





SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones, the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.





The Evening Chit-Chat

This is the season of house-cleaning.

Too self-evident to mention, you think?

Quite so. But I mentioned it only to introduce a suggestion.

As you take your broom in hand to move up on the foe, will you not make up your mind that the season of house-cleaning this year, is to be also a season of house-cleaning and simplification?

The desire to accumulate simply for the sake of accumulation is one of the oldest and most unreasoning of human passions. The child who hoards the red candy box and the half dozen seashells, beautiful once as they sparkled in their proper setting, the wet sea sand, but hopelessly ugly now, and the hundred and one little treasures quite as valueless and useless and quite as precious; the Indian who treasures his bits of colored glass; the miser who glazes over his hidden gold; and the housewife who solemnly takes out and cleans and puts back each year a lot of truck that she does not really want and will never use, are all slaves of this same primeval obsession—the mania for accumulation.

To discriminate, to know what to keep and what to throw away, to have the wisdom and courage to simplify one's existence by getting rid of all truck one is keeping simply because one does not quite like to throw it away—that is the mark of the woman who has developed somewhat beyond the primeval.

There are so many departments of the average household where simplification could be attempted with good results.

For instance, the writing desk. Ten to one it is overflowing with letters long ago read and answered and kept, not for any sentimental or literary worth, but merely "because it seems too bad to throw them right away."

Go through that desk with a relentless hand, trying up any letters that you have any real reason for keeping, and consigning the others to the fire, and see if you do not approve the result.

And by the way, let me offer a suggestion in regard to the souvenir cards which—if you are not a collector or do not happen to know any one who is—will seem a problem to you because it seems too bad to burn them up. Don't do that. Mine go to a dear old lady who delights in forwarding them to the missionaries who greatly appreciate this new kind of picture cards. Doubtless your Church Missionary Society will be glad of yours.

Then there is the medicine chest, with dozens of bottles in it that contain little trickles of medicine that you will never use again. There's a little of that fever medicine the doctor gave you when you had the grippe, and a few drops of the stuff he gave the baby for measles, and another bottle half full of some dark colored liquid whose reason for being there you have quite forgotten. You pretend to think that perhaps you will use some of these again but really you know you never will.

And then there are the closets and wardrobes and chests where your unused clothes are stored. Your elimination here surely ought to be most rigid, because you owe it to two people—to yourself, whose life these unnecessary things are clogging, and to somebody else who has need of them.

There are those boots that didn't quite fit you and that you have hoarded for two years hoping some day to get up the courage to wear them. You never will. You know it now. And they might mean so much to that somebody else.

There's that brown serge dress that you laid aside because you never liked and soiled your conscience by pretending that some day you will wear it made over. You know you never will and somebody's hands are outstretched waiting to receive it from you.

The responsibility of keeping these things—that by right of eminent domain belong to the somebodies who need them—truly I do not see how anyone dare assume it.

These are just a few general suggestions. The specific simplifications which your household needs, only you can know. But if you bravely carry out this policy through the whole house I promise that you shall be more satisfied with your spring cleaning than you have ever before.

Household Notes.

If troubled with rats use crude oil freely. Milk is much better for wiping off linoleum than water. Meat soaked in crude oil is said to be excellent bait for rodents. Copper may be cleaned by scouring with a cut lemon dipped in salt. To make a boric acid solution use one teaspoonful boric acid to one pint of water. A damp chamomile is indispensable for wiping off picture frames that are enameled. A slice of bacon cooked with spinach or other greens gives a delightful seasoning. It is better to keep tea and coffee in airtight glass jars, in a place not exposed to strong light. A little alum dissolved in the water in which cretonne is washed is an aid in keeping colors bright. Always scald the milk used in making a custard. Then when it is baked it will always be smooth. Scatter sassafras bark with woolen goods and furs when putting them away for the summer. It keeps moths out. A little vaseline or oil rubbed over a stove when it is taken down for the summer months will prevent rusting. Strong soap suds and water in which there is washing soda is fatal to china or glassware decorated in gilt. For wiping off a varnished paper use warm water and paraffin—half a cupful of paraffin to a pailful of water. In mashing potatoes it pays to heat the milk, adding the butter to the milk, before turning into the mashed potatoes. If a few pin holes are made in an egg shell before the egg is boiled there will be no danger or cracks in the shells. To clean ivory, brush with a soft tooth brush, using lukewarm water. If the ivory is discolored use a little alcohol. Always keep two large sponges for house cleaning purposes, one to wash woodwork with and one to use in rinsing. There is no better way to remove egg stains from silver than by rubbing vigorously with a damp cloth dipped in salt. Save your pound powder tins to steam brown bread in, to mold your pressed yeast or beef and cornmeal mush to fry. Tartaric acid will remove almost any iron rust blemish from material.

