New York Market Continues Weak - Prices Under Pressure

Further Recessions in Wall St. Under Profit-taking Sale

Harrison Issues Lead in Movement Toward Lower Prices—Losses Generally Small—Toronto Market Irregular.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Profit taking sales gave the stock market a heavy dose to-day. Quotations were in an uncertain way and recessions in the market cases did not exceed a point. The Harrison stocks issued, Union Pacific being the best, were the only ones to go up. The copper group, U. S. Steel, American Telephone and American Bond preferred were weak.

The bear traders, after a fortnight of severe reverses, resumed operations in a moderate way, and it was apparent that part of the pressure in the last part of trading, when the market was weak, was due to short selling. This selling, however, was a more important factor, and the pressure of long stocks at times was insistent enough to suggest that the buying movement had been overdone in some quarters of the market.

Mill Stocks Advanced. The list was not without its strong points. Toronto Stock Exchange. London Lower for Tractions. There was nothing new out on Rio, but the London market was weak, and somewhat of an outburst was expected when the lower cables were announced. The security has proved somewhat of an outburst.

Some Sharp Buiges. There were some rapid advances in values, which did much to call attention away from the chronic dullness in the general list. Rogers common was the leading feature, these shares scoring a five point bulge to 188 on small trading and closing bid for at that price. The earnings of the company have shown up decidedly well of late, and this is cited in explanation of the advance.

In a decision handed down to-day it holds that the Southern Pacific Co. is taxable in Kentucky, its home of incorporation, for the dividends and operates out of New York.
