## LOADS THE ISSUE SAYS ASQUITH TO ELECTORS

### In Addressing Constituents, Ignores All But Budget Rejection — Churchill is Heckled by Suffragettes.

LONDON, Jan. 10.—The second parliament of King Edward's reign came to an end to-day. Four privy councillors attended at Buckingham Palace, where at 3.30 the King signed the proclamation summoning a new parliament to meet on Feb. 15. Within an hour the royal writs had been despatched from the crown office to every constituency in the United Kingdom.

Parliament having been formally dissolved, Prime Minister Asquith to-night issued an election address to his East Fife electors. It ignores all side issues raised during the campaign and is confined strictly to the constitutional question involved in the lords' rejection of the budget.

In defence of the budget the premier says: "It apportions the new taxes between the luxuries, superfluities and monopolies, leaving the necessities of life untouched."

Asquith says: "In a sentence, the house of lords has violated the constitution in order to save the cause of tariff reform from a mortal blow."

The premier declares that the lords' claim to the control of the country's finances is usurpation, and the expenditure of the parliament just dissolved shows that the possession of an unlimited veto by a partisan second chamber is an insupportable objection to domestic legislation.

Describing how the legislation of a Tory house of commons, while a Liberal house of commons is impotent to carry new legislation, he says: "It is absurd to speak of this system as the best of all possible systems. The best of all possible systems is a system in which the house of commons is understood, and is practically interpreted by every other democratic country."

After a brief respite, A. J. Balfour, Chancellor—Lloyd-George, Winston Spencer Churchill and other ministers and ex-ministers are again busy on the platform.

Mr. Churchill at Birmingham suffered considerable interruption from suffragettes, several of whom were expelled from the meeting.

A crowd of Unionists invaded a Liberal meeting at Camberwell, a parliamentary borough of London, and created a disturbance that Thomas James McNamara, member of parliament for that district, could not get a hearing and was obliged to abandon the attempt.

Mr. Edward Grey at Edinburgh declared that there never had been less reason to talk about war between Great Britain and Germany than there was to-day.

### UNION JACK IN CREPE

How One Excited Briton Views the War Scare.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)  
LONDON, Jan. 10.—The Mail is making a great effort to make the country believe that defence is the dominant issue. This aspect of the political situation has so impressed one person in Richmond that on a high flagstaff he has hoisted a German helmet. Below it is a German ensign. Then, decorated with crepe comes the Union Jack. "If this is what you want, vote Liberal," is the inscription. There are many protests at this indignity to the flag.

Stewart Lyon writes the press concluding the cry of "foreigner" used towards Hansard Greenleaf in London. Concluding a dignified letter, Mr. Lyon says: "There are two insults the colonial kinsman will not tolerate; one that his loyalty must be bought; the other that they are foreigners."

### FATAL TOBOGGAN ACCIDENT

Woman Killed at Montreal and Daughter Injured.

MONTREAL, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—The first toboggan fatality of the season occurred this evening on the park slide on the mountain, resulting in the death of Mrs. A. J. Corner and the serious injury of her daughter, Mrs. George Barrat.

Some boys ascending the slide, allowed their toboggan to drop back into the slide where it was struck by one descending, on which were the two ladies and the younger woman's husband. The toboggan struck the descending toboggan from the side. Mrs. Corner's skull being fractured. Mrs. Barrat was internally injured.

## QUARTZ ALL RICH; GOLD NOT IN "POCKETS"

### Even Distribution is Best Sign of Permanency With Depth — Some Comparisons.

MATHESON, Jan. 10.—(Special.) Mining engineers now visiting the Porcupine camp are amazed at the remarkable surface showings of gold which are to be seen on many of the earlier finds and at the great extent of the area in which is found gold-bearing quartz. Experience has taught them not to commit themselves in regard to the probability of what lies below the surface. One must wait for development to prove this. Suffice it to say that where sinking has been done, the indications point to its continuance to a very much greater depth than has yet been attained.

The gold is largely associated with iron oxide, which gives the quartz a rusty or reddish brown appearance. This iron, sometimes specular, often in the form of pyrite, and in small cubes, has oxidized through the percolation of water and air, and left the free gold. Gold is nearly always associated with some other mineral, chiefly iron and chalcopyrite; but in August of 1908, a nice vein of eight inches was uncovered by Mr. Gibson in the Timagami Reserve, five claims east from the southern end of Lake Peashab, in which gold running over \$100 to the ton, was associated with iron and cobalt with some silver.

Gold associated with cobalt is not of common occurrence, the similar veins have been found near Rib Lake. These veins are comparatively small, the matrix is of calcite, and the ore is somewhat refractory. Interesting as these finds are from a geological standpoint, showing distribution of gold to be widespread over the whole camp area outside of the rich silver section, they are completely overshadowed by the remarkable finds at Porcupine, where on the Wilson and Hollinger ridges, which are really veins with the side and surface exposed, free gold is to be seen dotted over the side exposed, and on climbing up to the top, the free gold is still visible in all parts of it.

