

The Grand Worthy Patriarch submitted his quarterly report, which he read, and is as follows, viz:—

REPORT OF THE GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH.

Officers and Representatives:

Permit me at the close of the first quarter of my term to present my report. I regret exceedingly that comparatively few County and District Deputies have forwarded a statement by which our condition might be known.

Brother Longley, from Annapolis, says that "six months, perhaps three months ago, only three or four Divisions in the County were reporting regularly, while now there are thirteen; and that the reports from Divisional Deputies are quite satisfactory and hope inspiring." He adds that "we are now enforcing the Canada Temperance Act and that the outlook, both for propagating the Order and enforcing the law, is good." In connection with the work Brother Longley mentions the Grand Worthy Associate, who rendered essential aid. Deputies Nowlan, of Round Hill, and Mills of Granville, were untiring in their efforts to help the cause along.

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From Colchester Brother Layton writes, that the Divisions reporting to him are in good working order, and that "the cause of temperance is steadily gaining ground in the public esteem, and he trusts that when the Canada Temperance Act comes into operation it will be vigorously enforced. In closing his letter he says he "cannot refrain from referring to the great loss sustained by our Order, and by the cause of temperance generally, in the sudden death of one of our veteran Sons of Temperance, Brother Samuel Rettie. He was a charter member of Truro Division, No. 41, organized October 31, 1848, and he has been ever since a consistent and active member, and on all occasions a warm supporter and advocate of the cause of temperance."

Brother Black, of Cumberland, in a neatly prepared report, gives the condition of nine Divisions, which are doing fairly well on the whole. He says that "petitions for the adoption of the Canada Temperance Act are being received from the various parts of the County, satisfactorily signed, and there is no doubt that a majority will ask for its adoption. He says that "the Temperance people of Amherst won quite a victory at the late meeting of the County Council, by obtaining the appointment of their candidate as Clerk of License for the middle district of the County, against strong competition."

Brother Nowlan writes from Westport District, Digby County, that "the Order is in a progressive state, and that Western Star, at Freeport, is doing remarkable work. The greater part of the community are now enrolled under the banner of the Order. They have nearly completed a fine hall, which will be a credit to the Division and an honor to the place."

From Guysboro', Brother Whitman writes rather dolefully. He reports only one Division in his district as in good working order.

Brother Murray, of Halifax County, in a lengthy report shows the cause, on the whole, to be in a healthy condition.

From Hants, East, Brother Blois says that while "only six out of fourteen Divisions have reported, we are doing fairly well, but there is not much aggressive work going on, and the Canada Temperance Act is not being enforced as it ought." He says, "we want a first-class agent and lecturer to arouse the people."

From Hants, West, Dr. McMurray says that the Divisions heard from are meeting regularly, and working harmoniously. He urges the necessity of having a lecturer to visit the district occasionally. He "regrets that the Canada Temperance Act adopted in the County is, to a great extent, inoperative."

Brother Fraser, of Lunenburg County, had not got the reports of the Divisional Deputies when he wrote. He speaks of introducing reading matter into the Divisions, which he thinks will do good.

From East Pictou, Bro. McGregor wrote that he had received reports from only three Divisions. They are doing well, and he believes the others are in good working order. He adds "that the Canada Temperance Act has been in force in the County four weeks, and it has created a great change, especially in the towns of Pictou and New Glasgow, where drunkenness was formerly seen on the streets, while now there is scarcely any of it."

Brother Jost, of Queens, speaks encouragingly of the Divisions reporting to him. Some of them work under great disadvantage in having no hall to meet in. He says "a committee of delegates met at Milton, on the 18th inst., to devise ways and means for enforcing the Canada Temperance Act, and he has no doubt the result will be good. A very large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the evening, which heartily endorsed the objects of the convention."

Bro. Crowell, of Barrington, Shelburne Co., reports the Divisions in his District as doing well. He succeeded in reorganizing Palmerston Division at Wood's Harbor, on the 19th inst., with prospects of doing good work.

Bro. Farnham, of Kings, informs me that he has visited several Divisions in his County, and has received reports from two. Some difficulties had arisen in

two of the Divisions, which he says have been settled. He also writes that Lake Division at Billtown has been resuscitated with 37 members.

Bro. Hutchinson, of Digby, says: "with much reluctance he is compelled to make a very meagre report of the standing of our Order" in his District, and speaks of the need of an active lecturer.

Bro. King says "the trade in rum is again fully established in Antigonish with all its attendant evils," and he recommends "that organized Provincial effort in the field of legal suasion should be made both under the Scott Act and our own License Laws," and predicts that "a Provincial Vigilance Committee would do much to free our Province from the sale of rum." No Division reported in his County.

Of Yarmouth County it may be said that the Divisions are doing fairly well. Some places need special work, and the hope is entertained that many Divisions now off the list may be resuscitated during the year, and that others may be organized where none now exist.

Last week we had quite an accession to our Order. At Brooklyn, about three miles from Yarmouth, a splendid Lodge of Good Templars, with over fifty members, came over in a body to us. The officers were installed on the 26th inst.

During the quarter I have visited in company with Thos. M. Lewis, Esq., the centres of population of eight Counties. New Divisions have been organized, old ones resuscitated, and many, it is hoped, revived. Hundreds were induced to sign the temperance pledge, tracts have been distributed, subscriptions obtained to build halls; and we hope that in all the places visited good has been done.

I have nothing to show what our condition is in Cape Breton, St. Mary's District (Guysboro'), Inverness, or Pictou West. While no report is at hand from Shelburne District, it may be stated from personal observation that the cause in that section is gaining strength.

I refer you to the Grand Scribe, who will furnish information (statistics, &c.), on the state of the Order. The Agency Committee will give full particulars in relation to their department of work, and the Grand Treasurer will report state of the funds.

Anxious to reach the centres of population of all the Counties west of Halifax at a season when storms might be daily expected, our visit to many places where we would have been pleased to meet the friends of our cause, had of necessity to be postponed for the present.

Without going into details I wish to put on record my acknowledgements to the friends who extended hospitality and showed kindness to Mr. Lewis and myself in the places visited on our tour.

Much has been done by this Grand Division to encourage the introduction of the Scott Act in this Province, and I doubt not the friends of our cause everywhere will rejoice if that measure proves successful. As, however, there appear to be great difficulties attending its enforcement, would it not be well to obtain legal information of a reliable character, so that our friends in the several Counties where it is adopted may know how to proceed in conducting cases under it.

I have great pleasure in acknowledging Bro. Hutchings' report; his efforts are being crowned with abundant success.

The Grand Scribe submitted his report, which he read, and is as follows, viz:—

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REPORT OF THE GRAND SCRIBE.

Grand Worthy Patriarch and Representatives:

The activity and remarkable success of our operations in this jurisdiction during the last quarter call for mutual congratulation and devout thanks to the "great Patriarch above." Our grand old Order is distancing all competitors in the race for public sympathy and confidence, and the unusual number of Divisions organized since the Annual Session evinces that the necessity of organizing for the purpose of resisting the influence and power of the rum traffic is every day growing stronger. It seldom falls to the lot of a Grand Division to chronicle such a quarter's progress in every department of our work as it is the privilege of the Grand Scribe to report to this session.

STATISTICS.

The number of Divisions now on the effective roll is 195, showing an increase during the quarter of 36—an increase which is without parallel in our history. Fifteen of these Divisions having been organized before the close of the last term, their returns are embraced in the statistics of the quarter. The whole number of members in the effective Divisions at the end of the last term was 8888—an increase on the quarter of 531.

Of the 134 Divisions which have sent returns 51 show an increase of members, the banner Division being Richmond, No. 237, with an increase of 24. 52 Divisions report a decrease. The largest decrease occurs in those Divisions which have been obliged to suspend work during the summer months on account of the absence of members at sea and elsewhere, and to resume in the early winter with diminished membership.

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supposition prevails that returns should not be sent in until the officers of the quarter are installed, consequently if the installation is delayed the returns are delayed also. The supposition is erroneous and injurious, and no reason can be assigned why returns should not be forwarded immediately after the last meeting of the quarter.

FINANCES.

The amount of *per capita* tax received for the December term is \$409.30, showing an increase of \$87 on the corresponding quarter of last year. Total *per capita* tax received for past quarter is \$485.47. Total receipts for the General Fund \$586.63—an increase of \$48 on the corresponding quarter of last year.

The Grand Division is indebted to Bro. Thomas Hutchings for some very valuable papers obtained by him from P. M. W. P. Morris, and which the Executive, with the concurrence of the committees concerned, has introduced into our work. The most important of these are:—

1. The "Dispensation," which is issued to Divisions at their organization, bearing the names of the applicants, and is returned to the Grand Scribe at the end of three months, with the names of those applicants who had not been initiated erased, when a charter is regularly issued to the Division. The purpose of this paper is to avoid the informality of issuing a charter before the application therefor has been approved by the committee, and also the unseemly disfigurement of the charter by the erasure of names.

2. The "Application for Re-organization" of a dormant or suspended Division, to be signed by eight or more of the old members of the Division—the applicants, in case of the reorganization, to be readmitted with honors unforfeited, and without obligation.

1. Your committee have found great pleasure in their work, as it has been unusually successful. The public mind seems to have been prepared for action in connection with our cause and Order, and the labours of our agents have resulted in the formation and resuscitation of many Divisions, as will be seen in the reports of the Grand Worthy Patriarch and Grand Scribe.

2. Brother Hutchings is now on his third month of employment, and your committee hope that means will be found to keep him continuously employed. Judging from results, past and present, your committee are led to express their belief in the thorough fitness of Brother Hutchings for agency work among the people of this Province.

3. The valuable services of Brother Lewis, unexpectedly obtained, and the unusual amount of assistance given by some of the Grand Officers, have caused a great advance in the numerical strength of our Order, and increase of revenues. Your committee are of opinion that the present time is opportune for continuous and extended agency efforts; and respectfully suggest the advisability of a further grant of two hundred dollars to be used, if necessary, with the advice of the Grand Worthy Patriarch and Grand Scribe, during the present official year.

Rep. Rev. W. G. Lane, from the Committee on the State of the Order, submitted their report, which he read.

The report was considered clause by clause, and finally adopted as amended, and is as follows, viz:—

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF
THE ORDER.

I. Your committee record with devout thankfulness to Almighty God, the success attending the efforts of the Grand Division to overthrow the traffic in intoxicants, than which no greater evil at present exists. The abundant harvest gathered from all classes of society during the past quarter gives us the hope that the time is indeed drawing nigh when the most abominable trafficker in human souls will be altogether banished from the land.

II. With 195 Divisions and 8888 members, we have now a stronger lever upon social reform than for many years past, and there is no reason why the vices abhorrent in the drink traffic should not soon be removed from our midst; the end is being reached slowly but surely, we see it in the 531 names enrolled in our records during the past quarter. Yet, amid all this exultation, there is one thought of sadness: there were 1292 initiations during that period! Where, then, are the 761 whose names have been erased or dropped? The recorded violations of the pledge are considerably below the usual average of temperance organizations, still they are far too many. The number of new Divisions is larger than ever before in our history.

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III. The good financial condition of the Order is a cause for thankfulness. The flourishing condition of the agency work is due to the earnest, self-sacrificing labors of the Grand Worthy Patriarch and the Lecturers, Bros. Lewis and Hutchings.

IV. The blanks referred to in the Grand Scribe's report fill a long-felt want. Your committee recommend their adoption by this Grand Division, and thus legalize and confirm the action of the Grand Executive.

VI. That portion of the G. W. Patriarch's report relative to legal advice concerning the Scott Act is respectfully referred to the Grand Division.

VII. We recommend that the location of Mountain Side Division, as per Grand Scribe's report, be changed from St. Margaret's Bay to Ingram River.

VIII. We feel the necessity for renewed earnestness; let not one effort be relaxed. The deadly footfall of man's greatest foe is yet heard in the halls of the rich, in the houses of the poor, and on every hand the victims of unrestrained passion go down to a grave made terrible by its consequences. Let our motto be *Labor omnia vincit*—labor conquers all things—for surely labor, sanctified to soul saving, cannot fail in the accomplishment of its high and holy purpose.

FINANCES.

Of the 203 Divisions on the roll, 149 have paid *per capita* tax for the last quarter, 12 new Divisions are exempt, according to usage, and 42, of which 8 are supposed to be not working, have failed to come up to time. The amount of *per capita* tax received for the March quarter is \$584.86—nearly \$100 in advance of the previous quarter. The receipts for supplies are \$180,—an increase of 80 per cent. on the previous quarter. The total receipts for the General Fund are \$763.29—an advance of \$176.66 on those of the previous quarter.

AGENCY.

The agency work, in the hands of our valued agents, Bro. Thomas Hutchings and Bro. T. M. Lewis, has been carried on during the quarter with great energy and success. The total receipts of the fund for the quarter are \$542.06, and would have been considerably larger had not Brother Lewis been obliged to desist from work on account of illness, which laid him aside for several weeks. The reports of the agents will be laid before the Grand Division.

OUR ORGAN.

The *Watchman* continues to maintain its high character, and it is a cause of deep regret that of 203 Divisions in the jurisdiction not more than 76 seem to realize the importance of supporting it. The publisher is deserving of the thanks of the Grand Division, not only for hundreds of copies of the paper gratuitously furnished to Divisions which do not subscribe for it, thus supplying them with official notices which otherwise would have to be sent to them in circular form, but also for the efficient service which he rendered to the Order and to the cause of temperance by manfully exposing the tactics of the liquor dealers during the recent discussion on the proposed amendments to the license law on the floor of the assembly—an exposure which, it is well understood, largely contributed to the rejection of the measure by the House. Brother Halliday is no discredit to New Caledonia Division, No. 14, in which he received his early training.

TEMPERANCE TEXT BOOK.

In accordance with a resolution adopted at the last annual session, the Grand Division Executive memorialized the Council of Public Instruction respecting the introduction of a temperance text book in the public schools of this Province, and the Grand Scribe is happy to inform the Grand Division that their request has been granted. A copy of the Memorial and of the Minute in Council in reply will be laid before the Grand Division.

IN MEMORIAM.

The Grand Scribe regrets to have to report the death of the oldest Past Grand Worthy Patriarch in the jurisdiction, Brother WILLIAM BURRELL, of Milton Division, No. 4,—a brother who had been identified with the Order since its introduction into this Province, and one whose high character and estimable qualities challenged universal respect. He died on the 9th instant, aged 80 years.

The Grand Worthy Patriarch submitted his quarterly report, which he read and is as follows, viz:—

REPORT OF GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH.

Officers and Representatives :

Thankful that a kind Providence has enabled us to meet once more in quarterly session to review the past and plan for the future, we would also congratulate each other in that we are permitted on this occasion to meet our distinguished brother M. W. P., Benjamin R. Jewell, chief executive officer of our Order for North America, and that we have thus the opportunity of exchanging "the greetings of an exalted friendship."

Referring to our work during the quarter, it is quite possible we may not have been quite as aggressive as in the previous quarter, or as much so as we had wished. This need surprise no one. Special efforts were put forth during the first quarter which could not be continued during the winter months.

