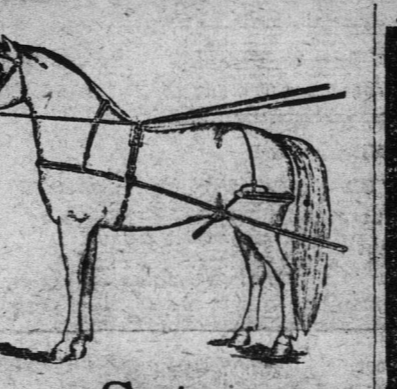

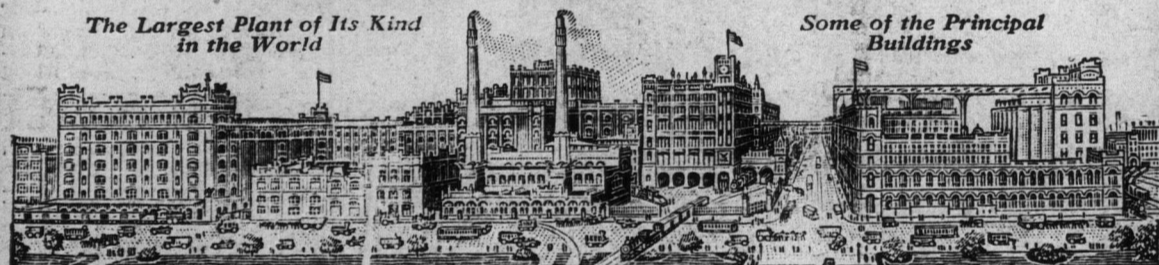

Three Lions Loose in a Hotel.

Armed Police Chase in the Streets.
Berlin, Oct. 21.—During a fog eight lions and a tiger escaped from a circus van at Leipzig about midnight last night, and for four hours the wildest excitement and terror prevailed in part of the city.

The animals, were being taken to the railway station in a van when the vehicle collided in the fog with a tramway-car. The van was broken open and one of the lions jumped. It sprang savagely at the throats of the horses that were drawing the van. The horses tried to run away. This excited the seven lions and the tiger which were still in the van, and they too broke loose with a roar.

Then followed an exciting hunt, in which eighty armed policemen took part. In all 500 shots were fired. Six of the lions and the tiger were killed. The other two lions were captured alive.

The people in the streets fled madly into houses, courtyards, cellars, restaurants and cafes. Some of the lions prowled roaring through the streets. Others invaded an hotel and a restaurant, where they frightened the guests and smashed furniture, doing damage to the amount of £1,500. Other buildings were also visited by the animals.

Scratching at the Door.
Three lions burst into the Hotel Blucher by way of the front door. A panic followed. One of the lions dashed up the stairway and scratched on the door of a guest's room. The guest, a Frenchman, opened the door and found that his midnight visitor was a lion. Then he fled. The lion sprang into the room, where it wrecked a large mirror, and then jumped through the window into the street. The two other lions which made their way into the hotel were shot.

The wife of the manager of the circus begged the police to spare her husband's "valuable animals," but her request was made in vain.

MAN HELPING DOVE SUDDENLY KILLED.
Touched Live Wire After Climbing Pole.

Augusta, Me., October 26.—While trying to release a dove from telegraph wires, George Faulkner, aged fifty-six years, met his death to-day. The dove, by a string attached to one of its legs, had become snarled and Mr. Faulkner climbed the pole in front of a restaurant to release it. At the top of the pole he came in contact with a live wire and received a shock of 105 volts. He immediately fell headlong to the sidewalk, splitting his skull. Faulkner was a mechanic employed in the wheel-works of the cotton mill. He leaves a widow, two sons and four daughters.

Lord Crew's Indian Story.

Whisky and Soda Memorial to an Englishman.

Lord Crew, Secretary of State for India, told a story of the jungle when bidding good-bye to a number of officers newly appointed to Government services in India, at an informal reception at the India Office.

"I remember hearing years ago in India a story of a young subaltern who went alone on a shooting expedition away into the wild country of the Malabar coast. The poor fellow was attacked by fever in the jungle, died, and was buried, and the people where he died felt themselves in no little difficulty as to how his spirit might be pacified and not haunt them.

"It was necessary, therefore, to place upon his grave something distinctly British, which would keep the spirit quiet. They were a hundred miles from any cantonment, but I was told that a small party of these simple folk went down to this cantonment and purchased a bottle of whisky, two bottles of soda water and a paper of cheroots, which they placed on the grave, and I was told that, in spite of difficulties, every year a party of them trotted down for the same purpose. Well, whisky and soda water are not things to be spurned at the proper time and place, still less cigars, but I should somehow wish that the concrete expression of our national genius had been in some respects different.—Daily Mail.



Clark's Park Beans

French Aerial Postal Service.

