### **BUSY WAR ON SCHOOL BOARD**

**Prevents City Council From** Attending to Business, Say Water Commissioners

Local Paper was "Stuffed" and Wrote Silly Editorial-Asked to Apologize-Other Business

"Some time ago," said Chairman Dw. J. L. Bray, LL. D., at the meeting of the Water Commissioners last evening, "a civic committee waited upon this Board and together we went pver the question of maining the city and its immense practical and financial advantages. They assured us the matter would forthwith receive the careful attention of the Council. "That's the last we ever heard of it," concluded the Doctor. "I suppose the Council's too busy fighting the School Board to deal with civic business."

Both the Chairman and Commis-sioner Sheldon (the Mayor being absent) also took occasion to express themselves on an editorial which had them published in the Banner-News, in which this publication alleged that "it had been told" that there was no uniformity in the water rates charg

ed and that the system was "illegal."
"A self-respecting and honest paper would have immediately gone to per would have immediately gone too the proper authorities and asceptain-ed the facts," said the chairman. "Secretary Weir is always accessible and his books are open to all. The Board resents the publication of charges that are unjust and untrue, and the paper should withdraw and apologize."

paper.
The usual routine accounts were presented and passed.

C.O. Rockwood Crushed at Fatal Toronto Corner.

Death Was Instantaneous-Victim Was Wheeling In Front of Car and Moterman Did Not Apply Brakes-Motorman Arrested and Held on a Charge of Manslaughter, Bail Being Refused For the Present.

Toronto, Oct. 11.—Cyrus O. Rock-wood, a stereotyper, was killed yester-day morning about 8 o'clock by a street car at Queen and McCaul streets.

Motorman John Dean was placed under arrest on a charge of man-slaughter, and ball refused.

Beekwood was on his way to work

Reckwood was on his way to work

at The Telegram and wheeled down the pavement between the car tracks on McCaul street. The motorman no-ticed him in front, and a race followed, in which the motorman clanged his gong frequently. Rockwood slowed up in nearing the corner, but the car did not, and he was struck and went un-der. The moterman failed to put on the brake, and when the car struck the curve it jumped the track, carrying Rockwood with it to the south side

On the arrival of the Emergency wagon the car was jacked up and the body released. Dr. Ray and Dr. Watson were on the spot, but said that death must have been instantaneous. The skull was fractured, and the limbs and several ribs broken. The body was taken to Moffatt's undertaking estab-lishment.

Coroner R. B. Orr opened an inquest at Moffatt's. The jury viewed the body and adjourned until Friday night at No. 2 police station.

### "THE GAMEST KID."

Toronto Policeman Describes Tommy Newell Cut In Two by Engine.

Toronto, Oct. 11.—Picking coal from the railway tracks cost little Tommy Newell his life on the C. P. R. just east of Yonge street crossing early last night. ### GAGGED WOMAN SHOT

Mysterious Murder in a Bush Near Hamilton City.

Neither Victim Nor Her Murderer Is Known-Everything Stripped From Her Person That Might Tell Who She Was-Attempt Made to Incinerate the Body-Seen to Enter Bush With a Young Man.

The murderer stripped her of every thing that might tell who she was. N purse or anything that would give clue to her identity was left. The body was then covered with dr brush, and a bundle of burning paper was thrust into the heap. The fire died out after burning a small hole is the woman's skirts, and the murdered did not wait to relight it.



#### THE ASTERIA

Interesting Data About the Magic

Familiar to some of the ancient vriters and credited with supernatural powers, the asteria, or star gem, was highly valued for the benefits sup-posed to be conferred on the wearer. Its bright, six rayed star, ever changing and shifting with every play of light and especially shooting out its flames in the direct sunlight, would seem to be something more than an ordinary crystal, and to the superstiordinary crystal, and to the supersti-tious mind it could readily be believed to embody some tutelar spirit. The particular virtue attributed to this gem was the conferring upon the wearer of "health and good fortune" when worn as an amulet, and to those fortunate to be born in the month of April, with which the stone was associated or represented, the wearer was insured from all evil. The star stone is found principally in Ceylon, invariably in soil peculiar to rubies and sapphires. Indeed it is composed of the same con-stituent "corundum," its chafoyant, or star fays, being caused by the pres-'sure of what the natives call "silk."
It is found in many different colors, from pale blue, pink and white to deep dark blue, ruby and purple. The blue are termed sapphire stars, the red ruby stars. It is always cue en cabochon, the star dividing into six rays at the apex. It is next in hardness to the diamond.