Strongly impressed with the importance of employing competent agents, the hope is cherished that the committee will be sustained in their desire to carry on their department of work. Much as we desire legal enactments, there is so much uncertainty about legislation that it will not do to depend to any great extent on these alone. Only recently, it would seem, the Dominion Government were about to submit for the consideration of Parliament some licensing scheme not at all assuring to the friends of prohibition. And our local House of Assembly, while deserving all praise in refusing to change the law in favour of the holders of licenses, won no laurels in their attempt to tamper with the alcohol question.

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The following are extracts from reports of County and District Deputies :—

Antigonish.—Deputy King reports only one Division in operation in the County. He says, “temperance principles are rather in the ascendant. Considerable activity is manifested by the new Clerk of License, quite a number having been fined for violation of the law.”

Annapolis.—Deputy Longley says, “The change which has taken place in respect to the status of the Order in this County since the beginning of the fiscal year is very noteworthy, and of a very satisfactory character. Six months ago it was difficult to tell how many Divisions were in working order in this County. Three only reported to me regularly. Now there are fifteen on the roll, eleven of which have reported in such a way as to convey the impression that they are working actively and well. Our membership has been nearly quadrupled.” Brother Longley speaks hopefully in respect to the enforcement of the law..

Cape Breton.—Deputy Johnson of North Sydney gives a rather gloomy picture of his district. The Scott Act is not enforced. He hopes a lecturer will visit them.

Deputy McLennan says the Divisions are doing their usual work, but have not succeeded in getting convictions under the Scott Act.

Colchester.—Deputy Layton speaks encouragingly of the Order in his County. Brother Hutchings having organized a number of new Divisions and resuscitated several old ones. A fund has been secured to enforce the Scott Act, and a convention held in March manifested a strong determination to proceed with the work vigorously.

Cumberland.—Deputy Black speaks encouragingly of his County, and describes in glowing terms Brother Hutchings' agency work.

Digby.—Brother Hutchinson, writes hopefully of his District. Better attendance is reported and the Scott Act is being enforced with a good degree of success.

Westport District.—No report.

Guysboro'.—Deputy McDonald has little to say of the work in Sherbrook. No division is in working order. Very little intemperance is to be seen. Deputy Whitman writes from Manchester that intemperance has increased to an alarming extent in some sections. He speaks of the division at the Intervale as working well.

Halifax.—Deputy Murray has a carefully prepared report in which he says the Order is in a better condition in the County than it has been for some time past. He speaks of Brother Lewis' visit as having been attended with good results.

Hants.—Dr. McMurray says in his report, “perhaps I may say with some good measure of confidence that our Order in West Hants, taken as a whole, was never in better working order than it is at the present time.” Bro. Blois of Gore reports the Divisions heard from as doing fairly well. He says an agent is needed to arouse the people.

Inverness.—No report from this County.

Kings.—Deputy Farnham thinks that the tide in his County has turned in our favor. He states that the Order is in a healthy condition, that the Scott Act is being enforced, and that a prominent man told him “that the sale of rum had been reduced one-half.”

Lunenburg.—Rev. Brother Fraser has an encouraging report from his County. Temperance sentiment has increased and the law is being enforced. He speaks of Bro. Lewis' visit as having given the cause a stimulus.

Pictou.—Deputy McDonald has little that is cheering to report of his District. The Scott Act is not being enforced.

Deputy McGregor says the Scott Act is being enforced in his district and that the Order is in a healthy condition.

Queens.—Rev. Bro. Jost reports the Divisions as doing fairly well. He regrets that the law is not being enforced, and "there is evidence that intoxicating drinks are illegally sold in many places."

Shelburne.—Deputy Crowell, of Barrington District, reports the Divisions in good working order.

No Report from Shelburne District.

Yarmouth.—While the cause of temperance has a firm hold on the people, all the Divisions cannot be said to be in a flourishing condition, especially in the Town. Other temperance organizations claim a share of attention. It is hoped the visit of the M. W. P., will awaken a deeper interest in our work. His reception by the people of Yarmouth was enthusiastic in its character.

Bro. Hutchings' report reached me too late for extended notice. He is doing grand and successful work. Bro. Lewis has been engaged in labors abundant. Regretting that his work was interrupted for a time during the quarter through sickness, it is a matter of thankfulness that he is again able to engage in the work.

Since my last report death has visited our family. My elder brother William Burrell, P. G. W. P., and a member of the National Division, exchanged worlds on the ninth of April in the eighty-first year of his age. Until within a few weeks of his departure he attended regularly his Division. It may be said of him, he "ceased at once to work and live," and that "he lay like a warrior taking his rest, with his martial cloak around him."

I must again refer you to the Grand Scribe for particulars on the State of the Order.

Taking a survey of the whole field of our operations the outlook is hopeful, and the friends of our cause everywhere may thank God and take courage. With the hope that our present session shall be promotive of great and lasting good,

YARMOUTH, 13 Aug., 1883.

Officers and Members of the G. D., S. of T., N. S.:

WORTHY BROTHERS,—

I regret exceedingly that ill health prevented me from attending the recent session at Cow Bay. In your kind letter of sympathy through the Grand Scribe I am glad to notice you had a harmonious and profitable session. And I sincerely hope that as the result of your deliberations an influence will go out that shall tell against the manufacture and sale of strong drink in our Province. Let our best efforts be put forth against a traffic which is the great hindrance to our material, moral, and religious progress.

Delegates from our Grand Division attended the session of the N. D. at Ocean Grove 11th ult. Their report will appear in due form for publication. After an exciting ballot it was decided to hold the next session of the supreme body in Halifax. No doubt the brethren at our Capital will vie with each other in making the session of 1884 in every way a success. The changes in our laws are given in a circular by the M. W. S. which will be published for general information. It was pleasing to meet representatives from the United States and British Provinces, assembled to promote the harmony and advance the interests of our Order. To me it was especially gratifying to meet such veterans as Generals Cary and Dow, the one an orator of the first rank, and the other a hero in the work of prohibition.

Occasionally I get a line from a Brother in relation to the enforcement or non-enforcement of the Law. It will be found that the Law will be enforced or not, just in proportion as our people are educated up to the principles of total-abstinence. Hence I look upon the competent propagating agent as a necessity in our work. Your attention is invited to the report of the committee charged with this department of our operations.

Owing to lack of information from County and District Deputies, (for I have only heard from six,) I am unable to give you a statement showing the condition of our cause. I again refer you to the report of our worthy Grand Scribe for particulars.

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The Grand Scribe submitted his report, which he read, and is as follows, viz :—

REPORT OF THE GRAND SCRIBE.

Officers and Representatives :

After an interval of two years the Grand Division again assembles in the fine old County of Cape Breton, a County whose beautiful scenery, natural resources and historic associations render it an object of attraction both to friends at home and strangers abroad. Though these two years have not materially affected the status of our Order in this County, they have produced commanding results throughout this jurisdiction as a whole. The period of remarkable prosperity inaugurated by our present Grand Worthy Patriarch and our two zealous travelling agents, knows no other interruption than that which arises from the season of the year which calls so many of the inhabitants of the country into the active labors of the field or to the distant fishing grounds. The absence from home of hundreds of our members at this period not only interferes with the labors of our agents in the field but leads necessarily to the temporary suspension from active work of numbers of our Divisions. It will be a matter of surprise, therefore, as well as of congratulation, that the Grand Scribe is able to report an increase in our effective strength, during the last quarter, of no less than *nine hundred and fifty-six* members.

4. Crystal Gem, No. 537, located in Fenwick, Cumberland Co., organized, May 30, by Deputy Thos. Hutchings, Grand Division Agent, with 33 charter members.

5. Highland, No. 538, located in Highland Village, Colchester Co., organized, June 12, by Deputy Rev. Benjamin Hills, with 28 charter members.

6. Lunenburg Rock, No. 539, located in Lunenburg, organized July 12, by Deputy Rev. D. Stiles Fraser, with 40 charter members.

DIVISIONS RESUSCITATED.

The following Divisions have been re-organized, the former one of the two after several years inactivity, viz:—

CHARTER SURRENDERED.

Lunenburg Division, No. 458, which had for some time held but a struggling existence, surrendered its charter on the 11th inst., in order that its members might unite with another society in applying for a charter to open a new Division to be called Lunenburg Rock Division, No. 539. An application having been made to the Executive for the transfer of the property of late Lunenburg Division, No. 458 to Lunenburg Rock Division, No. 539, the necessary authorization was given for the desired transfer, on the issue of the charter to organize the new Division; which action will require the confirmation of this Grand Division.

DUPLICATE CHARTER.

Richmond Division, No. 237, having sustained a severe loss by the destruction of their charter and a portion of their property by fire, an application was made to the Executive for a duplicate charter, which was granted free of charge; which action will also require the confirmation of this Grand Division.

FINANCES.

151 Divisions have paid *per cap.* tax for the quarter ending June 30, amounting in the aggregate to \$519,78, which is in advance of the preceding quarter, though that quarter has been usually considered the best in the year. The total *per cap.* tax (including arrears for preceding quarter) is \$610,66, which is \$25 in advance of *per cap.* tax receipts of previous quarter, and \$173,56 in advance of those for corresponding quarter of last year. The amount of cash on hand (including \$400 placed in the Savings' Bank, and accumulating interest) is \$762, 29. The Grand Division is thus rapidly acquiring resources, which will put it in a position, with the co-operation of the Order at large, to do a grand work for the cause in this Province during the coming winter.

STOCK DEPARTMENT.

The stock department of the Grand Division is developing to proportions which render it a most important branch of the Grand Scribe's work. The office can now supply Subordinate Divisions with all the books they require for all purposes, and at a much cheaper rate than books less suited for their work can be purchased for elsewhere. The supply blanks ordered by the Grand Division at last quarterly session to be prepared for the use of Divisions in ordering supplies, are working well and enable the Audit Committee to extend thorough investigation to the accounts

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of this department. The receipts for the last quarter for supplies are \$118,41--more than double the receipts for the corresponding quarter of last year.

AGENCY.

The agency work of the Grand Division is still being vigorously prosecuted, though necessarily under disadvantages at this season of the year. The reports of the Agency Committee and of the travelling agents will be laid before this Grand Division. The receipts of the last quarter for the Agency Fund are \$468,19, about \$75 less than those of the previous quarter—a decrease which it is not difficult to account for. The Agency Committee are now destitute of funds, and earnestly appeal to the Order for help, that they may not be obliged to withdraw their agents from the field before the Annual Session.

NATIONAL DIVISION.

The National Division of North America held its session at Ocean Grove, N. J., on 12th inst., and following days. The Grand Division of Nova Scotia was represented at that session by our Grand Worthy Patriarch and Bros. R. T. Murray, Rev. G. O. Huestis, and William Foster. The report of the delegation will be laid before this Grand Division. The Order will be glad to know that the application of the Grand Division of Nova Scotia for the National Division session of 1884 has been granted, and that in July next we shall have the opportunity of welcoming to the City of Halifax, the distinguished members of the highest branch of the Order.

In conclusion, invoking the earnest attention of the members of the Grand Division to the business before us, and trusting that this session will confer lasting benefits on the Order in Cape Breton, I submit this report

Your committee have secured Brother Hutchings for continuance of labor, and he is now on the island of Cape Breton. 2. We regret the unavoidable absence of our G.W.P., and that in consequence we are without his report.

3. We find, from the report submitted by the Grand Scribe, that there has been, for the season of the year, unprecedented increase in the membership, and an improvement in the activity of the Subordinate Divisions, manifested by a greater promptness in forwarding returns, which may be attributed, in a large measure, to the excellent management of our Grand Scribe, and the energy of the D. G. W. P.s.

4. We are pleased to learn that the stock department of the Grand Division is in a greatly improved condition, which will render it valuable to the Subordinate Divisions, enabling them to secure more suitable supplies and at a cheaper rate; and we recommend that all Divisions procure their supplies from the Grand Scribe.

The Grand Worthy Patriarch submitted his report, which he read, and is as follows, viz:—

GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH'S REPORT.

TO THE G. D., S. OF T., OF N. S.:

Officers and Representatives,—

A kind Providence has again permitted a goodly number of us to meet in annual session. It is a matter of thankfulness that the friends of temperance, from so wide a field, can thus assemble to take counsel with each other as to the means best adapted to carry on the work. Since our last annual meeting, special efforts have been put forth all along the line, on the success of which we may congratulate each other. Besides adding over four thousand, or fifty per cent, to our membership, a healthier sentiment prevails everywhere. Languishing Divisions have been revived, many that were dormant have been resuscitated, and a large number of new Divisions have been added to our list.

From time to time our agents, Bros. Hutchings and Lewis, have reported their doings, from whom, and from other reliable sources, it would seem as if the whole country had been stirred from centre to circumference.

With a view of forming a general idea of our position, the following extracts from County and District Deputies' reports are given:

From Antigonish the outlook is by no means cheerful. Only one Division in that populous county, and that one feeble. Bro. King says: "The sale of liquor is almost unrestricted" and he recommends "a central bureau in Halifax, to conduct prosecutions."

Annapolis has sprung from seeming inactivity to prosperity at a bound. Bro. Longley states that "a number of convictions under the Scott Act have already taken place, and more are to follow; several fines have been paid, and upon the whole," he says, "we can report the outlook in this county as somewhat encouraging, both in regard to the enforcement of the law and the general progress of the cause." A year since three Divisions were struggling in that County, now there are five or six times that number in good working order.

It would appear our Order is the only temperance organization in North Sydney District, C. B., and it is beset with difficulties. The Deputy says: "unfortunately those filling positions of influence either sympathise openly with the rum power, or look on with indifference." It is hoped a brighter day will soon dawn on North Sydney.

From Sydney we hear of Bro. Hutchings and his successful work, where he has organized three new Divisions and one Band of Hope. Deputy McLennan informs us that most of the old Divisions are doing well. The Scott Act is not enforced, which is to be regretted, as a good deal of liquor is sold.

Of Colchester, Bro. Layton, the Deputy, says: "Upon the whole the Divisions are in good working order, and the cause is at least holding its own in the county. The prosecutions under the Scott Act, commenced some time since, are still pending in our courts of law."

Cumberland has adopted the Scott Act, but Deputy Black hints that there may be trouble with the enemy; he says the order is maintaining its way. A new Division will have been formed this week. Bro. Black is always prompt, and his report coming so neatly tabulated, he may be styled a model Deputy.

Bro. Hutchinson gives a very full and satisfactory report of Digby District; the Order in that Section is doing well, and while no report is received from West-

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port District,—Deputy Nowlan having removed to Annapolis County—good evidence is furnished that the order is flourishing there. Bro. Lewis' visit to the County was eminently successful. Perhaps in no part of the field has improvement been more marked than in Weymouth, Digby County. A year ago no temperance organization existed there; since then an old Division has been set to work, and a new Division organized which would do credit to any community; the Deputy says: "its membership is 99, with an average attendance of 70 zealous workers."

From Guysboro', in Bro. Whitman's district, there is nothing cheering. He has been presenting the great theme before the people and obtaining names to the pledge. Bro. McDonald speaks hopefully of the cause in his section.