Paris, Oct. 31.—At the end of next week the second aerial postal service will be started in France. One has already begun in Paris to Panillac to catch the South American steamers once a fortnight. The new service will be more elaborate. The air men will fly from Paris to Nice taking a big mail, coming down at Naves, Lyons and Orange. At each town he will drop with a sack of letters to take aboard another for the south. From Paris to Nice, by air is 465 miles, but the doctors of the air postmen will prolong the journey to 525 miles. He leaves Paris at 8 a.m. the mails being brought to the flying ground at Les Moulinettes from the head post office by motor car.

The air man will have 8 1/2 hours before sunset in which to complete his journey. The flight will be made in a biplane of 100 h.p. and capable of seventy miles an hour.

The ministry of commerce has insisted that a biplane shall be provided with an automatic stabilizing device. When the new service is established there will be a saving of time over the railway of twenty hours.

Tiny States With Armies.

There are several small States in the world possessing armies of their own, and at the present time Germany is negotiating with Belgium with a view to settling the status of Moresnet-Neutre the small neutral State of 1,400 acres on the borders of Belgium and Germany. The inhabitants, who number about 3,000, have the right to decide whether they will accept the jurisdiction of the German or the Belgian courts, and whether they will perform military service for Germany or for Belgium.

One of the oldest and most attractive States in Europe is San Marino, which lies in Central Italy. The entire area is about thirty-three square miles, and the population numbers under nine thousands. This tiny republic, when it was founded in the fourth century by St. Marinus, had no army, but now it boasts one numbering about a thousand men, officered exclusively by generals.

This little army nearly came to blows with the Austrians when Garibaldi, the Italian patriot, sought refuge in their land.

The bride was given away by her father and was attended by Miss Edie Parsons, of St. John's, Nfld., while the groom was supported by Mr. James Congdon, of Roxbury. The bride looked charming in a dark blue travelling suit with white picture hat, and carried a bouquet of bridal roses and maiden hair fern. The bridesmaid wore an alice blue messaline silk gown and black picture hat, and carried a bouquet of carnations and asparagus fern. The groom's present to the bride was a substantial cheque, the bridesmaid gold pendant and best man gold scarf pin. Following the ceremony a reception was held, after which the bride and groom left for an extended wedding tour. On their return they will reside on Canton St., North Easton, Mass. The presents were costly and numerous, including several cheques, showing the popularity of both bride and groom.

How Ulster Was Planted.

A very interesting account of "The Ulster Plantation" is given by Mr. A. G. Bradley in Chambers' Journal.

Mr. Bradley says: "When the two great Ulster chieftains, the Earls Tyrone and Tyrconnel, who had so long defied the English Crown, were ultimately subdued and driven out, their domains, roughly corresponding to the six counties (Donegal, Derry, Armagh, Fermanagh, Cavan, and Tyrone), were ceded to the reigning king (James the First), and the opportunity was seized of settling them with an English and Scotch population.

London's Irish Estates.
"These were the years when the Elizabethan adventures had developed into the early Jacobean colonisers, and the fever was at its height. Virginia, the West Indies, New England, and Newfoundland were being seriously undertaken, and Ireland offered a handier and less rough, but perhaps more dangerous, opening of much the same kind.

"The country of Derry was bestowed on the various London trading companies to develop as it might, seem good to them, with certain restrictions. The other five counties, or, to be precise, all the good land in them, were surveyed into tracts mostly of one thousand, one thousand five hundred, and two thousand acres, virtually regardless of the native Irish occupants. The latter's business, to be sure, had been mainly that of graziers, and their buildings of slight value; but they were pushed out into the bogs, wastes, and mountains, with the exception of a few of the better sort, who, though shifted, were allotted definite tracts of smaller size upon the fringes of the colonists.

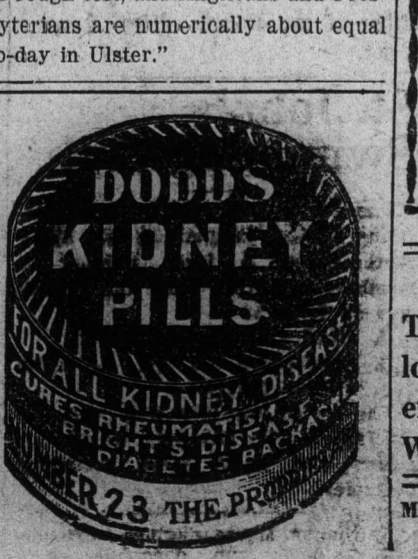
"Of the larger tracts now offered by the Crown with clear title there were something over two hundred, many of them, as it appeared from later survey, controlling and virtually attaching considerable areas of contiguous waste land. These were offered on terms of a lease for ever, at sufficiently tempting figures to counterbalance the discomforts of a semi-colonial career with rather more than its danger—to wit, about five pounds to the one thousand acres. Other tracts, again, were given to Trinity College, Dublin, and to the Anglican Church thenceforward established in Ireland, and placed in possession of the old Catholic endowments.

