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THE FOURTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
TORONTO MAGDALENE ASYLUM,
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JANUARY 1ST, 1869.

The Managers of the "Industrial House of Refuge," send forth this, their annual report, with very great confidence, convinced as they are, that the account they have to give of the results of their labours, is such as will gladden the hearts of the friends of the Institution, and do much, they hope, to remove the objections of some who think that little or no good can be done with the class of women received into the Refuge.

They would also thus publicly express their heartfelt gratitude and thankfulness, to a Loving Heavenly Father, who has so manifestly shewn in His dealings with many of the inmates of the "Home," that He is a merciful and long suffering God, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come unto Him and live: that He who spared not His own Son but gave Him up for us all, will with Him also freely give us all things.

On the 1st January, 1868, there were remaining in the institution 26; since then we have admitted 30; of these 10 were sent to service, 4 were restored to their friends, 14 left of their own accord, 1 was dismissed and 1 died; leaving 26, 1st January, 1869.

Of those sent to service, 5 have remained in the situations to which they were sent, for four, five, seven, nine and eleven months respectively, and continue to give satisfaction to their employers. Two of them have given donations in money to the "Home," as tokens of their gratitude, and one is, or soon will be, comfortably settled for life. The remaining five left the places provided for them, and we fear are not doing well, except one who has returned to the "Home."

Of the four "sent to friends," one was sent to a widowed mother in England, who for many years had been sorrowing over this lost one, and writing from time to time urging her to come home. Having been in the institution several times, but without giving much indication of any real change, she was for the last time admitted on the 2nd January, 1867, and remaining till April of this year, conducting herself with propriety, and evincing an earnest desire to redeem the past. She was sent home under the care of friends, and arrived safe and well. Another was sent to her parents in Edinburgh, and had previously saved \$26 toward the expenses of the voyage. We subjoin an extract from a letter received by the secretary from her mother: "My daughter G. has arrived safe home, and I am happy to say she is quite well, and sends her love to you and your dear family, to dear Miss Blakley, and all her kind friends, for she will never forget you all while she lives.*** My husband joins me in sending our humble thanks to you for your kindness to our daughter, which will never be forgotten by us. It will never be in our power to thank you enough, but I hope the Lord will bless you while you live for the interest you have taken in my daughter. She is quite a *new woman* every way. We are both very fond of her. It was a happy meeting."

She, who died, had for several years led an abandoned life, and indeed had almost sunk to the "lowest depths." She had been in the Institution several times before, but would never remain the stipulated time. About the end of January, 1867, she applied again for admission, being in a most wretched state both of body and mind, and was received, and during her year of probation was quiet and submissive, very different indeed, from what she had been on previous occasions. The great truths of religion seemed to find a firm lodgment in her heart, as also a conviction of the exceeding sinfulness of her life, and an earnest desire to reform. Her health, however, was evidently broken, and consumption, slowly but surely, doing its work, so that at the end of the twelve months the managers did all they could to persuade her to give up the idea of taking a situation—but without success, and she went to one, but only for a few days, and then returned almost convinced that both body and mind were in too weak a state—the one to work and the other to resist temptation. For some time, however, she clung strongly to the hope that she would yet be

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able to take a place and earn enough money to take her to her mother in Glasgow—thoughts of her former conduct to her seeming to distress her very much. But, at last towards the end of September, that hope was give up, and she died on the 28th November, “Rejoicing in her Saviour.” During the last two months, she was visited frequently by one or other of those who are so well fitted to carry conviction to the Sinner, as well as comfort and consolation to the sick and dying, who have returned to the Lord; and the testimony of each and all of them was, “That it was good for them to be there.” Her love to her Saviour, and her trust in His forgiveness of all her sins, were both strong and unwavering. The following was among one of the last remarks she made: “It is a faithful saying, and worthy of all acceptation that Christ came into the world to seek and to save the lost. If he had not come to seek, I would never have been found, and never have been saved.” Her bible and hymn books were sent by one of the committee, who was going to Glasgow to her mother with her last messages. Her death we hope will be blessed to some of those who where in the “Home” with her, more especially as during the greater part of the past year a strong religious influence has pervaded the minds of the inmates of the Institution, and several of them, we trust, have been “born again.” Some of them have become members of churches, and are giving satisfactory evidence of their desire to lead a new life.