Bro. Murray gives a very encouraging report of Halifax City and County. The City Divisions have especially done much to mould public opinion in favor of our cause. Their action in relation to the introduction of temperance Text Books into our schools, should commend itself to every right thinking mind. It is pleasing to note that already arrangements are being made to make the meeting of the N. D. in 1884 a grand success.

Dr. McMurray, in reporting of West Hants, remarks that "the Divisions reported are doing fairly well." But in respect to the Scott Act he says: "the obstructions by legal quibbling have had a disheartening effect upon some ardent friends of prohibition. The prosecutions which were commenced several months since are still pending, to be argued before the Judges of the Supreme Court in December; hence the traffic is spreading, and is carried on with unblushing effrontery, without an effort being put forward to arrest it." The cry for a lecturer is urgent.

From East Hants Bro. Blois gives reports from eight Divisions which are working in a proper manner, and generally fraternal. He says the people are not as interested in the cause as they should be. The Scott Act is not operated successfully.

Of Kings, Dep. Farnham writes that the most of the Divisions are holding their numbers fairly. Speaking of the Scott Act he says it is all they require—not having lost a single case, when the papers were correct, since Judge Thompson's decision in the case of Mr. Fadden. He complains that the decision referred to is not sufficiently known by our Order generally. To show the success attending the prosecutions, a brother told him not a glass of liquor could be bought in Wolfville; in other places quite on the sly.

Bro. Fraser, Deputy for Lunenburg County, has a picture to present which is more doleful than cheering. Much agency work was done and many public meetings were held, which doubtless for the time did much good; but he is not hopeful as to its permanency. "At present," he says, "Liquor is sold all over the county without hindrance, and in some places peddled from house to house. If those in authority are urged to prosecute, they will in most cases either stand upon their dignity and declare that they are not bound to do so, or they will refuse to act at all."

From West Pictou Deputy McDonald gives a report, which, on the whole, is encouraging. He speaks of Bro. Lewis' visit and hopes for good results. Bro. McGregor, of East Pictou, refers to Bro. Lewis' work, and gives a very hopeful review of the operations by the Divisions in his District, saying he is pleased to know that the cause is gaining in the county. The Scott Act has been in force for nine months and is working as well as could be expected. Forty convictions have been obtained, six of the parties served two months each in prison, two paid \$50.00, each, fines, the remainder have either appealed, or taken up cases by *certiorari*.

Of Queens, Bro. Jost says the Divisions reported continue working, but are not very active in promoting the interests of the Order. An effort was made to enforce the Scott Act in Liverpool, but an appeal was taken and the ultimate decision was not reached.

From Barrington, Shelburne County, Deputy Crowell reports only part of the Divisions. They are doing (he says) fairly well. A lecturer is needed (he says) in his District.

Of a part of East Shelburne Deputy Locke has rather dull tidings. In some places, notably Shelburne Town, intemperance prevails and the illegal sale of intoxicants goes on with scarcely any effort to prevent it. On the other hand, he gives cheering words of Lockeport. Of Star Division he says: "our membership is increasing, attendance better than it has been for years. They have established a monthly public meeting under the supervision of the Division, and these have been very interesting,—resulting already in some accessions to the Division."

There is no report from Inverness. Of Yarmouth, last but not least, it may be said the cause is firm. One new Division was formed the first part of the year, another was formed last week. Efforts are at present being put forth to adopt the Scott Act. Many of the friends who preferred the local law are led to look to the Scott Act as a matter of expediency. If Dominion legislation must take the place of Provincial in dealing with the question (which some doubt), then the people of Yarmouth, it is believed, will adopt the Canada Temperance Act rather than the license law just enacted. In a county where no licenses have been granted for nearly forty years, the prospect of licenses being obtained by *one third* of the voters, is ominous of evil.

During the first quarter of the year many of the counties were visited officially in company with Bro. Lewis. It was intended to visit every county, but sickness and other unavoidable circumstances prevented the carrying out of this plan.

If a systematic visitation is undertaken by the G. W. P., the coming year, the present incumbent can give assurance of kind courtesies and generous treatment. And while the self-imposed task may at times be arduous, it will afford real substantial enjoyment.

Bro. Hutchings has furnished a carefully prepared report, and Bro. Lewis has given an account of his labors. As part of these have been published, and all will appear in due form, it is not thought necessary to reproduce the facts and figures here.

A report of the representatives to the N. D., will be presented. The G. S. and Treasurer will report to you our numerical strength and financial condition. And the Agency Committee will, as usual, report in connection with their department of the work.

Trusting that wise counsels shall prevail in all our deliberations, and that our meeting together may be promotive of much good,

The present session of the Grand Division, by reason of the numbers in attendance, the constituencies which they represent, and the gravity of the questions to be considered, will doubtless be one of the most important in our history. The

The following Divisions, having failed to make returns and payments to the

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Grand Division for four consecutive quarters, have been suspended, viz:—Poplar Grove, No. 380, Happy Home, No. 411, and Temperance Banner, No. 441, with an aggregate membership of 86.

FINANCES.

162 Divisions have paid *per capita* tax for the quarter ending Sept. 30. 14 are exempt, according to usage, leaving a large number of delinquent Divisions. A large proportion of these, however, have not yet resumed operations after their summer's rest, or have done so with a depleted or exhausted treasury. The receipts for *per capita* tax during the quarter are \$691.49, nearly a hundred dollars in advance of the previous quarter, and \$226 in advance of the corresponding quarter of last year. The receipts for supplies are \$161.11, an increase of \$43 on the previous quarter, and seven times the amount received for the corresponding quarter of last year.

PROGRESS OF A YEAR.

The grand march of our Order through this Province during the past year—a triumphal progress which has raised the temperance sentiment of the country to a higher graduation, excited the emulation of rival organizations, and kindled the loftiest enthusiasm throughout our Order in the jurisdiction—it would be impossible to chronicle within the limits of this report. The following comparative statement, however, will give an intelligent idea of the advancement which has been made, viz:—

66 new Divisions have been organized during the year, and 24 old Divisions have been resuscitated. 7381 persons have been initiated in our Order during the year, and the losses yet constitute a problem which demands the gravest consideration of the Grand Division.

Any record of the year's progress of our Order in this jurisdiction would be deficient in the essential principle of common justice, did it not recognize, and give due prominence to, the prodigious labors of our agents in the field, Bros. Thos. Hutchings and T. M. Lewis, and to the zeal, energy and unprecedented self-sacrifice of our Grand Worthy Patriarch, Bro. Joseph Burrell, who, in the early part of the year, devoted the whole of his time to the work of the Order.

STOCK DEPARTMENT.

The stock department of the Grand Division, as is evident from the above comparative statement, has grown to such proportions that it has become a most important and remunerative part of our work. Stock hitherto purchased from abroad is now made to order in Halifax, and can be sold at greatly reduced prices. Outfits are made up for new Divisions and sets of books for old Divisions, which, sold at a discount, are in considerable demand, and have the advantage of being adapted to our Division work.

NATIONAL DIVISION.

Official papers containing the constitutional amendments and decisions made at the late session of the National Division have been received, and sent out to the Divisions. 2500 copies of the amendments have been printed and a copy sent to each Deputy and Division, and also attached, as an additional leaf, to the constitutions in stock. The Journals of the National Division have been received at an

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earlier date than usual and have been distributed in the usual manner. A circular from the Most Worthy Patriarch, soliciting contributions to the National Division Propagation Fund, has also been received and forwarded to the Divisions, but up to this date only three or four Divisions have responded. Resolutions on this subject, adopted by two of the city Divisions, will be laid on the Table.

DUPLICATE CHARTER.

Dawn of Light Division, No. 391, having lost their hall and Division property by fire, made an application to the Executive for a duplicate charter and sett of books, which was granted, free of charge, which action will require the confirmation of the Grand Division.

AGENCY.

The report of the Agency Committee will be looked for with great interest by this Grand Division, as it seldom falls to the lot of that committee to report such a splendid career of success as the agents under their direction have run. It is a matter of congratulation, and to some, a matter of surprise that two travelling agents should have been kept in the field the whole year round, and their expenses met, except some \$23 overdrawn on the Grand Treasurer, and a portion of one month's salary still due Mr. Hutchings—a deficit which this annual session will no doubt provide for. The receipts at the Grand Scribe's office during the last quarter for this fund have amounted to only \$21.30.

OFFICIAL ORGAN.

The affairs of the official organ will require the serious consideration of this Grand Division. The paper has been published during the year at considerable personal expense to Brother Halliday, and the accumulating debts due by Divisions and subscribers for the paper are creating an amount of embarrassment which he ought not to be obliged to suffer.

In conclusion, trusting that the proceedings of this session will be distinguished by a gravity and harmony proportioned to our high responsibilities, and that we shall be divinely guided in our preparations for a most vigorous and successful campaign during the coming winter, I submit this report,

Rep. R. J. Wilson, from the Committee on Juvenile Organizations, submitted their report, which he read, and is as follows, viz :—

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON JUVENILE ORGANIZATIONS.

GRAND DIVISION ROOM, HALIFAX, N. S., October 31, 1883.

Grand Worthy Patriarch and Representatives :

The Committee on Juvenile Organizations beg to report: They have received no statistics or information relative to the Cadets of Temperance; they fear, however, that that branch of our work is not in a flourishing condition. This is to be regretted, as, if well managed, the Section forms a very valuable link between the Band of Hope, consisting of children, and the Division, composed chiefly of grown persons.

The committee are happy, on the other hand, to report the receipt of returns from eighteen Bands of Hope, with a membership of twelve hundred and six. Eight of these have been organized since the last annual meeting of the Grand Division—the junior thus keeping pace with the senior branch of our Order. Of these, four with a membership of six hundred and forty-one, are located in the City of Halifax. The banner Band, in numbers, as well as in age, is the "Rosebud,"

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nineteen years old, with a roll of three hundred and eighty eight; the next in order is "Southern Star," which, although only two years old, numbers one hundred members.

The great drawback with the juvenile branches of our organization is the difficulty of securing competent adult managers, willing to give necessary time to the Band and Section meetings. In this respect the country Divisions labor under a greater disadvantage than those located in the city, but even there the committee think that the difficulty may be, in a great measure, obviated if the Divisions could enlist the school teachers of their respective districts in the temperance cause; this would at once give a staff of persons trained in the management of youth, and who, if their sympathies were enlisted, as they should be, with this as with every other moral movement, would wield an almost unbounded influence.

The committee submit, herewith, a tabulated abstract of the returns received from the Bands of Hope, comparing very favorably with that of last year.*

In addition to the Bands connected with our own organization, the committee are glad to learn that there are a number connected with the various churches. To all such as are engaged in the same good cause as ourselves, the committee extend their cordial sympathies and best wishes.

Rep. R. T. Murray, P. G. W. A., submitted the report of the representatives to the late session of the National Division, which he read, and is as follows, viz:—

REPORT OF REPRESENTATIVES TO THE NATIONAL DIVISION.

HALIFAX, Oct. 30, 1883.

THE OFFICERS AND MEMBERS OF THE GRAND DIVISION:

Worthy Brothers.—The delegates from this Grand Body to the 39th annual session of the National Division, have the honor to submit a brief report of the proceedings thereat.

The session was held at the town of Ocean Grove, New Jersey, commencing at 10 o'clock on Wednesday, the 11th of July, and ending at 4, p. m. on the 13th. At the opening there were 74 representatives present, from 21 Grand Divisions, and 20 were initiated during the session, representing 13 Grand Divisions. Others arrived after the sessions were commenced, and the total number of representatives was 129, from 24 Grand Divisions. Of these, 95 remained till the close, and these answered the roll.

The Brothers resident adjacent to the place of meeting exerted themselves to make the stay of the visiting members pleasant, and succeeded to an extent which earned for them the unanimous thanks of the Division in regular session.

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The returns as submitted by the Most Worthy Scribe showed a very gratifying improvement in the position of the Order, and it was with pardonable pride that we heard our own jurisdiction spoken of as the "banner," the figures following Nova Scotia in the tabulated returns being large where increase and prosperity were indicated, but comparatively infinitesimal where the reverse was to be shown.

The returns showed a net gain of 12 per cent., the membership being 55,860, as compared with 49,732 for the previous year.

As a comparatively full report of the proceedings at the session has already appeared in the columns of our official organ, the *Watchman*, the necessity for any lengthened statement at this time does not appear to exist, as the presumption is that all who desire to know the history of the Order, its progress and otherwise, are readers of that paper, and as a consequence are in possession of the facts.

We therefore content ourselves now with appending hereto the official digest of the business as prepared by the Most Worthy Scribe, and circulated among the members. It is as follows, viz:—

DECISIONS.

Ball ballots should be used in suspending members of a Subordinate Division. A druggist or druggist's clerk can become a member of the Order if otherwise qualified, provided he sells alcohol only for medicinal or mechanical purposes, but never as a beverage.

A Division has not the right, after suspending a member indefinitely for non-payment of dues, to suspend him, for the same offence, for a definite period of time. Nor can it vote to reinstate such suspended member, the reinstatement to take effect only after the lapse of several months—[or at any future time].

Grand Divisions have authority to admit as a member a person whose name does not appear on the credentials from his Division, provided there be competent evidence before the Grand Division that the person was duly elected a representative; and the Grand Scribe shall, at once, return the credentials to said Division for correction.

AMENDMENTS TO CODE.

Chap. V., Sec. 2. Amended by adding after the word "him" in the fourth line, the words, "or may, after charge and trial, expel him."

Chap. V. The following was added as a new section:

Sec. 3. "A vote of suspension shall always be taken by [ball] ballot. Upon the reinstatement of a member who has been suspended for non-payment of dues, the Financial Scribe shall, in open Division, call the attention of the Worthy Patriarch to the matter, and the Worthy Patriarch shall direct the Recording Scribe to note the fact upon the minutes. All Subordinate Divisions that have been notified of the suspension shall be notified of the reinstatement."

Chap. VI., Sect 2. Amended by adding, "And, should a member retained on such second ballot fail to appear for re-obligation within thirty days after such ballot, then the Worthy Patriarch shall declare the member expelled."

AMENDMENTS TO CONSTITUTIONS.

Part VI. Constitution of National Division, was amended by adding a section, defining the duty of Trustees, to take possession of and hold property, to prosecute and defend suits and collect monies, as therein specifically directed.

Rule XVII. Constitution of Grand Division, was amended to read as follows:

"Rule XVII. Any Division neglecting to make quarterly returns and payment of *per capita* tax for two consecutive quarters shall be disqualified from voting in the Grand Division, and the members of such Division shall stand suspended from all the rights and privileges of the Order until said returns and payments are made. Provided, that, if any Division neglects to make returns and payment of

per capita tax for four consecutive quarters, the Grand Worthy Patriarch, unless otherwise ordered by the Grand Division, shall declare the charter of such Division annulled."

SUBORDINATE DIVISIONS WITHOUT A GRAND DIVISION.

A recommendation of the Committee on Constitutions was adopted, providing that, in case of the suspension of the Charter of a Grand Division, for the lack of a sufficient number of Subordinate Divisions, the Most Worthy Patriarch may, if he deems it best, at the request of remaining Subordinate Divisions, attach them to the jurisdiction of some other Grand Division.

