DE VALERA TO **DEMAND IRISH** SELF-CONTROL

Manifesto Declares He Must Insist Upon Self-Determination for Ireland

NO MANDATE FOR ANY OTHER TERMS

Ireland Has the Calmest Week End in Many Months in Every Section.

London, July 17—The discussions between Premier Lloyd George and Eamonn De Valera, with the object of finding a basis for a general conference on the Irish situation, will be resumed tomorrow. It is probable also that Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, will confer with the prime minister. 
