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

MESSES. S. S. MUTTON, of Toronto, whose difficulties we referred to last week, claim that they will pull through all right.

Tue Belleville woolen mills are in trouble, an execution having been levied on them for \$3,500 at the instance of the Bank of Mont-

Our advices from Mitchell, Ont., state that large areas of fall wheat have been sown in the county of Perth this fall, and at present are looking well.

MESSRS. T. James Claxton & Co. were awarded silver medal and first prize for corsets at the late Exhibition, also first prize for hoop skirts and first prize for bustles,

L. N. BERTRAND & FRÈRE, hardware merchants, Quebec, have assigned, with liabilities of about \$7,000 and assets of about \$3,000, the latter consisting of stock and book debts.

An ingenious person has calculated that the number of dogs in Ontario is 300,000 and that, allowing a dollar a mouth for their maintenance, \$3,600,000 is annually spent upon them.

MR. GLEN, M.P., has ordered five thousand black walnut trees from the West to plant in the country in which he resides. As a walnut tree in thirty years b comes worth about \$100 at present rates this is a wise economical movement.

The visible supply of cotion on Sep 19th was 1,397,274 bales against 1,625,763 bales a year ago, showing a decrease of 228,489 bales, but, as compared with the same date in 1882, there is an increase of 133,057 bales.

CABLE advices from Liverpool report the sale of a lot of Canadian apples ex-steamer Polynesian at an average of 9s. 6d. per bbl The market is glutted with-fruit in bad condition, and prices, in consequence, are lower.


THE Co-Operative Store Co., of this city, has appealed to its shareholders to pay up the whole of its subscribed capital, in order to enable it to carry on the business. The nonsuccess which the Company has met with is attributed a great deal to the management.

THE business of Mr. Thos. Muir, hatter and furrier, Belleville, was abruptly suspended last week through the action of a Toronto wholesale firm to recover \$3,500 due on a chattel mortgage of \$5,000. A settlement is expected, which will enable the business to be continued as usual.

THE Canada Pacific Railway Co, has decided to erect two large grain elevators at their freight depot in this city. The site is well chosen, being alongside the wharf, so that the elevators will offer splendid facilities for the handling of grain. Their capacity will be half a million bushels each,

IN NEW YORK last week the National Rubber Co. held a large auction sale of rubber goods damaged by fire, which sold at a discount of 50 to 60 per cent-considered a good price. Some of these goods have been brought into this market, and buyers should see that they do not pay full prices for a damaged article.

The market for India rubber and its manufactures is supported with a good deal of strength in the American market, the raw material having advanced 15 to 20 per cent., with the probability of a still further rise. The Cundel Rubber Co., Newhaven, Conn., have put up the price of rubber shoes from 5 to 10 per cent, and it is believed the other companies will follow suit.

OF ALL the agents appointed in the early days of the boom in Winnipeg to manage the bank branches opened in that city, Frank Matheson of the bank of Ottawa is now the only one remaining. The latest defection from the ranks is that of Mr. Boxer of the Union Bank of Lower Canada, whose place was taken by the inspector about a week since. "Tis the last rose," etc.

H. M. Coulland de L'Epinay, general merchant, Cacouna, P. Q., has assigned to H. Bedard of Quebec .- F. McKellar, boots and shoes Kincardine, Ont., who commenced business about two years ago, has been caught in the toils of business difficulties, and has determined to discontinue buying and selling on his own account. He was formerly in business at Tiverton.

Owing to failing health, Mr. O. Sinclair. hardware merchant, Mitchell, Ont., has sold out his business to Mr. John G. Jones, formerly of Brussels, Out.—Messrs. Carling & Collins have started a new livery stable in Mitchell.— M. Rothschild, general trader, Mattawa, Ont., is asking an extension from his creditors. Besides his stock in trade he owns real estate and has built upon it.

THE keenness of competition in business caused Mr. L. Bennett, grocer of Mitchell, to dispose of his effects by auction and

private sale, and take a situation in London Ont.-Mr Wm. Challinger, jun., doing business in Mitchell as a saddler, has launched into the boot and shoe trade, notwithstanding that the latter line was already fully represented there, which of course means less profit all round.

THE British Board of Trade returns for the month of August, 1884, make a very unsatisfactory showing, the total imports amounting to \$148,053,695, as compared with \$181,124,930 for the corresponding month last year, or a decrease of \$33,071,235. On the export side the total value of shipments was \$99,010,285, against \$106,921,810, for the same month in 1883, showing a decrease of \$7,914,525. The exports from Great Britain and Ireland to Canada show a falling off during the same month of \$2,650,000, compared with Aug, 1883, or equal to about 32 per cent, due chiefly to the contraction in lumber. The imports from Canada also decreased \$2,662,900.

THE St. John, N.B., cotton mills will, it is hoped, definitely resume shortly. A determined effort is being made to enable them to do so, and an offer has been made to restart the institution. The mill cost \$226,000 eighteen months ago, and there is now only a claim of \$75,000 on lands, which have ten years to run, It had been proposed to issue \$50,000 scrip of par value of £100, with the effect of a bond on mortgage as far as possible. The mill is now running on a small profit Tenders have been received for the purchase of the mill for \$10,000, from Messrs, Vroom & Arnold, who also offer to pay for raw cotton and cotton in process of manufacture. Mr. Leigh, of Boston, offers to take 50 per cent of the scrip as he is of opinion that the prospects of the mill are excellent. More than \$16,000 of the scrip has been subscribed. The interest of the old shareholders will be conserved.

A MEETING of the creditors of James Walker, retail boots and shoes of this city, has been called .- Messrs. Paul Deschamps & Co., dealers in and manufacturers of boots and shoes, Ste. Cunegonde, have made an assignment to Messrs. Kent & Turcotte. The liabilities will amount to \$10,000. A meeting of the creditors will probably be called next week, when a statement of affairs will be submitted.

BLANCHARD & LIVINGSTONE, grocers, Sherbrooke, Que., have assigned and advertised stock for sale by tender. They had a very short term of business existence together, having commenced as recently as last May 1st. Their liabilities amount to about \$1,800, with assets \$600. They offered to compromise at 15c on the dollar, but creditors refused. Both parties had previously failed, and settled by some kind of compromise. Their troubles are. attributed to insufficient capital at starting.

Although Beauharnois possesses splendid water-power, and is comparatively near to Montreal, yet there are advantages in St. Hyacinthe which influence a decision in favor of that place; such as railway communication, machine shops for repairs, and a larger population from which to procure hands

Advices from Boston state that the wool market last week was less firm, in spite of the confidence manifested by holders. Although no immediate decline is looked for Ohio X is quoted at 32c to 35c and Michigan X 30c. A choice lot of 100,000 lbs of Montana wool was sold at 25c per lb. The total sales of wool in Boston last week were 2,611,819 lbs, against 2,954,258 lbs the week previous, and 4,221,960 lbs for the corresponding period last year. The total sales since January 1, 1884, have been 88,163,148 lbs, against 92,187,705 lbs. for the corresponding period of 1883, a decrease of 4,024,557 pounds.

