WHIPPING POSTS.

Were In Full Swing In the Old Richmond Street Court House and Prisoners Were Branded In Open Court — Victims of Pillory Were Placed In Machine.

Even so modern a city as Toronto has at least one landmark of dublous reputation. Paris has its Bastile, London its Tower, Oxford its St. Giles, Salem its Witch's Hill, and Toronto its pillory and stocks.

The punishment of lawbreakers by exposure to public scorn in the pillory and stocks goes back to early days. As far back as 1350 a statute was passed requiring the erection of

days. As far back as 1350 a statute was passed requiring the erection of stocks in every town in England for the punishment of persons convicted of fraud, perjury, libel, sedition and other infractions of the law, and for the correction of drunks and vagrants. More serious offences were treated with greater severity.

The stocks was at first used only for male offenders, and women were treated to the ducking-stool—a punishment which consisted in tying the culprit hand and foot to a stool, and either exposing her in some public place or ducking her in water. Later, however, courtesans, common scolds however, courtesans, common scolds and brawlers were put in the pillory

and brawlers were put in the pillory and stocks.

In some cases the heads of the men were shaven and the hair of the women cut off, and the victims were left for hours or even days at a time to the tender mercies of the populace. When in the 17th and 18th centuries political offenders were put in the stocks they were often pelted with eggs and other missiles, and at times subjected to rough usage at the

with eggs and other missiles, and at times subjected to rough usage at the haads of onlookers. On the other hand, there were instances of sympathy having been shown for individuals under punishment at the hands of a tyrannous magistrate.

Offenders such as cheats and pick-pockets, for whom the stocks had no terrors, were frequently whipped in public. The culprit was usually tied to the tail of a cart and drawn through the streets, the executioner hrough the streets, the executioner collowing him closely with his whip. Whipping also was a common form punishment for women sentenced

of punishment for women sentenced to Bridewell Jail.

The pillory had many forms, but the design generally used in England consisted of a frame mounted on a wooden post fixed in a platform raised several feet above the ground, behind which the victim was compelled to stand, with his head and arms protruding through openings pelled to stand, with his head and arms protruding through openings made for them. The stocks was of a somewhat similar character, except that the legs were secured in the openings in the frame. In many places in England those two implements of punishment were combined with a whipping-post.

As the pillory and stocks were the recognized forms of punishment in England until far into the eighteenth century, it was natural that they should be introduced into Upper Can-

hould be introduced into Upper Canada soon after the opening up of the province for settlement.

The law courts in Upper Canada

The law courts in Upper Canada a hundred years ago were surrounded with all the trappings and ceremonial of the highest courts in England. The population was but a mere handful, the court houses were rude log buildings, but the dignity of the courts must be respected, whatever or whoever else might suffer. There was a Vice-Chancellor and a Chief Justice in the court, one or both of whom was usually a knight or baronet, and Chief Justices and barristers galore, all direct importations from Lincoln's Inn, with an Attorney-General and Solicitor-General in the councils and Solicitor-General in the councils of the Lieutenant-Governor at York.
The chief court of the province—the Court of King's Bench — was held in York, the original Parliament held in York, the original Parliament Building at the foot of Berkeley street being used until 1813, and af-ter that, until the erection of the court house at the corner of King and Church streets, an old house was used which stood on Richmond street, where the Confederation Life Building new stands. Building now stands,

The early judges who presided

over these primitive courts were as severe in the administration of the justice laid down in the law of the day as they were punctilious in the enforcement of the rules of dignity enforcement of the rules of dignity and order in the conduct of the courts. Criminals and offenders brought before them got justice—cold, untempered justice—unmixed with mercy. The pillory and stocks were a constant resource in misdemeanors and minor offences, with flogging and branding, and even the gallows for those of a more serious character. In the old Richmond street court house on many occasions prisoners were branded in open court, the iron being heated in the wood stove which heated the room, and the stove which heated the room, and the initial letter of the offence com