"The two hundred and eighteen important estates were exactly divided, and with design, between English and Scottish planters; and, furthermore, each county, except Derry (controlled by Londoners), was apportioned, though with no such precision of equality, to both nationalities in usually separate groups.

"The Scottish settlers came mainly from the south-west counties—Hamiltons, Cunninghams, Humes, and Stewarts being much in evidence. Many significant old English names catch the eye at once, such as Phelippeau, Willoughby, Sacheverell, Talbot, Romington, Ridgeway, Poyns, Roe, and so forth.

"When all was quiet through the eighteenth century, and the English and Irish Anglican Parliaments held the country in the hollow of their hands, what a madness it was, from the British point of view, that by invidious laws, both sectarian and commercial, the sturdy Presbyterians of the north were driven by thousands and thousands to North America with a bitterness in their hearts as deep as any that burned within the Celtic Catholic emigrants of a later day!

Draught of Presbyterians.
"A hundred thousand left in the first quarter of the eighteenth century, and were the best pioneers and makers of new states that America ever had. "Proceeding usually to the Western frontier of the day, these people became colonists for the second time almost within a century. Hence, and perhaps from their rather grim Calvinism, their great qualities as pioneers. One would think this continuous drain of Ulster Protestants, mainly Presbyterians, from about 1700 to 1775, would have reduced the proportion of Scottish to English blood in Ulster. But on the other hand, Scot continued to move in there for long after James the First's plantation, which was not the case with the English. Creed is a kind of rough test, and Anglicans and Presbyterians are numerically about equal to-day in Ulster."

The Outlook

Although the People's Party has had nineteen members returned to the House of Assembly, and there is a possibility of a slight increase in this number, there is no probability of the People's Party showing a majority of votes recorded in its favour. So far as the votes of the electors go, the majority is already in favour of the Opposition, and that numerical superiority in votes will in all probability be increased by the returns from the four constituencies which are yet to be heard from. Of two things we are well assured. One is that the tide of popular feeling has set in against the Government of the People's Party, and the other is that there will be an Opposition in the House of Assembly strong in number and vigorous in action.

The situation of the Government is perilous. Two departmental officers have been defeated, and this will entail two bye-elections. The Government will have to exercise considerable ingenuity in finding safe seats for the two members of the House of Assembly, who will be called upon to fill them, and in this particular they may find themselves up against serious snags. Even though they overcome them, there are ominous reports of a serious decline in the revenue, and it looks as if the Minister of Finance and Customs will find it difficult in the next House of Assembly to justify the financial arrangements he put through the House last session. Altogether, the outlook for the Government is gloomy, but the outlook for the Opposition is correspondingly bright and hopeful.

Watching Ballot Boxes.

We would like to know why candidates were not allowed to have agents to watch the ballot boxes from the time they were closed and sealed until they were opened by the Returning Officers for the count. We can see no good reason for this refusal, and it seems to us that the Election Act should be amended to give to candidates this right. The Returning Officer, under the present procedure, appoints a messenger, who is sworn in, to guard the ballot boxes and keep them intact until they are delivered to the Returning Officer at the place of counting. What objection can there be to candidates having an agent to watch, who would be sworn in as the messenger is sworn in at present. If it is a fact, that a ballot box has been removed from the booth to a private house, it is a matter which justifies searching enquiry. It calls for some provisions in the Election Act to forbid any such practice. It will be a matter for the Opposition to take up at the next session of the Legislature.

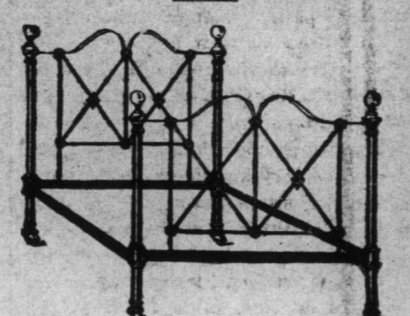

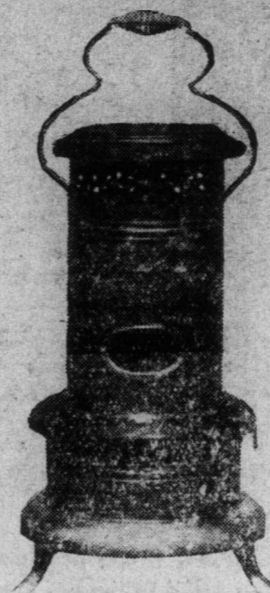

92 Years Old, 2 Meals a Day.

London, Oct. 28.—Leslie Fraser Duncan, ninety-two, four times a widower, the tallest Scotchman in London—6 feet six inches in his socks—gets up at noon every day, and his invariable diet is as follows:

1 p.m. (Breakfast)—Three boiled eggs, tea and three thin slices of bread and butter.
 2 p.m.—Glass of milk.
 4 p.m.—Glass of milk.
 5 p.m.—Tea, one boiled egg, and thin bread and butter.
 8 p.m. (Dinner)—One boiled egg and thin bread and butter.

