Taken From the Local Merchants Annually To Enrich Coffers of Big Detroit Emporiums — City Retailers Simply "Grin and Bear It."

For years the retail merchants of London have been giving an exhibition of "gameness" that is perhaps not paralleled in any other

We mean, that almost since there were women in London they have been going to Detroit to buy drygoods and dresses and fineries and These fair smugglers crowd the trains every time there is an excursion and come back loaded with "Bought-in-Detroit" articles. It is true that they wink at the law, but the unwritten law which permits the gentle practice of evading the customs seems to justify them.

Annually, there is a sum, estimated in the tens of thousands of dollars by some, taken from Lonlon and given to the merchants of Detroit. So far as can be learned the merchants of London have never made an effort to prevent this practice, and have simply grinned

The practice of smuggling from Detroit and other American points by the women of London is responsible for keeping back the city stores to a large extent. It is not "being loyal to London" to take a purse well filled in London by London effort to be spent in Detroit regularly. By this it is not suggested that it is not most desirable to trave! to American cities and to buy whatever one may want for souvenirs and small personal needs, but it is highly unpatriotic to make Detroit the purchase place of London homes when the stores of London are doing a great deal to maintain the city and to keep many

# OF BULGARIA'S GERMAN PACT

French Journal Sees In Complaint Against Servia Evidence of Complicity With

Getting away with an auspicious start, the Western Ontario Consignment Sales Company, the representaco-operative organization of breeders of high-grade stock throughout the country, yesterday afternoon conducted at the Fraser House stables one of the most successful live stock sales in the history of London. It was the company's first sale, and It was a recordbreaker. Because of the fact that the militia authorities are still using the buildings at the Western Fair, where it was proposed to hold the sale, the consignments were limited to about fifty head of pure

Nearly \$7,000 Realized.
Close to \$7,000 was realized by the sale, while animals will go as far west as Edmonton as a result, For the purpose of bringing buyer and seller together, one of the main objects of the sales company, no better medium could have been imagined. Stock men from over the entire Western peninsula and from Eastern Ontario and the Far West were in attendance. More than 300 attended the Bidding was brisk, and County Clerk Captain T. E Robson, who acted as auctioneer, kept things humming.

Prices realized were exceptionally good. In only one or two instances were any animals withdrawn. A number of young calves, in both Shorthorn and Holstein classes, brought the average prices down somewhat, but in spite of this, \$243.50 was the average horses; approximately \$130 for Shorthorns and \$110 for Holsteins. Laidlaw and James Murray, of Westminster, were prominent in the management of the sale, while all the well-known breeders and buyers of this section of the country were out in full force.

To sum up, the German general staff has placed upon its record since the beginning of the campaign apart from the failure of its general plan, which aimed at the crushing of France in a few weeks-seven de feats of high significance, namely, defeat of the sudden attack on Nancy; defeat of the rapid march on Paris; defeat of the envelopment of our left in August; defeat of the same enveloping movement in November, defeat of the attempt to break through our centre in September; defeat of the coast attack on Dunkirk and Calais, and the defeat of the attack on Ypres.

"The German army, powerful and courageous as it may be, has therefore succeeded in gaining the advantage upon no single point, and its forced halt after months of war condemns it to a retreat, the pace of which may be accelerated by the Russian successes, but the necessity of which is now a foregone conclusion, in pendently of those successes.'





# SPECTACULAR LIFE

Prinz Eitel, Interned, To Be Kept At Norfolk Navy Yard.

CAPTAIN IS HEARTBROKEN

Says He Only Gave Up When It Became Absolutely Necessary.

[Canadian Press.] Newport News, Va., April 8. — With the internment today of the German auxiliary cruiser Prinz Eitel /Friedrich and her crew, the commerce-destroyer ended her spectacular war career. She will remain at the Norfolk navy yard until the end of the war.

Decision of Commander Thierichens, of the Prinz Eitel, to intern his ship followed the receipt by him of an imperative notice from the United States Government early last night that the time limit for his stay in this port would expire at midnight. Had he not isked to intern his ship Captain Thierichens would have been compelled to depart from American waters not later than 4 a.m. today.






