CONFIRMATION.

The Confirmation will take place on Sunday evening, 23rd inst., at 7 p.m. The classes meet on Thursdays at 4.30; Fridays at 8 p.m. The Rector is also giving instruction on Holy Communion in the Church on Sunday afternoon at 4.15, and he earnestly requests the attendance of all who are to be confirmed.

HOLY WEEK AND EASTER.

The attendance at the services in Holy Week was larger than usual. Many communicants availed themselves of the daily celebrations of

the Holy Communion at 8 a.m. On Good Friday, the congregation was very large in the morning, the sermon being preached by the Bishop of Algoma. Mr. Moore preached in the evening. In the afternoon the Rector conducted what is known as the Three Hours Service, consisting mainly of addresses on the Seven Saying from the Cross. The first service of the Easter Festival was held on Easter even at 8 p.m.—a bright choral evensong with a full choir. The chancel presented a beautiful appearance, with the bright, fresh flowers in pulpit, desks, and sanctuary. There was a fair congregation, and no doubt many were kept away by the rain. The communicants on Easter day numbered 325, a larger number than on any previous occasion. It was a happy thought that suggested a celebration at 7 a.m. as well as at 8 o'clock. The numbers were divided, so that no service was too long. Commander Pocock, R.N., ordained to the perpetual Diaconate, kindly assisted at both the early Communion. Of the sixty-seven communicants at 7 a.m., many were receiving for the first time, having been brought in by the work in the Mission hall. The Church was quite full at both morning and evening services. The services were bright and hearty and the music excellent. At the children's service, 150 mission boxes were brought by the children and presented, completely covering the altar. They contained \$85.

The church was very tastefully decorated, many of the flowers in pots having been lent by kind friends, while the offerings sent in for the purchase of flowers more than met the cost—\$60.

The offertory of Easter Day, exclusive of the 7 A. M. and afternoon services, amounted to \$166.12.

EASTER VESTRY MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the Vestry was held on Easter Monday, 26th April. the Rector in the chair and about thirty persons present.

The Churchwardens presented their Report which, with the accompanying accounts, is printed in full in our columns. The accounts were discussed at some length, and stand for further consideration until the adjourned meeting to be held on Monday 10th inst.

On the nomination of Mr. Henderson seconded by Mr. Harman, Mr. Chadwick was appointed one of the Churchwardens for the ensuing year by acclamation. The Rector thereupon appointed Mr. H. W. M. Murray to be the other Church-

warden. It was stated that Mr. Hayes had been asked to continue in office but had been unable to consent to do so. On motion of Dr. Lough a vote of thanks to the retiring Churchwardens was passed.

The Sidesmen were then appointed. The names are given in the list of Parish officers, see page 7.

Dr. Snelling and Mr. McCarthy, Q.C., were re-appointed members of the Parochial Tribunal.

Mr. Cumberland moved that the Vestry records its satisfaction at the erection of the Mission Hall and expresses its thanks to the Rev. Mr. Moore and those associated with him in its erection and the carrying on of its work.

Mr. Cumberland moved for a return respecting the debt and liabilities of the parish, to be presented at the adjourned meeting.

Mrs. Vankoughnet moved a resolution recommending an increase in the salaries of the Organist and Sexton. This motion stands for consideration at the next meeting.

A motion by Dr. Lough seconded by Mr. Chadwick, that the sum of \$350 should be placed at the disposal of the Rector to enable him to put a furnace in the Rectory and to provide for papering and painting the interior of the Rectory, also stands until the adjourned meeting.

Mr. Cumberland gave notice of a motion to the effect that if it is proposed to ask the vestry to vote specific sums for specific purposes, details and estimates should be submitted.

The report of the Committee on Decorations and Improvements was then presented, and copies distributed among the members. This report was confined to a statement of the proceedings of the Committee, and contained no recommendation for future action. Mr. A. J. Close gave notice that he would move at the next meeting for a Committee to deal with this matter.

On motion of Mr. W. B. Close the thanks of the Vestry were given to the organist and choir for their services.

The meeting then adjourned.

CHURCHWARDENS' REPORT.

TO THE VESTRY OF ST. GEORGES' CHURCH,
EASTER, 1886.

We herewith submit the Annual Statement of accounts, from which it may be seen that notwithstanding the special expenditure during the past year, amounting to over \$3,000, the parochial finances are in a fairly prosperous condition.