### QUEER THINGS IN POLAND. Superstition Plays a Leading Role With Young Men and Maidens.

It is customary in Polish villages to strew straw over the Christmas eve supper tables and for the young people, blindfolded or in the dark, to pick out each a straw therefrom. Should the straw be green the lucky maiden expects to wear a bridal wreath or the youth to lead a blushing bride to the altar during the approaching year, but a dried straw foretells to either long waiting, possibly even until death.

In other rural Polish districts on the "Christ's eve" wine, beer and water are placed by a girl between two candles on a table. She then retires into a corner or an adjoining room to watch the result reflected in a mirror hung for this purpose. If as the clock strikes midnight a man enters and drinks the wine she is happy, for her wooer will be rich. Should he drink the beer, she may be content, for the wooer will be well to do. If the water be chosen, her husband will be very poor. But if as the clock strikes no man comes to her table the anxious maiden shivers with more than midnight terror, believing that she is doomed to be early the bride of death.

Poland is peculiarly rich in these observances, spreading themselves throughout the year, both sexes being equally superstitious in this respect. On New Year's eve the young unmar-ried men place themselves before a fire and, bending down, look beneath their Should a woman appear in the background it is the one they will marry, but if they see a shape as of a coffin it forebodes for them death during the year close at hand.

It is called also the turnstone from its habit of overturning pebbles in search of food. The telltale snipe bears that name because ds a note of alarm at the sight of a gunner. #### NELSON.

Fame of England's Premier Admiral Does Not Rest Upon Trafalgar Or Any One War.

We are close upon the centenary of the great naval battle of Trafalgar, an event often recalled by the venture of the Russian Baltic fleet to the far east and its annihilation in the strait of Corea. In the battle of Trastrait of Corea. In the battle of Tra-falgar, fought October 21, 1805, off the coast of Spain, Lord Nelson was killed before he had destroyed the hostile fleet, as he hoped to do. The British fleet under Nelson went into action with twenty-seven ships of the line and four frigates, while the combined French and Spanish fleets which he attacked numbered thirty-three ships of the line and seven frigates. When Nelson lay dying he was congratulated upon the dying he was congratulated upon the completeness of the victory and told that fourteen or fifteen of the enemy's ships had surrendered. "That is well," said he, "but I bargained for twenty," The evening of the battle several French and Spanish ships reached the harbor of Cadiz, whence they had sailed to meet the enemy, and one intrepid Spanish ship recaptured five ves-iels that had been taken by the Eng-lish. Some critics declare that the vic-tory of Togo over Rojestvensky was greater than that of Nelson at Trafalgar, notwithstanding that Nelson has always been credited with having "an-nihilated the enemy" on that memor-

Nelson's fame, the greatest in the naval annals of England, does not rest upon his achievement at Trafalgar or upon any one war. For eleven years preceding his death he had been a ship preceding his death he had been a ship commander, squadron and fleet commander and commander-in-chief by turns. As a reward for a victory won over the French at Aboukir, in 1798. he was created Baron Nelson of the Nile and in 1800 was raised to the rank of viscount for defeating the Danes at Copenhagen. Like Napoleon be destroyed his commission with terrible he destroyed his enemies with terrible

and unvarying certainty.

Nelson's distinguishing traits were
boldness and audacity in attack. Twice
Nelson disobeyed the orders of his chief, Nelson disobeyed the orders of his chief, the second time being at Copenhagen, where his disobedience won the victory. When Nelson's division was getting the worst of it at Copenhagen the flagship hoisted the signal, "Leave off action." Nelson said bitterly: "Leave off action! Now, d—n me if I do." Turning to the captain of his ewn ship, he told him to keep his signal for close action flying, then purposely placing a telescope to his blind eye—a placing a telescope to his blind eye—a souvenir of battle—continued: "You know, Foley, that I have only one eye and have a right to be blind sometimes. I really do not see the signal. D—n the signal anyway! Keep mine for close action flying. Jes, nail it to the mast. That's the way I answer signals to 'leave off action.' In another hour he, the subordinate, was dictating terms to the vanguished

Prince of Denmark.

Nelson's bluntness was often displayed in action. At the battle of the Nile one of his ship commanders, in Nile one of his ship commanders, in great glee over the prospect, exclaimed, "If we succeed what will the world say?" Said Nelson: "There is no 'if about it. We shall succeed, but who will live to tell the story is another question." At Trafalgar the captain of the flagship Victory told the admiral that he could not take the vessel through the enemy's line of battle, as had been ordered, without running into some one of three of the enemy's ships standing across the course. Said Nelson: "I cannot help it. Go aboard which you please. Take your choice." At Trafalgar he said, "If the signals cannot be understood a," cannot do wrong if he lays his ship along-side of the enemy." This he called the "Nelson touch," and it probably played a greater part in winning Traplayed a greater part in winning Trafalgar than the off quoted signal, "Eng-lands expects every man to do his duty."