Indication of Permanency.  
It is the even distribution of the gold thru the quartz which gives hope of its continuance. The permanency of these veins, large as they are, can hardly be entertained, because pockets, sometimes very rich, are invariably found in the veins, and the richness is all in one place, the quartz itself, a few yards from the pocket carrying an infinitesimal quantity of the precious metal.

All thru the Porcupine district, whilst there are seams running thru the quartz which carry a much greater mineralization than parts of the same vein outside of the seams, there is not that tendency to pocket which is characteristic of smaller veins in other sections. There again some of the biggest discoveries are one immense matrix of quartz with free gold all thru it. Remarkable! Marvelous! as one mining engineer, with a reputation from coast to coast, said on reaching Matheson, after viewing the wonderful showings on the Porcupine claims.

Comparisons with the Yukon and Klondike cannot be fairly made, except by way of contrast. The gold in the Yukon and Klondike is recovered from large placers in small particles and in nuggets. The quartz veins have been ground down by glacial action, and the gold, which will neither corrode or oxidize, has been deposited with the gravel and sand into river beds and gullies. Where the gold came from has always been a question puzzling to the western miner, because whilst he looks for it in quartz veins, the veins, when found, are invariably barren, or contain so little gold that they are not nearly as remunerative as a placer mine.

The Elusive Mother Lode.  
In the Saskatchewan Valley, where it is argued that the gold came from the Rocky Mountains, the most gold has been found furthest away from the Rockies, and the sands in the river nearest the mountains are almost devoid of even traces of gold.

The mother lode is never found. Miners are forever looking for the source

## CHAIRMAN BALFOUR: Pardon me, my lord, but would you kindly "duck," and let me ask him?

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—The first exhibition in this country of the gyrostatic mono-rail car, which has been advertised abroad as the solution of the mono rail problem and ranked among the wonders of the present century, by Richard Scherl, the young inventor who is a son of the owner of one of Germany's greatest newspapers. Many of America's best known railroad engineers and financiers were invited.

A single rail track had been laid on the floor of the rink in Aschcliffe, with about 12 laps to a mile. The car, which seats four passengers and two operators, and which is intended solely for demonstration purposes, worked perfectly.

Under the car are two gyroscopes, each revolving in a vacuum at the rate of 8,000 revolutions per minute, one on a perpendicular axis and the other horizontal.

These gyroscopes, operated by an electric current of 110 volts picked up by "shoes" from wires laid on either side of the mono rail, so balanced the car, either standing or running, that all tendency to incline, rock or pitch was counteracted.

Mr. Scherl believes that a speed of at least 120 miles an hour can be reached and maintained by a gyrostatic mono rail train of regulation size.

### A 'CANADIAN' IS A 'FOREIGNER'


According to the Interpretation of Some York Conservatives.

### BOURASSA'S NEW PAPER SETS FORTH ITS POLICY

Organ of the Nationalist Party and Why It Will Oppose Government.

MONTREAL, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Henri Bourassa's new organ, "The Devoir," made its first appearance to-day. It will be an evening daily journal to defend the principles of the Nationalist party.

The introductory editorial, headed, "Before the Battle," is signed by Bourassa himself, as managing director of the paper.

After laying down the general rule, that the Devoir will support honest defense and denounce scoundrels, the article says:

"In provincial politics we will oppose the present government, because we find therein all the bad tendencies which we wish to make disappear from public life; hereditarily, carelessness, cowardice, degradation and narrow-party spirit. We will support the opposition because we find therein the opposite tendencies, probity, courage, firm principle, great breadth of view. These principles are splendidly combined in the person of its leader, Mr. Teller. Should the day come when this group will no longer follow the inspirations that now guide them, they will find us ready to oppose them, as we are now opposing the men in power."

The article goes on to say that the position is not so clear at Ottawa, where both parties suffer from the atrophy which characterized provincial politics a few years ago, and when a desire to secure or preserve power seems to be the only aim. After mentioning that both parliamentary groups seem to have conspired on the important questions within the past few years, a solution in which right, justice and national interests were sacrificed, Mr. Bourassa adds: "Mr. Monk's famous speech at Lachine gives us the hope that the dangerous and stupid position in which we are placed will not last. The member for Jacques Cartier may rest assured of our support, if he maintains his attitude with firmness, logic and perseverance."

Still at War.  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—The already wide breach between the Republican organization of the house of representatives and the "insurgents" was widened perceptibly to-day.

CHABOT CHOSEN  
Will Again Be the Conservative Candidate for Ottawa Seat.

OTTAWA, Jan. 10.—(Special.)—Dr. J. L. Chabot, who was Conservative candidate at the last general election, received the unanimous nomination tonight by the Conservative convention. He accepted.

The Liberal candidate in Auguste Lemoine, a brother of the postmaster-general, and there is a third candidate in the field, Ex-Mayor J. A. Ellis, running as an independent.

