London, Oct. 22.—King George has issued an appeal to his subjects to come forward voluntarily and aid Great Britain in her fight against the Germanic allies. "More men, and yet more," the monarch says, "are wanted to keep my armies in the field, and through them to secure victory and an enduring peace." The message follows:

"To my people: At this grave moment, in the struggle between my people and a highly organized enemy who has transgressed the laws of nations and changed the ordinance that binds civilized Europe together, I appeal to you.

"I rejoice in my Empire's efforts, and I feel pride in the voluntary response from my subjects all over the world who have sacrificed home and fortune, and life itself, in order that another may not inherit the free Empire which their ancestors and mine have built. I ask you to make good these sacrifices.

"The end is not in sight. More men, and yet more, are wanted to keep my armies in the field, and through them to secure victory and an enduring peace. In ancient days the darkest moment has ever produced in men of our race the sternest resolve. I ask you, men of all classes, to come forward voluntarily and take your share in this fight.

"Mr. Arthur Private was sent to Canada by the Overseas Club of London, Eng., to organize contributions, from the Dominion to supply comforts in the form of tobacco for the Canadian troops at the front.

"The Overseas Club in sending him had every reason to believe he would accomplish a great work, and he has initiated many plans, including the placing of collecting lists in banks and the placing of collecting lists in banks and the placing of lists and boxes in post offices throughout the Dominion. etc.

"It should be understood that the Overseas Club in starting him on this mission did so from purely patriotic motives, and have themselves incurred heavy expenditure to carry out their ideal. The purpose of the club is to pledge its members as citizens of the greatest Empire in the world to maintain the heritage handed down by our fathers, believing the British Empire to stand for justice, freedom, order and good government.

"Five years ago the club had a small beginning. Today it has magnificent premises in Aldwych, London, in the very heart of the Empire's greatest city. It has upwards of 130,000 members, with His Majesty the King as patron, and H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught as vice-patron. Its long list of presidents and vice-presidents include names of Empire fame, and its central committee are some of the best known men in the city of London. The honorary secretary and organizer is Mr. J. Evelyn Wrench, and there are branches and corresponding secretaries in every town of any size that the Empire's corresponding sec

there are branches and corresponding secretaries in every town of any size in the Empire.

"The demand of The Toronto World for an account of the money collected by Mr. Arthur Private is answered by the statement that all moneys are paid by contributors, collectors, post offices, etc., into the various banks in Canada, and by them remitted to their headquarters, who, in turn, have instructions to make no payments except to the head office of the club in London.





EXPORTS FROM NEW BRUNSWICK OVER \$54,000,000

This Province Third in List of Exporting Provinces For Fiscal Year—Canadian Exports to France Greatly Increased, while Italy Rapidly Becoming Market for Canadian Products.

Ottawa, Oct. 22.—Ontario is once more the banner province of the Dominion with respect to contributions to the national exchequer in the form of duty paid on imports, as shown in the annual report of the customs department just issued. Ontario contributed \$33,318,000 in duties for the fiscal year ended March 31st, last.

Her nearest competitors is Quebec, with \$22,919,000. The smallest amount contributed by any province is that of Prince Edward Island with \$160,225. Nova Scotia is ahead of New Bruns-kick, the figures beins: Duty collected in Nova Scotia, \$2,930,000, and in New Brunswick, \$2,162,000. British Columbia and Manitoba, \$6,413,000. Alberta is ahead of Saskatchewan wkh \$2,484,000 as against \$1,356,000 for British Columbia and Manitoba, \$6,413,000. Alberta is ahead of Saskatchewan wkh \$2,484,000 as against \$1,356,000 for Saskatchewan, while Ontario is ahead in imports with a total of \$345,765,000. She falls short of Quebec in the volume of her exports.

New Brunswick Third in Exporting.

The exports of Quebec for the last fiscal year were \$181,982,000, compared with \$16,7685,000 for Ontario. New Brunswick is third on the list of exporting provinces, with \$54,322,000, British Columbia coming fourth with \$33. 627,000. The fiscal year, 1914-15, included four months, previous to the outbreak of the war. It is interesting to note that imports from Germany which during the fiscal year 1913-14 totalled \$14,500,000, fell to \$5,000,000 for the fiscal year ended March 31st, last.



All reports from the scene of the recent titanic struggle in France and Flanders emphasize the overwhelming importance of the artillery in preparing the way for the actual advance of the infantry. For two days and nights preceding the infantry assaults the German trenches and entanglements were drenched with a rain of shell fire such as has never before been witnessed. The view above shows the smoke cloud caused by a 10.5 shrapnel shell bursting over the Allies' trenches. What fifty such shells bursting close together would look like we must leave to the imagination of the reader. In the foreground, near the sandbagged dugouts, is a 150 millimetre German shell which fell into the Allies' trenches, but did not explode.

Petrograd, Oct. 22, via London—General Renenkampff has been placed on the retired list. Gen. Eral Renenkampff came into great prominence during the Russor Japanese war, being regarded as one of the ablest of the Russian commanders. Early in the present war he led the Russian invasion of East Prussia.