Nelson was killed by a French sharp-

### DRY SHAMPOOS.

Fragrant Powders That Will Cleanse the Hair and Scalp.

Dry shampoos are efficacious in cleaning both the scalp and hair, and the following powders for this purpose are fragrant and delicious.

Take white cornmeal as fine as can be ground. Perfume with a little powdered orris root and rub a quantity of it dry into the hair near the scalp. Massage well and bring the powder through the long part. Then with a long fibered brush remove all the meal, This is not a difficult thing to do if the brush has long fibers. The strokes need not be hard, and, indeed, should not be, or the vair will be pulled out.

The best way of brushing is to hold the hair out in one hand and brush through each strand, beginning near the hand and working down close to the head.

A powder that is delicious for the same purpose is made of one-fourth of a pound of powdered orris root, one and one-third drams of bergamot rind, the same of cassie flowers and one-quarter of a dram of coarsely ground cloves. Mingle and put through a fine sieve. The best way of using is to rub into the hair at night and let it temain until morning. Then brush out. This will perfume the head deliciously. A cheaper preparation made in the same way is composed of a half reet pewdered and five dreps of oil of rhedium. These three are specially suited to oily hair, as the pewders will absorb much of the meisture.

### BURBANK'S THEORY.

Explains Application of Plant Culture Ideas to Rearing Children .-No Maudlin Sentiment.

At a dinner given recently by the California state board of trade to Luther Burbank, the horticulturist, he delivered a speech which is noteworthy as containing a flat contradiction of the theories of the evolutionists that heredity plays a more important part in the development of character than environment. Among the important things which he said he had learned to study and know by the study of plant life were these:

"There is no doubt that if a child with a viclous temper be placed in an environment of peace and quiet the temper will change. Put a boy of gentle white parents among Indans and he will grow up like an Indian. Let a child born of criminal parents have a setting of morality and decency, and the chances are that he will not grow into a criminal but to an upright man.

into a criminal but to an upright man.
"I do not say heredity will not some-times assert itself. When the crimin-al instinct crops out in the individual it might appear as if environment were leveled to the ground, but in succeed-ing generations the effect of constant higher environment will not fail to be come fixed.

"We in America form a nation with the bloods of half the peoples of the world within our veirs. We are more crossed than any other nation in the history of the world, and here we meet the same results that are always seen in a much crossed race of plants. All the worst as well as all the best qualities of each are brought out in their fullest intensities, and right here is where selective environment counts.

counts.

"As time goes on environment will crystallize the American nation. Its varying elements will become unified and the weeding out process will probably leave the finest human product ever known.

#### THE DE .. DIVER. Men Who Withstand Great Pressure-

200 Feet Below the Surface. At what depth, asks The Pall Mall Gazette, can a diver carry out his functions? How long can he remain under the surface? What is the effect of high air pressures on the human system? One well-known firm of submarine engineers limits the depth of descent to 25 fathoms, or, say, 150 feet. But operations have been carried out at greater depths than this, and perat greater depths than this, and perhaps the greatest distance below the surface at which a diver has succeeded in working is 34 fathoms, or 204 feet. This was accomplished by Jas. Hooper, who descended to the ship Cape Horn, sunk off Pichidanque, South

America, and sustained a pressure of

881-2 pounds on every square inch of his body.

Another remarkable feat was that of Alexander Lambert, who recovered £70,000 in gold coin from the steamship £70,000 in gold coin from the steamship Alphonso XIL. sunk off Point Gando Grand Canary, in nearly 30 fathoms of water, the actual depth of the treasureroom being 26 2-3 fathoms, or 160 feet. This man also performed the daring feat of stopping the flooding of the Severn Tunnel when a door in the drainage tunnel had been left open. The door was situated a quarter of a mile distant from the shaft, but equipped in his diving dress he crept that distance through a narrow passage full in his diving cress he crept that dis-tance through a narrow passage full of water and closed the door. This plucky act enabled the pumps to over-come the volume of water which was flooding the working and allowed the completion of the tunnel to be carried

out.

A further interesting case of deep diving is that of Angel Erostarbe, who succeeded in recovering silver bars valued at £9,000 from the steamer Skyro, sunk off Cape Finisterre in over thirty fathoms. In this case the diver had to blow away portions of the vessel with dynamite before he could reach the treasure chamber. Three dives per diem were frequent, and as many as five descents were made in one day. After the animals are killed the actual work that each man does on any one animal is astonishingly small. He was proud, too, to belong to the Conservative party of Canada, the party that stood for everything.

The Premier then spoke of the respect he had for Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Quebec was right in being proud of him, yet he knew that Quebec would condemn the Liberal leader when he went wrong.