The resolutions adopted by the convention of wall-paper manufacturers of the United States, held at Niagara Falls the 13th ult., have led to counter action on the part of the customs authorities at Ottawa. By the said resolutions it was decided to maintain the schedule prices of old pattern or faculty papers in the home market, but that the manufacturers should be at liberty to sell to foreign countries, including, of course, Canada, at whatever prices they pleased. The action taken by the cus-

toms department compels such goods to pay duty on the American prices-that is, the market value at the place where produced.

THE Dominion Exhibition at Ottawa is proving a success, especially as regards the agricultural department. A list of the principal exhibits in the main building and on the grounds will appear next week. Much complaint is heard concerning delay of goods and machinery in transit. A leading Brantford, Ontario, firm, were anxiously looking all day Tuesday for their intended exhibits, which had been shipped six days before. The Waterous Manufacturing Co. are not, however, the only complainants. The time between the close of the Toronto exhibition and the opening at Ottawa is brief enough to render prompt shipment and delivery an absolute necessity. Exhibitors speak highly of the excellent facilities afforded them at Toronto. A leading manufacturer at Chambly contrasts it in some important respects with that in Montreal.

MANITORA WHEAT .- There appears to be an impression in the trade here that Manitoba will not have as large a surplus of wheat for export as has been stated, and this view is being strengthened by the fact that wheat is selling at 85c per bushel in Manitoba, which is as dear as it is here, and 9c to 10c per bushel higher than in Duluth and Ontario. It is, therefore, evident that buyers in the Northwest are not in the market for export account, and it is thought that if it were believed that a surplus of 5,000-000 bushels actually existed, purchases at 85c per bushel would not have transpired as freely, as indicated by a number of reports lately received, which state that large quantities have been bought at the figure named. There can be no doubt, however, that Manitoba has secured a good wheat crop of excellent quality.

ADVICES from Philadelphia state: The anthracite coal trade is at last beginning to improve, and if the developments of the past several days continue, October will bring some activity, if not the briskness in the trade that has been so long expected. The announcement of another week's stoppage of mining has had the effect of steadying the market for anthracite. At Port Richmond on Saturday morning there were vessels with orders for 23,000 tons of anthracite, while the entire supply of coal at that place-some of which had already been put aboard-was only about 66,000 tons, including the accumulation of broken, egg and pea coals. Freights continue phenomenal v low, and during the past week a number of the fleet which had been lying there for some time got under way.

THE failure of Mr. Thos. Fawcett, banker of London, Ont., appears to be a less serious matter than was at first reported. Mr. Fawcett. who resided at Watford, did a large private banking business, and had several agencies, his principal business being done in London. His liabilities, which were at first reported at \$1,000,-000, will not, it is said, reach over \$500,000. including indirect claims. Two or three joint. stock banks are interested in the estate, the principal creditor being the Bank of Montreal which holds commercial paper in addition to collateral security. The estate, it is claimed, shows a fair surplus, and it is probable that he will assign with a view of liquidating his affairs. Latest advices from London state that Mr. Fawcett admits that his liabilities cannot be far short of \$800,000 or \$900,000, which esti-

mate includes eight agencies in which he is largely interested, besides a number of smaller ones scattered through the West. Mr. Fawcett says he feels sure that the assets are considerably larger than his liabilities. Should the estate be forced into liquidation, however, or placed in the hands of an assignce, some of the securities would suffer a depreciation from their face value, but if the estate be managed properly Mr. Fawcett is confident it will pay dollar for dollar. The chief cause of failure is attributed to the general duliness of trade, but

principally to the heavy losses of cattle shippers which have to a great extent fallen upon

the bank. It is intended to close all the bank's

agencies.

POTATOES.—Reports have been received from all parts of this province indicating a large yield of potatoes, and in quite a number of districts around Montreal a good portion of the crop has been cellared in first-rate condition. The outlook for prices is by no means encouraging to growers, as the prospects are that there will be an abundant supply, both in Canada and the United States. The latest Washington Bureau report says: "The condition of potatoes averages 91, against 95 last year. It will be an abundant crop, but not so large as the last. There is some complaint of rot in New England and a little in New York. There is a wide range of condition, running

Several car loads have been offered at 35c to 37½c per bag, delivered in this city. A farmer from Lachute states that, sooner than accept present prices, he intends to feed his live stock upon potatoes, as it would pay him better to do so. As there is no likelihood of an export demand, it is generally conceded that prices will rule very low during the coming season. ing season.

THE FRUIT TRADE.-Importers of fruit are annoyed at the refusal of the Allan, Dominion, and Benver Steamship Companies to allow for packages whose contents have been pilfered during the voyage across the Atlantic, although it was formerly their custom to make such restitution. The steamship ompanies claim that if they receive 100 packages of fruit on the other side and only deliver to the owners here 99 packages they are not liable for the missing package. Once let this principle be admitted and it follows that if a steamship company receives in Liverpool 100 cases of oranges, for a firm here and 99 cases are pilfered by the crew and emigrants during the trip, the company is not responsible for the 99 cases, and the one case left is delivered to the party here who has peading tyholesale Trade of Montreal.



no recourse. We admit this to be an extreme case, but if the steamships can in equity claim exemption from damages to the extent of 1 per cent, so they can to the extent of 50 or 99 per cent. The regular steamship lines contend that they are not liable for any damages whatever, as the forms of the receipts they give upon taking delivery of the goods expressly stipulate that fact. On the other hund, dealers here state that such an agreement on the part of the steamship companies is too one-sided and arbitrary to hold good in law, as the companies referred to are the only ones by which they can import their fruit. We understand that a number of test cases will probably be faken to the courts by dealers here before they will submit to what they claim is a great injustice. A very nice point is involved in the dispute, as it must be borne in mind that dealers do not ask compensation for deterioration of perishable goods, but for the restitution of pilfered property, and it is urged that it is the duty of the companies to see that their passengers or crews do not prey upon the merchandise entrated to their care, and for which they receive regular rates of freight.

THE BOUNDARY QUESTION.

