

EXPECT BUSY SEASON.

Portland, Sept. 11.—Mr. Timothy Ellilot, immigration inspector at this port, returned Monday from Montreal, where he had just delivered to the Canadian authorities an insane immigrant deported from Biddeford. In conversation with steamship officials at Montreal Mr. Ellilot found them all looking forward to a busy season at this port during the coming winter, the freight outlook being especially good. The inward passenger business, however, is likely to fall short of that of last winter for several reasons, one being that at the present time the Canadian Government is instructing its agents in Europe to discourage immigration except in the case of farm laborers and domestic servants, for which there are good opportunities. Another reason is that the White Star-Dominion, Cunard and Allan passenger steamers coming this way, and possibly most of the Canada Line boats, will touch at Halifax to land part of their passengers beforecoming here, so that in all probability nearly one-half of them will go ashore there.






