The result was that the party taking the names was forced to quit.

[The facts appear to be that the Nova Scotia Co. of Bell Island desires to obtain a complete record of the names and occupation of all the men of Conception Bay in order to be in a position, when in need of men for special or other work, to locate any who are best suited for any particular line of work.

We are not in a position to verify this, but we give this information to our readers as we have obtained it. We understand that certain men are taking the names in other localities, and some of them are meeting with opposition.







### Rev. Dr. Jones' Impressions of Billy Sunday

Rev. Dr. Jones, Rector of St. Thomas's Church, St. John's, who recently paid a visit to Boston, gave a lecture last week to the St. Thomas's Men's Bible Class on his 'Impressions of Billy Sunday,' whom he was privileged to hear preach a short time ago in Boston. Feeling that our readers would be interested in getting some first hand information concerning this wonderful man, we clip the following account of the lecture from the St. John's Daily News:

The Rev. gentleman started by saying that he always liked Billy Sunday and that he liked him better since he heard him preach. He is one of the most famous men in the United States, and the religious world to-day. To get an idea of how well-known and popular he is, a few years ago there was a contest arranged among the American people to see who were the most famous among them, and Billy Sunday and Andrew Carnegie tied and came 8th in the list of America's greatest men.

Mr. Sunday, without doubt, owes all his greatness to God. He was a professional baseball player in his younger days, and at the age of 24 became converted and began to live a new life. He is now 55 years of age, and weighs 185 lbs. and is as agile as a man of 24. He takes great care of himself, is seldom or never sick, nor even with a cold. He attributes a great deal of his present vitality and energy to the knowledge he obtained in caring for his body in his baseball days. He has a wonderful personality and possesses a magnetism that is most unusual. He seems almost a mental, physical and spiritual dynamo, and apart from this he speaks and preaches from the abundance of the heart.

He had misgivings about how his associates would receive him on the baseball field after his conversion, but to his great surprise every man of them came forward and congratulated him on the stand he had taken. He was under contract to play for the whole season and wondered how he could be honourably released from it so that he could become a preacher, and decided that if a way should open up he would take it as a sign from God that he was called to be an Evangelist, and to his joy in a short time the way was miraculously cleared. The year following his conversion he was offered \$500 a month to play baseball again, but refused; at this time he was only getting \$85 a month, and was associated with Dr. Chapman, the well known Evangelist of that day. He has been preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ ever since. He preaches from an experience that is new every morning from communion with God. Over 300,000 people have "hit the trail" at Billy Sunday's meetings.

His language at times may be coarse and his actions occasionally not dignified enough to suit every one; but generally this is forgotten when the earnestness of the man is considered, and without doubt the Holy Spirit is with him and he walks with God Almighty. Dr. Chapman, his old leader, always preached the love of God. Mr. Sunday does not. He is a child of the old testament, uses dramatic language and preaches the moral law. The sermon Dr. Jones heard him preach was on sin. He thundered out the moral law, and made the sinner feel his sin and what is surprising, reads nearly all his sermons, stepping aside occasionally from his desk to elaborate or emphasize some point. He is gifted with several powers but claims that his power of preaching is not by nature. He is a great organizer, and has about him tremendous organizations. Boston was preparing one and a half years for his campaign. The tabernacle there cost \$50,000, and will hold 20,000 people, and seat 10,000. He has his own settlement, and is now building a tabernacle in Buffalo. The Boston campaign cost \$20,000. Everything has to be paid for before one cent goes to Mr. Sunday, and usually the collection of the last Sunday of the campaign is devoted to himself and staff and whatever is received before that, after all expenses are paid is given to the various benevolent organizations of the city at which he is. Prayer meetings, bible classes and other religious meetings were held by

trained men and women all over Boston suburbs preparing for Mr. Sunday's visit. These are men and women trained for this work, and show his great powers of organization. Dr. Jones said he believed that 25 per cent of Mr. Sunday's success could be attributed to his powers of organization. He has a wonderful vision of righteous men, and feels that he must live up to his record, and always aims at doing a greater work in the next city than where his campaign closes. Fourteen hundred and eight persons of all denominations came forward at the meeting he attended the other night, purposing, with God's help, to lead a new life and to shake hands with this wonderful man. Dr. Jones closed by saying how much good the meeting and hearing such a man did him, and prayed that he would profit by it. It was a very exhaustive and descriptive address to which this does not do even bare justice. It was a privilege to all present to hear first hand about this truly great man.