REGALIA AND EMBLEMS NOT CHANGED.

Propositions to allow a cheaper form of emblem for officers of Subordinate Divisions, and to substitute a badge for the white regalia, were rejected—the latter by a vote of 72 for rejection, and none against.

CADETS OF TEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Cadets was discharged. The Most Worthy Scribe was instructed to provide all blanks necessary for the proper work of the Cadets; to give notice, by circular, to the several Grand Divisions that Ritual and other necessary books can be obtained, and urged upon them prompt and persistent efforts for the organization of Sections in their respective jurisdictions; also to report at the next session.

THE RED BOOK.

Several changes were made in the Red Book, or Grand Division Ritual, requiring the publication of a new edition, which will probably be for sale in September.

PROPAGATION FUND.

The sum of thirteen hundred and thirty-five dollars was pledged by individuals, and on behalf of Grand Divisions, for the National Division Propagation Fund, in addition to three hundred and eleven dollars which had been previously pledged to the Most Worthy Patriarch. Three hundred and ten dollars were paid in on the pledges as they were given.

A recommendation of the Committee on the State of the Order was adopted, as follows: "We also recommend that each Subordinate Division be invited and urged to take a collection for the benefit of the National Division Propagation Fund, on or about the 29th day of September, 1883, the forty-first anniversary of the formation of the Order."

NATIONAL DIVISION ANNIVERSARY.

The fortieth anniversary of the organization of the National Division occurring on June 17th, 1884, it was voted that Past Most Worthy Patriarch, Sir S. L. TILLEY, of the Grand Division of New Brunswick, be invited to prepare an address appropriate to the occasion, to be presented during the next annual session, and that, in case of his inability to accept or comply with this invitation, the Most Worthy Patriarch be authorized to appoint a substitute.

FOR ACTION NEXT YEAR.

The following resolution, reported by the Committee on the State of the Order was laid over for action at the next annual session:

"Resolved, That two-fifths of the *per capita* tax received from the Grand Divisions of British North America be held in the treasury of the Propagation Fund, subject to the usual order of the Most Worthy Patriarch, and that it be expended only on the recommendation of the sub-committee appointed by the

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Most Worthy Patriarch for District No. One, as provided in the former report of the committee." [NOTE.—District No. One is composed of "the Provinces and Territories of British North America."]

The following resolution, offered by Representative THOMAS CASWELL, of Ontario, was referred to the Committee on Constitutions to report for action at the next session :

"Resolved, That Section 1, Article III., of the Constitution of Subordinate Divisions be amended by striking out all the words from and including the word 'Provided' down to the word 'notice,' and by striking out the words 'And provided further,' in the second paragraph, and inserting the word 'Provided.' Also, by striking out Section 2 of Article III., and all other parts of the Constitution and Code of Laws which provide for or recognize 'Lady Visitors' in the Order."

FORTIETH ANNUAL SESSION.

The next session will be held at Halifax, Nova Scotia, commencing on such day in the second week in July, 1884, as the Executive Officers may determine.

We have to observe with reference to the pledges for propagation purposes that the representatives from Nova Scotia did not feel justified in making any promise, as we knew that our own propagation work, the agency and official organ, made demands on our resources which it would be unwise to overlook.

With reference to the amendment of Rule 17 of the Constitution, we have to remark that the qualifying clause at the end is not just as we understood it, and as it most certainly was moved. The clause reads, "unless otherwise ordered by the Grand Division," i. e., the G. W. P. shall declare forfeited the charters of Divisions failing to make returns for four quarters, unless otherwise ordered. The qualification which was suggested, and we think adopted, was, "provided that such action shall be subject to the approval of the G. D." As the clause now stands, any G. W. P. can exercise the arbitrary power unless specially ordered not to do so. The object of the qualification was to prevent exercise of such power.

As will be seen, the necessary change in the code, with regard to members in arrears for dues, was made, and now the old and simple form of procedure, under the rule for charge and trial takes the place of the hasty legislation of a previous year, which caused so much confusion.

Your delegates feel that this report, which might have been much longer, contains all that is at present necessary, and the same is respectfully submitted,

The year now closed has been one that has afforded your committee, as well as yourselves, great pleasure in pursuing the work, which the executive officers and the agents of the Grand Division have, under Divine Providence, brought to very successful results. Where many have done well it is invidious to particularize; and we are all ready to rejoice in knowing that Nova Scotia is rapidly advancing towards a total extinction of the liquor traffic. That there will always be violators of the law of love, and offenders against the general prosperity, we all believe, as there will be violators of the Ten Commandments; yet it is evident from the advance already made in public sentiment, that our Province is likely to become one of the most prosperous and happy of this or any other Dominion or Kingdom, through the general adoption of the views and practices we advocate, and which we know have their origin and support in the fundamental principles of the Christian religion.

Your committee, knowing that facts and figures, indicating progress, are always acceptable to faithful workers, venture to furnish details of what has been done during the last year; whereby the Grand Division will see that the selection of officers and agents is, for such work as the Order has in hand, a matter of very great importance. Each and all must work in this, our enterprise; and we have great satisfaction and pleasure in knowing that harmonious and most effective action can be secured where the workers have widely differing views as to religion and politics.

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Your committee, fully appreciating the talents of our esteemed brother, Thomas M. Lewis, and rejoicing that he has been willing to continue in the field under the guidance of the Agency Committee, creating an excitement in many places in favor of our objects and organization, have hope that his health may be continued, and our Order still further benefited by his exertions.* It is important, also, that the Grand Division should decide on securing the continuous employment of our brother, Thomas Hutchings, whose efforts have been so conspicuously marked with success; and your committee earnestly recommend that his services be secured for the coming year, and that his salary be one thousand dollars.

The Grand Scribe suggests that the Grand Division should distribute among all the subscribers to the Agency Fund a statement of receipts and expenditure, and also the particulars of labor performed by the agents,—of Divisions formed and resuscitated, and increase of members of our Order, during the past year. That during the last year, the *Watchman*, printed and published by Brother Halliday, has well sustained its character for general efficiency, as endorsed at last annual session of this Grand Division.

The general appearance, quality of paper, and style of type are quite equal to most weeklies published under the conditions which govern it in this Province.

Its value to the Order consists, to some extent, in the diffusion of intelligence respecting local and Dominion legislation, in strengthening the links which bind our Divisions as a disciplined whole under one grand central authority, and thus largely enhancing our efficiency for either defensive or aggressive action,—in aiding the work of our agents, and recording every new band of workers added to the Order, thus flashing a stimulus through the whole,—and in its faithful and firm exposition at all times and under all circumstances of the great principles of tem-

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perance, especially as worked in conjunction with our Order, the interests of which are kept well to the front.

The *Watchman* has not met with that hearty support and encouragement from the members of the Order it had a right to expect. It seems almost incredible that, while this valuable auxilliary is sent weekly at so small a price, that out of a roll of some 12,000 names only about 800 should subscribe, and that out of this \$500 should be due the publisher, every cent of which is urgently required for weekly expenditure.

Brother Halliday suffered considerable personal loss in the year 1881 in this matter; since then he has not been recouped, barely holding his own, getting absolutely nothing for his untiring labor, week by week the year through.

With all this the brother hopes on, and has not quite lost all faith in the venture upon which he has embarked. He will print and publish it one year more, provided the subsidy of last year is continued.

The committee recommend the Grand Division to grant \$400 subsidy to Brother Halliday, for printing and publishing the *Watchman* during the coming year.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATE OF THE ORDER.

GRAND DIVISION ROOM, November 1, 1883.

Grand Worthy Patriarch:

The Committee on the State of the Order beg to submit the following report:—
The Committee have considered the several documents placed in their hands. The reports of the Grand Worthy Patriarch, Grand Scribe, Grand Treasurer, and

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the Agency Committee contain much interesting and valuable information relating to the work accomplished in this jurisdiction, "after a year of unusual activity and unparalleled prosperity," and must prove of "intense interest to every true member of our Order." When, one year ago, the present Grand Worthy Patriarch was nominated for the position which he has so worthily filled, the good that might probably be accomplished, were he elected, was predicted; but the grand results have exceeded the prediction, for no sooner did the new executive settle themselves down to business than the tidal wave of prosperity set in, and Division after Division was chartered for, let us hope, a long voyage, each filled with large crews of men and women who volunteered their services to rescue such of their fellow beings as might be found struggling on the river of intemperance, and restore them to the haven of sobriety.

That there must have been a leavening of the masses of the people on the temperance question prior to our last annual session is evident; for when our agents went forth on their mission they found men and women ready for organization, and exceedingly well indeed did they and the Grand Worthy Patriarch drill the enlisted recruits, for our Order in Nova Scotia may now be called a Grand Army thirteen thousand strong, ready to do battle with the foe who is responsible for so much misery and woe. We may not be able, possibly, to satisfy ourselves thoroughly as to the reason of the good feeling of the people towards our cause; but may not the various active societies which co-operate with us in disseminating temperance principles justly claim some credit in this direction? And may we not also, with justice, ascribe some of the credit to the teachings of the clergy? For now it is a well established fact that the excellent men of all religious denominations who are engaged in the work of preaching the gospel, are now generally in sympathy with our movement, and the congregations committed to their charge co-operating with them, temperance principles have been more generally adopted.

The statistics that have been so carefully gathered and tabulated, are proof of the advance made during the year just closed. The fact of sixty-six new Divisions having been organized, twenty-four old Divisions resuscitated, the nett increase of Divisions by 75, and of the membership by four thousand two hundred, is unprecedented and encouraging. With 237 well equipped Subordinates, we should look forward for good results in the year upon which we are entering. The work of our indefatigable agents, Brothers Hutchings and Lewis, is sufficient evidence of their earnestness, perseverance, devotedness, and qualifications for the particular duty assigned them. They have labored well in behalf of our Order. They travelled more than 7000 miles during the last eleven months, visited 102 Divisions, and addressed 400 meetings at which over 50,000 persons were present. The good that must result from the work referred to cannot be estimated. Our efforts should be employed in maintaining the position we have attained. Should we at the close of the coming year be able to say we have held our ground, we shall have done well.

The financial condition of the Grand Division, as exhibited by the Treasurer's report, is a sign of health and strength. The life invigorating power of our organization, in the shape of a cash asset of \$1131, will enable us to continue the campaign which has been so vigorously prosecuted.

It is pleasing to know that our agency department has been in good hands during the past year, the brethren composing the committee having performed their work with good judgment.

As *The Watchman*, the official organ of the Order, is in need of a larger patronage than has yet been extended to it, it is hoped that the special committee to whom has been referred papers relating thereto will be able to recommend a plan by which its circulation may be enlarged and its usefulness increased. Our institution cannot progress without the assistance of a well conducted journal, published in its interests. The committee trust that some arrangement will be made which will result beneficially to both the *Watchman* and the Grand Division.

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The committee would repeat the oft expressed words of encouragement in regard to juvenile organizations, by whatever name they may be known. They would direct the attention of the members to the report of the standing committee, presented at this session. Let all societies, formed for the training of the young in the paths of temperance, receive the fostering care they deserve. A few years will advance the active workers of the present to the ranks of the aged, and transform the boys into men. It is necessary then that the youth should receive the education necessary to qualify them to take the places of their fathers. See to it, brethren, that this work is not neglected.

For years past the statutes of Nova Scotia contained one of the best Provincial laws to regulate the traffic in intoxicants for beverage purposes. Many claim that it is a good law; some pronounce it a failure. An honest review of its work has proved it to be an excellent enactment. If "its usefulness is gone" the officials whose duty it is to see its provisions enforced are to blame.

The Scott Act, enacted in 1878, is a permissive law giving power to the electors of counties and cities to prevent the granting of licenses for three years. This law is in operation in ten counties in this Province. The eleventh county, by the voice of the electors, has decided to try it, and the twelfth county is taking steps in the same direction. There are two opinions in reference to the efficiency of this law in restraining the sale of intoxicating beverages. There is sufficient evidence to show that, if vigorously and honestly enforced, it is a good law. Any failure that can be attributed to it is consequent on the facilities afforded offenders to appeal to the higher courts—many of the appeals remaining undecided for months and a decision not being arrived at, in some cases, until after the expiration of a year. In a number of instances this state of things deterred friends from proceeding with prosecutions against other illicit vendors. It is to be hoped that the decision of one of the Judges of the Supreme Court (Judge Thompson) on cases in Kings County, will be of benefit to other counties.

During the last session of the Dominion Parliament, a new License Law was enacted, applicable to the whole of Canada. This measure is to supersede all Provincial License Laws, and is to operate in such counties where the Scott Act may not be in force. On one or two points the new law is retrogressive as far as this Province is concerned, while at the same time it is a gain for the other Provinces. It may be well, however, to state that it is 'an' improvement in other directions in which it has been difficult to secure a prosecution under the Scott Act. The new license measure provides that License Inspectors, under its provisions, can be appointed to enforce a compliance with the law. The recent enactment also enables rate payers to apply the permissive principle of the Scott Act to smaller areas than counties and cities. Friends will have a "two edged sword" with which to keep illegal vendors in subjection. Law-abiding citizens in every county or district should see that proper persons are appointed as Inspectors.

On the question of the National Division Propagation Fund, referred to in one of the reports, while suggesting that that important matter had better be considered in Grand Division, your committee are of opinion that a change is undesirable, as there is no certainty that the proposed plan would be advantageous to the Order in Canada.

The National Division is to hold its annual session in the City of Halifax, in July next. It would be well to provide for a suitable reception to that body—a reception honorable to its members and creditable to this jurisdiction.

At our present session we miss the presence, the voice and the counsels of several of our oldest, most active and esteemed brethren. We would have been pleased to have met them with our customary annual hand-shake. Three of the brothers referred to are prevented from meeting with us at this time by ill-health, viz.: P. G. W. P.'s, Longley, McRobert and Murray. The Grand Division will be pleased to learn of their speedy restoration to health and the active duties of life.

In conclusion, the committee beg to recommend the following resolutions for adoption by the Grand Division :

1. *Resolved*, That we acknowledge with gratefulness the mercies of Divine Providence; and in the great increase in the number of temperance organizations, and the large additions to their membership, during the past year, we, with fervent hearts, recognize His blessings upon our efforts.

2. *Resolved*, That this Grand Division would direct the attention of the Subordinate Divisions to the large increase of our Order during the year just closed, and urge upon the membership the necessity of continued labor for the advancement of our principles.

3. *Resolved*, That the special attention of the Divisions be directed to the valuable reports presented at this annual session, abounding, as they do, with facts and statistics regarding the progress of the Order during the past year.

4. *Resolved*, That the Grand Division appreciates the prudent management of the funds by the Grand Treasurer and other officers, and the Agency Committee. The judicious manner in which moneys have been expended, resulting in a large measure of good to the organization, at the same time retaining a handsome balance in the treasury, is deserving of commendation.

5. *Resolved*, That the Grand Division hereby recognizes the valuable services of the agents in the field during the past year—Brothers Hutchings and Lewis—to whose labors much of the success of the Order is due. The Grand Division is also indebted to the Agency Committee for their valuable services during the year, and for the judicious manner in which their work was performed; and, at the same time, the thanks of the brotherhood are due to the Grand Worthy Patriarch for his invaluable services in connection with agency work.

