A WORD WITH A CONTEMPORARY.

A word or two ago we referred to an article in the question of the annexation of Canada to the United States which appeared in the columns of the New York Freeman's Journal; and, in pointing out the fallacy of the line of argument pursued by that paper, we quoted from our able and esteemed contemporary, the Toronto Catholic Bazaar. Our New York contemporary, finding the position taken by us unassailable and its own ground utterly untenable, endeavors to hide its discomfiture by having recourse to such subterfuges as a wretched opponent by variously employ. It ingeniously refers to the Herald as a paper published at the "frozen mouth of the St. Lawrence," and employs the word "Kanucks," to designate the citizens of this Dominion. We may here say, that no gentleman, no man of letters, no man of any pretensions, would be expected to make use of opprobrious terms such as these, much less to write them.

The utter disregard of facts that has characterized the course pursued by our contemporary on the question of Canadian freedom than those of any other country in the world, and that at the "frozen mouth of the St. Lawrence" the people are loyal to their country and are willing to manifest their loyalty, not only in words, but in deeds. EDITORIAL NOTES.

BARON HIBBER, of Vienna, has made a donation of \$6,000,000 for schools for the Jews in Galicia and Buravia.

In the British House of Commons on the 29th ult., the Ashbourne Act Amendment Bill passed the third reading, 202 to 141.

The sale of Dominion lands in the Northwest for the year ending October 31st, last, has been greatly in excess of last year; the last three months show an increase of forty-two thousand dollars.

This steamship Albany arrived at Vancouver, B. C., on the 27th ult., from Yokohama with nine saloon passengers, twenty-eight Chinese, five Jews for Seattle, 1,400 tons of cargo for overland transit, and 800 for coast ports.

According to the most reliable footing of the votes cast at the last Presidential election, Cleveland has a plurality of the popular vote over Harrison of 70,490 votes, although Harrison won by a hundred for the next four years.

Six hundred thousand turkeys, two and one-half million pounds of chickens, ducks and geese, and one hundred thousand quarts of cranberries was what would be required for New York and Brooklyn on Thanksgiving Day.

The statement of Canadian imports for October shows a million dollars increase over the previous October. The customs duties for the first four months of the present fiscal year exceed those for the same period last year by \$55,000. The exports for October are half a million more than in the same month last year.

Notice has been given to the Ottawa authorities that application will be made to incorporate the E. R. Island and Northumberland Railway and Ferry Company, to construct a line of railway from Buctouche to Kingston and Richibucto, and establish a railway and passenger ferry connecting with the P. E. Island Railway; also the Hammond River and Moncton Railway.

It has been calculated in the United States, and it is not disputed, that the Presidential Election cost directly and indirectly not less than \$200,000,000, that is, at the rate of \$125,000,000 each for the presidential period. This is perhaps the largest sum of money ever expended in the United States for the purpose of electing a President.

The debates on the Irish Land Purchase Bill was resumed in the Imperial House of Commons on the 29th ult. Mr. Smith, Government leader, appealed to the House to assist in closing the discussion on the bill. 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MISCELLANIES.

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MARINE DISASTERS.

A most terrific storm raged along the New England coast on Sunday and Monday last week, and a large number of vessels were wrecked and several lives were lost. The Dominion Line steamer Vancouver arrived at Halifax on Wednesday night, having crossed the Atlantic in twenty days. The steamer Carrol, from this port, left Halifax on Tuesday afternoon, and arrived at Boston on Tuesday morning, after a very rough and stormy passage.

The British steamer Carrol arrived at Savannah, Ga., on Friday morning on the 30th ult., with the captain and crew safe. The steamer was wrecked on the beach near Savannah, on the 29th ult., and the cargo was saved.

A terrible accident occurred in a school house in St. Louis, a few days ago, which would have resulted in great loss of life, had it not been for the quick action of the teachers. The steam heating apparatus got out of order, and the resulting fire, which was extinguished by the teachers, caused the death of several children.

A fatal shooting accident occurred in Halifax, N. S., on the night of the 29th ult. The Rev. Mr. Wright, of the Duke of Wellington regiment, was killed. Early in the morning Capt. Brice drove down the western shore on the Duke of Wellington regiment, and was killed by a bullet from a rifle which had been fired from a boat on the water.

Four vessels have arrived here in distress as a result of the great storm which raged along the coast on Sunday and Monday last week. The vessels are the British schooner Boston, the Dominion Line steamer Vancouver, the British schooner Carrol, and the British schooner Boston.

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GENERAL NEWS.

The steamer Providence passed outwards from Quebec on the 30th ult., proceeding at full speed. She got away at 10 o'clock.

The Government announced in the British House of Commons on the 29th ult. that Sir Henry Norman had been appointed to the Governorship of Queensland.
