



Here, then, is eady-at-hand, practical, sensible and profitable way for us, all of us, to make and keep Canada prosperous.

The table of imports accompanying this booklet, showing as it does Canada's large purchases from Germany, Austria, and other countries, is well worth the careful study of not only the entire membership of the Toronto Board of Trade but of every Canadian, with a view to diverting this trade to Canadian and British channels.