6. *Resolved*, That *The Watchman*, the official organ of the Order, should be sustained by a more extended circulation, with a view of increasing its usefulness as a special branch of our work.

7. *Resolved*, That the Grand Division recommends to the Divisions a fostered care of juvenile organizations.

8. *Resolved*, That this Grand Division is of opinion that a wise and honest administration of the laws relating to the liquor traffic would tend to the advancement of temperance, and be promotive of good order. And *Resolved further*, That temperance men throughout the Province are hereby recommended to lend every possible aid in the enforcement of such law as may be in operation in the county where they reside.

9. *Resolved*, That the Grand Division recognises and appreciates the attention given to the duties of his office by Brother Temple, the Grand Scribe.

Cape Breton Division, No. 27, meets regularly, attendance good; but the membership, composed chiefly of youths, is not imbued very strongly with a desire to advance the cause of temperance. Archangel Division, No. 40, meets regularly; attendance good, members very harmonious and united. North Sydney Division, No. 167, has been passing, during the last nine months, through a period of depression, caused, chiefly, by a number of unsuitable persons getting into the Division and acting in such a way as to drive every one who was worth anything out of it. The obnoxious class are now removed, and I am in hopes by the end of the present quarter to be able to report the Division in good standing.

Outside of our Order there is no temperance organization, and little or no interest is taken in temperance matters. Rum selling and rum drinking abound here. I often think this is the worst place in the Province to keep up an interest in temperance matters. It is one of the largest ports in the Province, counting the number of vessels of all classes that visit us during the shipping season. Their crews are here by the hundred at times, and unfortunately the rum seller does a large business; and those filling positions of influence either sympathize openly with the rum traffic, or look on with indifference. As a general thing the clergy and members of Christian churches cannot be got to assist in the temperance cause.

Still we hope and will strive for a better state of affairs. We know our cause is the cause of God and all mankind, and ultimately it must prevail.

There is but one temperance organization in St. Mary's—No Surrender Division, at Goldenville. Many societies have been formed at one time and another, but all seem to have failed entirely to stop the habit of drinking. There is no legal, but much illicit selling practised. It is a rare thing to see a young man the worse for liquor; but there is much drinking on the sly, and many young persons are growing to be fond of it, and hence it is difficult, if not impossible, to keep them in a temperance society for any length of time.

I think the temperance sentiment here, especially among the older inhabitants, is as strong as ever it was; but very little is being done to advance the cause of *prohibition*, which I believe to be the only cure for the evil of intemperance.

Dear Sir,—I have the honor to submit herewith my report, as your Deputy for Halifax County, for the quarter ending September, 1883, and I take the liberty of referring generally to the events in connection with the Order in this city and county since the last annual session of the Grand Division.

As you are aware, not a little agency work has been done during the year, with gratifying results. Of course, all that could be desired has not been achieved, nor have the expectations entertained been in full realized; but there are more Divisions at work in the county than at this time last year, and a more active interest is displayed, not only in relation to the Order, but in the cause of temperance generally.

Early in the present year the city was honored by a visit from the respected head of the Order, Most Worthy Patriarch Jewell, and the occasion was taken advantage of to make a demonstration, the success attending which was not only gratifying to the members participating, but satisfied outsiders who witnessed the gathering, that there was life in the old Order yet; that after nearly forty years of active life in the city, after having to contend with the more or less friendly rivalry of other societies, and to battle with the prejudices and jealousies of other occupants of the platform of moral reform, the order of the Sons of Temperance was still an active, aggressive body of workers, having in its ranks men and women representing all creeds and classes, and all enthusiastic in the one common object. The gathering, if productive of no other good, made us better acquainted with ourselves, and tended to increase the unity of spirit and harmony of action so essential to success.

At a later period of the year the eight Divisions in the city took united action to bring before the City Council the matter of violations and evasions of the license law, and the regulations established thereunder by the Council. The memorial from the Divisions was referred to the law officer of the city, and that gentleman's report thereon left no doubt that the law was being openly violated, and that, too, with the consent of the Council, who were allowing liquor-sellers to sell for months after their licenses had expired without renewing. 'Tis true that it is not much better now, the city authorities treating all efforts to have the law enforced with an indifference begotten of the security from molestation which they have too long enjoyed. Had we a central organization in the city to look after such matters we might have a different tale to tell. Under the new license law such an organization may still be a pressing necessity, and should such be the case, I am confident we will not be long without one.

On another occasion, later on, the Divisions acted unitedly. It was decided to bring to the notice of the City School Board the action of the Council of Public Instruction, on the memorial from the Executive of the Grand Division *in re* Richardson's Temperance Lesson Book. The School Board unhesitatingly passed a resolution favorable to the use of the book in the city schools. Shortly afterwards seven of the eight Divisions acted together in sending an address to the school teachers, a copy of which address I herewith send to you.* There can be no doubt that the teachers endorse the sentiments of the address, and recognize the importance of instilling the principles of total abstinence in the minds of their scholars. Some time later, learning that the School Board did not intend to supply the work, and knowing that it would be unfair to the teachers to ask

them to do so, it was decided to order enough to supply the schools, to be paid for by the Sons; and before the annual session is held each of the schools will be supplied with a number of copies sufficient to meet the requirements of its several departments.

In other ways the Divisions have acted together, but these instances only are here set down. We have found that union is indeed strength, and I trust that in the years to come we will still be prepared to act together, and in many ways "meet the common foe with the victorious power of organization."

As an evidence that there is increased interest in the work in this county, I may say that I have received more reports from Division Deputies for this quarter than for any other quarter of any year during the three years I have had the honor to hold this position.

The reports I have received I will very briefly notice, the references being brief because I know your time is too limited to be devoted to a report which may already be too long.

From Bro. Wm. M. Brown, for Chebucto, whose attending members are, as ever, active in the work. Bro. Brown's suggestion for the good of the Order is "More interest in the organization of the Sons as a reforming influence," a suggestion which I heartily second, with this addition, that we must be alive to the fact that "prevention is better than cure," and act accordingly.

From Bro. Wm. Foster, for Mayflower Division, which has made a very creditable increase in membership, and out of 130 members has not at the present time more than half a dozen who can be said to be in arrears for dues. The system of visitation of absent members is found to work well with this Division.

From Bro. S. Mosher, for Richmond Division, which is the largest numerically, has made a good increase during the year, and is carrying on an active war with the City Council, on account of the countenance given, indirectly at least, by that body to unlicensed liquor sellers.

From Bro. S. Boreham, for Northern Star, which has had an N. P. (new progressive) boom, during the past quarter particularly, and is now on the high road of success. This Division is not with us every time, but there is no doubt that the hearts of most of its members are in the right place.

From Bro. G. H. Mackinlay, for Grove Division, which has more than realized expectations—being in a decline a little more than a year ago—but is now alive and well, and in hearty co-operation with our varied movements. Bro. Mackinlay suggests "active work this winter with a view to reaching the masses." I rise to second the motion.

From Bro. John McCrow, for Murray Division, some of whose members are actively engaged in the work of the Order, and fully alive to the interests of the cause. Others have been found to be a drag, to some extent, and their departure for fields more suited to their peculiarities has not been regretted to any very great extent. There are people who leave their country for their country's good. It is to be hoped they do so for their own good, also.

From Bro. John E. Butler, for McClintock Division, which suffered for a time by the unavoidable absence of some of the more active members, but which, within the past month, has got again actively at work. Bro. Butler suggests "more fraternal visitations." Amen. In an explanatory letter, accompanying his report, Bro. B. expresses great confidence in the future of the Division.

To the present time, the Deputy of Flower of the West Division, the latest addition to the city circle, has not reported to me; but I am aware that the Division is in good order, and has taken an active part in the movements of the year.

The Deputies of Divisions outside the city have reported in fair numbers.

Bro. Walter McCurdy reports Rising Sun, No. 52, in good order, the average attendance being about three-fourths of the total membership—a state of affairs very gratifying.

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Bro. John Gibbons reports Hubbard's, No. 318, inactive during the quarter, owing to the absence of members, and Mountain Side, No. 423, dead, having done nothing since December, 1882. With twelve unlicensed rumshops in a district of 300 souls, there is great responsibility resting somewhere.

Bro. Wm. McKeen reports Gibraltar, No. 371, steady, meeting regularly.

Bro. S. Lindsay, for Brookvale, No. 426, reports a fair state of affairs.

Bro. R. H. Reid, for Sedgewick, No. 469, has a good report, and makes a suggestion which will be laid before the appropriate persons.

Bro. J. E. Schmidt reports Beacon Light, No. 448, meeting regularly, some of its members imbued with a proper spirit.

Bro. John Barron reports Garfield, No. 480, in good order and sessions held regularly.

Bro. M. P. Richardson thinks that East Dover, No. 499, will get to work again when the fishing season is over. The members have remained steadfast.

Bro. Chas. Covey reports Beacon Star, No. 500, only nine months old, but fairly vigorous, with good prospects for the winter campaign.

Bro. Alex. Murchey reports cheerily for Royal Standard, No. 512, and makes a suggestion, which will be referred.

Bro. Jos. Himelman reports Eastern Light, No. 526, meeting regularly, with harmony prevailing.

I have not received a report from the Deputy, but learn from the G. S. that Crystal Rock, 304, has resumed work, and is preparing to build a hall.

There should be more reports, but they have not yet come to hand.

The length of this report warns me to be brief in my references to the juvenile branches of the work.

Acadia section of Cadets is not as active as it should be. Efforts are about to be made to infuse new life into it.

Rosebud Band of Hope, managed by Chebucto and Mayflower Divisions, is a full blown flower, without a withered leaf, and shedding the sweet perfume of temperance in many places. The devoted managers of this Band are doing a work by which untold good must be accomplished.

Southern Star Band, under the care of Murray Division, is doing for the children of the south-western part of the city, what Rosebud is doing for those of the east, west, north and south, while Ivy Band, under the care of Richmond and Grove Divisions, makes a pleasant gathering for the children of the extreme north.

By the means of these Bands the question of temperance is introduced into many homes whose heads are not actively with us, and it may be into some whose heads are turned from us. Thus, apart from the good done directly among the children, there must be much done indirectly among their parents. May the Order never fail to foster these juvenile societies!

You are no doubt wearied with my report, which I have endeavoured to make no longer than circumstances warranted. I recognize the importance of the position of County Deputy. To him the G. W. P. must naturally look for information. I have strenuously endeavoured to gather all that I thought would be of interest to you. I trust you will find it useful.

My Dear Sir,—I have received reports from Deputies of the following Divisions:—Avon, No. 12; Riverside, 324; St. Croix, 379; Golden Gate, 459; Scott, 479; Brooklyn, 497; Horseshoe, 523; Royal Oak, 520; Avalanche, 502. All these Divisions meet regularly, with a fair average attendance, and for the most part evincing an earnest interest in the advancement of the cause of sobriety. The obstructions, by legal quibbling, in the way of the enforcement of the Scott Act in this County, have had a disheartening effect upon some ardent friends of prohibition. The prosecutions which were commenced several months since, are still pending, to be argued before the Judges of the Supreme Court in December; and the exceptions taken are of such a nature that it is not safe at present to undertake further legal process with the violators of the law, and hence the traffic in strong drink is spreading, and is carried on with unblushing effrontery, without an effort being put forth to arrest it. The labours of one of the lecturers would be of much service now in some portions of this county.

Dear Brother,—I beg to report that I have heard from nearly all of the Divisions in this county, through their Deputies. There has not been the increase in the membership throughout the county that we could have wished; but most

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of the Divisions are holding their numbers fairly. The labours of a lecturer are necessary to satisfy the expectations of some of the Divisions.

In my last year's report to the G. W. P. I intimated that the Canada Temperance Act would be put in force in this county as soon as we should hear that the Privy Council of England had given a favorable decision as to the constitutionality of the Act. Since then we have been to work, and have found the law all that we require. *We have not lost a single case where the papers were correct.* Since the decision of Judge Thompson, in the case of Mr. Fadden, we have had no trouble. We have had several prosecutions, but the parties have all come, before the trial, and, to save expense, have acknowledged the violation, and have promised to sell no more. A brother informed me yesterday that not a glass of liquor could be got in Wolfville, and in other places it was to be got only on the sly.

Dear Brother,—It is neither an easy nor encouraging work to report on temperance in the county of Lunenburg for the past year. It is not easy because the county is large, my time is limited, and only two Deputies have reported, viz., Bro. Joseph Rudolf, Jr., from Lunenburg Rock, No. 539, and Bro. Daniel Rieser, from old Noble, No. 226. The former is a new Division, organized by myself at the request of charter members, last spring. It was formed by a coalition between a lodge of the United Temperance Association and old Lunenburg Division. It has been prospering well; has a membership of 57, and an average attendance of 35. The latter is about stationary, but continues to hold up the banner at Petite Riviere. Our own Division, Unity, No. 470, at Mahone Bay, is not growing. In fact it was with difficulty it held its ground during the summer, and I dare not venture on predictions. This is about all I can say regarding the state of the Order in this county.

The work of reporting to you is not encouraging. The reasons will appear as I proceed.

THE WORK DONE.

Your eloquent and vigorous agent, Bro. T. M. Lewis, made a second visit,—of the first I need say nothing, as you accompanied him,—and lectured at several points in this county with much acceptance, and a considerable amount was contributed towards the Agency Fund. In addition to his lectures, several largely attended public meetings were held at leading places. In the month of March, in connection with the County Lodge, I. O. G. T., I lectured to a crowded audience in the Cross Roads church, LaHave. The I. O. G. Templars held their annual session at Bridgewater, and had a good public meeting.

All these efforts, however, are not to be measured by the visible results. It is still only the seed time of temperance thought and influence in this county; but we have good reason to believe that the seed has taken deep root here and there, and is growing up, in some cases, it may be secretly, but still it is growing, and though the waiting for the early and the latter rain may be discouraging, yet it is by no means hopeless.

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Very little has been done to enforce the law. Last winter a vigorous campaign was opened at Bridgewater, and for a time bid fair to be successful, but it lacked staying powers; and although much good was done, the power of the enemy was only *checked*, not *broken*, and it is lifting its evil head again, soon to be more proud and more boastful than ever.

Elsewhere in the county, so far as I can learn, the law has been practically inoperative. It is so, in some places at least, for want of interest and a little plucky activity on the part of the proper officials.

The County Auxiliary Alliance were, a year ago, taking steps to test the mind of the people on the desirability of trying the "Scott Act," but very little interest was shown with regard to it in particular, and temperance in general, and consequently no action was taken.

PRESENT STATE OF MATTERS.

Liquor is sold all over the county without hindrance, and, in some places, it has been peddled from house to house. The temperance societies are mostly weak—at least in influence—and are doing nothing practical to oppose the horrid traffic. Clerks of license, magistrates and constables choose to be quiet spectators, or customers, and if urged to prosecute the violators of the law, they will, in most cases, either stand upon their dignity and declare that they are not bound to do so, or they will refuse to act at all.

Only a portion—but, I believe, the greater portion—of the clergymen take anything like a decided stand against the drinking customs of the people, while it is to be feared, some "wink" at the enormous evil.