The Montreal Gazette of the 18th inst. contains six articles on the boundary case, the chief object of which appears to be to throw upon Mr. Attorney-General Mowat the responsibility for the delay which took place in referring this long-disputed question for the decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council. The line taken in the Gazette is substantially that which has been adopted by nearly if not all, the journals which support the Dominion Government. It appears to us so unfair that we shall endeavor to place before our readers a true history of the question from the commencement of the controversy between the two Governments. Before doing so we must point out a fundamental error, which has been persistently adhered to throughout the protracted discussions. The Gazette cites from a comparatively recent speech of Sir John Macdonald that "there are only two ways of solving the question of where the true boundary is," one by an Act of the Imperial Parliament, the other "by a judicial decision of the highest court of appeal in the British Empire." The Judicial Committee did not set as a Court of Appeal on the case submitted, nor give a judicial decision, and the award of the arbitrators might have been confirmed precisely in the same way as the advice of the Judicial Committee, had the Dominion Government thought proper to consent.

It is unnecessary to dwell at length on the history of the disputed boundary before confederation, and prior to the cession of the rights of the Hudson's Bay Co. The ministers who took the most prominent part in contesting the pretensions of the Hudson's Bay Co., and in practically maintaining the rights of Ontario, were the late Sir George E. Cartier, the Hon. William Macdougall and the Hon, Joseph Cauchon. The important memorandum of the last-named minister has been claimed as the production of Mr. W. McD. Dawson, whose brother, Mr. S. J. Dawson, seems at that time (1857) to have shared his opinions. The late Chief Justice Draper expressed opinions substantially similar to those of other enquirers into the merits of the claim of Ontario. About a year after the settlement of the claims of the Hudson's Bay Co.; viz., on 14th July, 1871, Mr. J. Sandfield Macdonald, the Attorney General for Ontario, in a memorandum, requested the Lieut.-Governor to bring to the notice of the Dominion Government the importance of settling the boundary, for the expenses of which. both Governments had obtained appropriations by the respective Legislatures, that voted by the Dominion Parliament having been \$15,000. Orders-in-Council were passed by both Governments and the expression in regard to the reference is precisely similar to that employed in 1878, when appointing the arbitrators, viz, "to determine the boundaries." The. commissioners appointed were Mr. E. E. Taché for the Dominion, and the Hon Wm. McDougall, C.B., for Ontario. There is not a word in the Order-in-Council of 28th July, 1871, or in Mr. Secretary Howe's letter to intimate that the Dominion would give the commissioners appointed to determine the boundaries instructions as to the execution of the task confided to them.

On 26th September, 1871, the Dominion Government acknowledged the notice of the appointment of Mr. McDougall, C.B., to co-operate in determining the boundary. Meantime Col. Dennis, Dominion Surveyor General, was called on for a report

on the question of boundary, which he made on 1st October, 1871, and in which he gave it as his opinion that the Western boundary of Ontario was a line drawn due North from the confluence of the Ohio and Mississippi rivers, and the Northern the Height of Land. Col. Dennis stated in his report that the charter of the Hudson's Bay Co. described their grant as "including all lands and territories drained by the waters emptying into Hudson's Bay," although no such words are to be found in the Charter. The report was made without any communication whatever with the Ontario Government, and, although now pronounced erroneous by the judicial committee, it was intended by the Dominion Government that it should be given as instructions to the commissioner, who were thus to have been turned into mere instruments for carrying out the erroneous description of Col. Dennis. Mr. McDougall, finding that the Dominion Government contemplated giving what he thought erroneous instructions to their commissioners, suggested the appointment of a third commissioner, and thought for a time that Sir John Macdonald and Sir George Cartier were favorable to that mode of solving the difficulty, but, instead of that, on the 16th May, 1872, a proposal was made to refer the question to the judicial committee of the Privy Council. The Ontario Government held that a commission sitting on this side of the Atlantic would be more desirable, and made a suggestion to that effect, without positively refusing the other proposal. In November, 1872, the Dominion Government replied, adhering to their proposal for reference to the judicial committee. It certainly cannot be charged on the Ontario Government as blamable that it acted on its conviction that a Canadian arbitration was preferable to an English one.

A change of ministry in the Dominion took place soon after, and the two Governments agreed on the principle of arbitration. It took a considerable time to get all the documentary evidence prepared and printed, but the Dominion Government instructed their counsel to advocate the claim of Col. Dennis which had been likewise approved by Mr. Ramsay, now Mr. Justice Ramsay. There was no secret about the reference, and Parliament was asked to vote a sum to cover the expense of the arbitration. No objection was made to the arbitration, and in due course orders-in-Council were passed appointing the arbitrators, and pledging the parties to abide by the award, which was soon after made. A change of Government subsequent took place, after

which a long time elapsed during which the question of ratifying the award was held in suspense, and no notice was given of any intention to repudiate it, until the Session of 1880, when a committee of the House was appointed to consider the question. That committee agreed to a report, of which it is only necessary to remark, that it has been pronounced entirely erroneous by the very tribunal to which they themselves expressed their readiness to leave it, by supporting Mr. Plumb's proposition. Before making any further attempt at negotiation, beyond proposing to leave the question already arbitrated on to a single arbitrator or to the Supreme Court, which would have caused great delay, and increased costs, the Dominion Government secured the passage of the Manitoba Act, thus bringing another party into the controversy. It is well known that the result of this action on the part of the Dominion Government and Parliament was that there was serious danger of collision between the officers of the two Governments in the disputed territory.

The result of an impartial review of the history of the controversy must be to convince every impartial enquirer, that the Dominion Government committed an error in obtaining a report from Col. Dennis, and in basing on it instructions to commissioners, who should have been left to their own judgment, with the assistance of an umpire, if necessary, that Mr. Mowat was quite justified in object. ing to the first proposal to seek the advice of the judicial committee, which he never positively refused, although he declined accepting it; that the further proceedings regarding the arbitrators were all taken in good faith, and that the Dominion Government delayed a most unreasonable time before repudiating the award; that the Ontario Government had a just right to complain of the Manitoba Act, passed notwithstanding their protest; that in two successive sessions, in 1880 and 1881, the Legislature of Ontario passed resolutions with only one dissenting voice in favor of sustaining the award of the arbitrators, which has at last been pronounced by the judicial committee of the Privy Council to have been substantially. correct.

#### THE JAMAICA QUESTION.

A very grave question, having been suddenly sprung on the people of Canada, it seems desirable that the fullest information obtainable should be placed before them, and that it should be thoughtfully considered before the time arrives for its solution by Parliament. Mr. Solomon, who has for many years taken an active part in Jamaica politics, has recently visited Ottawa, after conferring in London with the High Commissioner, his avowed object being to obtain information as to the prospect of the Island of Jamaica being admitted into the Canadian Dominion. There is no concealment as to the reason for this movement. Whatever may be the cause, sugar, the staple export of the West Indian Colonies, has become seriously depreciated in value, owing to the competition of the product of the beet. Persistent efforts have been made by the sugar planters to induce Great Britain to impose duties on beet sugar to countervail the bounty allowed on exportation by foreign Governments, but these having failed it has been avowed by the West India Committee that it is a matter of life or death for them to find some market for their staple product.

