**Sir Richard Cartwright's Stock Going Up**

**Montreal, June 30.**—(Special.)—Sir Oliver Mowat, Hon. L. H. Davies and Hon. A. G. Blair arrived at-day, and with Sir Richard Cartwright, Premier Fielding, Messrs. Tarte and Sutherland they soon went into conference with Hon. Mr. Laurier. The feature of the day's developments was the head set rule by the French members to secure four portfolios, their coming holders being Messrs. Laurier, Tarte, Geoffrin and Chaqueville, besides Sir G. Joly de La Briere without portfolio. The French-Canadian Liberal Opposition is strong enough, so Mr. Laurier's supporters claim, to justify the stern demand for four good portfolios in the new administration.

**Wilkes-Barre, Pa., June 30.**—There was no change this morning in the situation at the Twin Shaft Mine. The rescuers continue to work hard in their endeavor to reach the entombed miners. Very little progress is being made, however, as there are frequent cave-ins of the earth about the edge of the shaft, and the company is compelled to work in a very hasty and dangerous manner.

Sir John A. Macdonald always received his friends in the Queen's in the old days, and there also, following the precedent established by the Old Chief, Sir Mackenzie Bowell and Sir Charles Tupper have registered.