To Raise Mink and Muskrats in Alberta

Far Farm to Be Started in June With 500 Mink and 5,000 Rats. Spokane, Wash., April 1—Two thousand acres of land in the lake district, north of Athabaska Landing, in the province of Alberta, has been leased for a term of years by Dr. T. J. Burgen of Spokane and his associates in eastern Washington, who propose operating a mink and muskrat farm as a commercial enterprise.

The work of preparing the farm and stocking it with animals will be begun early in June. Dr. Burgen says of the project:

"I do not recall having heard of a similar experiment anywhere in Canada, but I have devoted all my spare time during the last seven years to careful investigation, and I am thoroughly convinced that the undertaking will be a big financial success."

"I was over the ground recently and chose the location. We are arranging to place 5,000 rats into the lake, which is well stocked already. Dark rats will be used, as the pelts are of a higher commercial value than the lighter varieties."

"The rats require no food other than what they can get themselves, except in unusual cases. We shall prepare for emergencies by growing carrots, which will be fed to the animals, if necessary. The muskrat pelts are worth from 80 cents to \$1 each."

A Stupid Blunder.

There can be no shadow of a doubt that the Government has made a serious blunder in the location they have selected for housing the sealers of the Newfoundland who are detained for observation. These men are unfortunate and should receive the most considerate treatment, but the measure that is meted out to them should be such as does not endanger others. These unfortunate sealers deserve the best of food and the most comfortable of quarters. But that is no reason for risking the infection of a whole neighborhood of men, women and children. We understand that a shed is being run up on Quidi Vidi Road, within a few feet of the public road. There are quite a number of houses about. Children play around. Men women and children must pass within a few feet of this hostel in pursuing their ordinary avocation. Moreover the people around keep poultry and also dogs and cats and they go around everywhere. Naturally enough the people are in a great state of alarm, fearing that small-pox may break out in the shed, and that it may become a centre of infection to the neighborhood. We cannot conceive of anything more stupid than the action of the Government in selecting this location. We hope that the Government may re-consider its decision and make other provision for these men without menacing the lives and health of those who are free from the disease of small-pox.

POLICE COURT NEWS.

To-day 3 disorderlies were each fined \$2 or 7 days.
A drunk was fined \$1 or 3 days and another was discharged.
Three boys were summoned by Sergt. Mackey for throwing snowballs on the street on the 14th inst. Two of the boys pleaded not guilty and were discharged, but the third pleaded guilty to throwing the missiles and was fined \$10 or 30 days.
The man Walsh who was suspected of the larceny of a tub of butter from the Glencoe, and who was remanded Saturday, was released to-day. It was shown that the package did not contain butter but drippings or fat, which one of the fremen on the ship had gathered up and given to Walsh to take home, so that the man's character does not suffer in the least by the transaction.

Spent Over \$1000

Messrs. A. J. Harvey & Co. spent over \$1,000 in fitting up the shed on the South Side where upwards of 70 of the Newfoundlanders are being placed in quarantine. The men were supplied with new underclothing, mattresses were also put at their disposal, stoves, &c., were placed in the building, and the whole affair rounds to the credit of the firm. The men will retain the clothing given them but the mattresses must be destroyed, as none could use them fearing they might be infected with the disease for which the men were quarantined.

