But if this could have been done with the petty industry of that time, how much more rapid must be the accumulation of capital in these days of gigantic enterprise? Our reasoning will not be seriously weakened even if it be assumed that the continuance of peace would have raised the civil expenditure so that the revenue would have averaged twenty-five millions. On that hypothesis there would still remain nine hundred millions to be invested productively.

The value of our exports has more than quadrupled since 1810, and if the capital employed has been argumented in the same ratio in this instance, at any rate, Mr. Giffen's conclusions are fully borne out. Furthermore, our merchant tonnage has been trebted. In real efficiency as well as in cost it has been multiplied six or eight times, for one-third of our whole tonnage is now propelled by steam, and one steamer is equal to at least three sailing vessels of the same capacity, because of its comparative independence of the winds and its vestly greater speed. The growth of our textile and mining industries is too well known to need specification. There is, however, one form of wealth our own network at an outlay of over six hundred and fifty millions sterling, come into existence since the close of the war—the railways. 




