Premier MacDonald Writes President Cosgrave That Attack Will be "Overlooked"

(British United Press.) Dublin, March 25 .- Premier Mac-Donald of Britain has written President Cosgrave of the Irish Free State assuring him that the attack on British soldiers at Queenstown will not

affect Anglo-Irish friendship. "The circumstances," he wrote, "show that the affair was in no way

"show that the affair was in no way connected with the people of the locality, who can rest assured that the outrage will not be allowed to disturb the Anglo-Irish friendship which was cemented by the treaty."

# Stumpage Estimated Revenue Shows an Increase of \$260,000.

**EXPENSES REDUCED** 

Succession Duties are Expected to be Cut, Provincial Treasurer Says.

(By Canadian Press.) Fredericton, March 25.-Estimates for 1924, which were laced in detail before the Legislature this afternoon by Hon. J. E. Hetherington, the provincial reasurer, in his budget speech today, show that not including the estimated deficit on the St. John and Ouebec Railway of \$260,000, the province hopes to have a surplus at the end of the fiscal year of 1924 of

\$55,481.89. There are some marked differences in the estimated income for this year compared with the revenue received last year, as well as some outstanding comparisons in expenditure of departments. The departments of lands and public works are responsible respectively for the estimated increases of revenue to \$3,524,761, and a decrease in expenditure, which last year amounted to \$3,708,921, to

\$3,406,279 for 1924.