It must be borne in mind that all the West India Colonies are in the same Guiana, position, and that British Trinadad and Barbados are fully as deserving of consideration as Jamaica, if indeed Canada is to be called on to make sacrifices in what will probably prove a vain attempt to relieve West India distress. Mr. Solomon's recent movement seems to require explanation. a few days since he was in London, taking part in a conference with the Secretary of State, the object of which was to benefit all the British West India Colonies. Long before that conference there had been rumors that Jamaica desired to negotiate on its own account with Canada, and it must be obvious that, if it should succeed in its object, the other Colonies would have just ground of complaint that such a marked preference was manifested towards Jamaica, the Golony which is in the least prosperous condition. This, however, is a matter which will doubtless be carefully considered by the Imperial authorities, which must be a party to any action on the part of Jamaica, and will, moreover, in all probability, be called on to consider the question of discriminating duties if an attempt should be made by Canadalto impose them.

As a matter of course, Mr. Solomon has been interviewed and we find reports, both in the Ottawa Free Press and the Toronto Globe, of his utterances. Both journals represent Mr. Solomon as having stated that Sir Charles Tupper was favorably disposed to Union, while both admit that the members of the Cabinet with whom Mr. Solomon had interviews were studious in avoiding any expression of

opinion whatever. We venture to hazard the opinion that Sir Charles Tupper gave no encouragement whatever to Mr. Solomon's project. We think, moreover, that Mr. Solomon has very much exaggerated what Lord Derby said at the interview, which we may further remark applied to the Colonies generally, and not to Jamaica alone. Mr. Solomon pointed out the advantages to Canada, which were that Jamaica would take Canadian fish, lumber, etc., free of duty. What absurdity! At present lumber and fish are taken to as great an extent as they would be, and the small revenue duty imposed, is paid by the Jamaica consumer. The same remark applies to the other Colonies.

Of course the advantage to Jamaica is sufficiently obvious. Sugar, which now pays about 50 per cent duty, would be free, but then, as the other British Colonies, to say nothing of the French and Spanish, would have still to pay the high duty it would follow that Jamaica would have a monopoly, at the cost of the Canadian consumers. True, it may be said, sugar would be cheaper, but it would be even cheaper still if the duties were abolished on all sugars. Free sugar, even from Jamaica, would cause a serious reduction in revenue of nearly three millions in amount, and would completely ruin our refineries, which have been established in reliance on the good faith of the Government. Mr. Solomon confesses frankly that, "in studying this sugar question, he had considered the inter-" ests of Canadian consumers of sugar, "rather than refiners." We may, however, point out that he has considered the interests of Jamaica sugar planters rather than those of Barbados, British Guiana, Trinidad, Martinique, Guadaloupe, Porto Rico, Cuba and Brazil. It may be very questionable how far Canada can afford to go in the direction of free importation of sugar, but it seems clear that her interest is to put all the sugar colonies on the same footing.

Mr. Solomon was doubtless questioned closely as to the tariff, for the Globe reports him as saying that the high duties on cottons, woollens, etc., "would be found burdensome in Jamaica," and he intimated that "a modification of the tariff might be agreed on as a basis of Union." And so the famous N. P. is to be sacrificed in order to bring into the Federation, Jamaica and its population of 444,186 negroes, 107,946 mulattoes, 12,240 coolies, and 14,432 whites. Another opinion launched by Mr. Solomon, in reply to a question as to the mode of making up "the probable loss of revenue," was that there should be "direct

taxation." Mr. Solomon seemed to think that if Canada would not accept the proposed alliance the United States would have no difficulty. There is one extraordinary statement in the Globe, which we venture to assert is a gross blunder on the part either of Mr. Solomon or the reporter. He is reported to have said that "the rum sold in Canada had not only to "pay the excise tax of 8s. a gal. "lon, but the Canadian customs duty as "well." It is the invariable rule to export rum in bond free of excise tax, in all the West India Colonies.

While we observe with satisfaction that the Montreal Gazette is not favorable to the admission of Jamaica to the federation, we regret to notice that he advocates reciprocity. Canada has nothing to gain by reciprocity with the West Indies. They cannot take more of our products than they do at present, the duties on which are all strictly for revenue and paid by the consumers. It would be an act of supreme folly for our Parliament to letter itself by engaging to receive sugar duty free, or at nominal duties, and especially if those duties were to be discriminatory against other tropical countries, all of which are at present receiving our exports on the most favorable terms. Whatever our policy may be, it should be uniform to all tropical colonies, British, French, Spanish and Brazil. We shall only remark, in conclusion, that reciprocity with the West Indies would not benefit Canada, and as to Mr. Solomon's proposal a wilder scheme was never imagined, unless, indeed, it be Imperial Federation.

#### CANADA LIFE ASSURANCE COM-PANY.

The report of the Canada Life Assurance Company, which was presented at the annual meeting held at Hamilton on the 23rd inst., and which will be found elsewhere in our columns, is eminently satisfactory, even for a company which has had the merit of habitually exhibiting similar results. The addition to the assets at the close of the year was \$664;-709 an amount exceeding the aggregate of the payments. The new assurances during the year amounted to \$4,144,029, while the total amount of outstanding risks was \$32,252,126. The assets were increased to a larger amount than in any former year. In moving the adoption of the report the President, Mr. A. G. Ramsay, made some interesting statements as to the percentage of expenses to the income of the Canada Life compared with other companies, and also as to the cost of insurance. These will be found in the report and it will be seen that under both heads the Canada Life compares favorably with its numerous rivals. We regret that the late hour when we received the report prevents us from giving a more extended notice.

# THE CAUSE OF LOW PRICES FOR WHEAT.

In Charles Rugel's Paris circular of Aug. 30th an attempt is made to refute the prevailing opinion that the enormous decline in the price of wheat is the result of an unprecedented abundance of production. The authority referred to says:—"Without counting 1874, which was the greatest crop of the century, the year 1882, which is nearer to us, furnished a crop superior in quantity to that of this year. It was:

France......123,000,000 hectolitres against 110,000,000 England... 29,000,000 hectolitres

ngainst 30,000,000

U. States... 176,000,000 hectolitres against 176,000,000

316,000,000 Total... 328,000,000 And this by taking for these three countries the highest estimates for 1884. In 1882 the crop was equally good in Russia, whose export attained the maximum of 25,000,000 hectolitres, it was also good in Germany, in Austro-Hungary, in Italy and in all the other countries of the continent, and British India furnished a contingent of 8,000,000 to 10, 00,000 hectolitres. Now this year the crops of these countries, though good, are sensibly inferior to those of 1882, and on the whole there was more wheat for sale after the harvest of 1882 than there is to-day, which, however, did not prevent prices from keeping on a higher level than we see just at present. The average obtained by the French farmer during the season of 1882-83 was 25 francs a quintal; in New York it was \$1.14 per bushel, and the average price of '9 marques' flour in Paris was 58 francs per sack."

