QUARREL BETWEEN FRANCE AND RUSSIA.

MARCELLES, OCT. 23. -A nice little quar rel has arisen between France and Russia, such as in the good olden, time might have led to an immediate war, and in regard of which the newspapers have observed a discreet silence. It appears that early in last June a strong Russian police force, backed by 200 Cossacks, invaded the dwellings of 63 French tradesmen settled in Sebastopol, arrested and conveyed them on board of a Russian vessel (the Balaklava), which transported them to Odessa, where they were without resources, and many of them plunged into the deepest distress. A month before that occurrence the Cosacks had seized four Franch workmen and marched them on foot, like felons, to Simferopol. The reason of this expulsion of so many respectable persons, and the grounds on which Russia could justify such a violation of international law, as well as the laws of humanity, exposing the properity of unoffending French subjects to plunder and confescation, no one can teil. The Russian Government is bent on observing an shsolute silence and appears impervious to all remonstrance.

On the 20th of October, the Russians took possession of the ground purchased at Vallatranca. Great activity is displayed in constructing the different buildings. The company has purchased a vast quantity of timber and other building materials, through the agency of the Russian consul, at Florence. Several steamengins have been ordered from Euglish houses. The building materials on account of the Russian Government, and stores for the the use of the navy, are preparing at Toulon.

THE NEW GOLD COLONY .- There is no longer reason for any doubt as to the rich gold fields to be found in British Columbia. The evidence of vast wealth which is lying in Fraser's river, and in some of the adjacent bills, is confirmed by official intelligence. Governor Douglas himself-formerly the chief agent of the Hudson's Bay Company, and now the first Governor appointed by the Crown-has borne testimony from personal observation, to the actual existance of the gold throughout a vast portion of the territory hitherto in the hands of the Indians. In spite of some evil omens, and of bad reports, from neighbouring tribes, and rival gold-fields the matallic wealth of Vancouver and British Columbia is an undoubted and authenticated fact.
