



The well known racer Bluenose was one of the first to sail. To the spring fishing Lunenburg, which for some years past has had numbers of grand bankers lying idle, will send out practically every vessel of its big fleet, which is not away on a trading voyage. And whether or not the spring trip is a success, the indications are that every vessel suitable for the fishing will be pressed into service for the sumer trip to the Grand Banks. Much ice has been reported on some of the fishing banks this spring, but in spite of that the fishing skippers have been eager to make an early start.

FISH PRICES INCREASING According to prominent fish merchants here the fish markets are in a position to absorb a big catch this year. Very few dealers have stocks of any importance on their hands, and for the past few months prices have been increasing, though usually at this season of the year the tendency of prices is to decline. There does not appear to be any noticable increase in the consumption of fish, as might be expected during the period of general business depression, though fish, was the first food stuff to drop to the low price level. The present favorable market conditions are attributed to the fact that last year the production was comparatively small, an available stocks are now smaller than at any time for years. A big catch this year will be necessary to meet the current market demands and provide he normal carry over the stocks. With the revival of the fish industry, the shipyards where wooden vessels are constructed are also showing signs

## The Printer's Own Imp.

Aldus, Manutius, the celebrated Venetian printer, who lived during the latter part of the fifteenth and the early part of the sixteenth century, had a small black slave whom the superstitious believed to be an evil genius. To stop the rumor and satisfy the curious, the printer publicly announced in church: "I, Aldus Manutius, Printer of the Holy Church, have this day made public exposure of the printer's devil. All who think he is not flesh and blood are invited to step up and pinch him."

The term "printer's devil" caught the popular fancy of the Venetians. and from Venice spread over a great part of the world.

## Two Memorable Battles.

April 12th is a day doubly memorable in our Naval Annals, as being the, anniversary of two battles that were fought in 1871, one in the East and one in the West Indies. As Captain Mahan, the famous American historian puts it :"The sun had not quite set upon the exhausted squadrons of Appen and Hughes anchoring after their fierce battles of Ceylon, when his carltest rays shone upon the opening strife between Rodney and De Grasse. The two battles are, of course, notable in 'themselves, the action of Trimcumalee being one of the most stubborn fights that we ever had with the French, It began at meon, and had become gener al in both fleets by 3 o'clock; on both sides masts and yards came crashing down, but more especially on board the "Monmouth" 64, which was so badly mauled, that she was towed a mere log out of the line. The battle lasted till darkness fell, both fleets suffering severly, and neither could claim a victory. The other battle was the ever memorable occasion when Rodney in-

itiated the manoeuvre of breaking the line, and crowned his most famous victory, by taking prisoner the Comte de Grasse in his flagship the "Ville de Paris," the finest man-of-war at that time afloat-after she had fought magnificently for hours, and until she had lost half her men, exhausted all her ammunition, and had but three unwounded men on her upper deck, one of whom was de Grasse himself. He, with his own hand, hauled down the fleur de lys and surrendered to Hood in the "Barfleur." De Grasse was the first commander-in-chief of the French by land or sea, who had been taken prisoner since Marshal Tallard gave up his sword to Marlborough at Blenhein in 1704.


