



List Causes of Accident

A dozen causes of highway accidefits have been listed by engineers of the U.S. Bureau of Public Reads, as

Blind curves, blind road intersec tions, sharp curves on embankments, unprotected embankments, narrow oridges, sharp convex vertical curves slippery road surfaces, steep grades, narrow road crowns, sharp curves at bridge approaches, grade cossings, and inbanked curves.

The attention of the Public is especially drawn to the following Regulations, viz:

the day preceding pay day. (2) All cheques, drafts and other documents, representing money, in payment of Fees or Dues of any kind whatsoever to any Government Department must be made out in the name of the Department and not in that of any individual official thereo

The several Public Departments and their subsl. dary offices in the Outports have been directed to refuse to accept, in payment of amounts due the Government, any cheques which are not proper endorsed and stamped and which have not bee certified by the Bank on which they are drawn or the paying Bank in the case of cheques draw outside of Newfoundland.

In view of the lack of general compliance with the law in respect of stamping receipts as provid for by the Stamp Act (Consolidated Statutes 3m Series Cap. 28), the attention of the Public in drawn to the following provisions thereof, viz:





WHEREAS under and by virtue of Section 155 of the St. John's Municipal Act 1921 power was given to the St. John's Municipal Council to make Rules, Regulations and Byelaws amongst other things in relation to Motor Cars used for hire in the City, the following Rules and Regulations were adopted at a Regular Meeting of the St. John's Municipal Council held the 16th day of October,

A.D., 1924: (1) A distinguishing badge provided by the Council at the cost of the owner indicating that the car is licensed for hire shall be fixed on all motor cars used for hire in the City.

Any motor car driver whose car has not been registered as bona fide for hire soliciting or accepting fares for driving shall be guilty of an offence under these regulations and shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding Twenty-five Dollars or in default thereof to imprisonment not exceeding thirty