Mr. Duncan has a flowing white beard and a face glowing with health and he expects to pass the century mark. He was born in Elgin in Scotland and when he was five years old he began to walk six miles to school and six miles back home every day. In this way he walked 440,000 miles in his schooling. He did it all on two meals a day. His breakfast at 8 a.m., was porridge or brose. In 1848 he settled in London, and all through a busy career of fifty years he worked twelve and fifteen hours a day, on 2 meals a day, with no holidays. He never smoked in his life except one year in Edinburgh.

His alcoholic indulgence consist of four glasses of champagne a year—one each on his birthday, on his mother's birthday, on Christmas and on New Year. He has never used a telephone, and he retired from business with a fortune, twenty-five years ago, before the rush of modern commercial life was fairly begun.

Mr. Duncan's fourth wife, who died a month ago, was the widow of Whyte Melville, the novelist. He went to school as a boy with Lord Strathcona, now High Commissioner of Canada, in London, who is two years older and who also lives on two meals a day.

"Cashiering" and Mars.

Recently an Army lieutenant was cashiered for "conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman," in connection with betting transactions. Cashiering, a term derived from a Dutch word meaning to make void or empty, may be described as moral bankruptcy.

In the old days a cashiered officer was paraded before his brother officers, his sword was broken in two and he was stripped of his badges and ornaments of rank. Nowadays he is usually spared this crowning humiliation. An officer can be cashiered by sentence of general court-martial only, and the sentence, as a rule, is personally confirmed by the Sovereign. On the other hand, the Sovereign has the power at any time to dismiss or remove an officer from the Army without trial.

There is a wide difference in the after-effects of cashiering and dismissal. A cashiered officer may never again serve the Crown in any public capacity; but dismissal, though a stigma, does not debar a man from rehabilitating himself and again serving his King and country. In the ranks the equivalent of cashiering is "discharge with disgrace."

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.

NEW, York, Nov. 4.

The Evening Sun concedes the election to Mitchell for Mayor, and Tammany has suffered a severe setback if not a rout. Sultzer, it is conceded, has been elected Assemblyman for the sixth district. The Mail claims the election of Mitchell by over seventy-five thousand.

BELFAST, Nov. 4.

The resolution to pay no taxes under the Irish Home Rule Parliament and make the Government under its rule impossible by unfinching and continuous obstruction of the law, was passed here to-day at a demonstration of 6,000 business men, including representatives of leading firms with an aggregate capital of upwards of sixty million dollars.

LONDON, Nov. 4.

The militant branch of the suffragette organization is raising an army in the East End of London to force the Government to yield to the demands of the women, Sylvia Pankhurst announced at a meeting at Bow Street last evening. She said the army will be under the command of Sir Francis Vane Bart, who was Captain of the 3rd Royal Lancers' regiment in the Boer war, and who will have several army officers to assist him. It is no joke, she added; we are absolutely in earnest. As soon as our army is trained we shall get the same treatment as Carson and the Orangemen, and the Government will come to us offering us the vote.

The baseball season's ended, the pennant has been won, the work of pitchers splendid, and catches, too, is done; the grandstand is deserted, the yelling crowds are fed; the umpire, sorely hurtled, has gone to boil his head. And now those sturdy fighters who played "the only game," will cut swath as writers and put a clinch on frame. The boys who stumble greatly when asked to spell their names, will write the English stately of Addison of James. The boys who don't know grammar from seven sacks of beans, will hear the public clamor, and write for magazines. The miracle stupendous, the marvel of the age, it is how they can lend us their thoughts on printed page! There's Pankhurst, the pitcher; in summer he's a gent who makes the language richer with "I have seen and went." In wintertime he grinds us a polished kind of dope, and oftentimes reminds us of Laurence Sterne of Pope. When Springtime's pinions flutter, the diamond he will seek; and we shall hear him mutter: "I think them words is Greek."

INDIANAPOLIS, To-Day.
 The refusal of thirty members of the police forces to ride with strike-breakers caused the Fourth Bay Street car strike to pass without car service here. The policemen turned in their badges, which were returned with orders to remain on patrol duty.

PARIS, To-Day.
 Marseilles and Paris express was in collision last night with another train. Seven coaches filled with passengers were practically reduced to splinters at midnight. In addition to the dead many injured have been taken from the scene of wreck. The estimate of deaths is not more than twelve.

PARIS, To-Day.
 The French Government is considering the possibility of offering at this moment of the crisis its friendly services to the States and Mexico. Nothing has been done. It is understood Bryan is making informal inquiries at Washington and Mexico City as to whether anything could be done to ease the present tension and perhaps arrive at satisfactory arrangements.

