At the storming of Geok Tepe or January 24, after the Russian troops had blown up the outer wall by dynamite and entered the breach, the enem began to quit the stronghold and flee towards the desert. The horsemen being mounted, were able to get away first, and then streamed out ten or twelve thousand fugitives on foot-men, women and children. Their path lav across the flat and open sands, without even a shrub or dip in Cutter. the ground to give them concealment, Against these Skoboleff sent the whole of his cavalry, a portion of his horse artillery, and as many vayonets as could be spared.