At the last Easter meeting it was suggested that the Churchwardens' accounts should shew a comparison of the principal items with those of the previous year: we have acted upon this suggestion.

The accounts of several branches of parochial work will be submitted, as has become usual.

An estimate of probable receipts and necessary expenditure for the coming year has been prepared for the information of the Vestry, and is appended to the Churchwardens' account.

A list of the insurances on the church and other parochial buildings, is also presented herewith.

In accordance with the directions of the Vestry, the land on Phœbe street, 50 feet in frontage, has been taken on a lease renewable, at a ground rental of \$140 a year, and a Mission Hall has been erected upon it, at a total cost, with furnishing, and including ground rent for three-quarters, of \$1,100, all of which has been paid off excepting \$500, which amount the Churchwardens have raised upon a mortgage of the property, payable in five annual instalments, with privilege of premature re-payment, and bearing interest at 7 per cent., which considering the class of security and absence of personal guarantees, may be regarded as having been effected on very favorable terms.

The success which has attended the establishment of this Mission, may well encourage the Vestry to undertake a similar work in the south-easterly part of the Parish whenever an opportunity of doing so shall present itself.

Upon the suggestion of the Committee appointed by the Vestry to deal with the proposed improvements and decorations, we have roofed the Church and Chancel with slate, an improvement of a valuable and permanent character. Towards this expense only a small sum has been received, leaving \$665.60 still to be paid, against which there is a list of unpaid subscriptions to the Improvement Fund, amounting to \$500.

Acting under the directions of the Committee of the Vestry, by whom no doubt a report will be presented, we undertook the decoration of the interior of the Chancel, which has been done from designs by Mr. Chadwick, and under his personal direction. This has been a costly work, but the whole outlay has been met by donations and subscriptions. The Committee had a proposal laid before them for completing the interior of the Church in a style in general keeping with the work done, but proportionately less expensive, but decided not to proceed with it.

A considerable sum has been laid out during the past year in repairs and improvements to the school-house, chiefly in painting the interior, and in excavating the basement, to provide for a better system of heating than at present. It was fully expected that this expense would have been provided for by funds specially raised for the purpose through school-house resources, but up to the present time the receipts have fallen short of the expenditure to the extent of \$223.14.

The debt remains the same as last year \$3,500. Very little has as yet been done towards establishing the new Parish which the Vestry engaged to aid, and we have not yet been called upon to contribute anything to that object. We understand that the matter has been delayed by difficulties which have occurred in the selection of the site.

Mr. Hayes, seconded by Mr. Cumberland, nominated Messrs. Murray, Chadwick, and Henderson, who were declared elected, there being no other nominations.

PARISH NOTES.

A SPLENDID GIFT.—Mrs. Gosling presented to the Church on Easter Eve a communicants' kneeling cushion of crimson, adorned with white lilies, beautifully embroidered—her own work, executed at intervals during the past two years.

An old banner belonging to the Sunday School has been found in an attic in the rectory where it has lain packed away no one knows how long. This was used on Easter Sunday, together with the handsome one made at the time of the Sunday School Centennial, at which time also the Phoebe Street Sunday School displayed their banner, the workmanship of Miss Wood and Miss Mitchell.

We would suggest to the ladies to whose taste and skill we are indebted every year for our Easter decorations, that it might be well for them to note the kinds of plants and flowers which suffer most quickly by removal from a conservatory to the church, and in future select chiefly those which are not soon affected. The decorations were pronounced to be exceptionally beautiful on Easter Eve, but after remaining all night in a temperature perhaps twenty degrees lower than they had been previously kept in there were so many faded leaves and flowers as to materially diminish the effect.

The Revenue of this Parish is derived from the Offertory and Pew Rents, of which the former is relied upon as the principal source of income.

Offertory Envelopes will be supplied to those who are willing to contribute in this way to the maintenance of the Church and Ministry.

PAROCHIAL NEEDS.—Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure—

1. Debt, \$3,500, should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would soon extinguish it.
2. The completion of improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. The amount wanted for this would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
3. \$650 to pay for the new roof of the Church. The School House roof must also soon be renewed.
4. \$400 for the Phoebe Street Mission Hall, and subscriptions to maintain the Mission.
5. Donations and bequests towards an endowment, of which there is at present a sum of \$312 only.