The above authority appears to lose sight altogether of the reserves which have been held over from year to year, and proceeds to argue upon the assumption that we have only to deal with the present crop of 1884, which, if true, would, we grant, favor the interence that overproduction is not the chief factor in determining the present low prices of the leading cereal. But are not facts diametrically opposed to such a deduction? We have before shown that the wheat production in the United States alone has increased during the past five years at the rate of 98,000,000 bushels annually, or 270 per cent as compared with the five preceding years—an increment out of all proportion to that of consumption. Now, we can scarcely imagine that Mr. Charles Rugel would be bold enough to attempt to counterbalance this enormous over-production of the United States by showing

an equivalent decrease in the newer wheat fields of the world, such as those of British India, South America, etc. No; because he would only encounter worse difficulties, in the shape of further expansions in the yield. The great sequel of the alarming decline in the wheat markets of both hemispheres has been the preponderating excess of supply over demand, which has dealt speculation the most terrific blow it ever received, besides levelling in the ruins of bankruptcy some of the foremost representatives of legitimate business in Chicago, New York, London, Liverpool, Glasgow, Newcastle, Manchester and Paris. It was speculation that contrived to block the flood-gates of supply until the pent-up volume of over-production could be controlled no longer, the dam burst, flooding the markets on both sides of the Atlantic, and in the general confusion which ensued losses have accumulated by millions and tens of millions of dollars. It is not a little curious that so many authorities on wheat find it convenient to compare the abundant crop of 1884 with that of 1882, although, if we mistake not, they took the same year for their basis of comparison with last year's short crop. If, then, the estimated deficient yield of 1883, which contrasted most strikingly with that of 1882, proved so disastrous to the theorists, why should we anticipate the change to a much higher plane of values than that which now obtains, surrounded as we are with plenty. What upset the predictions of dearer wheat which were so rife about a year ago, but the fact that the reserves held over from previous years had been under-estimated? It is not safe always to gauge the actual supplies by the supply visible. Many farmers of late years have grown rich and have had the means to gratify their passionate propensity of holding for a rise, and thus the supplies in first hands have accumulated to such an extent that the occurrence of a short wheat crop in the United States and Canada last year was not sufficient to exhaust them. Farmers' reserves are always apt to be misleading. from the fact of their being out of sight. There is no mistake, however, as to the world's big wheat yield of 1884 and its fine quality, any more than there is regarding the indisposition on the part of farmers to market it at current prices, although it is only through moving it freely that we need expect any positive relief to the markets on this continent. The wheat situation may be summed up in the following sentence: At a time when the requirements of importing countries are at a minimum, the surplus products of exporting countries are at a maximum-

If, therefore, under these circumstances American and Canadian farmers refuse to take market values, depend upon it other countries will only be too glad to fill the orders which they rejected. We would advise our farmers to accept the situation, sell at market values, and give no heed to the theorists who so woefully deceived them last year, by picturing the high prices which, according to their arguments, were certain to be the outcome of last year's short crop.

#### THE BANK STATEMENTS.

The usual comparative statements of the condition of the chartered banks will be found at foot. Notwithstanding an increase of rather more than a million in circulation, the liabilities are less by nearly two millions than in July. Both liabilities and assets are considerably less than at the corresponding period in 1883. The statements are indicative of caution on the part of the leading banks, which cannot be too much commended at a time when business depression is very generally felt. There is a slight increase in the Dominion note circulation, but we regret much to notice that the banks generally hold too large an amount of their reserves in Dominion notes. This of course would be of no importance if the Finance Department were to act on the sound principle by which the issues of the Bank of England are regulated, and which was that originally contemplated for the Canadian Government issues. It was hoped that when the banks were required to keep 40 per cent of their reserves in Dominion notes theywould not much exceed that limit, which would necessitate their keeping about 60 per cent of their reserves in gold. We notice in the last statement a bank which, instead of holding about 60 per cent in gold has only about 10 per cent. There is a great tendency on the part of the smaller banks to keep an inadequate reserve of gold, and by the Dominion Act the Government is only required to hold 15 per cent of gold on the aggregate issue; and, although its present reserve is by no means in excess of what it ought to hold, its statement proclaims that it has nearly two millions of gold and guaranteed debentures in excess of what the law requires. If guaranteed debentures may. be considered strictly available as a gold reserve, the aggregate amount of the combined reserve at present is not at all more than prudence should require to be kept, and if the smaller banks were to act

with the caution of the larger ones, which are none of them inclined to keep an overstock of gold, there would be a heavy draw on the Government reserve. The banks held on 31st Aug., in notes, \$11,016,905 and in gold \$7,673,109. If therefore the banks were to be governed by the intention of the Act of Parliament and to hold only 40 per cent of their reserves in Dominion notes, they would have to demand gold for about \$3,500,000 of notes, and the whole amount on hand

was \$3,113,962, and this is said to be considerably in excess of what the law requires. The absurdity of the system is that, as the notes are legal tenders, the banks might hold many millions more, and the Government would merely require to hold 15 per cent of the total issue in gold. The only sound principle on which such an issue should be based is that of the Bank of England, a fixed issue on Government securities, and for every note in excess a reserve of gold.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

Prosperous and satisfactory Exhibit.

The annual general meeting of the share-holders of the Canada Life Assurance Company was held to-day at noon, at the Company's offices in Hamilton. The President, Mr. A. G. Ramsay, in the choir.

The Secretary, Mr. Hills, read the following

REPORT BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS :

While the trade and commerce of the country, and of the world generally, during the past year, indicate the somewhat severe manicial stringency and depression which have existed, the directors are pleased to be able to report that the business of the Canada Life Assurance Company in its 37th year, to 30th April last, was most successful and satisfactory. The applications for new assurances were in number 2,397, and amounted to \$4,805,029. Of these 208 for \$397,000 were not such as it was deemed prudent to accept. The number of new policies issued was 2,037, assuring \$4,144,029, with a new premium income of \$129,187.26, and the balance of 152 applications for assurance of \$264,000 was not carried out. At the close of the year, on 30th of April, the company's total business embraced 17,430

the company's total business' embraced 17,430 policies, on 13,987 lives, for assurances and bonns additions amounting to \$32,252,126.39.