Diphtheria Spreading

A case of diphtheria was reported from 57 Long's Hill this morning, where a girl of 17 years old is suffering from it. She will be sent to Hospital. A little boy, a patient at the General Hospital was also stricken with the disease yesterday and was removed to the Fever Hospital. He has the disease in very mild form. The General Hospital has been closed to visitors, and this is the second case of diphtheria to occur within a week in the institution.

Believed Him Dead.

Mr. M. A. Duffy by the Glencoe's mail had a letter from his brother John, from whom he had not heard since he left the city, 1 year ago, and who, it was believed, was dead. Mr. Duffy, who is well known in St. John's, is now residing in New York, is at work at his trade as a barber, and will come here to see his friends next summer.

Trouble About Hospital

There seems to be trouble coming from more than one quarter about the temporary hospital now being erected at Connors' Field, near the oil store, Quidi Vidi Road. Excepting Councilor Martin, none of the City Fathers had been consulted about permission to build there. Mr. Major and other residents of the locality are now coming down on the Council for allowing the building to be erected there and are getting up a protest signed by all the people of the locality. The residents are putting some of the blame on the Council, and as five of them knew nothing about it, there will likely be a lively time at the next meeting of the City Fathers.

Kindly Act.

One of the crew of the Beothic tells us of a kindly act of Capt. George Barron. A sick man of the Florizel, Mr. Percy Best, of Brookfield, was noticed on the wharf by the crew, who drew the attention of the captain to him and told him the man wanted a passage home. He was sick and suffering from consumption. The captain told them to put the sufferer in his room and supply him with the food he used.

May Lose His Eye.

Joseph Madden, of Petty Harbour, who was out in the Eagle had to come in by the S. S. Florizel owing to injury received to his eye. While on the lee near the ship Eagle a spark from her funnel struck him on the ball of the eye and rendered the optic useless for the rest of the voyage. He suffered great pain and had to be brought in to get medical treatment.

Trouble in Delagoa Bay

LONDON, To-day. A Capetown despatch states that the British cruiser Fort has been ordered to Delagoa Bay. According to the Johannesburg Express to suppress the anarchy which reigns in Delagoa Bay, owing to the fact that many officials and residents of the Portuguese African territory remain loyal to the deposed monarch. The revolutionists demand the deposition of the Governor of Mozambique and the expulsion of the loyalists.

Wise Precaution.

When the crews of the Florizel and Viking were being paid off Saturday each man was served with a printed notice warning him that next spring none would be allowed to board Bro's. ships unless they produced a medical certificate of vaccination and can show a vaccination mark. This is a prudent course, and if such had been adopted during the present spring it is not likely that so much trouble and expense would accrue to the owners of the seals of and the sealers on the Newfoundland.

Tim Shannahan, Tucker and Mrs. Tucker Over Among the Swails.

