The present bill before the Ontario Legislature to amend the Public and High School Laws is composed of no less than seventy-five sections. It provides that the present Council of Public Instruction shall be augmented by the addition of three members, to be elected, one each by the Inspector of Public Schools, by the legally qualified masters and teachers of High Schools and Collegiate Institutes, and by the qualified teachers of Public and Separate Schools. These members are to be elected in August of the present year. The members elected by the Public School Inspectors and by the masters and teachers of the High Schools and collegiate institutes are to continue in office for one year, and the representative of the Public and Separate Schools for two years, to be reckoned from the time of their election. Provision is also made for the filling of yacancies.
