STONES RAINING IN AND ABOUT LONDON AT PRESENT.

The Justice Stephen Carter Under Disgrace—Fearful Snow Blizzards in the South of England—Dangerous in the Streets.

BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. LONDON, March 10.—Mr. Cobb, M. P., has published his correspondence with Mr. Smith, first Lord of the Treasury in regard to Justice Stephen Carter.

The News disapproves of Smith's attitude in the Justice Stephen Carter case. The Chronicle says, "Mr. Cobb must furnish Smith with specific facts, for it will be a terrible thing if Justice Stephen had to conduct a murder trial while these deadly rumors are about."

The Telegraph does not regret that Mr. Cobb has raised the question, but the Standard defends Justice Stephen. It thinks that Lord Coleridge's opinion in the matter is sound.

Blissville Baiting. LONDON, Mar. 10.—A terrible storm has been raging in Scotland and the north of England for a week past, while in the south of England the weather was mild and calm. The gale which was totally unexpected, advanced in a north-easterly direction across the Bay of Biscay. The blizzard prevails over the whole of England, and commenced in London at 4 in the afternoon, and increased to great fury at night.

There was a unusual rise of tide and all the channel steamers had boisterous passages. Even in the harbors, the water was so rough that it was difficult to hold vessels to their moorings. The Dover, mail boat, nearly sank in the harbor and her paddle box was smashed. The steamers cannot cross to the admiralty pier where the telegraph cables and signal masts are stationed. Similar reports come from points all along the coast.

FAILURE OF A BOSTON TEA HOUSE. It was the Second Largest House of the kind in the United States.

BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. BOSTON, March 10.—Dudley, Hall & Co., dealers in tea and sugar at 140 State street, have assigned. Their liabilities are upwards of \$400,000. Their assets consist largely of equities in real estate, readily available to the best advantage, principally the stock in trade in the store on State st., the tea in warehouse and other bills receivable, amounting in value to about \$600,000.

The members of the firm are Dudley C. Hall and his son, Dudley C. Hall, Jr. The former had endorsed considerable paper for the accommodation of the firm. To this fact undoubtedly, is due the failure.

The individual members of the firm have also assigned, but their liabilities, except for endorsement of the firm, are very light.

The announcement of the assignment of this case causes a sensation in the business circles. The firm was in business over 20 years, and was the second largest tea house in the United States, and a business of over a million of dollars a year.

If the assignees can secure time to dispose of the large interests in real estate held by the firm and the members, it is possible to the best advantage, the creditors, if it is thought will ultimately receive a dividend. FIRST EDITION. WRECKED CARS IN FLAMES.

A TERRIBLE RAILROAD ACCIDENT NEAR HAVANA, ILL.

Passenger Train Leaves the Track at a Switch—One Person Killed and a Large Number Injured—Heavily Clothed Travelers Go Barefoot Through Ice and Snow in Chicago.

PEORIA, Ill., March 8.—The fast passenger train of the Jacksonville Southern railroad over the Rock Island, Tupper & Santa Fe, which left here at 1:30 this morning, met with a terrible accident at Havana, 41 miles south of Peoria.

During the storm which raged last night, the train, which consisted of a baggage car, coach, chair car and two sleepers, was an hour and a half late.

At Havana there is a sharp curve a mile and a half from the depot, and the engine struck the curve at the switch and left the track. All the cars followed pling and crashing over the roof of the engine and through the roof of the cars.

Freeman Sullivan was instantly killed. Engineer George Birkenhead of this city had one arm and a leg cut off.

The other injured are: Edward Hennrich, Peoria, burned and badly bruised; Walter Conover, Manito, Ill., left arm torn out and badly injured; Charles McKinnon, Peoria, burned and badly bruised; Miss Emma Reardon, St. Louis, seriously bruised; Express Menager, Peoria, burned and badly bruised; Frank P. Lewis, Peoria, seriously jammed in the breast; John J. Sullivan, Peoria, burned and badly bruised; James Hughes, Peoria, was also injured by being thrown against a car.

The wreck immediately took fire and burned fiercely, the corpse of a Mrs. Wood, who was in the baggage car being cremated.

A number of the passengers were rescued with the utmost difficulty, but two or three were severely burned.

The loss to the company, including the death and accident claims, will not fall short of \$100,000.

Passengers in the sleepers were not injured, but were made to make their way on foot for a mile through the terrible storm to shelter, without shoes or clothing.

KNOWLEDGE BY COAL GAS. One is Dead, but the Others are Expected to Recover.

BOSTON, March 10.—The factory of George Potter, consisting of his wife and five children, were rendered unconscious by coal gas in their residence, "Epiphany" street, last night. One son, twenty years of age, is dead. The others are expected to recover. The gas is supposed to have escaped from the furnace.

AN APED INDIAN DIES. BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. BOSTON, March 10.—"Old" Chip, a Chippewa Indian, who was captured when young by the Winnebagoes at his home near Canadian border, and was afterward held as a slave by different tribes, died Thursday night at his home near Boston.

He had aged rapidly in recent years, and his mind was feeble. He could move about only by crawling on hands and feet, and his dried up frame resembled that of an old man.

THEORY OF THE POLICE REGARDING THE MURDER OF DR. LEIDERMANN. BY TELEGRAPH TO THE GAZETTE. ST. JOHN, N. B., March 10.—Further facts have come to light regarding the murder of Dr. Leidermann, whose body was found in the ravine near San Remo.

Dr. Leidermann was a German and formerly resided in Manchester. In December he engaged quarters at the National Hotel in San Remo, and on subsequent two German joined the doctor and all three departed together by rail on Dec. 20.

On the evening of the same day the doctor and his two companions were seen by a man who had been employed in the hotel. They explained that Leidermann had suddenly become insane, and was confined in a room in the hotel. The man who had seen them was a German and had been employed in the hotel.

That night the two Germans left, and the body of Dr. Leidermann was afterwards found in the ravine. The spine of the murdered man was broken and the body punctured by a pin similar to those used in printing at the gaming tables at Monte Carlo. The pockets of the dead man had been rifled.

It was evidently the intention of the murderers to give the idea that the doctor had been ruined by gambling at Monte Carlo, and that he had committed suicide.

After fruitless attempts to unravel the mystery, the San Remo police sent a photograph of the dead man to the officials of Monte Carlo, who remembered having seen the deceased gambling in company with a reputed Polish countess and her German companion, and the woman and her companion were arrested and sent to San Remo.

The theory of the police is that the alleged countess deceived the unfortunate doctor to her home, where he suffered a fatal stroke, and that the victim of the crime was killed in the ravine.
