





### **Five Thousand Germans in New** York City

Will be Arrested Immediately After War is Declared Between the United States and Germany-The Intern ment Camps Have Already Been Decided on.

New York, Feb. 5.-A conservative estimate by a high Government official places the number of Germans and German-Americans at 5,000 would be immediately arrested in New York City the moment war started between this country and Germany. Sites for detention camps for those who would be arrested here have already been decided on, according to the official.

"Ellis Island could be turned into a concentration camp at a moment's notice," said this official to-night. on Staten Island as excellent places o intern these suspects.

"Unknown to the public three agenies have been at work preparing lists of men, and women, too, who would undoubtedly be a menace to this country if at large in the event of a war with Germany. These agencies are the New York Police Department under Commissioner Woods, the United States Secret Service under Chief Flynn, and the Department of Justice under Superintendent Offley.

"Many men whose names are well known to newspaper readers would help swell the numbers in these detention camps. Prominent bankers, editors and newspaper publishers known to thousands outside of this city, and doctors, lawyers, professors, and we must not forget to mention politicians, would have difficulty in proving in the event of a war with Germany that their sympathies w not be with the Fatherland.

"These suspects have been shadow ed-that is, a goodly number of them -for the last three days, and the duration of their freedom could be measured by minutes following an actual state of war."







### Your Boys and Girls.

Children should be taught to use individual judgment from early infancy when he should be taught to choose certain paths of action for himself. If he is continually and absolutely forbidden to do this and that he is sometimes seriously handicapped later, because he does not know how to use his own reasoning faculties in making these choices.

On the other hand obedience is one of the most necessary lessons for children to learn. For the most part the mother can exert her control otherwise than by commands, and if she does so her authority when exermised will have greater force and instant obedience will be more readily

Most of the nautiness of infancy can be traced to physical causes. Babies who are fussy and restless are usually either uncomfortable in some way because they have not been properly fed and taken care of, are sick, or have been indulged too much.

SUBMARINE SINKING.

NEW YORK Feb 9 Although the figures to show the number of submarines destroyed by less it is without warning, as in the the Entente Allies and the means usable, owing to rigid censorship on have made them chary about showwar activities, it was learned here tonight from an authoritative source that direct gunfire from the decks of warships and auxiliary vessels has been the most effective method employed thus far to combat the submarine menace. Britain and her Allies adopted various plans to catch the U-boats. Although some of them have been abandoned as ineffective a marine authority of unquestioned standing, who is in close touch with British shipping interests, said today when asked as to the effectiveness of arming ships, we have found that light guns discharging projectiles of from four to six pounds in the hands of trained gunners have been by far the most effective weapon. I know personally as many as two or three submarines have been bagged in one day in this way. A submarine commander looking thro a periscope has a range of vision of about three miles, but he must get his target broadside on to have a reason able chance of making a torpedo hit what it is aimed for, and as torpedoes are very expensive missiles he cannot afford to take many chances on a miss. A periscope above the water at a distance of two hundred or three hundred yards makes a fair mark for a gunner working from the deck of a ship thirty or forty feet above the surface of the sea. One shot hitting the mark is all that is needed as submarines are of light construction, and easily penetrated. A hole anywhere in their shell spells their doom. Seldom are torpedoes fired where the threatened ship can so manoeuvre as to show only her stern for a mark. In most cases of this nature so far reported, the submarines have come to

The Spanish mercantile marine which in July, 1914, consisted of 640 vessels with an aggregate tonnage of 846,491, up to January 31st sustained losses in ships to the value of 7,000, 000,000 pesetas by reason of the war. Seven steamers, aggregating 18,000 tons, and 22 sailing ships were sunk by mines or submarines. The losses represent about 12 per cent. of the nerchant marine.

All the officers and crew, except five, were lost. She was of the oldest type of destroyer in the British Navy, and known as the class built between 1894 and 1895. There are twelve vessels of this type, with an average displacement of 310 tons, 200 feet in length, beam 19 feet. Two vessels have a complement of 45 men each, while the other ten carry 50





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
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