As will be seen by the accounts attached hereto, the income of the year was \$1,209,932.83, and the payments of all kinds having amounted to \$579,377.19, the sum of \$664,709.23 was added to the company's assets, which at 30th April last amounted to \$5,282,341.56. The death claims were most moderate in num. The death claims were most moderate in number and amount, having been for \$233,864.46 of assurances, upon 105 lives under 124 policies, while the sum expected by the calculations was \$437,085. The usual dividend was paid to the proprietors, and there remained at the credit of their account at 30th April last the sum of \$95,181.70. As the near approach of the distribution of the profits of the company at 30th April next is naturally a subject of much interest to assures, the directors may say, without assuming to predict what the precise result will be, that, as the profits already amount to a large sum, there is every prospect that their early distribution will be of such a liberal and satisfactory character as should prove a strong inducement to assurers to secure that share in inducement to assurers to secure that share in them which they can at present 20, by joining the company. As prescribed by the company's charter, the following directors, whose names stand at the head of the list, retire from the board at the present time, but are eligible for re-election: James Osborne, Esq., Hamilton; The Hou Sir Alexander Campbell, K.C.M.G. Ottawa; Andrew Allan, Esq., Montreal; Thomas Swinyard, Esq., Hamilton.

To the President, Vice-President and Directors of the Canada Life Assurance Company:

GENTLEMEN, - I have completed the audit of the several Books of Account of the Canada Life Assurance Company, for the financial year ending 30th April last, and found them correct and satisfactory; the receipts and payments be-ing duly vouched and regularly recorded, the cash balance agreeing with banker's statements at the above date, after deducting the outstand-

ing cheques as noted in the Ledger.

The debentures, mortgages and other securities were severally produced and examined by me; they correspond with the schedules of investments submitted herewith, their totals agreeing with the amounts of the several investment

funds as stated in the ledger.

The accompanying statements of receipts and payments, and the general abstract of assets and liabilities, have been carefully examined and compared with the ledger balances, and are certified as correct.

The President said:—In moving the adoption of the Directors' report, I may say that, while it alludes to the monetary stringency through which this and other countries have been passing, the statements and accounts before you also record the unabated success and the sound financial position of the Company. To have been able in such times to transact a new business nearly

as large as that of our best previous years, and nearly twice as large as that of any other company, are not only strong evidences of the public confidence and good will which the Canada Life enjoys, but they are also proofs of the energetic work and devotion of your agents and officers, which I am very glad your agents and officers, which I am very glad to take the opportunity of acknowledging. As the report states, the total risks of the Company amounted to \$32,252,126, and the assets of \$6,283,341 were increased during the year by a larger amount than in any former year. A somewhat low rate of interest having prevailed last year, the income from that source has been less than it would otherwise have been; but it is still so largely beyond the rate of 4) per cent, upon which the calculations of the Company are based, as to afford a sound and good margin of profit. As might be anticipated from the increased new business, the expenses somewhat exceeded those of the preexpenses. somewhat exceeded those of the previous year, but they are still largely within the provision made for them in the premiums charged by the Company. Our percentage of expenses is at the same time not only greatly lower than that of any of other Canadian offices, but it is also less than one-half of their charges. average percentage, and there is, I believe, but one of all the companies doing business in Canada, which does so at so low a percentage of expense for each thousand dollars of assurance, as the Canada Life does. It will be observed by the report that the death claims expected by the calculations last year were for \$427.055 while a light part of the property of the calculations are the calculations and the calculations has the calculations are the calculations are the calculations and the calculations are the calcul pected by the calculations last year were for \$437,085, while as the amount of claims actually experienced were but \$233,464, a difference of \$203,221 resulted in the Company's favor. The great care which the Directors exercise in the selection of the lives offered for assurance thus continues to bear good fruit, by adding largely to the stability and to the profits of the company. An estimate of the profits at 30th company. An estimate of the profits at 30th April last indicated that they then amounted to over \$900,000, and as we appear warranted in anticipating a considerable addition to that sum before the 30th April next, we have reasum before the 30th April next, we have reason to hope that policy-holders' snares will then be of a very favorable and satisfactory character. The division of the profits of the expiring five years, to which I have alluded, being soon to take place, is already attracting a large number of assurers, the new policies of the current year very nearly equalling the amount of our best previous year at the same date, and the strong desire thus manifested to share in this approaching division of profits share in this approaching division of profits will doubtless lead to a further large addition to the business of the company. As strong efforts are being made at the present time to induce person to join what are called asses-ment or co-operative companies, I may point out that, as stated last session by Sir Leonard Tilley, the Honorable the Minister of Finance, in the House of Commons, the system of such companies is an illegal one in this country, and, as he added, it is one that country, and; as he added, "it is one that opens the road to an immense amount of fraud." As to the safety and permanence of the system, it may be mentioned that after a brief period few, if any, of the numerous companies of the kind which have tried it in England at various times are found solvent or surviving. In our own country such companies have also, after a brief existence proved disastrous and inefficient; and, as regards the United States, the records of that of Pennsylvania alone prove that, as stated by the Finance Minister, upon the occasion to which I have already alluded, out of 236 organized companies, there were after five years only 37 reported as surviving. Such an years only reported as surving. Such an ephemeral existence indicates how uscless the assessment system of assurance is as a family provision. It, can only offer the uncertain hope of a cheap assurance for a few years, till the company breaks down. It can not afford any guarantee that a definite amount of insurance will certainly be paid to a widow or children after an assurer's death, whether that occur at an early day or at a distant one, and without such a guarntee as that, which our own and other sound com-panies offer, life assurance must be but a fraud

and a delusion. I am aware that agents and and a delusion. I am aware that agents and managers of companies of the kind point to the names of prominent business and professional men who have joined them, or who act as their directors, but as some of them, at all events, allow their names to be used in that way simply because policies have been gratuitously given to them, one can judge how little weight should attach to the names of gentlemen thus used to decoy others to join such companies. I beg to move the adoption of the Directors' report and statements of account.

and Directors for their attention to the interests of the Company during the past year" Mr. Adam Brown declared that the affairs of the corporation had been managed with the greatest caution and prudence, and in a way which redounded to the credit of Mr. Ramsay and his associates.

It is stated that unless higher prices are established the mills will have to shut down until the market becomes, bare enough to admit of a rise in prices. This would be the wisest plan that could be adopted, as the mills cannot go on producing cotton for nothing.

Eastern Townships have been purchased in the country by Montreal parties at equal to 201c to 201c laid down here, one lot of over 100 packages being delivered on board car at 20½c. Prices here may be quoted at 20½c to 21½c for good to choice lots. A lot of fine Western was placed at 17½c, and a very fine parcel brought 18c—both lots on shippers' account. The very finest descriptions of dairy only are wanted, as shippers will not take the risk of handling the earlier and poorer makes found in straight lots. To sell the latter, therefore, much lower figures have to be accepted. Cheese.—A further improvement has been erected upon the gain reported last week, and prices are fully ic higher. Cables from Liverpuol advised a little better consumptive enquiry, which was reflected in the orders received yesterday and to-day. A large quantity of September cheese has been placed at 37s f.o.b. here. About two thousand boxes of Allen Grove were sold to a party here on p.t., but understood to be between 101c and 102c, and the rest were either sold by cable or consigned.

