A Disgraceful Episode.

Sir.—To-day the town took to Kentville two men to serve fifty days each for profane language on the street the other Saturday night. Now Mr. Davison on election night there was a gang of half drunken men come to the front of your house headed by one of the leading councillors, and what about their talk. Now if you wish to know who that councillor was go to the Kentville jail and ask the two men that were put there to-day and they will tell you who he was. He should be punished for his talk and the gang he had with him. Now you are a father of children, if you can help these men to get out to work for their families kindly do so. A woman will also prove what is said here.

A TAX PAYER.

The above letter we received some days ago. A somewhat careful investigation into the matters referred to convinces us that our unknown correspondent may be pardoned for not understanding the principles of equity upon which laws are enforced in Wolfville.

The statements made by our correspondent were to be substantially correct, much as they may surprise Wolfville residents generally.

A few weeks ago two men of this town with families of small children depending upon them for support were arrested for drunkenness and the use of profane language on the street. Neither of them had ever been convicted upon such a charge before, and apart from the usual objectionable conduct of men under the influence of liquor there appears to have been nothing particularly aggravated about their offence. Yet an officer appointed by the town council promptly took action against them. A by-law against disorder upon the streets, framed by the town council, was found to have been broken and the town stipendiary sentenced the offenders to forty days imprisonment in the county jail.

This punishment may or may not have been justifiable. It is not for us to decide, but the feeling that has got a lodgment in the minds of those two men is that all people are not equal in the eyes of the authorities in Wolfville and that crimes which one set of men may commit with impunity are very dangerous when committed by other people. This admittedly is a very unfortunate impression to be common general in a community. Let us see if there is any justification for its existence.

A few nights before they committed their offence the same two men were spectators at another drunken melee although on this occasion they were not themselves intoxicated. This was on the night of the 26th of October, and the friends of Sir Fred Borden were celebrating the victory of the Conservative Government.

The crowd consisted in most part of young bloods not particularly vicious or ill-disposed toward any one, but tractable, thoughtless, readily induced to celebrate a party, victory and partake of any refreshments provided them. We will not give the names of the rank and file as they are probably now heartily ashamed of the part they played in the affair, and we have no desire to further disgrace them.

One of the leaders of the motley throng was a near relative and ardent supporter of Sir Fred's, whose distinguished political services for many years back has consisted in breaking up meetings held by political opponents and whose ardent tones are as familiar and as much appreciated in this county as is the eloquence of his distinguished relative at Ottawa.

But there was one master-spirit and organizing genius in the throng, who saw in his half-intoxicated associates the material for an army of a modern Cataline. Like Cataline this leader was a statesman of no mean attainment. In fact he was WILLIAM T. FORD, a member of the Wolfville town council and poet laureate to the minister of militia.

It seems that in the discharge of our journalistic duties during the recent campaign THE ACADIAN in some way earned the resentment of this crude individual, and to his groping intellect it occurred that the arguments and criticisms of this journal, which he could not reply to by reason, might be offset by a display of violence and ruffianism on the part of his drunken companions.

He therefore incited them to accompany him about midnight to the home of the editor of this journal and there to engage in a riot characterized by an exhibition of profanity and filthy language such as fortunately has seldom disgraced this town.

Is it any wonder that the two sober spectators to this degrading performance, observing such a criminal breach of the peace conducted under the supervision of a member of the town council and with the passive permission of the town policemen, were led to believe that no great harm would come from celebrating a little upon their own account—even without councillor patronage. Is it any wonder that these men who have seen a town councillor go scot free who has offended against the criminal code punishable with two years imprisonment with hard labor should consider it oppressive and unjust that for a slight infraction of a town by-law they should pay forty days in jail?

We have hesitated in making the above facts public, knowing the undesirable effect of our town outside. Through will naturally feel astonished that Wolfville could entertain its affairs to men of this stamp. In justice to our town we state that

this is the first time on record that behavior of this kind has been laid to the door of a town councillor in Wolfville. In further justice to this community we may add that this individual is not a product of Wolfville, that he came to us from another county and that at the time he was elected councillor the ratepayers of Wolfville knew little of him.

The Commons Bar.

Some question arose in the recent political campaign on the Commons bar. An element in Kings county, possessed of more zeal for party than for fact or morals, made the statement that the bar was closed, in keeping with a promise made by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his party in 1896. On the other hand it was emphatically stated that the bar was never closed, but was still running.

The Liberal candidate for Kings in championing the cause of temperance with considerable flourish of arms proposed to clear the air of the doubt on this question and declared on the platform that the statement which the preachers were making to the effect that there was a bar in the House of Commons was a "lie." He even went so far as to furnish the authority of the speaker of the House of Commons whom he quoted in a telegram as also emphatically denying the existence of the Commons bar.

Naturally enough some citizens of Kings recently in Ottawa made enquiry regarding this institution, the existence of which they had already had ample proof.