We tramped over to the South Side the other day to see the seals getting ashore and to watch the skinning. Mrs. Tucker claims to be the only woman who ever went through the premises from stem to stern, and she says 'twould be well worth while for any woman in town to take a stroll through the works and watch the wonderful things to be seen.
From the "hooking on" of the pelts to the grinding of the fat is an interesting lesson, and she says 'tis astonishing that more of our people don't get interested.
The "hands" engaged handling the fat are quite at home in their work and go about it in an easy off-handed manner as if they were playing a game of cricket. Every man knows his work and things move along with an easy run that is pleasing to witness. The big "strop" of seals coming up out of the hold, ushered up with wonderful rapidity by the powerful donkey engines, always to another for a second or two, and then swings in over the wharf and soor drops in a heap. Here big strong barrows come along, pushed by rattling strong men, and the seals being hove into them, are conveyed to the weigh house to be weighed. The tally man stands with an all-important air and keeps check of the weight. There is another checker for the men, who keeps tally against him.
After the seals are weighed they are again barrowed and conveyed to the skinning tables. Here is a sight that must be seen to be appreciated. The "boy," usually a big boy with a mustache, takes the pelt and fires it up on the slanting table, and after cutting off the tail and a few scraps of fat, the skinner starts into removing the fat. The skinner of a seal requires the "knowing how," or great damage may be done the valuable skin. It is a grand sight to watch a good skinner roll off the fat, and great rivalry exists amongst them as to who will skin the most seals. The late Mr. John (aul) was considered the best a few years ago, but there are many others who are top notches to-day; but the seals are divided more evenly now and there is not that chance to shine that existed formerly.
Watching the fat going through the grinders is something that will repay a visit, and soon you see the oil running into the tanks, the whole business being worked like magic.
The busy scene, the jolly get along of the workmen, the sizzling of stean on all sides, the youngsters on the search for flippers, and the shriek of the hovering gulls, all lend something that is a complete change from the hum-drum life of the north side. Men are happier over there for they haven't time to grumble, and the lucky captain moves down the wharf a monarch of all he surveys. The merchant is there too, and mixer among the toilers. He looks happier on the south side than he does on the north. There's a freedom over there that makes you feel happy, a something out of the ordinary that drives dull care away; but the freedom of the "flipper" is not thrown in, for the delicacy is guarded by the watchful eye and the strong arm of the "mas" from the north," and was unto the St. John's boy that tries to "lift" it.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, April 16.
News has been cabled here from Washington that the force of Marines with a Maxim gun, from the British warship, Shearwater, landed on Tuesday last at San Quinton, Lower California, to protect the town against a threatened attack from the Mexican insurgents, came as a surprise to the British Foreign Office. Nothing whatever had been heard regarding the incident, was the statement given out this morning by the Secretary in charge of the Foreign Office. The Admiralty similarly disclaims any knowledge of the landing of a British force in the Mexican town, though it is admitted that the Shearwater was expected to call at San Quinton en route from Las Pas, Mexico, which port the warship left on April 3rd, bound for San Diego. The officials say that when Capt. Vivian, commander of the Shearwater, telegraphically reported its arrival at San Diego, he made no mention of the San Quinton incident.

Wants to Know.

It looks as if some people can do as they like. I should not think that the Council should take so much from the people. It's no benefit to the people. All this wood is there rotten, falling down, and lots of poor people perishing and they dare not touch one stick of it. I would like to see people getting a little more fair play than what they are getting.

Paris, April 11.—The 20-round fight between Sam McVey and Sam Langford was pulled off to-night. The fight ended in a draw, although Langford completely outclassed his opponent.

There was a great deal of infighting, and the referee was constantly forced to intervene. The faces of both men showed signs of severe punishment at the end. The fight was for a purse of \$10,000.
New York, April 3.—Commodore H. H. Melville, of the Motor Boat Club of America, received a cable from London advising him that sportsmen there are ready to back the British entry in the International boat race in waters for any part of \$100,000. The Englishmen ask if the Americans have "any offers" to make.

Laurier May Not Attend
Special to Evening Telegram.
OTTAWA, To-Day.

Officials of the Marine Department have been notified that Postmaster-General Lemieux will administer the department during the absence of Hon. Louis P. Brodeur at the Imperial Conference. It is understood that he will remain in charge afterwards, and that after the Conference Brodeur will make a tour of Europe, and then be appointed to the Supreme Court Bench. Should Sir Wilfrid Laurier fail to attend the Imperial Conference it will be impossible for any other minister to do so, as only the Premiers are members of the Conference. Other ministers attend conference to advise their chiefs, and have no standing in their absence. It is understood that Laurier's failure to attend would result in the Conference going over till 1912. Those near Laurier say he intends to sail on May 12th, but he compelled this with the assertion that the vote on the reciprocity resolutions must have been reached before that date. No such vote can be reached by that date except by agreement and the indications point to the opposition insisting upon a thorough discussion not only of the general issue of reciprocity, but of the various schedules, even though that it may require another month or two to do so.

Taxicab Strike.
Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-Day.

London is threatened with a taxicab strike. Five thousand drivers at a meeting adopted resolutions protesting against the owners of the Federation increasing the price of patrol and raising the fares from 8d. to 10d. for the first mile. The situation is an outgrowth of the refusal of the Government to remit the petrol tax of three halfpence a gallon.

