British Naval Expert Pays a Tribute to American Methods.

London. Dec. 12.—(British Wireless Service).—Tribute is paid to the enthusiasm, foresight, skill and instinct of the American naval authorities by Archibald S. Hurd. naval critic of the Daily Telegraph, in a long article on America's naval contribution to the war. He details the results of intensive training for landsmen, and says:

"The Americans hustled to some purpose in order to develop their navy to meet the particular demands of the war. It must have seemed impossible to multiply the personnel of the fleet nearly ten times, but that is the undertaking which was fast approaching completion when fighting ceased.

"When America entered the struggle she had only 176 ships in commission. Today the number, including scores of small craft, has reached 1,800.

"American seamen have done magnificent work. Any reference to them would be incomplete without mention of the skill and courage they exhibited in laying the great mine fields in the North Sea."

There is no doubt that the executive committee technically has a right to invite the Bolsheviki and to order the cabinet to receive them. The fact that the committee surrendered this right is looked upon as significant.

BOLSHEVIKI ARE REPULSED WITH SEVERE LOSSES

Anglo-Russian Troops Capture Supplies in Counter-Attack.

Archangel, Dec. 10 (delayed).—By the Associated Press.—The Bolsheviki forces were repulsed with considerable losses when they launched strong attacks against the Russo-Allied positions on the sector between the Dvina and the railroad near Narasevo on Saturday. The Anglo-Russian troops captured considerable booty in a counterattack. On the Pinega sector the Russo-Americans have withdrawn to more tenable positions than the villages far up the river which they recently captured.

ESTHONIAN FRONT HOLDS OUT AGAINST BOLSHEVIKI ATTACKS.

Stockholm, Dec. 12.—The delegation from the Russian Baltic provinces which has its headquarters here, received a telegram yesterday reporting that the Esthonian front was still holding against the attack launched upon it by the Russian Bolsheviki, although the situation was grave, because of a shortage of arms and ammunition. Russian ships have bombarded the coast from Narva to Asserien, but attempts of the Bolsheviki to land on the Esthonian shore were frustrated. In the south the Bolsheviki have captured Neuhausen, west of Pskov.


