THE FRUITS OF THE FRANCHISE

The Dominion Franchise Act is roundly condemned by men of all ranks and conditions of life. When it was introduced to Parliament there was no public demand for it. The adherents of neither political party had expressed dissatisfaction with with Senecal. They seem to have willthe Provincial lists, on which for nearly ingly accepted a share in all the tolls twenty years the elections of representatives in the House of Commons had taken place, and there was absolutely no reason for believing that, taking one thing with

the bone and sinew of the Dominion, were deprived of their rights as freemen, while thousands of men who had forfeited their vote by removal or other disqualification, were able to participate in every election

throughout the Province. But that is not all. The lists have recently been compiled. If the process of compilation were reasonably complete, as it is in the case of the municipal voters' lists, there would be little trouble to anyone, but as it is, there has been no end of work and expense for both political parties, and the end will not be till after the Court of Revision, at which the revis-

ing officer will be called upon to adjudi-cate upon some 1,500 cases appealed to him. One of the worst outrages of the act is the discrimination against the income voters. The last municipal voters' list is made the basis for compiling the Dominion list, but every man who qualified on in come, no matter how large, was left off the preliminary list. He either had to go to the trouble of making a declaration of his qualification or he now finds himself

income voters regard this discrimination as decidedly unfair. We have been repeat-voters to qualify in that manner, and dispense with much of the red tape, the wholesale sending of registered letters to persons whose qualifications are regarded as doubtful, and the vexatious waste of time and money in dancing attendance or the Revision Court? Simple registration a week or two before election, with heavy penalties to prevent illegalities, would certainly be a vast improvement upon the present cumbrous, expensive and grossly

inequal methods.

The system, however, we will have with ns, with all its faults, and they are many, till public opinion sweeps every advocate for its continuance from Parliament. What nembers of both parties now must see to is hat the full legal vote of the constituencies shall be put on the lists. It is a hard thing for a well-qualified voter to have to fight for his right, which could be so easily conserved under a better order of affairs. To a workingman it is no small sacrifice to have to jump attendance or courts of revision to secure the exercise of the suffrage that should be his by right of manhood. But for the present there is no other way for procuring or defending his franchise. Let the sacrifice now be made, and let us all work to bring about the re peal of an act so unf. ir to large sections the community, so expensive and unsatis factory to all except those charged with its management.

LONG HOURS IN PARLIAMENT. It is asserted by the London Lancet that the excessive strain of British Parliamentary life had much to do in hastening the death of Mr. Smith and Mr. Parnell. "Differen hours," it says, "a different tone of public discussion, a different bearing of public men toward each other, more like that which obtains among men of common society, less heat and impulse in leaders, would alter for the better the whole character of our legislation, and would sensibly extend the liver of our best men." The case of Mr. Gladstone is cited as exceptional, but even for him the strain of party life is a danger more than his friends like to think of, and from which many would like to see him extricated. There is the same trouble in Parliamentary bodies the world over. Men who live a regular life at home, going to bed early and rising at a reasonable hour, on going to Parliament have to revo lutionize their methods. At Ottawa, for ex mple, when the House of Commons gets under way, it is no unusual thing for the members to be kept sitting till the early hours in the morning. No wonder Premier Abbott holds the idea that an old and infirm man like him could not stand the strain and prefers a seat in the Senate to a chair in the House of Commons. Are such irregularities necessary? Members of Parliament say it is difficult to change the pernicious custom. But that is no reason why late sittings should be continued. The committees could easily meet at 9 a.m. and adjourn at noon, permitting Ministers and members to lunch and confer till 3 p.m. adjourn at 6 till 7:30, and then sit not later than 11:30. PROF. Snow conveyed the startling infor-

mation to the American Public Health Association at its meeting in Kansas City that the chinch bug did the crops of the country \$100,000,000 damage a year. The professor has, however, discovered how to rid the country of the pest, and he explained the novel method to the vondering scientists. A few diseased bugs were captured. They were put in large glass whose bottom was covered with damp sand. They were well supplied with green wheat. As many healthy bugs as could be captured were then put in the jar. In thirteen days nearly every bug was dead. They had all caught sporetrichum globuliferum. As demands for these infected bugs came in, and they came fast, half a dozen dead bugs were put in a pill box and sent to each farmer who wanted to kill bugs. 



The Waterworks Engineer's Report on the Water Supply in Relation to the Proposed Leonard Enths—

The total water available and collected for use at Springbank is 3,500,000 gallons in 24 hours. The average quantity used daily this year is 3,250,000. Assuming that the plunge for the proposed Leonard baths would be 18 feet wide, 63 feet long and 4 feet deep, it would contain 4,630 cubic feet, and if filled once a day the amount of water used during the year would be 1,708,200 cubic feet. At the rate of 10 cents per 100 cubic feet the cost of this would be 31,708 20 per amount. The cost of twenty baths at 38 each would be \$160, making the approximate total cast of the water for both plunge and other beaks \$1,888 a year.

The above is the substance of Waterworks Engineer Moore's report for the information of the City Council. It was submitted at a meeting of the water commissioners Tuesday night, who passed it ento the higher body without comment, although positively stating that the supply would not admit of city water being used for the proposed baths.