### Confederation Talk

Ottawa, Jan. 22.—In the House of Commons this afternoon, Gordon Wilson, of Wentworth, in the course of his speech in moving the address, expressed the hope that Newfoundland would consider favorably the question of becoming a part of the Canadian Confederation.

In the scale trembling.



### Eat Rice, Grow Fat, And Save Money

(Memphis Commercial Appeal.)

This is a free advertisement for rice. Rice is one of the few food products that has not advanced in price. You can get about four pounds of rice for a quarter. A quarter's worth of rice will carry you further than 50 cents' worth of beef. A quarter's worth of rice will carry you as far as 50 cents' worth of flour.

Rice is a wholesome food. Fashion caused a reduction of the greatest food value in rice requiring it to be polished. There ought to be a law forbidding the whitening of flour and polishing of rice. The law should be so that the whole grain should be ground into flour. People would have better teeth and better digestion.

But this article is about cheap food and not about the business of keeping healthy. Rice is the chief diet of about a third of the population of the world. The rice eating Jap whipped the filii of the tallow and flour eating Russian. A man can go further on a rice diet than on any other single article of food that is grown.

So, if you do not want to spend all your money for food, buy rice. If you want to have a variety in your diet, and that cheaply, buy sweet potatoes. And if you want dessert buy some molasses. Rice, sweet potatoes and molasses are the only food products we know of that are not very high. Eat rice, it is healthful; and eat rice, it is clean.

A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence. A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00. A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50. To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within an hour of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray. Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

No person in Newfoundland shall be permitted on and after the sixth day of December, 1916, to be in possession of any issue, either published since the first day of November, 1916, or hereafter published, of the following newspapers, namely:-

- New York American (Daily); New York Journal (Daily); Boston American (Daily); Boston Sunday American (Sunday); Chicago Examiner (Daily); Chicago Sunday Examiner (Sunday); Chicago American (Daily); San Francisco Examiner (Daily); San Francisco Sunday Examiner (Sunday); Los Angeles Examiner (Daily); Los Angeles Sunday Examiner (Sunday); Los Angeles Herald (Daily); Atlanta Georgian (Daily); Atlanta American (Sunday).

Any person convicted of a violation of this Regulation before a Stipendiary Magistrate or a Justice of the Peace shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding two hundred dollars, or in default of payment to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months or to both fine and imprisonment.

Recipes for the Cook

Plum Pudding—One cup water, one cup molasses, one cup chopped suet, 2 1/2 cups flour, one teaspoon soda, one cup bread crumbs, one teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 cup raisins, 1 cup currants, 1-2 cup citron. Mix the suet, spice and flour together, dissolve soda in two table spoonfuls of the water, hot and add it to the rest of the water and molasses. Mix all together, flour the fruit and mix in last. Turn into a well buttered mould and steam four hours.

Pudding Sauce.—One cup boiling water, two level tablepoons corn starch, 1/2 cup sugar, one table spoon butter, one egg, one teaspoon vanilla, 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg. Put water on to boil. Mix cornstarch and sugar together and stir it into the boiling water, stirring constantly until the mixture thickens. Remove from the fire, add the beaten yolk and the flavoring. Beat the white of the egg stiff and add it to the sauce. Serve cold.

Creamy Hard Sauce.—One half cup butter, one cup powdered sugar, one egg white, 1/2 cup rich fruit juice. Cream Butter, add sugar gradually. Whip white of egg and add it to the creamed butter and sugar. When well mixed add the fruit juice and serve. One teaspoonful vanilla may be used instead of the fruit juice.

War News

Submarines Captured

London, Ont., Jan. 16.—Lieut. Col. McMullen, commander of the Oxford Battalion who arrived from England last night, says before leaving Liverpool a big German submarine was brought in, all of the crew being dead. He was told that over one hundred undersea boats captured had been brought into a southern port.

Absolute Confidence

Petrograd, Jan. 22.—The Rusky Clovee says General Brussloff, Commander in Chief of the Russian armies of the south western front, addressing his staff officers said: "Information at my disposal and my personal conviction warrant me in saying that I am as certain as I am standing before you that during the coming year the enemy will be completely routed."

German Dugouts Bombed

London, Jan. 22.—The report from the British headquarters in France issued last night says, a successful raid was made this morning against enemy trenches southeast of Loos. Dugouts full of Germans were bombed and destroyed, and many casualties inflicted on the enemy with small cost to our selves. We secured some prisoners.