Dr. Chabot, at the last election, reduced the Liberal majority from fourteen hundred to six hundred, although his opponent was Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He is at present in poor health, and may have to undergo an operation within the next few days.

## YOUNG HERESS RAN OFF WITH WATER

### She's 16, He's 43, and Married, and After Zig-Zag Tour They're Arrested by Chicago Police.

CHICAGO, Jan. 10.—Living as father and daughter, Roberta Bult of Janon, a Philadelphia heiress, aged only 15, and Frederick Cohen, a former waiter of the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel, who eloped Dec. 29 from Philadelphia, were arrested late to-day.

They were discovered by detectives in a rooming house at 48 West Superior-street, on the north side of the city. When the policemen entered the house Miss De Janon was playing with a pet dog which she took with her when she disappeared with Cohen, who is 43 years old and married. Cohen was reading in an adjoining room.

Cohen at first protested against arrest. He soon admitted his identity, however, and Miss De Janon, sobbing bitterly, pleaded with the police to restore her to her parents.

Cohen revealed to the officers the story of his flight with the girl from Philadelphia, a flight extending thousands of miles.

From Philadelphia they went to New York, then to Montreal and on to St. John, N. B., where they boarded a steamer for England, leaving it at Halifax and going to Boston and then on to Chicago.

They gave up their trip to England at Halifax, because the boat officers would not permit the presence of Miss De Janon's pet dog on the vessel. At least, that was Cohen's explanation, but the police believe he planned to elude his pursuers.

Cohen and Miss De Janon reached Chicago on Thursday and rented a room in a boarding house, introducing the girl as his daughter. A maid said he was Robert King, a barber from Montreal, in search of work.

MAYOR GEARY'S INAUGURAL. Mayor Geary's message, if somewhat prolix, is a useful recapitulation of the city's position at the present time.

Economy is an inevitable note, but the aspiration is general and not specific. In Mayor Geary's positive pronouncements we find the recommendation of such obvious necessities as the new Union Station, caution in dealing with railway control in Ashbridge's Bay, the burial of all electric service wires in the city, the development of the playgrounds policy, an eastern entrance to the exhibition; a sewage system for the seventh ward.

There may be a difference of opinion about the appointment of a corporation counsel, and the relegation of Controller Ward's seawall to the back-ground, while the Bloor viaduct is not even mentioned.

Mayor Geary proposes to apply to the legislature for authority to construct and operate a tube railway and surface system, but the subject is dismissed in a brief paragraph, and evidently is not regarded as anything more than a stuffed club.

The street railway is whacked with resonating words in proper appeal style, but the result of the appeal to the city council must be awaited before doing anything more than thoroughly considering the situation.

Everybody will now thoroughly consider it.

There should be no difficulty, says Mayor Geary towards the close of his address, in arriving at a mutually satisfactory arrangement with the radial railways, provided always that such an arrangement terminates at the same time as the agreement with the Toronto Street Railway. It looks as if the big campaign of the year would be over this point. But Mayor Geary must receive his due. He declares, and he will have the support of every citizen in the declaration:

"This council should not for one moment lend countenance to any proposal tending to jeopardize or in the slightest degree weaken its grip on the ownership of the street railway franchise in 1921."

SIR JOHN A. MACDONALD.

Sir John A. Macdonald, had he lived, would have been 95 to-day. Among all the figures in Canadian history none is surrounded with a warmer atmosphere of affection and personal loyalty.

As time recedes and his character becomes more of an historic memory, it will not be forgotten that his great successor, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, has paid him a supreme compliment. Speaking on Friday night last his words were:

"If I have been able, in the course of my life, to give justice to whom justice was due, to meet my opponent and to shake his hand, and to say to friends and foes the good I thought of them, I owe it largely to the example which was given me in my own case by a man whose portrait is on the wall, and who at one time was the great leader of the Conservative party."

I must say for the credit of his memory, that I found him in all our relations, not only courteous, but true to his word and never unfair; and in this respect, the not in his policy; I have tried to emulate his example."

Sir John could ask nothing better of history.

IS GERMANY'S STATE SOCIALISM RIGHT OR WRONG?

Germany in many important respects is regarded as in the van of modern civilization. In general education, in technical training, in social and individual organization it is held up as having led the way along which its competitors must also travel if they are to compete with Germany on anything like equal terms. But there is a deeper side to Germany's admitted advantages. Germany, although an embryo composed of a number of states, all more or less bureaucratic, and with the predominant partner, Prussia, less democratic than any, has deliberately embarked on a policy of monarchical or state socialism. This is a far wider and more real distinction than any of the other differences between it and the English-speaking peoples of Britain and the United States, still indoctrinated with the principle of individualism. But state socialism of the German type is the antithesis of individualism—both cannot be sound. If commercial ownership and management of lands, forests, canals, mills and other properties, of railways, street railways, gas and electric lighting plants, and other public utilities, is right and profitable for the nation, then the rule that hands these over for the benefit of private individuals and companies cannot be sustained in the court of reason.
