

Sad Signs in Fernie town

Colonist Special Correspondent Gives Fuller Particulars of the Disaster.

Still Taking Dead From the Mine—More Names of Victims.

From Our Own Correspondent.

Fernie, B. C., May 24.—This was a day of funerals in Fernie, and one which will long be remembered. The arrangements were all systematized, and as each shift of the rescuers were relieved the bodies were loaded on the train and brought into Fernie. At the depot in many instances the bereaved were waiting to claim their dead, and in such instances the bodies were taken to the homes. But in the majority of cases, the relatives had not yet been notified.

Seven Years for Mislacing Railway Switch. Winnipeg, May 24.—(Special)—William J. Honjes was charged at Calgary today with misplacing a railway switch at Namaka siding. He pleaded guilty and was sentenced to seven years in the Penitentiary. The residence of Peter McLaughlin, at Rathwell, was completely destroyed by fire yesterday.

DESERVED SENTENCE.

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Victoria Day was joyfully observed in Winnipeg, all stores being closed and the business suspended.

PORTO RICO PEOPLE Think End of the World Is Nigh.

San Juan de Porto Rico, May 24.—The most brilliant sunset ever seen here was witnessed last evening. It was caused by the eruption of the volcano, which threw up a considerable height of red ash and cinders.

THE MEN IN THE MINE were evidently killed by the concussion from the explosion. The bodies so far as can be seen do not appear to have been injured.

OPINIONS AS TO THE CAUSE OF THE explosion differ widely. Some believe it was caused by the drilling of a hole close to the mine.

WHERE BRADLEY'S BODY WAS FOUND there were some 16 others. They were all ascertained to have been killed.

HEARTRENDING SCENES. The scenes which presented themselves in front of the offices of the mine company were heartrending in the extreme.

THE MACKENZIE AND MAN YUKON railway claim has had quite a stirring effect on the Canadian press.

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

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Provincial Legislature

(Continued From Page Seven.) Mr. McBride was speaking at 12:30, when attention was called to the fact that there was no quorum, and Mr. McPhillips moved the adjournment of the House under the provisional rules.

Mr. Speaker held that a quorum was present, and therefore Mr. McPhillips' motion was out of order. Mr. McBride resumed his remarks at 12:40, and continued, with occasional interruptions, until 1:15, when he was called to the chair by Mr. Speaker.

Before adjournment, Hon. Mr. Dunsinuir said he desired to express his regret for the language he had used towards Mr. Tait, but he could not acknowledge that his words were unjust considering the provocation. The House adjourned at 2:10 a.m. Legislative Chamber, May 28, 1922.

Mr. Speaker took the chair at 2:40 p.m. Mr. McBride rose to a question of privilege. He presented certain passages in a Colonialist editorial, from which he was proceeding to read when called to order by Mr. Speaker.

The article complained of was as follows: CURTIS AGAIN. We are always glad to have some of the actual words of Smith Curtis, M.P., to publish. He speaks so much that he could not himself expect that everything he says would contain pearls of wisdom. But occasionally, under the influence of strong feeling, a perfect gem of eloquence drops from his lips. One of these he uttered yesterday, when he spoke the words, "Are we to submit to this, that our majority will be shut out quite as much as the minority?"

Mr. Speaker said the proper time to make such a statement was when it came up in regular course. Mr. McBride made the same objection to the following motion, and by the Hon. Mr. Eberts:

Mr. McBride rose to protest and was called to order and told to sit down. Mr. Gairden asked the Hon. the Minister of Finance the following question: How much money has been paid out of the province's treasury to the aid of the unfortunate families of the victims of the various coal mining disasters in the province during the past few years?

Mr. McBride again rose to make an obstructive speech, declaring the report of Mr. Curtis' bill respecting deception in the employment of workmen was taken up. Mr. Hunter moved the following amendment:

That any employer or workman of this province who has sustained any damages, by reason of any deceptive representations, false advertising or false pretences, used to induce such workman not to change or to change his place of employment, against any person, society, association, organization, directly or indirectly causing such deception, shall be liable to a fine of not more than \$100, or to imprisonment for not more than three months, or to both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

Mr. Curtis suggested that Mr. Hunter should bring in his amendments to the form of a separate bill. Mr. Hunter asked if Mr. Curtis would promise to support such a bill if he brought it down?

Mr. Curtis said he would support such a bill if it was proved to him that employers were subject to the same grievances as the workmen. Mr. Hunter said it was a poor rule which did not work both ways. He would suggest that the matter be laid over until members should have an opportunity to fully consider the effect of the proposed amendments.

Mr. Curtis insisted that the amendments should be brought in as a separate bill. The House adjourned at 6 o'clock until 8:30 p.m. Mr. Speaker took the chair at 8:45 p.m.

Mr. McBride rose to a question of privilege. He said if the government would consent to a dissolution (crisis of confidence), he would support the motion. Mr. Speaker called attention to the following resolution:

That the Hon. Mr. Eberts to move the following resolution: "To amend the rules and orders of the House in the following manner: 'Strike out Rule 37 and substitute the following in lieu thereof: 'That after a question has been proposed, a member sitting in his place may claim to move that the question be not put, and unless he shall appear to the chair that such motion is an abuse of the rules of the House, or an infringement of the rights of the minority, the question that the question be now put shall be put forthwith, and decided without debate, and the motion shall apply to all motions and questions and amendments presented in the House and in committee of the whole.'"

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Supreme Court. Mr. McPhillips' bill to amend the Supreme Court Act was read a third time and passed.