In no year since the establishment of this Institution have the results been so satisfactory, and the managers have consequently been much encouraged to persevere in their endeavours to rescue some, however few—from vice and infamy—for, after all our success, it is only for the *very few* we can speak. Hundreds are every day treading the downward and soul destroying path, and that with a determination of will, which if brought to bear on any honest line of life, would ensure comfort and respectability. Often have the committee to contend with this obstinacy, more particularly among those classed as “left of their own accord.” After being in the “Home” for a few weeks, a strong desire and determination to “go out” and “do better for themselves,”—as they term it—come over them, and no entreaties or appeals to their former experience of failure, or of the impossibility of their getting a respectable place, without recommendations or

decent clothes, make the least impression, and the managers are obliged to open the door and let them go to almost certain ruin. And most probably in a few days they are in the jail, bitterly regretting they did not remain in the "Home," and yet, perhaps, to do the same thing a few months afterwards. And still we feel, and know from experience, that it would not do to refuse to admit them again, for we have found in several instances that the good has been done, or at least shews itself after they have been in perhaps for the third or fourth time.

We have also some pleasing things to tell about *former inmates* who have been doing well for years.

In a letter from Mrs. Dr. Burns (who is now in Scotland) to our Treasurer, she says:—"When I was in the north I had a call from one of the former inmates, who was sent home. Her case was one of painful interest. I don't know if you will remember it as it is many years since. S. J. is the name, she is doing well, and her aunt, a most respectable woman, called with her to express unitedly their gratitude for the kindness which had been shewn to her. Thus bread thrown upon the waters may be found after many days." Another lady has received several letters from one who was with her for sometime as a servant, and who, on the girl's father expressing a desire to take her home, travelled some distance into the country to deliver her safe into his hands. The last letter contained a certificate of church membership, and was a most pleasing communication.

The following extract is from a letter written by a lady to whom we sent one as a servant, in September, 1865, and in whose family she remained serving them most faithfully, till a few months previous to the date of this letter, viz: September, 1868. "Knowing the great interest you have felt and still feel in E. M. I have great pleasure in telling you that she is now, through a kind providence, provided with a good and pleasant home for the remainder of her days. She was married on the 16th inst., at the Wesleyan Parsonage, to a very worthy man, who had often been employed by us, and is a most steady and industrious workman."

Another girl whom we had sent to a minister's family, stayed a year with them and then they took her mother (who had also been an inmate of the "Home," and had kept her first place for two years and a half,) and found the daughter employment close at hand. Three

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months ago we heard from her mother of her marriage. The mother has given two donations of 2 and 4 dollars, respectively, as a mark of her gratitude to the managers. Another has given 11 dollars in three years; another 6 dollars in two years; another 9 dollars and another 10 dollars; all from the same motive. Surely these are most encouraging proofs of the good that is being done by means of this institution.

We have confined ourselves almost wholly to a bare statement of facts, being convinced that such must carry conviction to the hearts of all, and that nothing further is necessary to ensure a continuance of that support which we have hitherto received, and we cordially invite any to visit the institution, and judge for themselves.

Our present Matron has now been in charge for nearly three years and a half, and we feel that much of the present efficiency of the Institution is owing to the conscientious and painstaking discharge of her duties. She having, as we can testify, the good of the "Home" thoroughly at heart. We have also an efficient sub-matron, who takes charge of the work room.

The value of the work done this year, by the inmates, is about \$700—not quite so much as last year—the reason being, that the number in the "Home" has been considerably less than the previous year.

We have again to thank the many kind friends who have so earnestly laboured to promote the welfare of the institution, and especially our faithful medical attendant, Dr. Robinson.

We are also indebted to the managers of the Bible and Tract Society for a liberal donation of Bibles and useful reading.

Mr. Cumberland, Manager of the Northern Railway, has also most kindly allowed us to have our supply of cordwood brought down to the city at half freight rates.

To the gentlemen who have steadfastly laboured to promote the moral and religious welfare of the inmates of the Refuge—Messrs. Alcorn, Richardson, McCord, Macdonald, Brown, Haycock and others—we tender our grateful thanks, and hope they will receive the blessings of many of the saved, who were "ready to perish."

We have continued the improvements on the premises, commenced last year, and having surrounded them with a new high fence, and planted a small orchard, we hope in the course of this year to bring

the ground into a much better, as well as more profitable state of cultivation.

The present wooden building, now occupied as the "Refuge," being very old, and its foundation falling into decay, while its internal arrangements are also, in many respects, unsuitable for the purposes of the Institution, it is intended to form a fund to erect a new one as soon as it can be done without getting into debt. Already \$1000 has been funded for this purpose, and we doubt not that the liberality of the friends of the cause will, as heretofore, be generously extended to the promotion of this important design.

May the Lord continue to bless our labours, and to His name be all the praise.