NEW YORK, To-Day.
 Fuscon carried New York City yesterday, electing John Purroy Mitchell as Mayor with approximately 95,000 plurality, and retaining control of important Board by an overwhelming majority. Tammany Hall saw its nominee for the mayoralty, Edward E. McCall, go down to defeat by one of the biggest pluralities ever given against a candidate. The organization of a big vote for Mitchell pulled through even the Fuscon candidates for President of the Board of Aldermen and Comptroller, George McAnny and William A. Prendergast, against whom the Independence League as well as Democratic organization candidates were running. Returns showed complete triumph for Democrats in Massachusetts, where Governor and State tickets were shown in four cornered fight. The selection of Democratic Governor and State ticket in Virginia without contest, showed the ascendancy of Fuscon over Tammany Hall.

Repairs to Manchester Commerce.

It has been decided that the S. S. Manchester Commerce will go into dock for permanent repairs to her bow. This afternoon the liner will berth at the Furness Withy Line pier and discharge about 1400 tons of her large cargo in order to put her on even keel and in proper condition to be docked.
 Within the past twelve months three large steamers of the Manchester Line came to St. John's disabled. First the Manchester Inventor, which struck a 'growler' in the Belle Isle straits and had several plates in her bottom stove in; next the Manchester Port, which put into this port in July last with her bunkers on fire and now the Manchester Commerce, which nearly met destruction by collision with an iceberg in the straits of Belle Isle.

S.S. Dunedin Short of Coal.

The S. S. Dunedin (Capt. H. J. Case) five days out from New York, bound to Liverpool with a general cargo arrived in port at 1.15 p.m. to-day, short of coal. The S. S. Dunedin is owned by the Dunedin S. S. Co., Messrs. Henderson and Mackintosh of Leith, England, and is 4796 tons gross, and 3055 tons net. Messrs. Bowring Bros. are the Agents, and will look after the coaling, after which she will proceed to Liverpool.

He was met by Mr. Whiteway on arrival.

Political Changes

The latest rumor in political circles to-day, is that Mr. J. S. Currie, an elected Morriste for the District of Burin, will retire from the field so as to give an opening to Mr. R. A. Squires, defeated in Trinity Bay District. Squires, it is said, is a keen aspirant for Minister of Justice honors.

Mr. Lloyd George Unfolds Sweeping Proposals.

Ministry of Land—Powers Over Wages, Rents and Sales.

"The remedies," said Mr. Lloyd George in his speech on land reform at Swindon recently, "must be thorough, searching, complete, and drastic."
 The Government proposals, as outlined by the Chancellor, are certainly drastic, and he told the meeting that he was announcing the absolute unanimous decision of the Government.

"Sensational" is the term generally applied to the speech in political circles, the feeling in which is described elsewhere.
 Lord Strachie presided over the meeting, which was held at the Bath, the audience being drawn from Somerset, Dorset, Wiltshire and Gloucestershire. About 2,000 people were crowded in the hall, and outside great crowds congregated to witness the arrival of the Chancellor.

Mr. Lloyd George, addressing another meeting in the evening, said they were preparing a great scheme of colonizing Britain.
POINTS FROM THE SPEECH.
 The Government's scheme proposed to assume complete control of land. The privileges, prerogatives, pleasures, amenities, and the power of the few will be regarded as the dust in the balance when we come to consider the propriety, the efficiency, the security, the happiness of the nation as a whole.

The first essential was security for the tiller of the soil that he should have full legal assurance that he would reap the harvest which he had sown.

Tenants must be compensated for improvements and for disturbance. Ministry for Land to be set up, to which would be transferred all existing functions of the Board of Agriculture, and added functions of registration of title and land transfer.

They were going to take land out of Chancery. When an owner was hampered by some silly settlement from improving the estate, he would be empowered by the new Ministry to raise money for the purpose.

The present land valuation machinery would be handed over to the new Ministry.

Great powers of control over land generally would be vested in the new Ministry, which would be exercised through Commissioners.

The Commissioners would investigate complaints of turning out tenants, and if eviction was capricious it would be voided or compensation given.

Small farmers could appeal for rent reductions, and the large farmer against rent increases, or if through State action the wages of laborers in his district were put up.

In times of great agricultural depression there could be appeal to the Commissioners for temporary lessening of rent.