In Terrible State.

When Sgt. Cleary found the aged spinster alluded to by us Saturday, the house, or cellar rather, which she occupied off George Street, was in a terrible state of filth. The unfortunate occupant who resided in it alone, and who was ill, was clothed in rags, neglected and dirty and slept on an old pallet covered with rags. She has occupied this hole for 24 years, and faintly showed signs of mental affliction. Dr. Fraser visited her, pronounced her insane and Supt. Grimes had her conveyed to the Lunatic Asylum. This city cannot be protected against outbreaks of disease when human beings are allowed to inhabit such filthy dens.

A Clean Bill.

The S. S. Glencoe was placed on quarantine when she arrived here yesterday morning from Louisburg. After examination the ship was given a clean bill of health. All the vessels arriving from Cape Breton will be quarantined.

Dickens' Love Affair.
Famous Novelist a Rejected Lover—Hitherto Unpublished Letters of Author tell of Romance.

Some time ago an American collector had an inexpressible good fortune to come across some unpublished letters of Charles Dickens. Together with the comments of Professor George Pierce Baker, of Harvard, they are being circulated privately in a little book, entitled "Charles Dickens and Maria Beadnell." Few lovers of Dickens, we dare say, even heard of Maria Beadnell. Yet she was the original of Dora Spinlow in "David Copperfield," and of Flora Finching in "Little Dorrit."

A Shed for the Sealers

WHILE GOVERNMENT MEMBERS LIVE IN MANSIONS.

Saturday we referred to the fact that the quarantined sealers kept in Baine Johnstone's shed, on the South Side, were dissatisfied with the store in which they were placed and the food tendered them, and as a result Messrs. Piccott and Winsor, M. H. A. S. visited them, heard their complaint, informed the Premier Sir E. P. Morris and it was immediately decided to put the men in a shed in the East End. A site was later on selected on Quidi Vidi Road, in Connors' Field, opposite the oil stores. The shed will be a building of about 150 feet long by 50 feet wide, and yesterday carpenters were procured by Kennedy Bros. and lumber was sent down by the Horwood Lumber Co. and the work of erecting the shed began. The spectacle of crowds of men going through the streets with their working implements, and the sight of men working at the place on the peaceful Sabbath Day, to say the least of it was a surprise to a great many and certainly was not an edifying spectacle, especially when there was no necessity for building a shed. A shed built of green wood and which must of necessity be as cold as that which the men occupied on the South Side is good enough for these poor fishermen while the members of the "Pickle Party" live in mansions. We hold that there was no necessity to build a new shed to put these men in. One of the two rinks, preferably the Curling Rink which is a fine strong and light building could be fitted up and made comfortable for the men in half a day and the Sabbath quiet need not be disturbed. Last fall thousands of dollars were spent to fit up and beautify this building at the best of the "experts" for an agricultural show, but it could not be utilized for the convenience and comfort of those poor sealers. A hastily constructed shed is good enough for them. Another feature of the case is that the people of the East End view the erection of the shed in this particular locality with fear, and on all sides the proceeding is denounced. The place is surrounded by houses on all sides and the residents fear infection. There is also the ever present danger of fire while the men are domiciled there, and with the oil stores so near if an outbreak occurred the consequences would be terrible to contemplate. The people of the East End are asking why the Premier did not select some site in the West End for the erection of this shed. The reason is obvious. He had much to lose by arousing the resentment of his constituents but recked little as to what might occur to those of the other district. Moreover, would it not have been better and safer to hire one or two of the wooden sealing steamers? There would have been a chance of making the quarters warm, wind tight and comfortable and isolation would have been easier, and this could have been done without endangering anybody. Where the shed is now being built is thickly populated. The people there are menaced and will have to take the precaution of killing their fowls, dogs and cats in an attempt which may fall of keeping themselves, husband, wives and children immune from smallpox. Nothing more stupid or showing less capacity for dealing with a problem, and greater recklessness for the care of citizens has come within our experience. The sealers who are unfortunately detained in the public interest should be provided with good food, and comfortably housed, but surely this can be done without housing them on a public street where many people are living.