Fish,-An advance of 25c to 50c per bbl. has taken place in Cape Breton herring, owing to the reported short catch on the Labrador Coast, and quotations now range from \$5.50 to \$5.75, some holders asking \$6.

Demons are unchanged, at \$3.50 to \$4.50 per box. Jamaica oranges \$3 to \$9 per bbl. The first receipts of Brazilian oranges sold at \$5 per case. The first lots of Malaga grapes have arrived and sold at \$7 to \$7.50 per keg. Peaches \$5.00 to \$6.50 in carriers, and \$1.50 to \$2.00 in baskets. Grapes— Canada Delaware 10c to 121c per lb. Canada Rogers at 8c to 10c, Concords 6c to 7c, and Champion 5c. Quebec damsons are very dear, baving sold \$16 to \$17 per bbl., against \$9 to \$10 at this time last vear. Latest advices from Liverpool quote choice red fruit at 13s 6d to 14s 6d per bbl.

GRAIN AND FLOUR .- The demand for wheat is exceedingly small, and prices have declined fully le on the week, sales of Canada No. 2 red winter being mentioned at 85c to 86c. Wheat which lately arrived in England from the Atlantic ports show a loss of 21c per bushel, red winter shipped from New York some time ago having lost 12c per bushel on price and 9c on freight. In Canada there is a prevalent indisposition among farmers to sell at present prices. Advices from Peterboro state that farmers, after drawing their wheat twenty to thirty miles returned with it rather than accept Threy miles returned with it rather than accept 75c per bushel. In other places however 75c has been accepted, although not for any large quantities. Corn is nominally quoted at 63c to 6 c in bond. Pease have been sold at 80c, and rye is nominal; oats sold at 34c, and barley is quoted at 55c to 65c. The flour market is quiet, but prices are a trifle steadier. Superiors

A few small lots have changed hands at 33c for Barbadoes. Syrups are slow sale at 27½c to 45c, a good round lot being taken at 32½c. In dried fruit there is little stirring. New Sultanas are there is little stirring. New Sultanas are offered to arrive at 7c to 7½c. Currants have changed hands at 6c to 6½c for new and at 4½c to 4½c for old. New Valencia raisins are quoted at 7c to 7½c, and old at 4½c. Ivaca almonds sold at 10½c on spot, and Levant filberts at 7c to 7½c to arrive. The tea market has developed a slightly steadier tone, but prices here have not materially altered. An advance of 2c to 3c not materially altered. An advance of 20 to 30 per 1b. has taken place in Japan. Sales are reported of 120 half chests of Moyune Young Hysons at 14c to 17c, and 100 caddies of Pingsuey at 15c to 16gc. A good demand exists for dust, but there is scarcely any to be had. Coffee is quiet and steady. In spices there has been an advance of 1c to 2c in nutners all round for brown and limed. Black megs, all round, for brown and limed. Black megs, all round, for arown and limed. black pepper is very firm, owing to the shortage of supplies. The Penang crop is expected to fall short 2,500 tons, and a deficiency of 4,000 tons is reported in Malabar. Rice is quiet at \$3.50.

Hidden.—The old fight between dealers appears to be still going on, 9½c having been paid for No. 1 green butchers, upon which a loss has occurred, as dealers have been supplying cured hides to the Quebec tanners at the same price paid for the green. It is known that 2000 hides were sold last week for shipment to Quebec at \$9.50, although a lot was bought by a city buyer at \$10.25. Prices, therefore, are unsettled, the nominal rate being \$9.50 for No. 1 green. But for the misunderstanding among dealers No.11 hides would be selling at \$8 to \$8.50. In Western hides a few lots have changed hands at about last week's prices, and a lot of Toronto at \$0.50 for No. 1 and \$9 for No. 2. Lambskins are selling freely at 60c, about 1,500 skins being taken in last week at that figure. Sales were also made at 65c. Calfskins nominal, at 12c to 13c.

Hors.—Brewers are taking a few lots of the best Canada new hops at 20e to 21½c, the latter figure being for very fine qualities, and prices range from 18e to 21½c, as to grade. Some magnificent samples of New York and California hops have been offered on this market by a representative of a New York firm who has made several sales to brewers here, among which is a lot of No. 1 California at 23c and a lot of New York State at 24c, also a parcel of good California at 21½c, these prices being f.o.b. New York—the two best lots costing 29c and 30c laid down here and the good lot at 27½c laid down here. They are much superior to the Canadian hop, and by some are considered equal to English descriptions.

IRON AND HARDWARE.—The pig iron market continues in bad shape, it being impossible to sell, except at a shading from current rates. A large lot of Coltness was offered at \$19.50 delivered at Hamilton, but the best bid obtainable was \$18.75. Here there is only a limited trade passing in small lots, and quotations are reported as follows:—Siemens \$18 to \$18.50, Ooltness \$19.25 to \$19.50, Langloan \$19 to \$19.25, Summerlee, Gartsherric and Calder \$17, 75 to \$18.00, Dalwellington \$16.50 to \$16.75, and Eglinton at \$16.00 to \$16.25. Warrants during the week advanced to 42s, but are lower again at 41s. 11d. The metal market is easy and 12s. 6d. lower on the week, at £81.5 in London. Copper is quiet and unchanged at £59. Here sales of copper are reported at 153e to 15 7-s, and tin at 21c to 22c. Tin plates are quiet and easy. The only sale reported is a lot of 2,000 boxes I.O. coke to-day at 153 3d f. o. b. Liverpool. Here prices are quoted at \$4.00 to \$4.10 for I. C. coke and at \$4.50 for I. O. charcoal. Canada plates are scarce, with a good demand at \$2.85 for good brands. The general hardware trade is also quiet, but remittances with some houses have improved. O wing to an agreement among manufacturers to advance the price of horseshoe nails discounts have been reduced to 45 and 50-per cent.

LEATHER.—Whilst several fair-sized lots of sole and black leather have found a market on local account, the market generally is quiet, and but for the export demand, business would be extremely dull. A lot of about 250 sides of Spanish sole brought 25½c. A few parcels of harness, waxed upper, and buff, have also been placed at within the range of price list. Glazed calf steady at 22c.

LUMBER.—The chief feature at the yards is the slack condition of trade, the like of which dealers say has not been known at this season for many years past. An enquiry from Boston is reported for ash and walnut, but it does not appear to have resulted in much business. Laths are quiet and steady, at \$1.75 to \$3 as to size of lot, but stocks are too light to admit of much trading. A few lots of deals are going forward by steam to U. K. ports, but there is an absence of life even in the shipping business. The last lumber charter for South America was at \$12.50.