The leaven of temperance, however, is working, and its influence is extending, and is throwing more and more into the arena of disgrace both the sale and use of intoxicating drinks. We must labor in hope rather than in any encouraging degree of realization in this county for some time yet, but still we must labor none the less vigorously. The enemy works, and so must we. Idleness means defeat. Agents' visits, though not productive of much immediate fruit, will help us. In such a place as this county, is just the place where they are most needed to help keep alive the vital power of true temperance principles and practice. Do not forget us in making your plans for the future.

Dear Sir,—I have received reports from Rocklin, Lochinvar, Hopewell, Albion Mines and New Glasgow Divisions.

In answer to questions 1, 3, 4, and 5, they all say "yes."

Membership of Rocklin, 45; contributed to agency, \$2.00. Membership of Lochinvar, 28; this Division has been organized since the last annual meeting. Membership of Hopewell, 62; has a Band of Hope under its care. Albion Mines has a membership of 76; are owners of a hall. New Glasgow has a membership of about 130. During last quarter had the privilege of organizing Riverton Division, No. 541; I have received no official report but know they are doing well.

Mr. Lewis has been travelling the county for five weeks; he will be able to give a much better report than I can, as to the state of the Order. He succeeded in organizing a Division at Battery Hill, on Monday last, and hope he will be successful in either organizing or reorganizing one or two more during this week.

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Although we have not as many Divisions in this county as we would like—and had Mr. Lewis been in the ground two weeks sooner, we would, no doubt, have had one or two more—still we are pleased to know that the cause of temperance is steadily gaining ground. The Scott Act has been in force for nine months, and is working as well as could be expected. We have obtained about forty convictions for violation of the provisions of the Act. Six of the parties served two months, each, in *prison*; two paid \$50.00 each, in fines; the remainder have either appealed or taken the case up by *certiorari*, and we are awaiting the decision of the Supreme Court at Halifax.

They are now at the helm, and are guiding it well. So long as they remain connected with it, Victoria Section will not only exist, but prosper. The indebtedness of the Section to Bros. Bradley and Jas. McElhinney, of AVON Division, should be acknowledged. The last named Bro. has been unsparing in his efforts for the good of the Section.

“The benefit of Sections to Divisions has been fully exemplified by Victoria during the past year, as several of the Cadets, while maintaining their connection with the Section, joined the Division and have proved valuable members, and well posted up in the duties required of them.

While I have no regular report from New Dominion, of P. E. Island, owing to the absence of the Deputy from the Province, yet Bro. L. P. Tanton has kept me fully posted in the working of the Section, and you will rejoice with me to know that it is doing well and making its influence felt in its locality.

Why the other Sections which a few years ago were so earnest in the good work have gone down, it is hard to say. We can only conjecture that some one has been remiss in their duty, or we would have more Sections at work to-day throughout the Province.

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I am afraid many of the Deputies have neglected their duty, and lost the interest they once manifested in the good work. There is one thing many of them neglect, to keep up a communication with the Head of the Order. I would remind each Deputy that when from any cause he is prevented from looking after the Section confined to his care, he should at once acquaint the G. W. P. that some one may be appointed to look after its interests.

Attempts were made to reorganize Safe Guard Section at Richmond, but they did not succeed. It is to be regretted that we have not more Sections at work in the city where the need for them is so great.

According to your directions, the Executive issued and sent to every Division, and many prominent men, a circular setting forth the claims and merits of our Order. We met with a few enquiries, but no tangible results. We find two causes for the non-extension of the Order of Cadets, 1st, the lack of interest manifested by the members of the Senior Order, and which lack of interest has proved prejudicial to that Order; and 2nd, the early age at which youths are admitted to the Divisions. The subject has been before this Grand Section so often, that I hardly dare propose anything; but as the National Division holds its next session in Halifax, would it not be worth while for this body to try and bring its legitimate influence to bear upon that august body, to make such change in their laws as may be to the advantage of our Order, and of benefit to the youth of the land?

In compliance with your directions, the Grand Officers communicated with P. G. W. P., Thos. Hutchings, on the subject of the cards of membership. The Brother informs us he is in communication with the parties in England in reference thereto, and will as soon as possible inform the G. Section of the result.

Brothers, our Order is not advancing as we would like to see it. Let us ask ourselves what is the cause, and if possible apply the remedy. I am convinced in many cases the blame lies, to a great extent, with the older members, who evince little interest in the Section after they arrive at the age of honorary membership. That is not as it should be; they owe a duty to the Section which they should strive to repay. I trust in the future they will try and atone for the past, and make the Order what it should be in every part of our Province, a power for good. I trust our combined wisdom at this session may conduce to that end.

The report of the Grand Secretary was read and referred to committee on Grand Officers' reports; also Grand Secretary's Financial Statement, which was handed to Finance and Audit Committee.

GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT.

To the Grand Worthy Patron, Officers and Members of the Grand Section, Cadets of Temperance, of Nova Scotia, in Annual Session convened:

G. W. P. AND BROTHERN,—

The rapid flight of time brings us again together in annual session, to review the past, to take counsel for the future, and by so doing to endeavor to encourage one another in the good work in which we are engaged.

That it is a good work none of us will deny; and especially those of us who have grown up as members of a Section of Cadets, *can* (and I have no doubt that all do) truthfully assert, that the benefits which we have derived from our connection with the Order have been of incalculable value, and which, in all probability, we would not have received from any other source.

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But, while the advantages of the Order are so apparent, is it not strange that so little interest is taken in it? However, we have to be thankful that our standing is somewhat better than it was at last annual session.

MEMBERSHIP.

At that session I reported in working order three Sections, with a total membership (active and honorary) of two hundred and fifteen. Since last session one Section has been reorganized, viz: New Dominion, No. 2, of P. E. I., which now numbers forty-three members. The other Sections also have increased in membership to some extent, and at present we number four Sections, with two hundred and twenty-six active and forty-nine honorary members, a total of two hundred and seventy-five, as compared with two hundred and fifteen last year, an increase of sixty.

In addition to this increase, I am of the opinion that the Order is more widely known than it was at last session. The circular which was sent out early in the year has been the means of bringing our Order more prominently before the Divisions; and while no new Sections have been organized, there has been a number of enquiries, and I am in hopes that ere long we may have several more good Sections.

FINANCES.

Our funds are still in a fair condition, as will be shown by the report of the Grand Treasurer. Last year the balance on hand was forty-nine dollars, eighty-five cents. The receipts for the year, fourteen dollars and eighty cents, and amount paid out, thirty-seven dollars and twelve cents, leaving a balance of twenty six dollars and eighty-one cents.

The smallness of the receipts may be accounted for by the fact that it is only nine months since the last session, and, therefore, we have only three quarters' receipts.

MEMORIAL TO NATIONAL DIVISION.

It is urged as one great objection to our Order, that the Divisions take in members at fourteen years of age, and that the Sections are unnecessary. But, on the other hand, it is held, and I think correctly, that it is not advantageous to take members into the Divisions at such an early age, and a movement was made in the National Division to raise the age of admission; this movement, however, did not meet with much success.

Now, as the National Division meets in Halifax next summer, I am of the opinion that a memorial from this Grand Section, backed up by some of our eloquent brethren who are members of the National Division, would have great weight in that body, and might be the means of procuring the desired legislation, which would be of great benefit to this Order.

STOCK.

Our stock of Grand Section Constitutions is exhausted. If thought advisable to print a new edition, I would recommend that a committee be appointed to revise it. The Sub-Section Constitutions, which were ordered last year, have been obtained, and the account will be presented. In other respects, we have sufficient stock to last for some time.

CONCLUSION.

I am pleased to be able to present a somewhat more encouraging report than at last session. Then, we seemed to have touched bottom; now, the movement is upward, although very slowly.

Let us, one and all, prepare for another year of work, and, with the blessing of the Great Patriarch above, our efforts will be crowned with success.

I have to thank the Grand Worthy Patron, and other brethren, for kindness and advice during the year.

I trust that our session in this town, with our good brethren of Victoria Section, may be mutually pleasant and profitable to all present.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GRAND OFFICERS' REPORTS.

G. W. PATRON AND BROTHERS ;

Your committee on Grand Officers' reports have before them the reports of the G. W. Patron and G. Secretary, and beg to report thereon as follows :

The report of the G. W. Patron on the state of the Order, while not as encouraging as we might reasonably hope, is nevertheless a tolerably satisfactory one. It is gratifying to find that one at least of our defunct Sections has been resuscitated, and we hope that an especial effort will be made during the coming year, to reawaken more of our hitherto sleeping Sections.

The report of D. G. W. P. Foster, of ACADIA, No. 2, though fairly satisfactory is not what we should have had from that source, with such officers at their head and such a field for work as the city of Halifax, with its numerous temptations to the young.

With the good results of its past work to be seen in so many cases, it is a wonder that the temperance men of Halifax do not rally around that Section and make it what it should be—the great training school for our temperance men of the future. But, we regret to say, it is not the case ; indeed, were it not for a few tried and true friends among the Sons of Temperance, that Section would be badly off. We trust there are brighter days in store for old Acadia.

D. G. W. P. McInnis, of Headlight, we are glad to find reporting favorably on the future prospects of that Section. This Section has worked along pluckily under difficulties, and deserves all the encouragement we can give them.

The report of D. G. W. P. Wood, of Victoria, shows that fine Section to be in its usual prosperous condition. Would that we had more Sections of that stamp in our Province.

We are especially glad to learn that New Dominion Section, of Charlottetown, is again in working order, and we hope it will regain its former position of usefulness in our Order.

Your committee trust the various Deputies will take note of the suggestions of the Grand Worthy Patron and be more punctual in their reports.

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With reference to the proposed memorial to the National Division on the subject of the change of age of admission to the Sons of Temperance, your committee would urge that at this session that subject be fully discussed and some plan of action be decided upon. This is an important subject, and one that calls for immediate action.

The complaint of the Grand Worthy Patron that the older members of the Sections do not take that interest in the Order they should is well grounded. Our honorary members, in the majority of cases, do not do their duty in this respect. This is much to be regretted, but we see no remedy. If any can be suggested, it should meet with our hearty co-operation.

The report of the Grand Secretary shows an increase in membership which, if slow, is sure.

It is to be regretted the circular sent out by the Executive was not more productive of good; but we trust, during the coming year, by a combined effort, we may be able to further advance the interests of our Order.

Your committee are glad to find the finances are in a healthy condition, and show a small balance on the right side.

Your committee would suggest that a committee be appointed to revise the Constitution and Bye-laws of this Grand Section, and report at the next session. In conclusion, your committee trust that the year we are about commencing may be one of increased success in the good work in which we are engaged.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE ROSEBUD BAND OF HOPE.

HALIFAX, N. S., September 8, 1883.

To the W. F. and members of Chebucto and Mayflower Divisions, S. of T.:

In submitting the nineteenth annual report of the Rosebud Band of Hope, the managers beg to state that the membership has increased very considerably since the presentation of the last report, the total being now about 400, and they have pleasure in saying that the attendance and the interest in the meetings have kept pace with the membership.

The annual winter entertainment was given last January, in College Hall, Gerish Street. Over thirty prizes were awarded for attendance, entertainment and propositions. Some two hundred and fifty children were present, and fully appreciated the amusements and refreshments provided for the occasion. At this entertainment the superintendent and the organist were the surprised recipients of handsomely bound copies of Hood and Milton, presented by the children of the Band. The entertainment was held further north than was desirable, but College Hall was the only place that appeared to be available. Every year the managers are at a loss for a suitable place in which to hold their entertainments, and have been especially indebted, during the past year, to the Rev. Dr. Hill, rector of St. Paul's, who, on two occasions, gave the Band the free use of the Sunday-school room in Argyle Hall. The managers take this opportunity of again calling the attention of the Divisions not only to the want, but to the urgent necessity of procuring a larger room, if this branch of the Order is to be maintained or extended.

One of the managers, Bro. John O'Sullivan, was laid aside for three months by severe illness; but he has now fully recovered, and was able to render his usual valuable assistance at the annual pic-nic.

The pic-nic was held this year on August 15, on Hosterman's grounds, North-West Arm. The children assembled on the Parade and marched through several of the principal streets, preceded by the band of the 63rd Rifles, and their old friend and first superintendent, General George G. Gray, apparently very much in his element.

The Band is indebted to Bro. P. Howe, who, on this occasion, furnished a large number of flags and banners, which were distributed among the members of the Band and the Cadets who accompanied them, making a very pleasing picture as the procession passed through the streets.

The day was beautiful, and the excursion a success. The thanks of the managers are due, and tendered, to the many kind friends, both in and out of the Order, who contributed to the success; but coupled with the sincere regrets of the managers at their inability to fully carry out the arrangements that had been made for the conveyance of patrons to the grounds, the law limiting the number of passengers on the boat preventing the captain from calling at the Lumber Yard on the afternoon trip. The managers made all the reparation in their power by refunding, as far as they were able to ascertain, the ticket money to those who were disappointed of their passage.

Two of the most esteemed and earnest of the managers, Bro. Holloway and

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Miss Wetmore, having decided to become partners for life, the managers and the members of the Band united in presenting them, previous to the happy event, with a token of their esteem and kindly feeling.

One literary and musical entertainment and one magic lantern exhibition have been given during the year, realizing \$28.65, in aid of the funds of the Band.

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AGENCY WORK OF GRAND DIVISION OF N. S.,

1882-83.

REPORT

Of work done by Past Grand Worthy Patriarch, Thomas Hutchings, under the direction of the Agency Committee of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance of Nova Scotia, in the Counties of Halifax, Colchester, Cumberland, Cape Breton, Victoria, Inverness and Richmond, from Nov. 23, 1882, to Oct. 23, 1883.

Having been permitted, in the good providence of God, to return to the Province of Nova Scotia after an absence of one year and two months, during which time it was my privilege to labor in the interests of the Grand Division of Western New York, Ohio, and Indiana, and in the State of Kentucky, under the direction of the National Division of North America, as well as for the Grand Division of said State, it is to be hoped that the work to be undertaken at this time may prove to be of great service to our cause in this jurisdiction. These were the sentiments used at the beginning of the work; and now that the time has past and gone, we stand to-day at the close of one of the most successful years that we have ever known as an organization. It therefore becomes my duty to present an official report of the work done in the several counties, in order, as visited by me, with a desire on my part to make as short a report as may be consistent with its great importance from every conceivable stand-point. The work was begun in

HALIFAX COUNTY.

Immediately after my return from the United States, I first visited the several Divisions in the City of Halifax, as well as the Bands of Hope, the Section of Cadets, and the Dartmouth Reform Club, public meetings being held under the auspices of Grove, McClintock, and Murray Divisions, as well as by Beacon Light Division, at Hammonds Plains.

While at work in the city, a day or two was spent in Hants, and Brooklyn Division, No. 497, was organized at Brooklyn, with 32 charter members.

After getting through my programme in the city, it was decided that a few days should be given to the Margaret's Bay District, which was attended to without delay, and public meetings were held at Hubbard's Cove, Ingram River, Glen Margaret, Indian Harbour, East Dover, and French Village. During the progress of the work,

East Dover Division, No. 499, was organized at East Dover, with 27 charter members.

