Cholera Uncontrolled. BERLIN, Jan. 23 .- The cholera in the Neitleben Lunatic Asylum at Halle grows Neitleben Lunatic Asylum at Halle grows worse. A number of those stricken with the disease have died within a few hours. The total number of cases since the out-break is 84, of which 38 have proved fatal. There have been six new cases of cholera and one death in the Neitleben Insane Asylum to-day.

Colliery Catastrophe. Colliery Catystrophe.

London, Jan. 23.—The wall of the shaft in the colliery at Pontypridd, near Aberdare, collapsed this afternoon as the shifts were changing. Fifteen men were on their way up and many were waiting below. Six of the fifteen making the secent were killed instantly and others were injured severely. Ten men at the bottom of the shaft were also injured. Three more men may die.

Trumble at Gusternala.

Trouble at Guatemala. PANAMA, Jan. 23.—A dispatch from Guatemala says that a mob had attacked the British Legation and had beaten Minthe British Legation and had beaten Min-ister Gosling's oldest son so severely that he may die. Minister Gosling's youngest son shot one of the mob dead. The British warship Melpomene is at San Jose, and her commander has cabled for the Warspite and Nymph to come and assist him in blockading the port. President Barries protests that he is powerless to make reparation, as any attempt on his part to atone for the outrages would cause an Indian uprising, if not a general revolution.

The Egyptian Question. London, Jan. 23 .- The Cabinet held two long sessions to-day to consider the Egyptian question. Lord Rosebery has received advices from Lord Cromer, the British Minister to Egypt, to the effect that the Khedive has intimated his intention to refor to the Turkish Sultan and to the treaty powers the action of England in urging the dismissal of the Egyptian Cabinet. Other advices from Cairo state that the natives are in a more excited condition than at any time since the outbreak of Arabi Pasha.

THE WALPOLE MURDER.

Considerable Mystery Said to Surround

All Implicated Men Belong to the Chippewa Tribe.

ALGONAC, Mich., Jan. 24.—An autopsy was held yesterday afternoon by Drs. Mitchell and Knight, of Wallaceburg, on the dead body of the Indian, Frank Roy, murdered by his companions in a carousal late Saturday evening. In removing the scalp a fracture of the skull was discovered extending over the right temple, causing considerable congestion of the cerebra membranes of the right hemisphere. This, together with injuries received by concustors.

considerable congestion of the cerebral membranes of the right hemisphere. This, together with injuries received by concussion at the base of the skull, were, in the opinion of the medical men sufficient to considerable discoloration of the throat, denoting a strangulation by compression of the wind-pipe. This report will be presented at the inquest to be held in Port Lambton to-day by Coroner Frazier, of Sarnia.

There is more mystery surrounding this and occurrence than is at first sight apparent. JACOBITES STILL FLOURISH.

The Jacobite movement countinues to flourish in certain fashion. Although in the public view it has not got beyond the stage of ridicule, its advocates, or some of them, appear to be terribly in earnest. They do not propose to initiate a rebellion, but they cling with fervor to their claim that Queen Victoria does not represent the direct and only original Stuart line. A meeting of Jacobite clubs has been held at St. Ives, the Marquis de Ruvigny presiding. The marquis announced that he had been on a visit to New York, where no little enthusiesm was displayed in behalf of the Jacobite cause. Branches of the league had been founded in New York, Philadelphia and Boston. The marquis severely censured the Right Hon. J. G. Shaw-Lefevre for his harshness in having recently forbidden the Jacobites to decorate the Whitehall statute of Charles I. The marquis also described in elequent language the sympathy felt by the Jacobites for the cause of the Carlists in Spain. The meeting cang Jacobite songs with great enthusiasm, and adjourned after earnest expressions of loyalty to the ancient and direct line of Stuart.

