SUAKIM, March 23.—The enemy in yesterday's fight numbered 4,000. Their fanatical courage won admiration. They rushed to what seemed certain death repeatedly without faltering. Hundreds of dead and wounded lay around the British square. The enemy finally withdrew, but it was in no sense a defeat. It is believed they lost 800 men. The British, especially she marines, behaved admirably. Desperate Sheikhs waving their banners, and with hordes of followers charged the marines before they had been reformed, but were unable to penetrate their line.

LONDON, March 25 .- Although the Standard this morning says for a positive Standard this morning says for a positive fact that no alarming despatch has been received from St. Petersburg, it is known that not only is such really the case but that it is simply a question which will make the declaration of war first. Both England and Russia are trying by every subterfuge to outstrip the other in the preparations. Instructions have been sent to Plymouth and every other military port to have all menof-war ready at once, and Lord Dufferin is preparing for the concentration of all immediately available troops with a view of at once throwing them into Afghanistan, and of making a display before the ameer.
