Victoria, B. C., May 27—Details of the Variety sale, Victoria Rink, Friday, killing of Admiral Kolchak, head of the May 28. Open at 1.30 p.m. killing of Admiral Kolchak, head of the All-Russian government, were given by Captain W. I. Webb, provost marshal with the British forces in Siberia, who arrived here today on the steamer Malita Maru from Vladivostok. Through treachery, he says, Kolchak was killed by revolutionists. He had been incarcerated with former Premier Peppeliayeff at Irkutsk. When placed in front of a firing squad, the premier was shot down when he attempted to escape. Kolchak, denied a trial and the privilege of seeing his wife, cooly smoked a cigarette and waited the volley. The order to fire was disobeyed by the firing squad whereupon a commissary strode forward, pushed Kolchak's head back and shothim to death with a revolver. Kolchak was placed in a cage at Irkutsk and exhibited for a nominal charge according to N. Deberg, former member of the admiral's staff, who arrived here yesterday.

891/4 CANADIAN BATTLEFIELD MEMORIALS

113/4 Appointment of Several Officers to Carry on Preliminary Work.

(Canadian Press.)

Ottawa, May 27—In order to carry out preliminary steps in connection with Canadian battlefield memorials, the governor-in-council, has authorized the appointment of certain officers to take charge of this work. Brigadier-General H. T. Hughes has been detailed as chief engineer in charge of the work, and Captain Maurice Pope of the Royal Canadian Engineers as his assistant, Lieut.-Colonel J. T. Gagnon, Canadian Army Pay Corps, as financial officer, and Lieutenant-Colonel N. M. Ross, officer in charge of landscape work.

The chief engineer is authorized to prepare plans and specifications and call for tenders for such construction work as may be necessary, other than that which will be dealt by an honorary commission yet to be appointed.

His authority to do these things is subject to approval of the High Commissioner for Canada in London.

A CHAIR AWAITS THE CANADIAN MINISTER

Philadelphia, May 27—A musty diplomatic secret has been disclosed here through announcement that Canada soon will send, its own minister to Washington. It is that for the last ten years a specialy made chair, carved with the Canadian coat of arms, has been waiting in Washington for use of this envoy.

Elihu Root, then secretary of state, ordered the chair, one of many specially designed for the pan-American union building at the capital. Andrew Carnegie's memorial to cement more firmly the relations of the Americas.

Albert Kelsey of this city, one of the architects of the pan-American building, said:—

"Once a month the ambassadors and ministers of all the American republics meet and are presided over by our secretary of state in the pan-American building and each representative has a chair of his own, with the arms of his country carved on the back.

"Now, when these chairs were decided on, Secretary Root asked me to have an additional one made with the Canadian arms on it, which was done, and which has been hidden for the last ten years, for Secretary Root cautioned me—to use his exact words—to be a little reticent about the matter."