Main circus, and at present in charge of the animals at the Wonderland Musee, was the victim of a thrilling occurrence Sunday afternoon and had a miraculous escape from being crushed in the coils of a boa constrictor. He had burned a sore out of the mouth of the reptile, causing it intense pain. About noon he opened the cage and took out the snake for the purpose of examining the sore. The reptile at once coiled itself around Bannon's body and neck, pinioning his arms down to his sides. Tighter and tighter coiled the snake, and Bannon became unconscious. J. D. Harrison tried to pry it off the man's neck with an iron bar, but the snake turned on him. He then opened his knife and cut the reptile's throat. It was ten feet long, weighed 111½ pounds and was valued at \$100. The snake was exhibited every day by a female charmer, and never showed signs of vicious ness before. Bannon will recover. Conference on the Subject Be tween Toronto Ministers.

Anglican, Presbyterian and Baptist Views on the Subject.

TORONTO, Jan. 23.—An important conference on the subject of church union took place this morning between a committee representing the Anglican Ministerial Association and the Ministerial Association and the Ministerial Association.

terial Association and the Ministerial Association proper, representing Presbyterians, Methodists, Baptists and Congregationalists. Rev. Wm. Frizzle, president of the association, occupied the chair, and the attendance was large.

Rev. Jas. Grant presented the views of the Baptists on organic union. He thought there should be little difficulty in finding some means of amalgamation between the Baptists and Congregationalists. But, however, the Baptists would just have to possess new sentiments and opinions on the subject of baptism, a matter which was to the members of the Baptist community a matter of faith. The teaching of the Baptists were that the

have to possess new sentiments and opinions on the subject of baptism, a matter which was to the members of the Baptist community a matter of faith. The teaching of the Baptists were that the ordinances were means of grace only as they accentuated gospel truths. Baptists could not enter the proposed union without abandoning their belief as to the subject fitted for baptism.

Provost Body dealt with the matter from the Anglican standpoint. He was glad to be able to discuss with his brethren of the Ministerial Association, and referred to the meeting of Presbyterians, Methodists and Anglicans at the first conference held in the city three years ago. He was quite certain that the proposed movement would ultimately result in success. Beyond question the trend of Christian thought was toward Christian union. The Anglican Church was not seeking to put out an independent panacea of her own. Things which were non-essential should not be allowed to block the way. The Congregationalists, he had heard, had found it almost impossible to dispense with some system of central government. As to doctrine, it had not appeared at previous conferences that doctrinal differences welld prevent harmony. Those having divergent views might be brought together.

Rev. Dr. Caven said he believed real spiritual union would manifest itself in outward forms. It was a mistake for anyone to say it was a good thing that there should be denominational differences. But if union could not be brought about without every Christian being conscientiously satisfied it would be a bad thing for the church as a whole to have it come. The whole Protestant doctrine could be found in the New Testament, and could not be found in the prestant doctrine. Rev. Dr. Langtry said there were no doubt many in the audience who would consider his remarks as coming from a "medie val, narrow-minded bigot." "No, no!" criedmany. Regarding Canada's Trade and Commerce.

Collated from the Official Returns for 1892.

Whence the Country Gets Its Imports and Where Its Products Go-The N. P. and the Carrying Trade.

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—The trade and navigation returns for the last fiscal year, ending June 30, 1892, show that the aggregate trade of the country was \$241,369,443, an increase over last year of \$23,000,000. The aggregate trade in 1874, a year of tariff for revenue only, was \$217,665,510, so that the increase in eighteen years is less than \$24.000,000. Progress in this respect was much greater between 1868, the date of the union, and 1874, which brief period shows a total increase of \$86,000,000. Between 1868 and 1878 it was over \$41,000,000. That was the first ten years of Confederation. From 1882 to 1892, the last ten years, the increase was under \$20,000,000—not half as great as the first period.

EXPORTS AND IMPORTS.

The exports for 1892 were \$11,963,000, an increase over 1882 of \$11,000,000. The increase of 1882 over 1872 was \$20,000,000. If these figures are an index the country was much more prosperous between 1872 and 1882 than during the ten years brought to a close on June 30, 1892.

The imports totaled \$127,406,068 last year, a few thousands less than in 1874. Taking the same test years, 1872, 1882 and 1892, the decade increase was precisely the same. Our total imports for the last ten years from Great Britain and the United Year.





