A Lilliputian Ocean Trip, THE ATLANTIC TO BE CROSSED IN A JOLLY-BOAT.
Within a few days a craft will take its de

parture from this port for a voyage across the Atlantic, smaller than any which has ever before been deliberately navigated for so large a distance. It will contain two men and a dog and the provisions for a voyage of about six weeks, during which the men will subsist upon half a pound of nest-which will be preserved in cansthree quarters of a pound of bread, and three pints of water each day. Out of this allow ance the dog is presumed to select his rations.

The object of the enterprise is more one of novelty than otherwise. Mr. John C. Don ovan, the principal owner, is now fifty-four years of age, and has been at sea since he was fifteen, while his companion, Mr. William Spencer, has had a large experinace Donovan conceived the idea of building the boat according to his own plans, and attempting to navigate her across the ocean to astonish the Johnny Bulls, and in the beight of the excitement attending such a singular adventure, to sell his vessel probably to good advantage.

The little craft is fifteen feet four inches






