The education in all is the same, but for £8 a year a native receives meat twice a week, with lodging and eincation. This is the beginning of that change which will, as is right, throw the main burden of supporting the place on those who receive the benefits of it instead of on the much-enduring, ever contributing missionary public of the home country.

The majority of the pupils are beyond the age of childhood, and they are mostly young men and women.
