TORONTO, Aug. 3-11 p.m.—The depression which was over the Northwest Territories on Friday has moved with diminishing energy to Northern Canada, causing local thunder storms in Ontario and Quebec. For the past two days the weather in the Northwest has been comparatively cool. The wind on the lakes has been moderate and variable. Minimum and maximum temperatures: On Aug. 3, 30-46; Winnipeg, 32-47; Port Arthur, 36-51; Toronto, 42-57; Montreal, 46-59; Quebec, 42-59.

TORONTO, Aug. 4, 10:30 a.m.—The indications for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville) are: Mostly fair; very warm weather, with local showers or thunder storms.

—Mr. John Conning, a talented young student from Knox College, Toronto, occupied the pulpit of the King Street Presbyterian Church yesterday, and preached eloquent sermons to large congregations both morning and evening.

—The death occurred in Detroit the other day of Mrs. John Fraser, who came to Canada with her husband and settled in London in 1860, a few years ago going to Detroit. The family surviving are—Hugh, in Scotland; Thomas, in Guelph; and John and Eliza, of Detroit.

—Mary Jones, a rather prepossessing looking girl of 18 years of age, appeared at the Police Court this morning charged with vagrancy. The girl has no home and has been seen wandering around Port Stanley and other places. She was remanded for a week.

—Mr. Anson Paul, of King street, who has reached the advanced age of 90 years, had a difficult surgical operation performed the other day by which he was relieved of a cancer from the back of his head. The patient stood the pain of the operation without the aid of anaesthetics.

—Rev. R. Neale, of the First Congregational Church, preached a strong sermon last evening on the subject of "The So-called Christian Science or Healing," in the course of which he vigorously denounced the "science" as contrary to the will of God, and something that should be avoided. He attributed the cures effected in this manner as of mesmeric origin.

—Rev. W. Tapscott, of Brampton, preached yesterday morning and evening in Talbot Street Baptist Church. His evening discourse was an eloquent and pointed application of the lessons to the Samaritan woman at Jacob's well, John, iv., 4. Rev. W. H. Porter, the retiring pastor, preached his farewell sermon on Sunday next.

—James Quinn, the aged news vendor, whose stenographic voice has for years been heard around the streets of London proclaiming that he was prepared to sell the ADVERTISER, containing all the news, is missed from his customary position at the street corner. He left the city this morning via C. P. R. on a visit to his daughter in Toronto, and will go from there to Glasgow, Scotland.

—Alfred H. Rodgers and William Smith, the two men who assaulted an old man named John H. Brown on July 25, appeared again at the Police Court this morning on the charge of assault on Mr. Brown. On behalf of the prisoners, the defence was conducted by Mr. J. W. Porter, the retiring pastor, who wished to drop proceedings. The Magistrate allowed them to go on suspended sentence.

—Mr. A. D. Hodgins, of this city, has in his possession a quaint old volume containing the first five chapters of the Bible printed in the year 1623. The book is bound in leather, which is the original cover, somewhat the worse for wear after its handling of over 200 years. The type is in old English, and the language plentifully interspersed with Latin.

—Owen Flynn and his wife, Annie Flynn, appeared at the Police Court this morning to answer a charge of keeping a house of ill-fame on Balaclava street near Richmond. William Burris was also charged with being a frequenter. The policeman who arrested them testified that on Sunday night at 11:30 p.m. he found Flynn, his wife and daughter, Burris and others all drunk, dancing round the house and otherwise making night hideous. The magistrate fined Burris \$5 or 20 days and allowed the others to go.

—The defense of Brothell.
Mr. George T. Blackstock has been retained, together with Messrs. Hellmuth & Ivy, as counsel for the defense in the Benwell murder case to be tried at the Woodstock Assizes next month. Messrs. Finke, McKay & McMullen, of Woodstock, are also engaged on the defense.

An Early Morning Blaze.
Shortly before four o'clock yesterday morning a telephone call was received from the residence of Mr. Samuel Munro at the Central Station to the effect that the residence of Hon. David Mills, Queen street, South London, was on fire. The department arrived on the scene shortly afterwards and found the rear of the house completely enveloped in flames, and it was only after a half-hour's hard work that the fire was got under control. The blaze started in the summer kitchen, and when first noticed by Mr. Brown, a neighbor, had gained considerable headway, and had communicated with the large extension in the rear of the house proper. All the kitchen utensils and furnishings, together with the household goods in the extension, were completely destroyed. The loss will amount to about \$700, which is covered by insurance. The household escaped in their sleeping clothing, but were soon enabled to dress. Willing hands aided in removing the furniture and Mr. Mills' valuable library. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Rev. R. Johnson at St. James' Church.
The pulpit of St. James' Presbyterian Church was occupied yesterday morning and evening by Rev. R. Johnson, B.A., of London, the morning the reverend gentleman selected as his text Matthew, i, 21: "And she shall bring forth a son and thou shalt call his name Jesus, for he shall save his people from their sins." He affirmed that Jesus Christ was the central figure of the world's history. From him there emanated an influence which had gone and was still going into every department of life until it would so permeate it that all would notice it. Jesus was the saviour from the power of sin in this world. He seldom referred to salvation as a thing of the future but always talked of it as a thing of the present. Man looked upon it as something to come, something for a death-bed, but when Christ preached his sermon on the mount he did not talk of things to come but of things then and there with them. What a sensation it would create if Christ preached to the fashionable churches or the money exchanges of Canada, and especially Matthew, v., 32, to the people of Chicago. If he saved men from sin in this world they would be saved from the penalty of sin in the other. Christ did not take sin from the man, but took man from the sin. Nor does he grant man his worldly desires so often prayed for. If man always received what he prayed for, heart would be so locked up that it would not be able to contain itself.
