The Wicked Wife, &c. All in vain—medical skill was baffled, and after a long elaborate investigation, the doctor declared his belief that the foreign substance must have become lodged in the stomach, and found its way into the stomach. British and Foreign. (By Telegraph to Associated Press.)

New York, Dec. 6, p. m. Gold 113; eight exchange 110; money 7 per cent. The daughters of Florence Greeley decline to accept subscriptions for their benefit, having a comfortable competency.

London, Dec. 6. Council 91 1/4; breadstuffs quiet. The waters of the river Arno, as well as those of the Po, have overflowed their banks. Many bridges were swept away, and communities are inundated, causing great destruction of property.

The Governmental situation at Versailles unsettles business of all kinds throughout the country. The committee of thirty formed yesterday by the Assembly is regarded as hostile to the Republic.

President Flourens is expected to resign. The Government will probably make a statement at the opening of the Assembly to-day, as to the course it intends to take.

THE BALLOT. A member of Parliament, Smith, of England, recently returned from the United States, made a speech at Westminster in which he intimated that he had a Bill in Great Britain and the United States.

MORE WATER GRAVES. The ship United, from Quebec to Bristol, had been abandoned at sea, with the loss of eight of her crew.

THE SITUATION AT YEMASSEE. The situation at Yemassee remains for the present unchanged. The committee of thirty has taken some radical measures, and announces a programme which can only lead to disagreement with the Executive. Nothing will be decided before Monday. There has announced that he will not change his policy. The radical press regard the situation as extremely precarious. The Assembly seems likely in one form or another to endure for the present.

A CHANCE TO OBTAIN BREVET. An effort is to be made to have Congress donate land to exiles from Alaska and Louisiana.

The Staffed Diamond Fields. Messrs. Harpending, Rubery and Maurice Dore have testified before the executive committee of the San Francisco Mining Company investigating the diamond fields. Harpending said he went to London in 1871 and thence to Paris. He started for home in April, 1873, in company with Rubery, Hill, Lent and Fargo. They held a consultation with Mr. Barlow in New York about the diamond fields, and it was decided that a party should go from Denver to the fields. Slack and Arnold got lost, but were finally found at the diamond fields, near the dome of the mountains. In three minutes Harpending picked up a large number of diamonds. They staked the ground and then returned to San Francisco, leaving Rubery on the field. Janin has 1000 shares, which he sold to Lent and Harpending for \$40,000. The total value of the shares sold here was \$380,000. One man makes a clean breast of the swindle, and names all parties concerned. The matter is shortly to be presented to the committee a full account of the transactions of himself, Harpending, Ralston, McAllen and others, from the first to the last, with Arnold, Slack and Janin. It is understood that the name of the man who made the confession of the swindle is Cooper, of San Francisco. The gems were purchased in Europe. Arnold, Slack and Cooper realized \$80,000, with which they bought more gems in Europe and sold the ground with them, and then took Janin to the place and picked up diamonds for him. The latter's first report was made, and on the strength of that Lent, Harpending and others invested in the stock. Detectives are on the lookout for the swindlers.