About Ottawa it is an open secret that this drinking place had never been closed. The Ottawa residents of the drinking class, who at such times as they found the licensed saloons of the city closed by law, and resorted to the Commons bar for their drink 'at all hours,' could abundantly attest that their unrestricted privilege to get drunk at the Commons bar was cut off, but only about six years ago. The members of the House of Commons themselves, if they would speak the truth, would attest to the fact that it has been only during the past year that their privilege at the Commons bar has not been shared by the common herd. They could also attest that the bar was only closed with the expiration of the last session of Parliament.

Several delegates of the Baptist Convention of Canada meeting in Ottawa in November being curious to see this notorious apartment of the House of Commons were taken down to the basement of the building by reputable officials and attendants upon the departments, and pointed to the door of the bar. They were not able to get in, of course, as the bar was closed—locked for the period of the absence of the members of the commons and the senate from the city.

However, we should say to the wary that there is prospect that this bar is at last to be really abolished. As Rev. J. D. Spiller and the writer were walking in the vicinity of this room with a guide who is thoroughly familiar with the House and the sessions (being in constant attendance upon the commons) we discovered that the portion of the basement in which the bar is located was under reconstruction, an addition being made to the Commons building in that vicinity.

The architect in charge was directing the workmen with plans in hand. He called to our party in a thoughtful courteous way to come and see the plans. Interpreting them to us as we stood around the blue lined paper, he very generously volunteered some most interesting and significant information. Calling attention to four apartments he said, "these are to be the drinking rooms," and turning to our guide in a very confidential tone he said, "you know the drinking is to be run in better form after this; the bar is to be done away with." Pointing to a smaller apartment near the four drinking rooms our guide asked "what is this for?" The man with the plans said, "that is the liquor room."

It will be very interesting indeed to the country to have it again announced that the bar has been closed. It is a question, however, if it will be equily consoling to know that public money is being used to equip more ample drinking accommodations in its stead. The country will not be convinced that the substitution of the "board" for the "bar" in a drinking room, will make for sobriety in the legislative halls, or for morals throughout the country; nor will its sense of respect for the legislators, who resort to bluff and trickery regarding the bar in the House of Commons, be measurably increased. When the prime minister, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and the speaker of the House and the minister of militia and other dignitaries of the commons resort to such despicable tactics in the open, what can be expected of them in things of their legislative work that of necessity are not so apparent.

Proposed Street Extension.
The suggestion made by a correspondent last week with reference to the opening up of a section of Central avenue between Prospect and Acadia streets with a view to its ultimate extension to Main street is engaging the attention of a number of our citizens. We agree with the movement provided the new street is made of sufficient width, viz., fifty feet. The proposal made by the Council to open up a lane thirty-three feet wide we feel assured will not meet with the approval of citizens. Such a policy would be in our mind most short-sighted one and in the end would only involve the town in expense and inconvenience. The street south of Prospect street is 8 1/2 feet wide and it should certainly be of so large width to Main street. This street would be of considerable convenience to citizens as well as open up a desirable part of the town for residential purposes. If the work is undertaken, however, it should certainly be in view of the future development of the town, and the street should be laid out so as to include the least possible damage to all owners property to be passed through by it.

"Courtship of Miles Standish."

A MOST PLEASING ENTERTAINMENT.
The chief topic of conversation since Saturday night has been the dramatic representation of Longfellow's poem, 'The Courtship of Miles Standish,' by the young lady undergraduates of Acadia, in College Hall. The 'college girls' certainly scored a decided success, as no entertainment given here for a long time has been more thoroughly enjoyed.
The stage effect was excellent. Antique furniture of rare pattern, with wall decorations of ancient swords and weapons of war, carried the spectator back to 'ye olden time,' and one could almost fancy himself in the home of the Puritan at Plymouth in 1620.

The Indian chief, Miss Olive Shipperal, of St. John, was so cleverly represented that the war-like appearance of this Indian brave sent a thrill of terror through the audience. Other attractive characters were Helen Christie, Amherst, as messenger; Miss Kate Mitchell, Indian girl; Misses Ola Ross and Jean McGregor, and Hettie Crandall as warriors; Ida Rand, Marjory Barnaby and Nellie Porter as Indian women. A prominent character was that of Jennie Weston, as Elder. Marie McLeod, P. E. Island, took the part of Captain of the Mayflower, and Alice Eaton and Bulah Eiderkin took the part of sailors.
The members of the council with their sombre Puritan dress, with white cuffs and collars, large broad hats, were faithfully portrayed by Miss Julia Sweet, Miss Reta Manning, Miss Evelyn Slack and Miss Marion Sharpe.
The two choirmen from the opera 'Priscilla,' 'Tis a Secret' and 'Capit', by the entire company, were heartily enjoyed.
The descriptive parts of the poem were read by Miss Treva Mitchell with her usual grace and effectiveness, and added very materially to the success of the undertaking. We understand Miss Mitchell also rendered much valuable assistance in other directions.
It is hoped that the young ladies may be induced to repeat this very attractive entertainment during the winter.
