On the afternoon of the sixteenth there will be a competition among twelve of the Vancouver schools for a valuable shield and other prizes. Each school will send a choir of fifty pupils trained wholly by teachers. Independent adjudicators will be appointed to award the prizes.

In the evening there will be assembled a chorus of 1,600 pupils, who will present a fine programme of music, action songs, etc., assisted by an efficient orchestra of forty players.

During the afternoon of the seventeenth the Vancouver Musical Society will give a miscellaneous programme, and in the evening Mendelssohn's "Hymn of Praise." Chorus and orchestra will number 220 performers.