burned on the hand of the victim In 1803 Lieutenant-Governor Peter In 1803 Lieutenant-Governor Peter Hunter had set apart by proclamation the six-acre block bounded by Church, King, Jarvis, and Front streets for the use of the people of York for the purpose of a public market for the sale of cattle, meats, poultry and other provisions. This square soon became the centre of the square soon became the centre of the life and activity of the town. It was the rendezvous of the citizens, and especially on market days was a busy and animated spot. Public auctions were held here in the open air, and at a later date the authorities public well in the square and fitted

a public well in the square and fitted it with a town pump.
The market-place, therefore, was the logical spot for the erection of the pillory and stocks, and it is probable, as they were often resorted to, that the farmers from the country-side and the citisens of Yolk and their wives usually found the punishment frames filled on market days with persons sentenced to public exwith persons sentenced to public ex

BEEF HIGHEST IN TORONTO. Removal of duty in the United States has drained Ontario of cattle.

150,000 head of cattle shipped from Bastern Canada to United States within three months.

within three months.

Togonto, December 11.—With choice butcher cattle bringing nine cents per pound, "on the hoof," and with dressed hind-quarters up to 15 cents per pound, Toronto this week has the distinution of being the highest priced primary live stock market in the world.

The manager of one of the oldest and largest packing plant's declares that prices have reached a level here which has made exportation of cattle an impossibility. medie exportation of cattle an impossi-bility.

Buth Chicago and Buffalo are below Toronto this week, and the absolutely necessary local demand in Ontario seems now in the face of the very large curtail-ment in supplies to be sufficiently strong to maintain prices at a level higher than that which prevails at any other centre in.

that which prevails at any other centre in America.

Since the beginning of September fully 150,000 head of cattle have been shipped from Eastern Canada to the United States. The result has been serious for Ontario, because, with the winter months at hand, the entire province seems to have been almost drained of its supplies of beef. The buyers and the selfers on the Toronto markets, to use their own expression, "will be hanged if they know where the cattle for the next two or three months are going to come from."

Sir Lionel Phillips, the leading gold mining magnate of

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, December II.—An attempt was made to-day to assassinate Sir Lionel Phillips, the leading gold mine magnate of South Africa. Three shosts were fired at him.

One bullet lodged in his neck and another in one of his thighs. His condition is declared not to be grave. The would-beassassin was arrested.

The attempt was made while he was walking on Commissioner street. It is supposed to have been an outcome of the blitterness aroused against the mine owners owing to the disastisfaction of the miners in connection with the conditions of settlement of the strike movement in September. At that time a series of riots occurred in which about 100 miners were killed and many wounded when they came into armed conflict with the troops and police.

The grievances of the men were chiefly concerned with the great mortality in the mines and the refusal of the mine owners to recognize the unions. They were eventually forced to accept the owners terms.

Sir Lionel Phillips was closely identified

Sir Lionel Phillips was closely identified with the late Cecil Rhodes and Alfred Belt, who was partner in the firm of Werner Belt & Co. He has lived in Johannesburg since 1839.

In 1898 Sir Lionel was sentenced to death at Pretoria for participating in the Jamsson raid, together with John Hays Samson.

The report, which was followed by a series of resolutions, resurbed in a lengthy discussion, which was participated in by the majority of doctors present, and a number of theories were advanced as to the cause of the epidemic.

Dr. Campbell suggested in his report that the majority of the typhoid cases were due to defective water in the service and in the wells, and the rest were probably caused by contact. The report discussed personal hygiene, sanitary conditions and icoalion of cases, etc., in detail. At the conclusion of the report a warm discussfollowed. One doctor suggested that the epidemic was not due to impure water but to contact. A second maintained that the City by flies. After two hours' discussion. Dr. Campbell's resolutions, with modifications, were adopted, as follows:

"That the Society unanimously resolve that the City Board of Health be advised to make frequent bacteriological and chemical examinations of the water system.

"That the Society cordially endorse the action of the Board of Control."

That this Society favors the proposal to abandon the Chain Lakes water for drinking purposes.

"That a copy of the above resolutions be forwarded to the Board of Health and the Board of Control."
