Paris, Sept. 17.—The president of the Ukrainian delegation to the peace conference has written to M. Clemenceau, president of the conference, protesting against attacks by Gen. Denikine's volunteers upon the Ukrainian army, which was in pursuit of Bolshevik forces fleeing after the recent capture of Kiev. The letter says that Gen. Denikine is "making use of entente assistance which was intended to enable him to fight the Bolsheviki, to penetrate Ukrainian territory with the object of re-establishment of the Russian Empire." It also declares that the attack on the Ukrainian army permitted the fleeing Bolsheviki to make their escape.

# BRITISH ELECTORS **ANXIOUSLY AWAIT** PREMIER'S ADDRÉSS

Lloyd George's Announcement On Vital Issues Expected Tonight.

London, Sept. 17.-Premier Lloyd George's return to England last night feorge's return to England last night from his vacation at Deuville, France, and a brief visit in Paris will be followed tonight by an address which will be delivered at the London City Temple and which, in view of the extreme political and economic unrest prevailing in the country, is awaited with keenest curiosity and interest. Among the many topics which the

public is eager to hear the premier dis-cuss are the Russian tangle; Ireland; the reduction of national expenditures; industrial developments; the probable dissolution of Parliament and a general election. An election would be particularly welcomed, but it is doubt ful if the premier will speak on that subject tonight, it being suggested that he will probably avoid controversal topics as far as possible. In view fact that the speech will be addressed to the international brotherhood con-gress, Mr. Lloyd George will confine himself mainly to elaborating his recent appeal to the nation to co-operate in the establishment of a new world or der, leaving other matters for addresses he has promised to deliver elsewhere

"And be it further resolved that after careful thought and full consideration we are of the opinion that the granting of such bonus upon an equality." granting of such bonus upon an equality basis be limited only by the country's ability to pay, so as to enable the beneficiary to become efficiently restablished with security and happiness, the classification of beneficiaries, the method of distribution and administration to be agreed and decided and did his work faithfully and finally upon by a joint Parliamentary and G.W.V.A. commission:



Doherty, minister of justice, speaking in the House of Commons tonight, officially and definitely stated that the Parliamentary committee which will be appointed to deal with the new soldiers' civil re-establishment bill will not take up this matter. He stated that the proposition that every returned man, regardless of his financial situation should be paid this gratuity, was not in the interests of the country or not in the interests of the country or

Monthly Payments.

Replying to a question by Major D.

L. Redman as to whether the Government would consider making monthly payments to soldiers, the minister of justice said that any matter which came under the head of soldiers' civil re-establishment would be considered

by the committee.

Answering Col. Currie, Mr. Doherty said that there was no fixed indemnity which Canada was to receive from Germany. The Allied nations were to submit statements on losses suffered by civilian populations, pensions and allowances to soldiers and dependents, allowances to soldiers and dependents, and Canada would receive her share of whatever the commission decided that Germany could pay.

In regard to finding work for returned soldiers the records showed that 16,000 had been placed in the public service, and recently they were being engaged at the rate of forty to fifty daily.

the prohibition question in the hands
of the people, and I, as the chosen
leader of the great Liberal party, am
well content to let the people decide."
Mr. Dewart declared, amid ringing
cheers. "While the referendum ballot
looks like a maze, the people, I am

sure, will solve the riddle in no uncertain manner," he added.

"The people of the province will show that they do not desire any changes in the Ontario temperance act," said Lambert Wigle, who was called on by President Buckland to give an account of his stewardship. "The act, forced from the Government by public opinion, needs no amendment. The people of this district will vote almost unanimously against any change," he continued.

Criticising the Government for its lack of sympathy with the rural communities, Mr. Wigle said the farmers could not expect anything more tangible than promises from the Hearst Government.

"Now that the election is near, they have decided that Essex County is in need of an experimental farm. # "DIRECT ACTION" IS THREATENED BY LABOR MEN

To Force 8-Hour Day and 44-Hour Week All Over Canada.

Question of Shorter Hours Warmly Discussed at Industrial Conference.

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.—A threat of "direct action" to enforce legislation making the eight-hour day and 44-hour week compulsory all over Canada, which came from more than one week compulsory all over Canada, the which came from more than one source, served to liven up the afternoon session of the national industrial conference, held in the Senate chamber. The question of shorter hours of labor in the industries of the Dominion was the bone of contention during almost the entire afternoon, and the respective views of capital and labor on the subject were ably presented.

major in the industries of the Dominion was the bone of contention during almost the entire afternoon, and the respective views of capital and labor on the subject were ably presented.

Capital objected that reduction of the hours of labor meant reducing the output of factories and workshops. "There is nothing that will decrease production so much as a strike of a month or more in duration," countered James Winning, one of the leaders in the recent Winnipeg strike, "and that is what may come."

Volcano of Unrest.

Industrial peace, in the opinion of Mr. Winning, and also of other labor speakers, was at present somewhat of a delusion in Canada. Not faw helm.

Not far below the surface there was a smouldering volcano of unrest which might burst forth at any moment, he said, and unless the question of the eight-hour day and 44-hour week was settled at this conference it would be the chief issue in a strike within a very short period.

M. P. White, a Toronto manufacturer, thought that labor wanted the basic eight-hour day that it might benefit from overtime at a premium wage, and other speakers for the employers held that the time was not ripe for this sort of legislation. Labor speakers, including one woman delegate, Miss Helen Gutteridge of Vancouver, parried that the time was never riper for labor legislation in the opinion of those who opposed it, and that the workers wanted something better than to eat, sleep and work.

More Speed Needed.

The recommendation in favor of shorter hours was still before the constant.

The recommendation in favor of shorter hours was still before the conference when adjournment was made, and Senator Robertson, vice-chairman

and Senator Robertson, vice-chairman of the conference, warned the delegates that there must be more speed in order to finish with the agenda by Saturday. This was only the second resolution of the afternoon.

Miss Gutteridge, the first lady to address the conference, replied to what she called "the very, very pessimistic note which ran through M. P. White's discourse."

The eight-hour day, she declared, was not asked as the ideal of labor, but it was a compromise between the ideas of Canadian manufacturers and labor. Canadian workers realized their duty in reconstruction, and in bearing the burden of the war debt, she said. The east was hampered by old customs and ideas and might find it hard to take up the eight-hour plan, but it would be for the benefit of labor in general.

# **BOARD OF RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS HEAR** LIST OF PROTESTS

Judgment Was Reserved in All Cases Heard.

Ottawa, Sept. 17.—The board of railway commissioners for Canada yesterday began their regular traffic sittings to be held throughout the season at the central station building, the first and third Tuesday of each month. Hon. F. B. Carvell, recently appointed to the chairmanship, presided for the first time. After the session he declared himself as entirely satisfied with the proceedings and stated that if the work continued to be as interesting as it was yesterday he would like it very much.

The complaint of the Dominion Millers' Association, represented by C. B. Watt and the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, represented by J. E. Walsh and S. B. Brown, against the new milling in transit rules filed by the railways and which became effective September 1, 1919, were heard. Mr. Watt and the other representatives of the government, was not printed through public funds.