There were some things connected with game and the game laws, which must be reversed. If a man wanted sport it ought to be at his own expense, and not at the expense of the farmer.
 Barren land which could not be cultivated must be used for afforestation. All light soil (often found near the seaboard), to be cultivated, and Min-

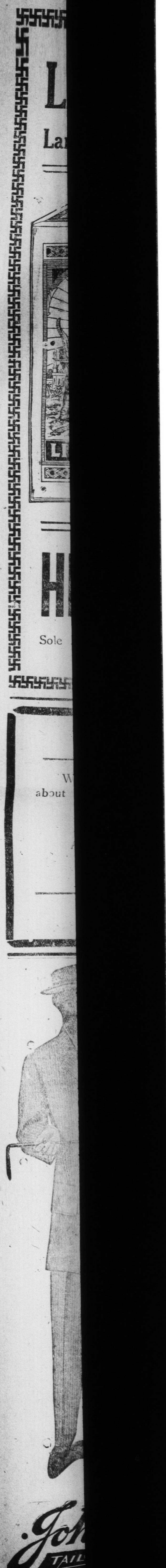

The Realness of Books.

Did you ever realize what a wonderful thing the realness of books is? Of course we all know that books are just books, and yet most of us subconsciously forget that the people between the covers of books have never been really alive.

To illustrate, I have been reading a book lately in which the chief character is an ideal man,—that is, ideal from a woman's standpoint. He is gentle, he is tender, he is strong. He anticipates her slightest wish before she has a chance to express it. He remembers all the little things that women so love to have remembered. He nurses her in a long tedious illness, with all the tenderness of a woman and all the strength of a man. And most wonderful of all, he is as clean and pure as a man expects his bride to be.

As I read the book I thought of the men I know, most of whom fall far below that standard, and I thought to myself, "It is a pleasure to hear about such a man. Now if one man can be like that, why can't others?"

And then I came to myself with a start and remembered that one man wasn't like that; that he was only a

book man and I couldn't judge other men by him.

Did you ever suddenly remember like that that a book was only a book? If you have, you will understand, and the other folks will have ceased reading the article before now, so it is quite safe for me to write this way.

Some of the people I have read about in books—especially the old-fashioned novels, that one lives with for weeks, before one finishes them—have become so tangled up in my mind with my live friends, that I never quite separated them. For instance, I can scarcely believe that I haven't known Col. Newcomb. Nothing in real life ever caused me more poignant indignation than the way that dearest of men was treated by his daughter-in-law after he had lost his memory. I fairly ached to get inside that book and do something about it.

And when he died,—well I was in a trolley car at the time but I could not any more help crying than the tide could help rising. I pulled down my veil and big tears actually rolled down my cheeks. Everyone thought that I had had bad news or something of the sort, and one woman even pressed my hand sympathetically and murmured,

"Don't cry, dearie, everybody have to have some trouble in their lives." I couldn't tell her it was only a book because she would surely have thought I was insane. I wonder if you are thinking the same, Reader Friend?

To Build Its Own Navy.

New Zealand Adopts Policy Somewhat Similar to Canadian Liberals—Latter, However, would Also Have Ships Built in this Country.

Wellington, N.Z., Oct. 28.—The government of the Dominion of New Zealand decided to-day to adopt the policy of building a navy of its own on the same lines as that of the Commonwealth of Australia, and to discontinue its subsidy to the Imperial British Navy. Premier William Ferguson Massey in announcing the reversal of the present system, explained that the decision of the government to assume the greater responsibility was due to the inability of the British Admiralty to carry out its agreement of 1909, and station two cruisers of the Bristol type of 4,800 tons displacement in New Zealand waters, the Dominion bearing the cost of their upkeep. The British Admiralty had substituted for these two cruisers the Psyche and the Pyramus, of 2,133 tons displacement, which were unsatisfactory to the Dominion, and the Premier proposed to recommend to the New Zealand Parliament an order for the construction in England in 1914, of a cruiser of the Bristol type at a cost of \$2,000,000. This and other war vessels acquired by New Zealand, the Premier said, would be under the administration of the Dominion in peace time, but would pass automatically during war time, or when they were urgently needed.

132 Auto Deaths

In New York in Nine Months.

New York, Oct. 24.—Figures given out yesterday by George Le Brun, clerk of the coroner's court, show a great increase in 1913 in the number of deaths in Manhattan due to automobiles over any previous year. In the nine months ended Sept. 30, there were 132 deaths in Manhattan. At the same ratio the number for the entire year will be 176. Six were caused by mail wagons, sixteen by other automobile trucks, seven by taxicabs, three by fire trucks, and the rest by private cars. Fifty-eight of the victims were children under 12. The number of deaths in the borough of Manhattan caused by automobiles in three previous years were: 1910, 62; 1911, 90; 1912, 146.

Football's Childhood.

Football a modern game? Anything but—in fact, it is said to have originated with the ancient Britons. Be this as it may, the game certainly was very popular in the Middle Ages.

Why, in 1314 we find Edward II, warmly censuring the excessive enthusiasm of football players; and Edward III, in 1349, following his example. Henry VIII, and Good Queen Bess attempted to suppress the game, but, despite their efforts, it continued to be played until about 1850.

