Yesterday we published the letter of July 4th, 1912, addressed by Sir Edward Morris to Messrs. Glyn, Mills. Currie & Co., the agents of the Colony. in connection with the Loan.

There are two paragraphs which we publish again to-day to direct attention to two statements which they contain. The paragraphs run as fol-

"The proceeds of the present Loan will be applied to the building of five Branch Lines of Railway, about 300 miles in length, to connect with the Main Trunk Line of Railway between St. John's and Port-aux-Basques: the building of such Branch Lines has been authorised by Parlia-

ment (10 Edward VII., Chap. 12.) The money provided by this issue is intended to complete the Branch Lines under construction, all of which will, it is expected, be open for operation by December 1st. 1914."

The first statement to which we direct attention is that the branch lines provided for by the Railway Extension Act of 1910 will be about 300 miles in length.

Cable News.

NEW YORK, July 25.

A cable from London says, twentyfour policemen are keeping guard over Lord Devonport's residence and park which surrounds it, to-day, while others patrolled the approaches to the park. Devonport is the employer for whose death thousands of striking dockers prayed publicly for on Tower Hill yesterday. Precautions are being taken for fear of an attempt being made to assassinate him. Devonport, who is chairman of the Port of London, incensed the strikers' hatred by refusing to move an inch toward a settlement of the struggle, and was as determined as ever to-day. It is said he was deeply perturbed by yesterday's demonstration of intensity of feeling against him. Charitable and kindly in private life, the reviews today ranked him one of the old school of English captains of industry. To the danger of assassination, Devonport is indifferent; but to have an immense throng pray for Heaven to kill him, has disturbed him seriously. Public sympathy was in a measure turning strongly in the strikers' favor to-day, because of the sufferings of themselves and their families. Other workers are talking of sympathetic strikes, and it is feared this will become general. The Government is seriously alarmed over the outlook.

LONDON, July 25.

Sir William MacKenzie, who sailed for Canada yesterday, declared strongly in favor of three Dreadnoughts from Canada to be donated immediately for the North Sea Squadron. Hazen, the Canadian Minister of Marine, who accompanied Borden to England, in replying yesterday to a deputation from the Imperial Marine League, declared he was not violating confidence when he said the question of converting merchant ships into armed cruisers in time of war was discused the last few days between the Government now here and the Admiralty authorities. In order to make such lines effective, said Hazen, guns and ammunition would have to be supplied to ports on either side of the Atlantic, between which such vessels ran, so that in the event of hostilities they would at the earliest possible moment be placed in a position to resist an atack or assist other vessels attacked. It has been suggested, he said, to the British Navy, the conditions should not effect the reduction of what Britain should do-the contribution should only be a supplement to what the Mother Country undertakes. "This is the view which we have taken here during the deliberations, and which we have tried to put before the authorities," said Hazen.

LIMA. Peru. July 25. A destructive earthquake occurred vesterday in Piura, capital of the most northerly Pacific departments. The shock lasted one minute and fifty conds. The city is said to be al in ruins. While the advices from the district are meagre, it is reported that a number of children have been killed, and many injured. Among the latter was Mr. Blackler, agent for the South American Insurance Company. The dry bed of the river was torn open, and jets of water was thrown out. The town has a population of 12,000.

PITTSBURG, July 25. Death and disaster spread broadcast over the south-west countries yesterday and last night, through a cloudburst and the overflowing of rivers. Three score lives were lost, while the damage to homes and industries cannot be estimated. Fifteen lives were lost in Superba Mine, No. 2, Uniontown. Seventy-five miners narrowly escaped death, and reports coming from outside sections say that many lives were lost by torrents bursting into slopes. At daylight, shivering women and children gazed over the scene of desolation and death, in Upper Congioeny Valley.

QUEBEC, July 25. As a result of a cave-in while a number of men were digging on the banks of Renogami Canal, two men were killed and five injured-two mortally. Three more are supposed to be underneath the soil which fell. A gang of one hundred men are working to recover the victims.

WINDSOR, Ont., July 25. H. G. Herbert, travelling Immigration Inspector for the Dominion Government, was shot and killed to-day by a crippled alien to whom he refused admittance to Canada. William Ferguson, a Scotchman, was the murderer.


