

Presbyterians Urged to Rally For Budget, Despite Union Views

Toronto, Sept. 30—It was announced yesterday that all Presbyterians in Canada, through their ministers, were to be urged to rally, no matter what their views on the question of Church Union, in support of the budget requirements of the Church this year—\$1,400,000—and to also make a supreme effort to wipe out the deficit of \$400,000, chiefly resulting from the cost of mission work in foreign fields. A statement to that effect was issued by the federal board of Presbytérian church and signed by Rev. Dr. D. R. Drummond, chairman, and Rev. Dr. Robert Laird, secretary, and will be in the hands of every Presbyterian minister in the Dominion within a few days. The statement points out that because the deficits have hung on for several years vital mission work, built up at great cost of men and noney has already been abandoned.
