A hearty vote of thanks was moved by Dr. Fitcher, seconded by Sheriff McKeellar, and tendered the speaker by the chairman.

SINCE the time when gloomy-visaged Columbus discovered America and called it the land of the West with a bear a vegetable of all nations resort. It is so seldom, however, that a man, prosperous, well-liked, and with troops of friends, resolves to cross the ocean and make his home in an unknown land, that one must needs take some special interest in his history. Mr. Thomas Myers is a middle-aged, ruddy-complexioned, full-headed, hearty-voiced Englishman, who over a quarter of a century ago began the manufacture of Cattle Spice, a condiment for mixing with cattle food.