Ons.—The market for fish oils lacks animation, although prices are fairly well maintained. Cod oil is steady at 55c to 60c, with sales at within that range. Steam refined seal 59c to 62c, pale sale at 55c to 57c, and straw seal at 52c to 53c. The advance in linseed oil has been well maintained, and ordinary lots are quoted at 55c to 50c for raw and 59c to 60c for boiled. Spirits of urpentine 47c to 51c. Cod liver oil is quiet at \$1.20 to \$1.30.

Sugar and Fruit.—The market for cane sugar is cabled weak and lower in London, with beet sugar dull but sensitive and may react quickly. Stock in four ports of the United Kingdom on Sept. 13th was 6,000 tons under that of last week, or 778,834 tons, against 200,657 tons at the same time last year. A further sharp decline of 13 3d per. oxt. has taken place in the London market for beet root sugar, sales of 88 degrees of polarization having been made at 10s 9d for new crop October-December delivery. Fair refining muscovado has declined 9d to 11s 9d. Havana advices quote the market dull and lower. Prunes are cabled 2s. lower, at 14s. f.o.b. Bordeaux, but Bosnian prunes are preferred, although 2s. higher, at 16s. f.o.b. The first direct fruit vessel, the "Esculona," from Patras to Montreal, left on Monday last. Samples of new crop Smyrna figs are expected this, week.

Wool.—The demand previously referred to for domestic wool on American account has fallen off, and prices here are quoted as follows: A supers 27c to 28c, and B supers at 23c to 24c, unassorted 20c to 22c, and fleece, 19c to 21c. In foreign wools sales are mentioned of Cape in small lots at 164c to 174c, as to quality. Australia is quoted at 19c to 30c, as to quality.

#### TORONTO WHOLESALE MARKETS.

(Revised by Telegraph.)

|TORONTO, Sept. 25, 1884.

It would be misleading to say that trade is good, but it is true that the volume of trade in all branches is moderate, and nothing more is expected. There is no reason to suppose that trade will be dull, with the sort of dulness that has existed during the spring and summer months of this year. Complaints from wholesale houses are now largely due to the keenness of competition in trade, a circumstance which has been pointed out as existing both in wholesale and retail trade. But it is certain that the marketing of produce will be restricted in extent, owing to low prices. The movement of grain, so far, is smaller than was looked for, and the information is received that the farmers will wait to see if prices do not improve. It is this waiting that will embarrass the wholesale

trade. The movement of grain would add precisely to the circulation of money that is needed. The best opinion on the subject is that prices are not likely to be any higher during the winter months, when increased rates of freight and storage will cut into the value of wheat. And if the promise of a good harvest comes with the spring it is certain that prices will not be any higher then. It does not seem unwise to sell grain soon, even at the current prices. The banks are full of money, but their business does not suffer, as carrying merchants' accounts pays probably as well as discounting the paper of the produce dealer. But it would be better business if the grain crops were put on the market, and accounts settled up from the bottom. Remittances from the country are a trille better, but far from satisfactory. The money market is very quiet. Rates on loans from banks are quite unchanged. Commercial paper is discounted, as a rule, at from 7 to 74 per cent, but first class paper is discounted at 64. There is very little doing in loans on stocks and rates are unchanged. Sterling Exchange is dull at 108 5-8 across the counter for 60-days; demand bills 109 across the counter. The stock exchange has been very quiet. Following are prices to-day compared with those of last Thursday:

Boots and Shoes.—Manufacturers are still working on short time. There are stocks in various houses that it is desirable to diminish, and work is waiting till there is some immediate demand for goods. Trade continues much as it has been reported for some time past. Orders are still small, but it is said increasing in frequency to some extent. Wholesale prices are not changed, as cost of material and color has not been varied. Competition in this branch of trade is keen, and good buyers have much advantage.

Butter.—Opinion is varying somewhat as to the future. Some dealers think that prices of good to choice samples will improve, as there is only a limited quantity of such in the country. Others hold the opinion that the export trade is likely to fall off somewhat, and that prices will be easier. For some time there is not likely to be much change either way. The price paid by wholesale dealers here is from 15c to 16; for good to choice qualities, and 13c to 14c for needium. There are still larger quantities of inferior offered, which is not more than 10c to 11c.

Cattle Trade.—There is a satisfactory local trade being done, but exporters are not pressing business. For good cattle, weighing from 1,200 to 1,400 lbs, the prices paid were 4½c to 5c per 1b, live weight. There are still some cattle to be picked up through the country, but the export trade is not so active. Good butchers' cattle are in sufficient supply, and bring 4c to 4½c per lb., live weight, light cattle bring from \$25 to \$30 per head. It is considered just possible that prices may weaken. Sheep are in fair supply, with good demand also, and bring \$4.50 to \$6, according to quality. Lambs are in good supply, and prices continue low, ranging from \$2.75 to \$3.76 per head. Calves in light demand, and bring on basis of \$c per lb, dressed wheight. Hogs declined, quoted at 5½c per lb, live weight.

COAL OIL.—There is no change in trade, crude is reported unchanged at Petrolia, 80 to 85c per barrel, common refined here quoted at 16½c to 17c; Carbon Safety at 19½c, American prime at 23½c, and water white at 27c. Trade is fairly active.

Day Goops.—The principal change noted in the trade is that winter goods are more in demand. In ordinary seasons the fall orders would have filled all demand for winter goods. But the general course of trade has been such that orders for winter goods are still coming in. The prices of woollen manufactures are still reported low, notwithstanding there was a slight advance secured on certain lines of tweed. Cuttons also are reported singgish, and good buyers would find favorable terms. Complaints are heard from some wholesale men that remittances on a fair business scale are still behind what were expected. And, as there is but one remedy for this, namely, the movement of grain, it is feared that discontent in this direction will continue for some time longer.

Dayas.—Trade in some lines has somewhat improved. There has been some demand for linseed oils. Generally business is called fair. Prices are nominally unchanged from last week's figures, with exception of genuine, which is quoted at \$1.35 for Howard's, and \$1.25 for German in oz. bottles.

Flour and Grain—The breadstriffs markets are steady, but there is no speculation to indicate that higher rates are looked for. Flour is quiet at the low quotations given, and manufacturers are not making much out of their work. Superior extra is quoted at \$3.90, with bids at \$3.85. Extra has been selling at \$3.62, to \$3.65. Spring extra and fancy have been quoted by buyers at \$3.50, with sellers at \$3.55. Oatmeat is very quiet. Car lots of medium are quoted as low as \$4.10, and choice at \$4.10 to \$4.20. Bran is variable, and has been selling at from \$10 to \$11. The grain market is also sluggish: Wheat is nominally unchanged. Manufacturers are looking for No. 2 spring,