Beacon Star Division, No. 500, was organized at Indian Harbor, with 25 charter members.

Mountain Side Division, No. 423, was reorganized at Ingram River, and the Division at Glen Margaret decided to resume work. The public schools were visited, and everything done to interest the young in the cause of total abstinence.

After my return to the city, a public meeting was held in the Beech St. Mission Church, and a number of names obtained for a new Division.

On the evening of January 1st, 1883, a public meeting was held at Lawrence-town, in the interests of Crystal Rock Division, and on Tuesday evening, January 2nd, organized Flower of the West Division, No. 503, at Beech Street Church, with 33 charter members.

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My work in the city and in the western part of the county being now completed, on Friday morning, the 5th January, the coldest day of the season, thermometer 26 degrees below zero, I left for Musquodoboit Harbor to meet an appointment in the evening. Public meetings were held at Musquodoboit Harbor, East Jeddore, Upper Musquodoboit, Elmsvale, Higginsville, Brookvale, Little River, Middle Musquodoboit and South School Section. During the progress of my mission in this part of the county, the several Divisions was visited officially, and encouraged in their work, and the following Divisions were duly organized :

Golden Dawn Division, No. 504, at Musquodoboit Harbor, with 39 charter applicants.

Ocean View Division, No. 509, at East Jeddore.

Alder Bank Division, No. 511, at Little River, with 40 charter members.

Royal Standard Division, No. 512, at South School Section, with 32 charter members.

The public schools were not forgotten, and the distribution of temperance tracts formed an important part of the duties to be performed in these visitations.

This brings me to the close of my work in Halifax County, which, on the whole, was quite satisfactory. In the first place, most of the Divisions, both in the city and county, were doing well—some exceedingly well—while only a few could be reported as in a low condition. Then the number of new Divisions organized must be of great service to the cause we are striving to advance, and will tend to strengthen the ties that bind us to these important principles of truth and right. Hoping that all the Divisions in this county may continue to labor in advancing the important interests that have been committed to their common guardianship, I must now call attention to, and report upon the work done in the

COUNTY OF COLCHESTER,

which was begun on the 22nd of January, 1883. Public meetings held at St. Andrews, Lower Stewiacke, Stewiacke Station, Shubenacadie, Hants, Brookfield, South Branch, Meadowvale, Stewiacke Village, Springside, Smithfield, Middle Stewiacke, Cross Roads, Truro, North River, Onslow, Belmont, Clifton, Acadia Mines, Great Village, DeBert River, North Earltown, Tatamagouche Falls, Tatamagouche, Guzore, Central New Annan, West New Annan, East New Annan, Brule, and Waugh's River.

While these meetings were being held, all the Divisions in the county were visited officially ; at many of these visitations a good degree of interest was manifested, and quite a number of Divisions organized, and old Divisions reorganized, as the result of the labour performed. At St. Andrews, I organized " Laurel Wreath," Band of Hope, with 19 members, under the supervision of Maple Grove Division, No. 510.

Hiawatha Division, No. 515, was instituted at Meadowvale, with 26 charter members.

Laurel Division, No. 516, at Cross Roads, Stewiacke, with 18 charter members.

Old Barns Division, No. 517, at Clifton, with 45 charter members.

Tatamagouche Division, No. 403, reorganized, with 12 old and 43 new members.

Golden Sunset Division, No. 424, located at Tatamagouche Falls, was reorganized, with 14 old and 35 new members.

Forest Home Division, No. 519, was instituted at Guzore, with 21 charter members.

Rising Hope Division, No. 524, at West New Annan, with 36 charter members.

Mountain View Division, No. 527, at East New Annan, with 38 charter members.

Sylvan Dale Division, No. 528, at Waugh's River.

Bayfield Division, No. 390, was reorganized at Brule.

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When at Belmont, full arrangements were made with the members of Fraternity Division, No. 487, to resume work, which was attended to; and the Division had resumed operations before I had finished my trip in the county.

It gives me a great degree of pleasure to report that, on the occasion of my visits to the several Divisions that were in successful operation, I found them actively engaged in advancing the good cause. This, together with the large number of Divisions added to the roll in the county, must have a sound and wholesome influence upon our work in the future. In addition to the labor performed and reported here, nearly all the public schools were visited, and a considerable degree of interest manifested by the children in the several localities.

Having completed the work allotted to me in the County of Colchester, my steps were directed to the

COUNTY OF CUMBERLAND.

Public meetings were held at Malagash, North Shore, Wallace, Middleboro', Head of Wallace Bay, Richmond, Pugwash, Pugwash River, Goose River, Shinimicas, Warren, Amherst, Fox Harbor, Toney Bay, Fort Lawrence, Upper Salem, Nappan, Maccan, Chignecto Mines, Joggins Mines, Shulee and Fenwick. As the interests of the cause were being advanced throughout the county, the following Divisions were organized, and some of the old Divisions brought into line again:—

- Blue Sea Division, No. 521, at Malagash, with 47 charter applicants.
- Middleboro' Division, No. 522, at Middleboro', with 45 charter members.
- Faithful Guide Division, No. 525, at Pugwash River, with 35 charter members.
- Silver Dawn Division, No. 529, at Toney Bay, with 38 charter members.
- Dauntless Division, No. 531, at Upper Salem, with 25 charter members.
- Maccan Division, No. 532, at Maccan, with 41 charter members.
- Mountain Home, No. 533, at Chignecto Mines, with 32 charter members.
- Forest View Division, No. 535, at Shulee, with 21 charter members.
- Crystal Gem, No. 537, at Fenwick, with 33 charter members.

Here, too, as in the other counties, as often as possible, the public and Sabbath schools were visited, and all the influence possible brought to bear upon our important mission work.

The several Divisions that I found working upon entering the county, were doing exceedingly well, and among these I came very near forgetting the Divisions at Springhill Mines, Southampton, West Brook, Parrsboro', Diligent River, Port Greville, Fraserville, Spencer's Island, Advocate Harbor, Apple River and Eatonville. Public meetings were held in all these places and the interest manifested in the large gatherings at many of the more populous centres, gave sure indication of success in the future. It gives me pleasure to add that in nearly every locality (two only excepted) where Divisions were inactive, those Divisions immediately resumed operations with increasing signs of prosperity, so that it can be said for the county, taking it as a whole, our beloved Order occupies a fine position, which must tell upon the material advancement of the people for all coming time. The Divisions all along the line were doing a good work, many new members being added to the Order.

After completing my work in Cumberland, it was decided to give me a short season of rest, and as I was returning to Halifax, I stopped on the way and held public meetings at Lornevale, Acadia Mines and Highland Village. I visited the Divisions at Lornevale and Acadia Mines, and arranged for the organization of a new Division at Highland Village, which was subsequently accomplished, and Highland Division, No. 538, regularly instituted with 28 charter members.

The programme arranged by the Agency Committee having been completed and no further appointments made, I returned to the city on the 2nd of June, after an absence of nearly 5 months of successful efforts, such as were never before witnessed in connection with this important mission work. "Truly the Lord hath done great things for us, whereof we are glad."

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After a pleasant season of rest, I left the city of Halifax on the morning of Wednesday, the 4th of July, for work in

CAPE BRETON COUNTY.

I arrived in Sydney on Thursday afternoon, July 5, and in the evening paid an official visit to Star in the East Division, No. 61, and was very cordially received by the members. This old Division is doing well. Its meetings were well attended for the season of the year. Its record is one of success and prosperity. I had the pleasure of installing the officers. As soon as possible after my arrival, in consultation with some of the leading members of the Order, a programme of work was arranged and public meetings held at Sydney Forks, Sydney, Bridgeport, Little Glace Bay, Cow Bay, Homeville, Marion Bridge, North Sydney, Sydney Mines, Upper North Sydney, Gabarus, South Bar and Louisburg.

New Divisions were instituted at the following places:—

Light of Home Division, No. 540, at Gabarus, with 51 charter members.

New Hope Division, No. 542, at Louisburg, with 31 charter members.

Rising Dawn Division, No. 543, at South Bar, Sydney, with 31 charter members.

During this, my first trip in the county, the following Divisions were visited:—Cape Breton, No. 27; Archangel, 40; Star in the East, 61; North Sydney, 167; Morien, 246; H. A. Taylor, 249; Homeville, 271; Princess Louise, 323; Star in the West, 416, and Belloni, 490.

With the exception of Cape Breton, Archangel, Star in the East, Morien and Homeville Divisions, I am not in a position to report very favorably. In fact, very few of the Divisions were found in as good a condition as they might reasonably be expected to be. This may be attributed, in part, to the fact that a reaction had been going on for some time, in consequence of the failure to carry out the Scott Act in the county. It is to be hoped that the day of darkness will speedily give place to the dawn of a brighter morn, when the law will be (as it can, and ought to be) enforced, without any distinction or preference whatever.

As soon as possible after my work in this county was completed, including visitations to the public and Sabbath schools, arrangements were made for work in the counties of Victoria, Inverness, and Richmond; but just before leaving, I had the pleasure of organizing the Willing Workers, Band of Hope, at Sydney, on the afternoon of Monday, the 20th of August, with 13 girls and 16 boys—in all 29 members,—under exceedingly favorable circumstances. This completed my work here for the present, and on Friday, the 24th of August, I arrived at Baddeck, to begin operations in

VICTORIA, INVERNESS AND RICHMOND COUNTIES.

Public meetings were held at Baddeck, Big Baddeck and Middle River, in Victoria County; Whycocomagh, N. E. Margaree, Big Intervale, Margaree Harbor, Strathlorne, Lake Ainslie, Mabou, Port Hood and Port Hawkesbury, in the County of Inverness; at Arichat and St. Peter's, in Richmond County, and at Canso, in Guysboro' County.

While the work was progressing, new Divisions were organized at the following places:—

Crystal Light Division, No. 546, at Whycocomagh, with 31 charter members.

Speedwell, No. 547, at Baddeck, with 41 charter members.

Valley View, No. 548, at Big Baddeck, with 30 charter members.

Guardian Division, No. 550, at Middle River, with 30 charter members.

Strathlorne, No. 553, at Strathlorne, with 32 charter members.

Life Buoy, No. 554, at Port Hawkesbury, with 35 charter members.

I crossed over to Canso and organized Stand Sure Division, No. 555, with 61 charter members.

During my visit to N. E. Margaree, Victory Division, No. 257, resumed work, with 23 old and 14 new members.

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Nothing could be done at Arichat or St. Peters; but it affords me a great degree of pleasure to report a fine Band of Hope at the last named place, in excellent condition and doing a good work. There may be an opening for a Division before the end of another year, but at present nothing can be done in that direction.

It having been decided by the Agency Committee that I should return to Sydney and make a short trip in the interests of the new Divisions organized, arrangements were made accordingly and the following places visited on the way: Baddeck, Big Baddeck, Whycocomagh and Lake Ainslie. At these places public meetings were held, all of which were well attended and a good degree of interest manifested in the cause. It gives me a great degree of pleasure to report the several Divisions doing finely, and looking forward to a season of success during the coming winter. The work being completed in this section, my next duty was to return to Sydney, when arrangements were made to re-visit most of the localities previously visited, which was attended to, and public meetings held in the following order: at Sydney Forks, North West Arm, Sydney, Marion Bridge, Gabarus, Louisburg, Lorway Mines, Bridgeport, Homeville, Mira Gut and Mira River.

It was my privilege to visit the several Divisions, including Rising Dawn Division, at South Bar, and it gives me pleasure to report the new Divisions working exceedingly well, some of the older ones improving, while others occupy about the same position as when they were visited a short time ago, with some slight signs of returning life, and hopeful anticipations for the future. While this work was being attended to, the public and Sabbath schools were not forgotten.

Having endeavored, in as brief a manner as possible, to present a report of the labor performed, as one of the agents of the Grand Division, it remains for me to give a summary of the work done under the direction of the Agency Committee from the 23rd of November, 1882, up to the 23rd of October, 1883, and is as follows:—

And now, in conclusion, as the work of the past is brought up before us in panoramic order, it speaks of discouragements, difficulties and failures; but these have been nothing, in fact, not worth a moment's consideration, when the great successes that have been achieved all along the line are taken into account, as they must be, if we would form a just estimate of the victories won, and the good accomplished in the interests of the cause of God, and truth and virtue.

Where indifference once prevailed, we have to report earnestness, yea, enthusiasm, abounding on every hand, many, by their actions, asking the important question, "Lord, what will thou have me to do?" and finding that there was an abundance of work to be performed. God has been pleased to give signal success, so that, at this time, we are occupying a position in advance of any of the years that are past, and must, from this standpoint, take courage for the future, going forward in the path of duty, until our purposes are completely accomplished.

There will not be time nor space afforded me to chronicle all that has transpired, of an encouraging character, during these months of toil and effort in the several counties visited, nor can I speak too highly in praise of the many true and faithful friends of the cause in the several sections of the country, for their truly genuine hospitality and kindness to me at all times manifested; and, in many instances, at considerable sacrifice, work has been cheerfully done in the interests of the old Order and the cause of total abstinence. It will be safe for me to say that the success we have had could never have been realized, were it not for the valuable assistance rendered by these untiring friends of humanity, who are to be found in every section of our Province; to mention these by name would be to me a great source of pleasure and satisfaction, but for fear that one single name might be omitted, I prefer to speak in general terms, which will include all persons who have in any measure helped forward the work. I say a hearty "God bless you!" in the name of the Agency Committee. May it be theirs to have the "well done" pronounced at the end of the journey.

It becomes my duty, as well as my privilege, to recognize the advanced position taken by the people of this Province in favor of the total prohibition of the liquor traffic. It will be safe for me to say that if the question were tested to-morrow at the polls, a very large majority would vote against the *importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating drinks*; the day is not very far in the distance when this will be the great issue to be tested by the popular vote of the people of this Dominion.

The recent gains made in some of the States of the American Union, together with the victories won in other States, leave it but a question of time with us when here, as in other lands, this unholy traffic shall be made to feel the power and force of law, backed up by an educated public opinion, which must, sooner or later, be productive of the best possible good to all classes of people in our country. May heaven speed the day, and may the goodness of God, as shown to us in the past, lead us to place continued and ever increasing confidence in his power to wrest the prey from the mighty, that the purposes of wicked and designing men may be brought to naught, and the principles of justice, equity and mercy, recognized and appreciated by all. With an ardent and ever increasing desire to see our beloved Order going forward to meet this foe of God and man, working side by side with other organizations for the furtherance of these great and important principles, I submit this report in the bonds of

REPORT

of work done by Thomas M. Lewis, Grand Division Agent and Lecturer, in the Western Counties of Nova Scotia, during the year ending Oct. 23, 1883.

To the Agency Committee:

At the close of my first year of temperance missionary toil, under the direction of the Agency Committee of our noble Order in Nova Scotia, I beg to record my acknowledgements to Almighty God for all His goodness, and especially for

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travelling mercies, during every period of the year and under all circumstances. The thousands of miles travelled, the tens of thousands of persons addressed, and the number of meetings of one kind or another held, will be all duly tabulated and will appear in your report.

