Government found the problem solved was that the cash and to be solved was that the cash and the lands had largely disappeared, the liabilities remained and the road was insolvent. What course remained except intervention by the Dominion Government or by the Provincial Governments? There were two main considerations. The first was that of bringing the enterprise to a successful conclusion by the completion of transportation system. The C. N. R. had given Canada both colonization and competitive service. Now the road was found to be insolvent. Was it for the Dominion or the provinces to

for the Dominion or the provinces to intervene?