Then, apparently, it went into a decline, but was revived during the last century, first by the public schools, then by certain clubs, notably Sheffield and Hallam, established in 1857, and Blackheath and Richmond, established in 1858.

The formation of the Football Association in 1863, and of the Rugby Football Union in 1871 ensured the future of the game.

Rio Janeiro.

Rio Janeiro is one of the world's greatest surprises to those who believe that America ends at Key West, and that south of that point the Indians are still fighting off the descendants of Pizarro and other eminent hold-up men.

Rio Janeiro is the capital of Brazil. Those who have not consulted an Atlas since 1867 and who have known Brazil merely from its coffee are inclined to wonder what need the country has for a capital. The same kind of a human scallap who wonders whether the inhabitants of Kansas dress in skins or calico, and who declines to explore his country west of Canada's Corners, Connecticut, is likely to believe that Rio Janeiro is composed of grass tufts festooned with 25-foot anacondas, and that the well-known moistness of the unhealthy in the rain season.

These beliefs would create a good deal of amusement in Rio Janeiro, which is a city of about a million up-to-date people situated just below the thorax of Brazil on the Atlantic ocean, and so far from the Amazon river that many of its inhabitants have never heard of it. Rio Janeiro has the finest harbor south of New York, and all steamers of any social standing whatever call there while passing. This harbor is profusely decorated with mountains on three sides, and the famous Sugar Loaf peak, which is a natural decoration placed there in mired by all travelers.

Rio Janeiro's real name is "San Sebastião do Rio de Janeiro," but the full name is only used by the leisure class. The city was founded in 1567 while North America was still a howling and shaggy wilderness, and has been a South American capital since 1680. The age of the side streets in the older portions can be accurately calculated by the amount of dirt on them, but the main streets are broad and handsome, and Rio Janeiro has made all North American seaports look cheap by surrounding its harbor with a broad boulevard garnished with trees. When Rio Janeiro needs a new business street it bores one through the middle of the town in a manner which would fill a North American city with awe, and it spends as much money improving its looks as New York does improving the bank deposits of its millionaires.

Rio Janeiro is a two-story town. The masses live in the lower story two or three feet above the ocean level and die of malaria, with great fluency and ease, while the classes live in beautiful suburbs back in the hills reached by streets cars which climb like Thomas cats.

What a Traveller Saw in Europe.

"During the last thirty-six years I have visited Great Britain and the Continent of Europe thirteen times. This year in England, France, Switzerland, Austria, Germany and Holland I was able to make some comparisons between the present and the recent past that are informing and suggestive," writes Dr. A. E. Dunlap, in the Boston Congregationalist.

A Broadening Interest in Other Peoples.
"One of the evidences of change most patent to the traveller is the growing popular consciousness of the regions beyond. In former times the average man knew little and cared little what was going on outside of his range of work and acquaintance, at any rate outside of his own country. Now he has begun to feel in touch with the world. This is evident in common conversation, in growing uniformity of dress and customs, and notably in newspapers.

America Influences Europe.
"In shops, hotels, and many other places the traveller speaking only English meets those who understand him, where thirty years ago he could rarely make his wants known. He finds that the porter, waiter, shopkeeper, barber, and clerk have been one or more years pursuing their callings in America, and have returned with such advantages in getting employment that many of their neighbors are stimulated to follow their example. During the last four years, for example, 900,000 Italians arrived in the United States, while 500,000 returned to their native country. Poles returning to Poland within the last two years were more than one-half as many as arrived in American ports. We hear a good deal about European nations leaving America through immigration, but probably America is to a greater extent leaving Europe with its ideas and ideals.

Business Expansion Everywhere.
"The expansion of business is everywhere marked. Europe has entered on a new era. No one topic seems to be of greater interest in business circles than the new American tariff and its effects abroad. I spent a few days in Bradford, England, among manufacturers of woolen goods. They were planning for enlargement, eagerly awaiting the action of our Congress. They said their mills would hum as soon as the removal or reduction of duties should give them a change in our markets.

The average wages in those mills is about forty per cent. of those in New England, and other differences, as in hours and quality of work and character of employees, will make the new adjustments in trade of much interest.

On the Continent, especially in Germany, the expansion of business is wonderful. Such cities as Munich, Mayence, Cologne, Dusseldorf and Amsterdam have extended their borders far and wide in the last decade. Munich has become one of the most beautiful cities in Europe. I have seen no more desirable place of residence on the Continent. Many of the smaller towns have grown into cities. All along the Rhine the old castles and fortresses which used to monopolize the attention of travellers now divide it with smoking factory chimneys. Rushing railway trains and whirling automobiles along both sides of the river are obliterating the atmosphere of romance which used to brood over quiet shores and vine-clad hills. The Alps are not losing their grandeur, though the hurried tourist may partly avoid it by rushing through the tunnels bored under them during the last quarter of a century. The Dolomites keep their glory of form and color.

