## MAYOR McKAY AND COLLEAGUES WIN

Much Interest Taken in Civic Election—Many Faid Taxes.

The civic election held Tuesday and despite the extreme cold day, a very large vote was polled. Mayor McKay and seven of his colleagues were elected. H. A. Marquis being the only opposition member to win out.

Both sides worked hard, but the former, consisting of old campaigners, with Com. Belle-Lisle and Duncan at their head left no weak unions to win out.

In ward one the fight was exceedingly hot. Here a determined effort was made to elect Com. Belle-Lisle and early in the fight it looked as if he was doomed as nearly one hundred and fifty ratepayers had neglected to pay their taxes. But this handicap was overcome to some extent by the paying of taxes of those who would vote right and Com. Belle-Lisle won out by seven votes.

As was expected Ward II. voted in favor of Anderson for Mayor, but the majority here was not enough to offset the adverse vote of Wards I and II. It was in this ward that the opposition elected H. A. Marquis. Ward III voted solidly for the old council.

## COLD SNAP THIS WEEK

Thermometers Register Around Twenty Below for Three Days.

In common with the whole of the Maritime provinces Campbellton has suffered from a very severe cold spell. The cold started Sunday night with a high wind and snow storm. The mercury began to fall rapidly by 7 o'clock it was about fifteen below and following hard. During the day the wind came up somewhat, but it grew steadily colder and Tuesday it was about twenty below with a stiff wind.

It continued cold all day and night with another frosty below. Wednesday morning and below zero all day.

However this morning it is considerably milder and it is possible the cold snap is over.

St. John, Jan. 25.—The thermometer here at an early hour this morning.

**Coldest Since 1915 at Fredericton.**  
Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 24.—Not since the winter of 1915 has there been such low temperatures as recorded here during the night when the official temperature was 27 below zero. Many private thermometers in Fredericton showed 30 and 32 degrees below zero early this morning, and throughout New Brunswick the cold wave is the most severe experienced in years.

**Forty Below Zero at Blackville.**  
Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 24.—Blackville, on the Miramichi, reported 40 below zero, while on the Upper St. John River, Grand Falls reported 38 degrees below.

**QUEBEC'S BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR**

Some Large Items in Sister Province's Administration.

Quebec, Jan. 25.—The Hon. Jacob Nolin, Provincial Treasurer, has distributed a financial statement in which the receipts of the government for the fiscal year, 1922-23, are estimated at \$15,531,738.38. Some of the big items of the estimated revenue are as follows:

Alcoholic Liquor Act (trade account), \$2,000,000.  
License, \$1,485,000.  
Taxes on commercial corporations, etc., \$1,600,000.  
Duties on successions, \$1,500,000.  
Motor vehicle tax, \$1,200,000.

Among the items in the estimated expenditures the following appear:

Public debt, \$3,539,122.22.  
Administration of justice, etc., \$1,422,246.75.  
Public instructions, etc., \$1,308,322.49.  
Lunatic asylums, \$1,066,625.  
Roads, \$1,500,000.

The total of the estimated expenditures is \$15,326,917.40.

**MOVING PICTURES OF FORESTRY**

Opera House Crowded With Pupils And Teachers Monday Afternoon.

A. G. Couch, lecturer for the Canadian Forestry Association, who is touring the province in the interests of forest protection and conservation, addressed meetings here on Monday.

At a matinee at the Opera House stereo-optical slides were shown and also four reels of films bringing before the audience in picturesque scenes the unlimited wealth of New Brunswick's natural resources.

Mr. Couch has been joined by Sergt. A. Lager who will address the gatherings in the French speaking districts of Gloucester, Restigouche and Madawaska counties during the next three weeks. Motion pictures such as were shown here will be exhibited with all these lectures.

Mr. Couch addressed the Farmers' last week and also a gathering of 1,250 school children and 88 teachers. This town is being promoted jointly by the Canadian Forestry Association and the Provincial Government.

### COUNTY COUNCIL MET LAST WEEK

**H. C. Gillis Chosen Warden—Business Going Through Rapidly.**

The regular Annual Session of the Restigouche Council convened at the Court House Dalhousie, Tuesday morning.

