Barley will be grown to a smaller extent, probably one-balf to two-thirds that of last year. Reenomy of Mulch.

I have a small garden in which I grow some dainties which we all enjoy, and which benefit and confirm our health in one cup of buttermilk, one egg, butter size of and egg, two cups of flour, one stead of assailing it, as boughten dain-ties are so apt to do. I have used sawdust very satisfactorily as mulch, but cannot get any this year. So I cut the asparagus tops off close and spread the haula, cleared of seeds as it is, over the strawberry beds, and use the beanpoles to hold it in p'a e against wind. A calm, frosty December morn-ing is the time to do this well. Tomato and pea haulm and cornstalks serve to shade part of the surface in the same way. A heap of leaves, carried in from street trees, is divided between perennial flowers and the strawherries. and prunings of some evergreens planted as a screen help to complete the useful service.