Europe's Abiding Charm.
"But even if one's journey is limited to the beaten paths, any traveller with lively imagination and some historic knowledge can find in Europe what nothing in America can yield to him. None of our cities can offer a view like that from the Maximilian in Munich toward sunset; while the architectural beauty of the London Strand, going toward Temple Bar, not to mention the picturesque-ness of the moving throng, far outdoes the glory of Broadway in New York.

Though Europe is changing and progressing rapidly, its abiding charms of history and art and architecture and customs that cannot change remain unaltered.

"Quo Vadis."

No amusement spectacle that has yet been devised for the pleasure of the people of this day and age can approach in massive grandeur, dramatic intensity and impressive beauty George Klehe's remarkable photo-drama "Quo Vadis" which has created such a sensation at the Astor Theatre in New York City, in Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston and a dozen other important amusement centers and is announced for a week's engagement in this city commencing Monday night at the Casino Theatre with matinee Saturday.

The crowd in front of the palace as Rome burns; the Emperor hearing with astonishment their impressions; and the sight of Petronius turning their attentions once more to Caesar, these episodes were accomplished with a vivid flash of reality impossible to the dramatic stage.

"It was, of course, the burning of Rome which most fully revealed the capacity of the pictures to indicate spectacles. Through streets swept by smoke and flames rushed pink-stricken people. Houses tottered and crumbled about them as the flames advanced relentlessly.

With striking reality is the burning of the city represented, and the later views of charred and ruined buildings

added their effectiveness to the scenes.

"It was perhaps the most striking novelty of these pictures that the backgrounds never seemed to have been created for the special purposes of these various views. The action seemed on the other hand to be taking place in just the spots it would naturally have happened.

This sense of reality was, of course, secured by the trouble exercised in imparting a look of solidity to the scenes. Some of the out of door pictures, especially those showing the Christians at their devotions, sometimes in moonlight and at others bathed in the morning sunlight, were uncommon in their photographic quality.

The Scots Greys march to the strains of "The Garb of Old Gaul," the Scots Guards and many other killed regiments to "Highland Laddie," the Royal Scots to the famous "Dumbarton's Drums," the Scottish Border Regiment to "Blue Bonnets Over the Border," and the Scottish Rifles to the well-known life of "Within a Mile of Edinboro' Toun." The "regimental march" of the King's Royal Rifles is "The Huntsman's Chorus," and of the East Surreys "A Southerly Wind and Cloudy Sky."

The Welsh Fusiliers and the South Wales Borderers use the spirited "Men of Harlech" as their "regimental march."

Many of the famous Irish national airs have been taken by the Irish regiments. The Connaught Rangers appropriate the music of "St. Patrick's Day," while the Royal Irish Regiment uses "Garry Owen."

"God Bless the Prince of Wales" belongs to several regiments, including the 3rd Dragoon Guards and 12th Lancers.

The Suffolk march to the music of "Speed the Plough," and the Derbyshire Regiment to the "young May Moon."

To give potatoes a flavor, add half a teaspoonful of sugar, as well as salt, when boiling.

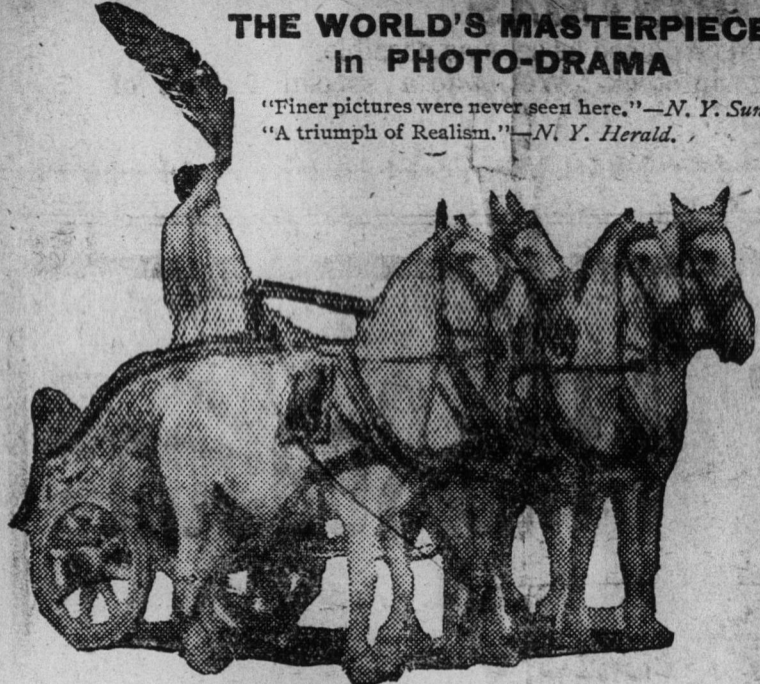
