

The government had to refuse to pay the expense bills that he put in: they bristled with items for cabs and telegraphy. His family seemed to know that something was wrong with him, but as he was of a violent temperament when interfered with they thought it better to leave him alone. On Oct. 13 there appeared in the Mail the following verses by Mr. Ridout, almost a week after his disappearance, and they show how his mind was running. The Exchange Bank. e time ago we presented this view banking losses, that it was important t determine who had got the money that had been lost. The London Advertiser thought this suggestion not of much account, except as material for a joke. Perhaps our contemporary will admit now that this very restion is one of prime importance in the matter of the Exchange bank.

The money of the bank disappeared, went out of sight, but it did not perish. Somebody got it, and who? Much of it was lent on notes discounted for parties who did not pay, but this was not all. The latest accounts indicate that no small amount was lost by the manager in buying up the bank's stock against a falling market. With the knowledge of the bank's affairs which he must have possessed, that was just a clean giving away of money to

somebody outside: A very practical ques tion with Exchange bank stockholder might be this : who profited by the pur chases of the stock that were made by the manager, on authority given him by the directors to do so, as has been stated ?

It may be depended upon that this very identical question of who got the money-will grow to be the first and foremost one whenever wrecks of banking or other companies happen. It is in fact and ought to be the principal question in all such cases. Find out who actually got the money which a bank has lost, and the origin of the trouble stands revealed.

Nor need it be so difficult to find out all about it as some people would have us suppose. One circumstance there generally is, which ought to make the search comparatively easy. In nine cases out of ten the bulk of bank losses are made up of gigantic loans to a few individuals, not of small loans to a multitude of small customers. It has been shown that the Consolidated bank lost a good half million and something more, by one Jewish firm in Montreal. That so much of the bank's means should have been lent to any one firm was perfectly outrageous and inexcusable. The thing was wholly unwarrantable under any circumstances, but it looked all the worse because the advance was made to what was notoriously a mere peddling and speculating firm all the time. Following the question of "who gets the money ?" another question arises How does it happen that any man in the position of a bank manager is found willing to put such large amounts of the bank's funds in such dangerous risks? There is reason/ for asking this question, too. At the very time when a bank's money is being lavished by the hundred thousand on some gigantic risk that is with perfect propriety, call the attention doubly hazardous and even more so, legit. of the British government to, though here itmate customers of the bank, quite good it may be remarked, as at least curious, enough for the small amounts they want, are refused accommodation. There must be a reason for this; let bank shareholders find out what it is, and how the thing happens to work that way so much. But perhaps we are exaggerating here, it may be said that we are overstating the facts. Let those who think so recall the history of bank failures in Canada, and say what it was that wrecked the Upper Canada, the Commercial, the Gore and the Consolidated. We are badly misinformed if it was not in every case the heavy advances to a few dangerous big customer that did it. By-and-by we shall know with more certainty than at present, how far the wreck of the Exchange bank par allels those disasters of former time.
