TURN CITY'S GARBAGE INTO SALABLE ASSET

Experts Recommend Reduction Plant to Cost \$600,000-Daily Collection Required.

Consulting Engineers Rudolph, Hering and Gregory, who were appointed by the city to investigate and report a new method of disposing of the city's garbage, yesterday recommended that all the refuse should be taken to a reduction works, there to be convert-

d into salable products.

They propose that the garbage be separated into three parts, each of which should be separately collected and taken to a reduction works in the east of the city. It was claimed by the engineers that grease can be ex-tracted from the garbage, which could be sold for the manufacture of soap and candles, etc. It was estimated that the reduction plant would cost the city

and candles, etc. It was esumated that the reduction plant would cost the city approximately \$600,000.

This system would necessitate the sarbage being collected daily, which would involve a considerably increased expenditure for the city. The refuse from the reduction plant would be used to fill in reads and marshes in used to fill in roads and marshes in the same manner as the ashes are used

Two patients have gone to the Western Hospital to undergo the Pasteur treatment for rables. One is a girl of 16 years, residing on Kingston-road, and the other is a boy of 3, the sen of a neighbor of the girl's family. On Nov. 8 the young lady was bitten by a cat, and two days later the little boy was also bitten by the same feline. Symptoms of rables being noticed in the cat shortly afterwards, it was killed and the head sent to the provincial bacteriologist. The examination showed positive signs of rabies, and the boy and girl have gone, as a result, to the Western Hospital for treatment.



WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominiou Land Agency or Bub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, sielly owned and occupied by him or by his father. Mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price 43.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (invaning the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead if igh, and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.


DR. W. B. HENDRY REFEREE FRANK ROBBINS TO UMPIRE
