Illness of the Premier.

Our readers, we are sure, will heartily agree with the following, which we copy from the *Hamilton Times*—The news that the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie is ill from over work will be received with general regret, mixed with partial concern. It has been known ever since he entered on office, that Mr. Mackenzie has been over-working himself continuously and severely, and the result that has ensued has been anticipated. We do not think that any excuse is needed for our saying that, in so doing, Mr. Mackenzie is not doing justice either to himself or the country. He is not doing justice to himself, for no overworked man can keep up to his best, or show himself at his real worth, while suffering from the strain of exceeding his strength. He is not doing justice to the country, for it needs his clear head and sound judgment in more important matters than the details of departmental work—important though they must be—admitted to be. We speak, the mind of Mr. Mackenzie's best friends when we say that it is his duty to give more of the work of detail to his colleagues and subordinates, and reserve himself for the higher duties of the Premiership, unless by persistently endeavoring to do six men's work he is willing to peril his whole future by a complete breakdown in health.

The London Election Case.

Judgment was given on Thursday by Chief Justice Hagarty in the Walker Election case. The decision, which was given in writing, was very lengthy, being a full synopsis of the evidence adduced. His Lordship dwelt very severely on the gross acts of bribery and corruption, which several of the witnesses in their sworn testimony acknowledged having committed, and intimated that he would report to the House of Commons the names of persons who had been guilty of corrupt acts. His Lordship's decision was that Major Walker is unseated, with full costs to be paid by respondent, for corrupt acts by his agents. He, however, is not disqualified for re-election.

It is understood in Ottawa that the Ontario elections will take place after New Year. Writs will be issued immediately after dissolution.

The Renfrew election trial has resulted in the unseating of Mr. Lorn McDougall on the ground of bribery by agents.

Mr. A. F. Macdonald, who was the other day unseated at Cornwall, will again stand for that constituency, and is already in the field. Dr. Bergin will again contest the Riding with him.

The Ontario Council of Public Instruction offer one gold, two silver, and two bronze medals for competition, to be awarded to the teachers who passed the best examinations in 1874.

Sandford Fleming, who is at Metapedia, N.B., has been telegraphed to return immediately, in order to approximately locate the Pacific Telegraph Line, in order that the successful tenderers now in Ottawa may close their contracts with the Public Works Department, and proceed with the construction of the line as soon as possible.

CONSERVATIVE GATHERING.—We see by the *Mail* that a meeting of delegates representing the Ontario Opposition, from the several electoral districts of the Province, is to be held in Toronto on the 23rd of this month. The object of the meeting is to consult with reference to the approaching Provincial elections. Reformers should take a hint from this, and not be behindhand in organizing and making due preparation for the approaching elections. Our opponents are already hard at work, and Reformers should not let them get ahead in any way in the necessary work which requires to be done in most of the constituencies.

AFTER a lengthy trial, the Hamilton and Minden Road Company have been forced to fully meet the claim of one Gray, who brought an action for injuries sustained by the falling of the iron bridge over the Desjardins Canal on the 16th March last.

SUDDEN DEATH.—On Wednesday evening, about 5 o'clock, Thomas Cooley, late agent of the Toronto *Mail*, died suddenly in a cab while being conveyed to the city hospital in Hamilton. Deceased was 31 years old, and had been a respected resident of Hamilton for the past six or seven years.

ACCIDENT IN THE TOWNSHIP OF BEVERLY.—As Mr. Wm. Wilson, of Westover's Corners, one day recently, was driving a span of horses in a buggy, on the 6th Concession of that Township, about two miles west of his own place, the pole of the buggy dropped down and the horses ran away. Wilson jumped out, breaking both arms in the fall. Dr. Lundy set the broken limbs, and the injured man is doing as well as could be expected.

TORONTO, GREY AND BRUCE RAILWAY.—The annual meeting of the shareholders of this Company was held at Toronto on Wednesday. The report of the Directors was read and showed a very satisfactory return for the past year. The financial operations were reviewed and approved of, and the meeting closed by the appointment of the following Directors for the ensuing year:—John Gordon, William Ramsay, John Morison, B. H. Dixon, Wm. B. Hamilton, John Baxter, W. M. Clarke, Capt. Thomas Dick, and Thomas H. Lee. At a subsequent meeting of the Board, Mr. John Gordon was re-elected President, and Mr. W. Ramsay, Vice-President.

A new Roman Catholic Chapel was opened in Winnipeg on the 30th ult., and on the 31st ground was broken for the new Merchants' Bank building.

The Canada Thistle in Missouri.

The foothold which this most formidable of all weeds to farmers is getting in Missouri ought to attract attention. In England the thistle is held to be so noxious as to be a common enemy to the whole population. No farmer, landowner or gentleman will pass one growing on the roadside without stopping to cut it down, while his pocket is full of salt with which to salt the fresh stump, as an additional security against its sprouting up again. Even cutting and salting, however, does not always destroy the life of the stubborn plant; and the only sure method of extermination is to dig up each plant, dry it in the sun and burn it. Ploughing under scarcely makes an impression on it. It is generally said amongst farmers that a lodgment of the Canada thistle on a farm impairs its value to the extent of five dollars per acre. Five years ago it was comparatively unknown in Missouri, but now its purple heads and thorny leaves can be frequently seen along the railroads, whence it is generally creeping into the adjacent fields. When the seeds are ripe in the fall they are borne abroad on the down that supports them, and scattered far and wide. If the plant is to be kept down—it is too late, now, to keep it out—relentless war will have to be waged against it, not only by landowners, but by county courts, and even by the state. The legislature ought to enact a law requiring railroad companies to keep the margin of their roads clear of it; county courts ought to pass orders instructing road overseers to cut down or dig up all the plants along the public highway once a year; and farmers and landowners ought to carry the same process into their fields. Nothing short of this general crusade will prove effective against this insidious enemy.—*St. Louis Republican*.

Mr. Philip Smuck, late of Glenmorris, has purchased the Ayr brewery. Mr. Hespeler's new brick building is being roofed, and will be one of the finest structures in the city when finished. A few more such men as Mr. Hespeler is what we want in Winnipeg.—*Nor' Wester*.

ACCIDENT.—As Mr. James McDonald, of the Township of Morris, was returning from the harvest field with his cow a few days since, he had occasion to climb a fence. After jumping over the fence, he tripped against a stump and fell upon the scythe blade of the cradle, thereby inflicting a frightful gash ten inches in length on the hind portion of his thigh, which required a like number of stitches to sew it up.

Locations at the Dominion Land Office, Winnipeg, during the month of August, amounted to 47,200 acres, besides purchases by cash and warrants, 5,246 acres.

PROGRESS.—In the course of some remarks on the forthcoming Provincial Exhibition in Toronto, the *Globe* points out that twenty-eight years have elapsed since the first Provincial Exhibition was held in Upper Canada, at Toronto. All the prizes that could be mustered did not exceed \$1,000, and the total amount actually awarded at the close of the contest was little over \$1,000, while the number of entries in all the different departments amounted to only 1,150. These statistics are interesting at the present time, and show the wonderful progress that has been made in agriculture and manufactures in the Province since that time.

A match game of base ball was played yesterday, between the Eckfords of London, and the Young Canadians, of Dundas, resulting in a victory for the latter by 16 runs. The Young Canadians now aspire to the Junior Championship. Well, let 'em have it.