The meeting was called to order and Dr. Murray was appointed chairman. Secretary-Treasurer read the names of the Councillors elected as follows:—

Coun. Gillis was chosen Warden on the casting vote of the Chairman.

Warden Gillis on taking the chair, thanked the Council for the honor of electing him Warden, and asked for the co-operation of the Councillors in the discharge of the business of the council.

The minutes of the July session were read and approved.

Moved by Coun. Dr. Murray, seconded by Coun. Murchie and carried unanimously by holding vote:—  
That whereas William D. Duncan of the Town of Campbellton, (now deceased) with marked ability and faithfulness represented the Parish of Addington in the Municipal Council of the Municipality of Restigouche during the last term, wherein also he exhibited a thorough and intimate knowledge of municipal affairs coupled with an untrusting devotion to his official duties and in public recognition of which he was again elected to the same office at the general election of Councillors in September last, although in failing health at the time of said election.

Be it therefore resolved that this Council place on record its high appreciation of the public services rendered by the said Coun. Duncan and the great loss which the County of Restigouche has sustained by his death.

Be it also resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to the bereaved family of the deceased as an humble tribute to his memory.

On motion it was resolved to hear Dr. Desmond of the Board of Health upon reassembling at 2 o'clock.

The Sec.-Treasurer read the minutes of meeting of ratepayers of Eldon voting \$100 for winter roads to be assessed.

The Secretary-Treasurer read the minutes of Ratepayers of Grimmer, voting \$1000 for winter roads, to be assessed.

The Secretary-Treasurer read a request from Rev. St. Audet, Supt. of the Hotel Dieu Hospital for an increased grant of \$1000.

The Chairman of the Board of Valuers submitted report of the Valuers.

The Warden appointed the following Accounts Committee:—Coun. Murchie, Arsenau, Savoie (Balmoral) Archibald, Dr. Murray, Copeland, Savoie, (Grimmer), Levesque, Barriere and McKay.

The council adjourned until 2 o'clock.

Tuesday Afternoon.  
The Council reassembled at 3 o'clock, Warden Gillis in the chair. All councillors present.

The minutes of the A. M. session read and confirmed.

Dr. Desmond of the Board of Health addressed the Council on Board of Health matters and submitted the report of the sub-district Board. He said that there had been very little contagious disease in Restigouche County during the past year. There had been a few cases of small-pox and diphtheria in Durham, but these had been carefully looked after. He said it was always a pleasure for him to meet the Councillors for Restigouche. Restigouche was one of the best counties in the province. It was free of all kind of debt and its councillors were always boosters.

Coun. Barbeau said the Court House was in bad shape and moved 500 pamphlets in English and 500 in French to be issued, not later than the last day of February 1921. Carried.

Moved and seconded, that the whole of the amount voted by the Council for the different parishes for the overseers of the Poor be paid to the re-treasurer of the County, at the close of this meeting.—Carried.

Moved and seconded, that all the Lists of Parish officers, submitted to the County Secretary-Treasurer, for 1921, by the Parish Councillors, be the legal lists of Parish Officers for each Parish, just as if they were read and passed by this Council.—Carried.

Coun. Savoy (Grimmer) moved that the Secy-Treas. be granted an increase of \$600 per year. Making \$1200. In all.

Coun. Murchie moved in amendment that an increase of \$400 be granted. Amendment carried.

On motion of Coun. Dr. Murray, Couns. Murchie, Arsenau and Copeland be the Council's representatives on the sub-District Board of Health.—Carried.

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**\$10,000 REWARD FOR MURDERER**

Sensational Murder of Paul Delorme, Ottawa Student—Clues Being Followed.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—A reward of \$10,000 was offered here tonight by Rev. Adelard Delorme for information that will lead to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who murdered his half-brother, Raoul Delorme, the 24 year old Ottawa College student, whose dead body was found with six bullet wounds in the head in a shack in the north end of this city on the morning of January 7 last. The reward will be paid immediately after conviction of the guilty parties.