Rev. Jas. Allan, M. A.,

AT COCHRANE ST. CHURCH.
The presence in St. John's of the Rev. James Allan, M. A. of Toronto, Superintendent of Missions in the Methodist Church, induced the authorities of Cochrane Street Church to give their Easter services the character of a missionary celebration. Mr. Allan is one of the foremost men in Canada, and has, for a number of years, occupied what is perhaps the most important position in connection with the work of the great church that he represents. He is essentially a leader, and his words, eloquent and enthusiastic, carried conviction to the hearers yesterday as the large congregations listened to his sermon and address. The morning discourse was based upon the faith and the choice of Abraham, and set forth the fact that the standards of this world were not always the standards of the gospel. The wealth, large population, political power and influence of the British Empire were as nothing, if understood and supporting them were not the true principles that make for good character. Mr. Allan's illustrations, finished delivery, and convincing logic, held the close attention of his audience. 

S.S. Labrador From the Gulf.

Yesterday morning at 6 o'clock the s.s. Labrador, Capt. D. Martin, arrived from the Gulf sealfishery with the excellent trip of 12,500 seals, about 500 of which are old. After leaving Channel on Friday, March the 10th, she had the first sign of the seals on Sunday, the 12th, when the men captured two fine whitecoats; but few others were seen until the Saturday afterwards, when, running into a small patch about 35 miles east of Bird Rocks, about 150 were killed. She steamed through the ice all Sunday, and that night the seals could be heard crying around the ship. She was into a big patch and the work of slaughter began, but only 400 were secured as a terrific snow storm began and the men had to deist. This lasted all day, but next morning the weather was clear, the men were out early and killed nearly 7,000 for the day. The following day, Wednesday, 5,000 more were accounted for. The Viking and Southern Cross could be seen off to the westward evidently doing well also, and the patch being pretty well cleaned up, the ship began to pick up her pans on Thursday.

Another storm coming on drove the men aboard ship at noon that day, and that night became jammed and remained so for about 18 days. The ship drifted with the current and the men had to labor hard in gutting the seals to the ship, being compelled to tow them over 5 miles of rough uneven ice, which was often rafted, and they could only make two tows per day. This was necessarily tedious but it was the only way to get the seals on board. All were safely stowed below decks by Wednesday, April 6th.

On the 6th Capt. Martin used seven kegs of powder in blasting the ship out of the ice. She was released and steamed a few miles, after which she again became caught, and remained so until the 12th, when the ice became slack. She started for home when only 3 miles off Cape St. George. She called at Cedroy, landed about 100 men of her crew there, then went to Channel and landed more, after which she proceeded here, but harbored at St. Lawrence owing to stormy weather. She left St. Lawrence at 5 a.m. Saturday. The weather all the spring was stormy and the ice heavy, so that Capt. Martin is to be congratulated on his success as master of the Labrador for his first spring. Had not the ship been jammed she would have had a full load. The Kite had 2,000 seals on March 29th, and the belief is that she will have a good trip.

More Sealers Discharged Saturday

The Viking finished discharging Saturday afternoon. She landed 17,886 young harps, 160 old harps and 4 old hoods; total, 18,052. Gross weight 354 tons, 17 cwt, 3 qrs.; net, 342 tons, 9 lbs.; net value, \$30,346.49. Her crew of 216 men shared \$46.61 each. Capt. Bartlett share was \$1,213.85.

The Florizel also finished discharging Saturday afternoon. Her trip out was 25,342 young harps, 696 young hoods, 200 bedlamers 65 old harps, 735 old hoods; total, 28,129. Gross weight, 566 tons, 16 cwt, 2 qrs., 5 lbs.; net weight, 478 tons, 2 cwt., 2 qrs., 18 lbs. Net value, \$40,818.97. Her crew of 270 men shared \$50.20 each. Capt. Kean shared \$1,638.75.

Stowaway After Stowaways.
