158 Years Ago

Very little was known about the early history of Newcastle until the year 1764. when William Davidson brought out a number of settlers from the old country to hew the lumber and farm some of the more fertile patches of land along the Mıramichi at Newcastle which was named after the Duke of Newcastle. Three years later Davidson launched the first vessel built on the Miramichi, and which was named "Miramichi". In 1785, some Loyalists came and settled at Newcastle. The lumber trade and ship building brought a great many vessels every year.

The troublous times of early settlers gradually passed away and in 1825, Newcastle had a population of 1000 peo-

Wages at that time were low. The ordinary rate two shillings a day, or at the present rate of exchange, about forty cents. Women servants received ten shillings a month or six pounds a year, or in dollars and cents two dollars a month or twenty four dollars a year.

Cotton goods cost about ten times as much as they do now. The ordinary dress of both men and women was nomespun, wool was carded and spun by hand and woven into cloth on a hand loom. Particulars of a suit of broad cloth bought by an early settler in 1777, cost six pounds or as much as he could earn in ten weeks at the current rate of wages. Douglastown was one of the pioneer sites populated on the Miramichi river and the decendants of these great men are still forging ahead in this thrifty town.