Progress in the case was reported by the police today to consist in the discovery of an automatic pistol of the same calibre as the bullets found in the young man's head. It was found in an automobile said to have been seen around the district about the time the body was found. Other clues have also been followed with the result that much information is available for the second sitting of the coroner's court scheduled for Tuesday next. In the meantime the contents of the stomach have been analyzed and a report on this will be made to the coroner's jury by medical experts tomorrow.

Much talk is heard around town of a sensational arrest which may be expected shortly in the case but no definite information as to this was forthcoming tonight.

**CANADA'S POSITION.**

A Canadian customs revenue decrease of more than \$57,000,000 in the first nine months of the current fiscal year so plainly indicates the conditions existing that the public hardly need to be told the King government must turn a deaf ear to the demands of importunate followers for expenditure on public works, and that estimates will be pared to the bone. That course on the government's part may be suicidal, but any other course would mean national disaster. The task of the Liberal party is to avert that. The duty of every patriotic citizen is to stand loyally behind the government in support of every honest effort at that retrenchment the public accounts show is imperatively necessary. A few minutes' consideration of the trade figures will convince any thinking man and woman of the gravity of the problem the government faces. That consideration will convince every thinking man and woman that economy and business-like prudence in every department of our business affairs is the task of the nation deserving the hearty support of the people irrespective altogether of any of all political considerations.

During 1921 our imports were valued at \$799,294,598, against \$1,236,920,021 for the previous year. The variable imports were \$546,857,816, against \$890,847,353. The total customs revenue was \$122,575,653, against \$208,068,892 in 1920. Exports were \$816,624,281, against \$1,392,905,114. Total trade, \$1,615,988,879, against \$2,235,843,985. From the United Kingdom in 1921, Canada imported goods worth \$123,149,009 and exported goods worth \$308,860,848. Our imports from the United States were \$555,208,190, and exports \$326,969,382. Canada's financial needs for the ordinary running

expenses of the county have now become so great that money for extraordinary services can only be provided by heavy bonding, and bonding means still further increasing interest charges so heavy that they alone exhaust the revenues. If the Liberal government puts its back against the wall for four or five years and stoutly resists but its train service is as bad as ever. No trains to meet the Maritime Express, put on yet. This is something our Town Council should take up at once, probably they think it is not their business, but anything that will improve and benefit the town should be the business of the town council in the absence of a board of trade.

**THE ELECTION.**

The civic election on Tuesday created more than the usual interest and resulted in a win for Mayor McKay and his ticket. The entire ticket with one exception was elected. Mayor McKay and his colleagues went into the fight to win. They had a progressive policy which was favored by the majority of the electors even though, as a whole the acts of the past council were not acceptable. The proposals used was extensive and every member on the ticket worked hard to win and work usually means votes.

At all events it appears that Mayor McKay and his colleagues have a clear mandate from the people to proceed with the permanent work which their policy calls for. This is a time of progress and many citizens felt that if Campbellton is ever to grow and progress some such policy of permanent work was necessary. We hope that before the work is undertaken a thorough examination of the different kinds of permanent streets will be made, so that Campbellton may have the best that money can buy, and that our money will not be wasted.

**BUY GOODS MADE IN CANADA.**

In times like the present every nation finds itself obliged to go back to first principles in economics. With international trade still very much dislocated one of the safest fields for Canada to develop is its home market. Canadian goods should be bought by Canadian people if we are going to keep our factories open and our workmen employed. Already, within the past few weeks, our export trade has been showing increases, while our import trade has been showing a very rapid decrease. This is one of the healthiest signs which has been seen since peace was declared, and it indicates that we are once more back on the road to a healthful prosperity, but if Canadian purchasers will maintain the steadiness of purpose they have shown for some time past—Ex.

Moncton, Jan. 20.—A. G. Terney, B. S. A. Horticulturist, gave a short address on apple growing in New Brunswick and claimed that apples could be grown here as well as in any other province of Canada. British Columbia, he said produced about 200,000 bushels of apples twenty years ago, and in 1921 its output was over 3,000,000 bushels and New Brunswick was about in the same position as British Columbia had found itself in 1900. First class apples were grown yearly around Shediac, Moncton, Woodstock, the St. John Valley and in other sections of the Province.