Serious Munitions Explosion

London, Jan. 19.—The following official communication was issued to night: The Ministry of Munitions regret to announce that an explosion occurred this evening in a munitions factory in the neighborhood of London, and it is feared the explosion was attended by a considerable loss of life and damage to property.

Pushing The Turks Back

London, Jan. 20.—The War Office communication issued to-night concerning operations in Mesopotamia, says, the enemy were expelled from a small strip on the right bank of the Tigris in the bend of the river north east of Kut-el-Amara, and a whole trench system on a front of 2500 yards to a depth of 1100 yards, is now in our possession. The right bank of the river from Kut-el-Amara down the stream has been cleared of the enemy. Further progress has been made against the enemy's trenches on the right bank southeast of Kut el Amara.

Notes and Comments

Elsewhere in this issue will be found a message from Ottawa dated Jan. 25, which we take from Tuesday's issue of the Daily News. It only adds to the feelings of a great many people here who had for some time past been discussing privately in certain circles. Some think that in the conclusion of the war an attempt will be made to round off the Dominion of Canada by the addition of Newfoundland to Canada's provinces. This may be done with or without the consent of the people of this Colony. The Imperial War Conference shortly to be convened in England will no doubt consider this as well as other matters.

A young Naval Reservist, Wm. Alma Kirby, of Hr. Buffin, P. B., passed away at the Fever Hospital, St. John's, on Saturday morning last, and was buried in the S. A. Cemetery on Sunday afternoon, the remains being drawn on a gun carriage by Naval Reservists. Deceased, who was only 18 years old, arrived on board the Briton on Dec. 4th, and was stricken with scarlet fever on Christmas Day. William Kirby did not live to see active service, but he nevertheless played a loyal citizen's part in volunteering for the defence of his country.

During the past fortnight we have met several men, some of whom are fathers of sons already fighting for the Empire, who, although over the prescribed age, are nevertheless anxious and willing to do something practical for the flag themselves. They are men between the ages of 45 and 50, sound and strong in wind and limb, and we venture to say can do as hard a day's work and endure as much fatigue as the average young man in our Regiment or in the Naval Reserve. We wonder if such men cannot fit in somewhere? We read the other day of hundreds of women being wanted in the Old Country for work in munition factories, etc. Why not give these men the opportunity to enlist for that and other work behind the firing line. They are fit; they are willing. Why not recruit say 300 or 400 such men and send them to the Old Country, and thus relieve other younger men who would then be free to go to the front.

The St. John's Municipal Council favors the appointment of a Medical Health Officer for the city alone. At present the duties of Dr. Brennan are divided, but as he resides in St. John's we may be sure the capital receives the most attention. The question now arises: If St. John's requires the full services of a public Medical Health Officer, how in the name of common sense can the public health of the whole country, east, north, west and south, including St. John's, be attended to? Only a madman would say that the public of the whole country are receiving the attention they require from a health standpoint. This war is showing us the importance of health. It is an all-important question, and one which demands the creation of a Department of Public Health, a department which would look after the interests of the public health the same as other matters are attended to by various other departments of the government. We look forward to the

time when a department of public health will be created; when medical examination of school children will take place, when sane and strict laws in reference to the health of the people will be placed on the statute book; and when bulletins pertaining to health matters will be issued from time to time.

The North Sea Fight

London, Jan. 24.—Special despatches from Holland give stories of the battle between German and British destroyers in the North Sea, but the details, which on some points are conflicting, are mostly not substantiated. It seems, however, certain that the main engagement began about two o'clock in the morning, and lasted until about seven.

It was fought in intense darkness, while the severity of the cold can be judged from the fact that each corpse on the V-69, the flagship of the German destroyer flotilla, was so frozen to the deck when the boat arrived at Yeuville that they had to be hewn free with axes.

All details of actual damage to ships refer to the V-69, which it is stated, was rammed by a British ship after being seriously battered. These correspondents report gossip that seven or ten German vessels were sunk but there is nothing confirmed in regard to this. According to the V-69 the Germans started from Helligeland with the intention of raiding the British coast, but were driven back toward Flanders where some took refuge in Zeebrugge.

It is confirmed that commander Boehm of the V-69 is alive, and, according to one report, uninjured. It is stated that he superintended the removal of the crew from the destroyer, as an examination of the ship proved the impossibility of repairing her within 24 hours. This, of course, implies an intention to intern her in the Dutch port, but nothing official is obtainable in regard thereto. A number of survivors of the sunken British vessel have arrived on the East Coast.

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
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
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