I have visited parts of ten counties, viz : Annapolis, Kings, Hants, Lunenburg, Queens, Shelburne, Yarmouth, Digby, Halifax, and Pictou, and cannot forbear to record my sincere impressions of the beauty and prosperity, as well as the comfort, morality and piety of our fine Province. In regard to the drinking practices, I feel assured that they are not at all to be compared in magnitude with those of other days, when our fathers first took upon their shoulders the responsibilities of this great reform. It would be impossible to accord too much importance to the part played by our grand Order of the "Sons" in bringing about the changes which have led to the present attitude of society in regard to the liquor traffic. The founders of our Order in Nova Scotia occupied the first rank of citizenship, in every sense of the word, and comprised men of every shade of creed and political bias, and the consequence is, their impress is left upon society in a corresponding ratio ; and this, undoubtedly, is the cause of our organization occupying the proud position which it does to-day. Our fathers, moreover, were possessed of a sound missionary or propagating spirit in regard to the principles of the Order, and "went everywhere," as their representatives and descendants are to-day trying to do ; and the result of these efforts adown the course of time no human mind can possibly foreshadow.

For nearly three months, about the beginning of the year, I was accompanied by the Grand Worthy Patriarch, Joseph Burrell, Esq., and it is not too much to say that the success of the year, so far as my efforts were concerned, are attributable to his hearty co-operation, and his great sagacity in planning and arranging the details of the work, financial and otherwise. A thousand incidents of travel might be written ; but I feel persuaded that the space accorded to this report will not permit any such details.

I am under great obligations to hundreds of kind friends who entertained me, and stood by me in ways innumerable, and my hope and persuasion are that they will receive a just reward.

APPEAL OF THE AGENCY COMMITTEE TO THE FRIENDS OF TEMPERANCE.

The Grand Division of Nova Scotia has ever regarded the agency work as of the utmost importance in extending the cause of temperance, and as a prime factor in the progress and prosperity of the Order. Its object is to awaken the public mind, by the power of personal appeal, to a vivid perception of the expediency of total abstinence, and of the imperative necessity of organizing against a powerful and organized foe. The experience and observation of the past have shown that all great moral reforms have been mainly indebted to such an agency for their success ; and especially is this the case with the temperance reform in which we find ourselves in the arena of conflict, not with principle and enlightened reason, but with human passions, appetites and prejudices.

At no period has such an agency been more necessary in this country than at present. There is no lack of information as to the evils of the liquor traffic, and the necessity of effective remedial measures. Light has been scattered broadcast

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the land ; it has streamed from the pulpit and the press ; it has reached every hamlet and cottage in the Province. But with multitudes, facts, figures and arguments lie quiescent and dormant. Facts, though admitted and self-evident, are not principles of conduct. They are like seeds buried where the conditions of germination will not reach them. The influence of the living speaker is necessary, not so much to *inform* as to *persuade*—to arouse the sense of individual responsibility, and move men to immediate action.

At no period has there been greater necessity for *organization* on the part of temperance men than at present. We have to contend against a powerful organization, and one whose ramifications extend all over the country—a fraternity bound together by mutual interests, backed by any amount of ill-gotten money, and aided and abetted by multitudes of victims and accessories. They have to some extent, it is true, abandoned the attitude of open and declared resistance (as is evident from the small number of votes cast against the C. T. Act, in the counties where it has been adopted ;) but they have adopted still more formidable methods, and by secret evasions of the law, legal quibbling, seduction of the youth, political and commercial intrigue and fraternization, &c., they are seeking to wear out their opponents, and hold their ground. Such a foe is not to be cut off in detail. Such a foe is too shrewd to show his plans and combinations. Our duty as temperance men is clear. "What king, going to make war against another king, sitteth not down and consulteth whether he be able with ten thousand to meet him that cometh against him with twenty thousand?" How can we be prepared, without organization, to meet an organized foe? and in a trial of strength, the strongest must win. If the foes of temperance are a unit, have a settled policy, and are vigilant and unscrupulous, how much more necessary is it for us, who have infinitely more at stake than they, to be united, organized, and active and loyal in carrying out our principles!

The magnitude and importance of the work done, under the direction of the Agency Committee, during the past year, is entitled to recognition by the general public. Twelve months ago the committee were fortunate enough to secure the services of two able and efficient agents and lecturers, Messrs. Hutchings and Lewis, and these they have kept actively employed in the field during the whole year. How well these agents have done their work appears from the summary of their labors, compiled by the committee. *Four hundred* meetings held, and more than *fifty thousand* people addressed, *a hundred and thirty* schools visited, and over *four thousand* scholars spoken to, is a grand achievement. And in the accomplishment of this work over *seven thousand* miles have been traversed by the agents. The recorded result of these labors is the formation of *ninety* Divisions, with an aggregate membership of *three thousand* men and women pledged to total abstinence and to the extension of the principles of the Order—each Division being a centre of influence and a recruiting station in its own locality. But the full result in setting in operation so many additional propagating agencies, established on a stable basis and under a common head, and in the advancing and ripening of public sentiment for ulterior measures, cannot be estimated.

In view of the record of the year's work which they have presented, the committee are satisfied that the wisdom and utility of continuing an agency which has been so signally successful will not for a moment be doubted. Anticipating a verdict of approval from all true temperance men, the committee have, therefore, determined to keep their agents in the field another year, relying upon the generosity of the friends of the cause that the funds necessary to meet the expense will be forthcoming.

Friends and patrons of humanity and sobriety! we appeal to you for aid! The field is large and "white unto the harvest," and in none will your gifts produce more abundant returns. For the "cause of God and all mankind," and for the sake of suffering, bleeding, perishing manhood, we invite your co-operation and

support ! By your convictions of the justice of our cause ; by your recollections of the ruin which strong drink has wrought, and your pity for the sufferers under its slow torture ; by your hopes of a "better day coming," we ask you to give us your help ; and in the glad after-time you will see your reward in that "sweet symphony of events which will roll its grand harmonies" through a land redeemed from the curse of the destroyer.

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Temperance Text-Book in the Public Schools.

MEMORIAL.

To the Council of Public Instruction for the Province of Nova Scotia :

The memorial of the undersigned Executive Committee of the Grand Division,
Sons of Temperance of Nova Scotia,

RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH :

1. That the Sons of Temperance of Nova Scotia have, from the period of their introduction into this Province, taken the deepest interest in the training of the young, through the instrumentality of Sections of Cadets and Bands of Hope, in the principles of temperance.

2. That, in the judgment of your memorialists, the protection of the coming generation from the vice of intemperance is a measure which presents the strongest claims to the consideration of the Government of the country ; and that, while the State provides for the instruction of the young in morals and the laws of health, the collateral subject of the nature of alcoholic stimulants and their disastrous effects on all human interests, is too momentous to be overlooked, and one just and sound views of which must tell on the history of the future.

3. That in view of these facts, the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance of Nova Scotia, at its last annual session, adopted the following resolution, viz. :—
“ That the executive of this Grand Division be empowered to examine the works published and generally accepted as Text-Books on Temperance ; and that having ascertained which, in their opinion, is best suited to the purpose, they be, and are hereby authorized to urge upon the Council of Public Instruction the placing of such book on the list of works prescribed for use in the Public Schools of this Province.”

4. Your memorialists, representing an Order whose active membership in this Province is over ten thousand persons, would therefore, in accordance with the above resolution, respectfully but strongly urge the Council of Public Instruction to include the “ Temperance Lesson Book, by Benjamin Richardson, M. A., M. D., F. R. S., Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians, London,” among the books prescribed for the instruction of the young in the Public Schools of this Province.

"*Read*—Memorials from the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance of Nova Scotia, and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of Canada, calling attention to the importance of instructing the youth in attendance at our public schools regarding the effects of alcohol on the human system, and the injurious consequences following from its use as a beverage.

"*Ordered*—That the TEMPERANCE LESSON BOOK, by B. W. Richardson, M. A., M. D., LL. D., F. R. S., be placed on the list of books recommended for the use of teachers; that trustees of schools be requested, as far as practicable, to place a copy of this manual on the teacher's desk, with other books of reference, and that teachers be instructed to give their pupils orally, according to their age and capacity, the substance of the lessons contained therein."

ADDRESS OF THE DIVISIONS IN HALIFAX CITY TO THE
TEACHERS IN THE CITY PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

HALIFAX, August 20, 1883.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

The undersigned, representing and acting under the authority of several Subordinate Divisions of the Sons of Temperance of this city, desire to address you on the question of Temperance Lesson Books in the Public Schools. In doing so it may be advisable to, as briefly as possible, relate the action so far taken in the matter.

Early in the present year the Executive of the Grand Division presented to the Council of Public Instruction the following Memorial:

[The memorial and reply are inserted on the preceding page.]

Some time after the receipt and publication of the foregoing order, it was deemed advisable by the several Subordinate Divisions to bring the matter specially before the Board of School Commissioners of the City of Halifax. This was done, in a memorial setting forth the particulars of the Executive's Memorial to the Council of Public Instruction, relating the action taken by the Council, and asking the School Board to give effect to the recommendation in the schools of the city. Though without official information from the School Board, we are aware that the question has been acted upon by that body, the following resolution having been published in the daily papers, as part of the proceedings of a meeting held in July last:—

"*Whereas*, The Council of Public Instruction has ordered that the Temperance Lesson Book, by B. W. Richardson, M. A., be placed on the list of books recommended for the use of teachers; that trustees of schools be requested, as far as possible, to place a copy of this manual on the teachers' desks, with other lessons of reference; and that teachers be instructed to give their pupils orally, according to their age and capacity, the substance of the lessons contained therein; and

"*Whereas*, Representatives of several temperance organizations in the city have memorialized this Board to carry such Order into effect;

"*Therefore Resolved*, That this Board recommend all teachers in the Public Schools to give instruction, as far as practicable, from Richardson's Temperance Lesson Book, to all the pupils under their charge."

While being pleased at the favorable reception given to the memorials, the members of the Order, for whom we speak, feel that their work in this particular direction would not be complete if they did not specially address themselves to

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those upon whom devolves, to so great an extent, the training of the young. And here we beg to disclaim, on behalf of our fraternity, the entertaining of any doubt that the teachers in this city will be reluctant to comply with the recommendations made. In all the discussions on the matter there has not been a doubt even implied. The members of our Order confide to the utmost in the purity and integrity of the teachers, and the same confidence, we are assured, is entertained by all classes in the community. Yet we feel justified in thus addressing you, believing that, if you are made fully aware of the action taken by the Council and the Board, you will the more readily give to the matter the attention which its importance imperatively demands.

Surrounded as our young people are by the temptations of the bar-room, the school children cannot be too early advised to shun the evils flowing from the use of intoxicating drinks; and while they doubtless receive that advice, not only from their parents, but from their teachers,—whose influence for good or evil is scarcely less than that of their parents,—yet we know that the familiar lessons of such a book as that prescribed, when intelligently explained to the scholars, will do much to inform them of the dangerous nature of alcohol, and the disastrous consequences attendant upon its use. Thus, ably seconded by a work recognized as a standard authority on the subject of which it treats, the teacher will find his or her efforts to instruct the young more readily understood, and productive of greater benefit. This being the case, it is not unreasonable to expect a more widely diffused knowledge of this important matter, and in the years to come a greater measure of success attending the efforts of all who seek to benefit themselves and their fellows by avoiding the dangers which beset the paths of those who tamper with strong drink.

That the teachers in the Public Schools of the City of Halifax will do their share towards bringing about so desirable a result, we, and the members of the Order we have the honor to represent, fully believe; and in conclusion, we beg to assure you, ladies and gentlemen, that you will always have the cordial aid of the Sons of Temperance in any and every effort having for its object "the common weal: the good of all mankind."

THE SONS OF TEMPERANCE NATIONAL MUTUAL RELIEF SOCIETY was organized June 25, 1879, by a commission of nine members of the National Division, appointed by the M. W. P. Its object is to strengthen and perpetuate the Order of Sons of Temperance. It is divided into four classes, each of which is practically a separate society. Classes A and D have not yet been started, but class B, in which the insurance is \$1,000, and class C, in which the insurance is \$2,000, are in active operation. Until the classes are full the insurance is one dollar for each member of the class. Any member of the Order between the ages of eighteen and sixty years is eligible to either or both of these classes.

The assessments are graded according to age at the time of joining the society, and are not increased with advancing years.

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The Society is co-extensive with the jurisdiction of the National Division, hence no local epidemic can affect its stability.

Since the organization of the Relief Society we have collected assessments on ten deaths in class B, and thirteen in class C, and have paid to the heirs of deceased members \$12,323.00.

The net gain in membership for the past year is fifty per cent. The membership to-day is eighteen hundred. One hundred and thirty members of the National Division are members of the Relief Society. No representative to the National Division who has joined the Relief Society has yet died.

We have now a surplus in the treasury of more than two thousand dollars.

During the past year we have aided the officers of the National Division in their propagation work, and in the future we shall continue to do this more effectively. The Relief feature will largely increase our force of workers and organizers.

Our admission fee is small.

We have no quarterly or annual dues.

Our assessments are equitably graded.

We pay no death claims caused by drink.

We fulfil all promises.

We claim that for safety, simplicity, economy and promptness, we are excelled by none and equalled by few.

We insure only Sons of Temperance. The executive officers of the various Grand Divisions should therefore give us their hearty co-operation. Our success is theirs.

We invite all temperance workers and organizers to correspond with our General Secretary. In connection with M. W. P. and M. W. Scribe of the Order, we wish to arrange for organizers throughout North America. Live, active men and women will be paid for their work.

The success of the Relief Society will give additional popularity and permanence to the Order.

We want a soliciting agent in every Division in the states and Provinces.

OUR PLAN.

To become a member you must be a Son of Temperance in good standing in a Division, and under sixty years of age. The membership fee to one class is \$3.00; to each subsequent class \$2.00. Each applicant pays his own Medical Examiner. You can join class B—\$1,000—or class C—\$2,000—or both. September 1, 1883, class A—\$500—will be opened, so that we can then give \$3,500 insurance to such as desire it.

The treasury of each class is separate and distinct. As each class has its own members and its own deaths, it has also its own expenses and its own treasury. In keeping the accounts of the classes separate, we have the only equitable plan of giving different amounts of insurance in the same society.

When a death occurs the assessment card is sent directly to each member from the main office, and all remittances are forwarded to the General Secretary, who returns a receipted card. This is simple and easily understood by all. There is no divided responsibility in the handling of assessments.

The Relief Society is managed by a Board of Government consisting of fifteen of the prominent members of the National Division. The Most Worthy Patriarch, three Past Most Worthy Patriarchs and the Most Worthy Treasurer are now members of the Board. These gentlemen are chosen because of their business qualifications and their general fitness for the work.

All applications must be approved by the Chief Medical Examiner, who resides in Washington.

Applications may be made through the Recording Scribe of any Division, or to the Grand Scribe, or through any of our solicitors, or direct to the General

Secretary. If your Division has no regularly-appointed solicitor, we shall be pleased to appoint one.

Read directions to Deputies, relative to money remittances. If the Blank Return has been mislaid, write to Grand Scribe for another.