THE LONDON AND PORT STANLEY LEASE.

At length, the agreement between the city and the Cleveland syndicate has been signed, and the London and Port Stanley Railway will pass from the control of the Grand Trunk Railway to that of the new management on April 1 next. The ADVER-TISER said at the inception of the negotiations that if carried out the deal would be a big thing for London, and it continues to hold that view. Of course, a better bargain could have been made, but it has been pretty conclusively proved that, taken all in all, the agreement does full justice to the city, and is certain to be to its material advantage. Many of us hoped to have the Grand Trunk Company continue to operate the railway, but since the Grand Trunk resolved to construct the Kingscourt branch connecting the St. Clair tunnel by direct route with the Air Line, it has been made vident that the London and Port Stanley was of comparatively little value to its present lessees. The new managers score, indeed, not so much because they are able to control a direct route to a favorite summer resort and to lake navigation, but because they have at their back extensive exporting companies in the United States who desire to find a near market for their coal and iron products. That connection, as matter of course, none of the trunk lines reaching this city could obtain by way of Cleveland, Ashtabula and Port Stanley This syndicate, by taking the coal and iron companies into partnership, has been successful in organizing a company that will make the route of decided advantage to both the lessees and the commercial and industrial population.



Mayor Essery seconded this.

Just then a few words from Mayor Oille, of St. Thomas, gave the whole thing a temporary setback. Mayor Oille entered a protest. There was no consideration for St. Thomas in the matter of passenger rates, he said. The lease made the railroad fares from St. Thomas to Port Stanley the same as from London, viz., 30 cents return for excursions and 19 cents a single trip on the commutation tickets. This was not fair. St. Thomas was only one-third the distance of London and ought to have a proportionate rate of 20 cents and 10 cents respectively. This would be a two-thirds proportion of fares for one-third the distance.

Great Britain Determined to Control Egypt.

More Troops in Readiness for the Land of the Nile.

Desant Anti-British Attitude of the Young Khedive.

London Jan. 24 .- A Cairo dispatch LONDON, Jan. 24.—A Cairo dispatch says Lord Cromer called upon the Khedive this morning to inform him that the British Cabinet had ordered an increase to the British garrison in Egypt. No doubt is felt that the dispatch had a profound impression in dissipating any idea in the Khedive's mind that Mr. Gladstone intended abandoning Egypt.

Major-Gen. Sir Francis Wallace Grenfell, of the Egyptian army, who is now in London, was at the War Office to-day in consultation with Rt. Hon. Campbell Bannerman, Secretary of State for War.

It is officially stated at the War Office that both Sir Francis Wallace Grenfell and Gen. Kitchener the Sirdar of Egypt, who has complete authority over the Egyptian troops, unite in guaranteeing the loyalty of the native troops to their Euglish officers. For this reason, chiefly, the Government, acting largely upon the advice and opinion of Sir Francis Wallace Grenfell, will, for the present, limit the number of British reinforcement to 1,000 men, but arrangements have been

limit the number of British reinforcements to 1,000 men, but arrangements have been completed to draft 10,000 men on three days' notice from the British garrisons in Malta, Cypress and India to Ezypt.

The troops on their way to India to relieve British regiments about to depart from India are detained at Port Said until advised to proceed. The British could, therefore, in a short time bring about the 15,000 British troops to bear against any insurrection in Egypt. surrection in Egypt.

The latest dispatches from Cairo state that hostility of the Khedive towards the English shows no signs of abating.

In answering the threat uttered by Lord Cromer, to the effect that a complete change of regime might be necessary in the event of resistance to. British authority, the Khedive replied that he only yielded to force. The Khedive has been strengthened in his attitude of antagonism toward the English by deputations from the provinces headed by local officials hostile to British control. These deputations have addressed the Khedive in fulsome and flattering language, congratulating him upon his opposition to the English.

Paris, Jan. 24—The sensation in France over the action of the British in Egypt is increasing.
